The Value Adjustment Board (the "VAB") is an independent governmental agency created by Chapter 194 of the Florida Statutes to accept and process taxpayers petitions contesting the value of real estate and personal property assessed by the Property Appraiser's Office. Hearings are conducted by "Special Magistrates" appointed by the VAB to determine whether or not property is property assessed. If not, then the VAB has the authority to make any necessary adjustment. On June 17, 2008, the Governor signed 14B 999 into law. This law chapted the composition of the Value Adjustment Board from three County Commission and two School Board members to two County Commissioners, one School Board member, one citizen appointed by the County Commission and one citizen appointed by the County Commission and one citizen appointed by the School Board. Executive Summary

Staff requests the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) adopt the attached Business Plan (Exhibit 1). It describes principles, policies and strategies that allow Alachua County to harvest and sell timber at market value from Alachua County Forever-managed preserves. The Plan also describes the state of the timber resource inventory on the preserves, outlines the harvesting strategies, estimates the potential revenue, and prescribes the uses of the proceeds.

Issues

The County would be harvesting timber on conservation lands. All harvesting plans and harvesting activities are intended to further the goals of the County under the Alachua County Forever program; protect and enhance water resources, habitats and to provide resource-based recreational areas. Logging can result in impacts to the properties that are unsightly, ecologically damaging and necessitate closures of portions of the property during harvesting. However, with proper planning, oversight and execution, staff is confident that these activities ultimately lead to better ecological function and some additional revenue to further the County's goals. County staff recommends the BoCC adopt the six policy directives (page 5 of the Plan, Exhibit 1) to further the BoCC's adopted Principles for stewardship of ACF preserves and to enhance the County's ability to efficiently manage the timber harvesting and the revenues generated by these operations. These are: 1. The Board of County Commissioners recognizes that restoring the form and function of the native forest is the primary purpose of such timber harvesting on ACF-managed lands.4. The Board of County Commissioners recognizes that timber harvested is a commodity, has economic value subject to market forces, and directs that it should be sold at market value.5. The Board of County Commissioners recognizes it is beneficial for the County to re-invest the harvest revenue to manage the Alachua County Forever portfolio of preserves and directs that these timber funds supplement existing core funding to provide and enhance the sites' capital improvements.6. The Board of County Commissioners recognizes that this initial Business Plan will be amended to address available economic opportunities, changes in market dynamics or timber stand age, or to adapt to operations that alter stand composition. Acts of God including beetle outbreaks, windstorm and wildfire. The Board therefore directs staff to revise this Plan at least every five years. Those revisions will be described in the annual workplans for the portfolio and incorporated in the revision to this Plan. Normal market variations affecting stand choice and revenue receipts do not merit revisions to this Plan.

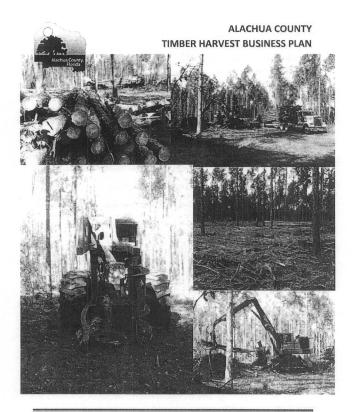

Among these were a "no loss of conservation values" stewardship philosophy and a directive that any stewardship be consistent with Alachua County Forever's primary goal of preserving, restoring and enhancing environmental values. Several preserves contain planted pines. Intensive treatments to reduce competition and maximize growth to produce densely-stocked even-aged stands of timber were typically utilized by prior landowners. This strategy maximizes return on investment but at the cost of the rich, diverse natural plant and animal communities that previously existed on these sites and perpetuation of these practices will result in a loss of conservation values. The restoration of this even-aged forest to an uneven-aged canopy -- and contemporaneous restoration of the ecological benefits associated with it -- is one of the County's preserve stewardship goals. Restoration treatments include timber harvests (i.e. thinnings, selective harvest, and clear-cut depending on the ecological goals for the preserve), prescribed fire, and plantings. The harvested timber is a commodity with economic value subject to unique market forces. It is appropriate to take advantage of this opportunity and derive income from this restoration effort. A sound management strategy can facilitate the ecological restoration of the lands, improve the quality of both ecological and recreational values, and provide some funds to accomplish these stewardship goals.

The term timber is used throughout to describe planted pine, off-site hardwoods, or exotics. Silviculture is the art, science, and practice of establishing, tending, and reproducing forest stands of desired characteristics. It is based on knowledge of species characteristics and environmental requirements. A glossary of other terms is included at the end of this Plan. This Plan focuses on the process of timber harvesting and the use of the proceeds. It is not intended to be a comprehensive treatment of preserve silviculture, restoration nor resource management. It does, however provide some context for the need for timber harvesting.

