The elegant mythologies of Greece and Rome made no proselytes among other nations, and fell hopelessly when they fell. The Koran of Mahomet has, it is true, been propagated by the sword; but it has been propagated by nothing else; and its dominion has been limited to those nations who could not reply to that logic.—If the Bible be false, the facility with which it overleaps the otherwise impassable boundaries of race and clime, and domiciles itself among so many different nations, is assuredly a far more striking and wonderful proof of human ignorance, perverseness and stupidity, than is afforded in the limited prevalence of the most abject superstitions; or it really has merits, which, though a fable, have enabled it to impose so comprehensively and variously on mankind, wonderful indeed must have been its composition—so wonderful indeed that the infidel himself ought never to regard it but with the profoundest reverence, as far too successful and sublime a fabrication to admit a thought of scoff or ridicule. *Edinburgh Review.*

THE PAMPERO.
These cases were both submitted for a decision last week, and on Thursday of the present week His Honor Judge Bronson delivered his opinion and decision in each case.

The evidence and propositions submitted by counsel were commented on at considerable length, and a decree of condemnation against the vessel directed in both cases.

The sale of the Pampero, we understand, will take place at Jacksonville about the 17th of January next.

The counsel for the claimant, Mr. Segur, prayed an appeal in each case, which was granted, but will not affect the decree for a sale of the vessel.

The salvage case of Fontane & Pent against the steamer, has been postponed to first Monday in April, as well as all other claims and questions as to the distribution of the proceeds of the sale.—*St. Augustine Advocate.*

The editor of *Murper's Hog*azine very judiciously expands a suggestion contained in one of Mr. Greeley's letters from England. "Our eyes have just now fallen upon a passage in Mr. Greeley's last letter from Europe, in which he speaks of the appearance of the English women, and commends, with a little more than his usual ardor of expression, their perfection of figure. He attributes this, and very justly, to the English lady's habit of out-of-door exercise. We had thought that this fact was known; that it was known years ago, and that our fair country women would catch a hint from it, that would throw colour into their cheeks and fulness into their forms.—And yet; sadly enough, our ladies still coop themselves in their heated rooms, until their faces are like lilies, and their figures—like lily stems. We have alluded to the matter now, not for the sake of pointing a satire surely, but for the sake of asking those one or two hundred thousand ladies, who every month light our pages with their looks if they do indeed prize a little unnatural pearliness of hue and delicacy of complexion, beyond that ruddy flush of health (the very temper of a kiss!) and that full development of figure, which all the poets, from Homer down, have made one of the chiefest beauties of a woman? If not, let them make of themselves horsewomen; or, besting that, let them make acquaintance with the sunrise; let them pick flowers with the dew upon them; let them study music of na-

ture's own orchestra. Vulgarity is not essential to health, and a lithe, elastic figure does not grow in hot-houses. For ourselves, we incline heartily to the belief, that if American women have a wish to add to the respect, the admiration, the love, and (if need be) the fear of the men, they will find an easier road towards that gain, in a little vigorous out-of-door exercise and a uniform attention to the great essentials of health, than in any new-fangled costumes, or loudly applauded 'rights.'"

AUSTRIA.—Advices from Hamburg to the 23rd Nov. state that an armed revolt had been organized among several regiments of the Austrian army in Holstein, which was on the point of breaking out, in open defiance of the Empire, when it was discovered and checked.

Many of the regiments were composed mostly of Hungarians, who were said to be incited by agents of Kossuth and the revolutionary propagandists in London. A large number of officers and soldiers had been arrested.

Several Hungarian noblemen are implicated.

An agent of Kossuth had been arrested at Presburg, in whose pocket was found a proclamation inciting the people to revolt.