The purpose of this Business Plan is to:

- Articulate certain principles that guide timber harvesting on Alachua County Forever (ACF)managed lands
- Describe common harvest practices that may be used on ACF-managed lands
- Recommend to the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners (BoCC) sound business practices that guide timber harvest on these lands
- Identify the timber stands that require harvesting and estimate their product classes, economic value, and projected harvest schedule.

This Plan will be amended by staff as budgets, policies, market forces or other events require. The Plan will also be amended as additional site information is gathered, timber stock-and-stand data is analyzed and ontimal harvest strategies are developed.

Recommended Board Policy Directives

The BoCC adopted the following Guiding Principles at their February 26th, 2002 regular commission meeting (Item # 42R-022602).

- 1. Certain administrative and operating expenses of the program may be borne by the General Fund. There are competing needs for County services using the General Fund and the services and benefits of land conservation to the community must be considered in the context of those other public needs. Additional sources of program support may need to be developed to support the operating costs, e.g. user feats.
- 2. Commercial Pooled Paper should be used to initially acquire properties until the appropriate time to issue the ACF Bonds. All costs directly related to the acquisition of a project, whether or not it is successfully consummated, are reimbursable from the Bonds.
- 3. The ACF program will use the existing contracts where appropriate and develop new contracts or the internal capacity where there is a deficiency in expertise or resources in the community. The BoCC recognizes the great value of using ACF funds to leverage partnerships in the protection of the country's sensitive lands. The Country has the fiduciary responsibility for ACF funds and therefore will require BoCC approval prior to any application being made regarding committing funds in such partnerships.
- 4. The BoCC is aware that there are long term stewardship costs associated with projects selected but no funding source other than the General Fund Reserves has been identified. To minimize stewardship expenses while the Program is in this initial acquisition phase, staff will use a strategy of "no loss of conservation values" stewardship. The initial stewardship program will

reflect this strategy. As the program matures and other funding sources materialize, the stewardship program may be enhanced.

5. Any stewardship of ACF sites shall be consistent with the ACF's primary goal of preserving, restoring and enhancing environmental values. A stewardship plan will be developed within 12months of acquisition and made available for public comment prior to BoCC approval.

In furtherance of these Principles and to enhance the County's ability to efficiently manage the timber harvesting and the revenues generated by these operations, County staff recommends the following be adopted by the BOC:

- The Board of County Commissioners recognizes that a well-managed forest contributes to the community's quality of life by protecting and enhancing wildlife habitats, protecting water resources and providing natural areas suitable for resource-based recreation.

Normal market variations affecting stand choice and revenue receipts do not merit revisions to this Plan.

The Timber Resource

The ACF portfolio of properties acquired over the past several years are as varied as the ownerships from which they were acquired and the ecosystems present in these preserves. The management objectives of the previous owners ranged from intensive industrial silviculture, agriculture, recreation or investment to a valued place to live and raise a family. Many landowners altered the existing natural communities to achieve their visions and objectives on the land they owned. A number of these properties have been planted in pine trees that are now or will be merchantable. In these instances, harvesting timber may be the first step towards furthering the County's goal of maintaining and restoring the land to its natural state and condition.

Planted pine stands currently occupy approximately 1,200 acres of the preserves managed by the County (Table 1). Stands range from 18 to 468-acres in size, 5 to 19 years in age, and are planted on sites that vary from old agricultural fields to typical flatwood communities. Site preparation utilized to establish the trees is similarly varied, running the spectrum from intensive cultural treatments to just sticking trees in the ground. The intensive treatments to control competition and enhance growth at time of planting include mechanical chopping, root raking, bedding, herbicide, and fertilization. The seedlings on some sites come from genetically improved sources, collected in seed orchards and graded on their increased growth and disease resistance characteristics. Other seeds were gathered in the wild simply as a seed source to grow seedlings. Generally, the prior landowner's decision to use one of these various methods is financially-based. Intensive site preparation can be quite expensive and how much is invested on site preparation depends on the expected Return on Investment.

There are other County-managed areas that contain natural and planted pine stands that have exceeded the optimal age to respond to thinning or are planted in a pine species (e.g. Sand Pine) that does not respond to thinning. These have not been included in Table 1. ACF Staff will include the timber management of these acres in the annual work plan as they are developed every year.

Restoring Natural Communities

The ecological quality of a site can be regarded as being on a continuum based on the ecological values and functions present. The continuum ranges from very high and therefore highly functioning, to low and devoid of natural character and function. The County acquires sites along this continuum. Stewardship of a site is geared toward maintaining or improving its position on the continuum so that it is moving forward and increasing its ecological values and functions. At the very least, staff works to maintain it in its current condition in accordance with the BoCC's Guiding Principle #4 and not lose conservation value.

In a truly natural system, wildfire, climatic disturbances, soils, rainfall patterns, along with insects and diseases determined the characteristics of the natural habitats in Florida. Today, Florida is fast approaching a condition where natural areas are becoming islands and the historical large-scale disturbances (i.e., fire, climatic disturbances, insect and disease populations) no longer operate in the same way and with the same effectiveness. Land managers must use a variety of tools to help mimic natural processes that maintain natural habitats. These tools include prescribed fire (figure 3), mechanical

treatments (mowing, roller chopping, mulching), selective herbicide use and timber harvests.

Thinning individual trees from an overcrowded forest creates a more natural forest structure, and redistributes light, moisture and nutrients to the residual trees, shrubs and groundcover plants. This practice enhances growth rates of remaining trees and allows dormant plants to occupy their former sites, helping to restore the natural habitat. Another benefit of thinning forest trees is to reduce fuel loads and facilitate prescribed fire. Healthy, less crowed forests have fewer insect outbreaks, are less susceptible to wildfire and are used by a wider variety of wildfife.

The Preserve Management Plans adopted by the BoCC call for restoring these planted pine stands, converting them from a short-rotation (40 years or less) even-age management regime, usually associated with intensive silviculture and a profit-driven tenure, to a long-rotation (100 years or more) uneven-aged management strategy. This encourages the restoration of diverse plant and animal communities that have become increasingly rare. Timber harvests for restoration may commonly involve thinning a forest or more rarely a clear-cut approach depending on resource management goals. Revenues will be utilized to fund the management of these forests to achieve goals.

Thinning Planted Pine Stands - A Road to Restoration

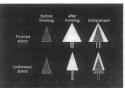
As mentioned in the previous section, planted stands are usually overstocked with trees to compensate for losses so that a desirable final density of natural or commercially viable trees is achieved. Typically, stands are established with a tree density such that the basal area is between 100 to 200 square feet per acre. Basal area is a measure of stand density developed by foresters to measure growth in a stand. It is the total cross-sectional area (square feet) measured 4.5 feet above the ground (DBH-diameter breast height) of all the trees contained in one acre. A historically appropriate overstory basal area usually ranges between 60-70 square feet per acre.

Once the stand is established and trees have reached merchantable age and/or size, thinning will be used to reduce the basal of a stand. More than one thin may be required to achieve the desired basal area. Thinning is a silvicultural operation where selected individual trees are removed from the stand to reduce the density of trees and to improve growing conditions for the remaining overstory trees and understory plants. A major restoration goal is to replace inappropriate tree species with those

appropriate to the natural community. Many thinnings, over an appropriate period can be used to gradually replace the entire stand with native species. There are currently approximately 1,200 acres of planted pines, on properties managed by the County, that will need to be thinned between now and 2020. Table 1 above lists the stand characteristics and treatments.

The rule of thumb for the correct age to begin thinning on normal sites is 15 years after planting for three reasons. First, this is the age that receiving mills in our area consider the point in a tree's life cycle that is suitable for the pulping process (the point at which the length of fiber contained in the wood is sufficient to obtain the desired strength characteristics). Second, this is the normal age that planted pine growth begins to slow down due to the resource competition. There are diminishing returns in growth with delays in harvesting. Third, this is the approximate time when it would be appropriate to select dominant or co-dominant trees in the stand. The dominant stand trees are those usually selected and retained on site as the seed-bearing (mast) trees. If of the appropriate species, these specimens and their offspring begin the restoration process to uneven-aged old growth management.

Once the stand has been thinned, the resources that all trees in the stand once competed for will now be redistributed to the residual trees (figure 4). The remaining trees increase in growth and vigor and the chance of insect or disease damage is decreased. Thinning also lessens the risk of fire events causing permanent damage or mortality. The timing of the first thinning is also critical. The opportunity to capture the increased growth and economic potential generated by thinning is short and the tree's ability to benefit from Figure 4. un-thinned stands.

ACF staff will decide on an appropriate thinning methodology -- complete removal of rows, harvesting individual trees, patch thinning, or a clear-cut -- as the situation dictates. Trees that show evidence of disease, crooks, forks, and trees that are suppressed in height and diameter will be removed between the take rows. In order to maintain the desired basal area range during the entire rotation, ACF staff will monitor the stand's crown closure and the growth rate of the residual trees. Based on this data, thinning may need to occur in each stand every 5-15 years until the desired stand age classes and densities are achieved.

Staff may also change the method of thinning from a mechanical method (by row) to an individual tree selection method depending on the desired goals. One component of basal area is tree diameter. As the stands are thinned and the growth potential of the site is redistributed to the residual trees, the diameter growth will increase over time as will the basal area even though the numbers of stems in each stand decreases. This relationship allows the County site manager to manipulate crown densities by having fewer larger trees in the stand while achieving the desired basal area of old growth forests.

Timber Revenue - the Vehicle for Restoration

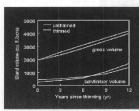


Figure 5. Yield curves for thinned and un-thinned stands

Initially, revenue is generated from two commodity classes, Chip and Saw (CNS) and Pulpwood. Other common revenue-generating classes such as Plywood logs (plylogs) and Poles are not included in the stands at present. This is due to the relatively young age of these stands. As the diameter and height of the trees increase with time these commodity classes will show up in future harvests (figure S). In timber management, log diameter generally determines the commodity class and generally the higher the class, the more valuable the tree.

The harvesting schedule selected by the County site manager is dictated by several factors; ecological considerations being the most important. Staff will evaluate the trade-off between time, stand value and restoration goals to decide when a particular stand should be harvested. Certain product classes may experience economically driven peaks and valleys in value further influencing staff's decision to cut or let stand a particular area depending'on the value of the product classes contained within the stand. Harvest priorities may change with unforeseen emergencies and natural events such as insect infestations and windstorms which may wipe out a valuable stands. In these cases, salvage cuts, where at-risk and diseased trees are harvested to prevent the spread of an infestation, or downed and stressed trees are harvested after a storm to derive some value. Like any commodity, timber markets respond to supply and demand from wood users. Widespread natural events can result in a flooded market, thus depressing the price. In these markets, wood processing mills may reject timber altogether.

A relatively new product class which will influence long term management decisions is the use of the currently un-merchantable stems and debris left over from logging operations (slash) as fuel for blomass-powered electricity generating plants. On typical industrial forest sites, this debris is left on site, piled and burned or spread throughout the harvest area. As these power plants are built and fuel demands increase, there may be viable economic incentive allowing pre-commercial thinnings that will generate income where once there was none. As the market for blomass matures, this Plan may be amended to capture new economic opportunities.

There are several strategies used to sell standing timber, each with unique benefits and challenges. In the first, a lump sum price is negotiated for the standing trees and the trees legally become the real property of the buyer at the execution of the contract. The trees remain on the property of the purchaser until harvested or the term of

the contract expires. The advantage of the lump sum

transaction lies in its simplicity and is akin to a simple sale of a house or property. The price is generally that which satisfies both parties. The disadvantage is that the timber seller may not know the actual value of the wood as that is determined at the mill and is dependent on market conditions. Usually the buyer is more knowledgeable and will make an offer based on discounting his estimate of the timber value by their transportation costs, risk of loss, and profit. This method also restricts the number of

d profit. This method also restricts the number of bidders that will participate because of the generally large amount of up front capital required to participate. For the County, this could mean significant loss of revenue because of these discounts.

A second strategy that needs to be evaluated since it may maximize revenue potential is where the County negotiates a delivered price directly from the various receiving mills. The County would develop a pool of contract loggers and pay them a log-and-haul rate for services provided. The County is then paid for wood delivered directly from the receiving mill, eliminating any broker or middleman.

This Log-and-Haul method requires two separate contracts; one with the logger and a second with the mill. It also requires expertise on the area's timber markets, familiarity with loggers and mills, and knowledge of the stands to be harvested. It also allows the County to instantly react to changing market conditions, ecological or environmental issues that may arise. This method requires the County to have staff expertise in timber markets, knowledge of and access to receiving mills and availability of qualified logging contractors in the basin. Alachua County currently has this expertise on staff.

In the interim, Alachua County will typically employ a third strategy which guarantees a greater percentage of the timber value. The County will

advertise the sale and accept bids based on a Pay-as-Cut system where the bidders offer a price for each

commodity class. The bids are analyzed by comparing the different log specifications and prices submitted by each bidder for the different commodity classes. The winning bid maximizes the revenue for the County, while using a qualified logger. This strategy allows the largest number of qualified bidders to participate as there is no upfront money required to participate in the bidding process. The County is then paid for the timber on a weekly basis as it is harvested and removed from the site. This sale type also allows the County flexibility to modify the scope of work or cease operations during the harvest if unforeseen ecological or environmental issues arise. The Pay-as-Cut method requires the County to have in-house expertise capable of cruising the timber stands, analyzing current market conditions and usage demands at the various milk, setimating the stand value, and evaluating the bids.

Sales from individual stands in a preserve may be combined to provide enough acreage to make them economically viable for bidders. For example the sale from the Phifer Flatwoods Preserve will combine a 28-acre stand with an 18-acre stand and harvested in 2016 even though the optimal thinning date for the 28-acre stand is 2013.

When the site manager chooses the appropriate stand and schedule for harvest, sales from these stands will follow the normal purchasing procedures handled by the County Administrative Services Department (ASD) in consultation with ACF staff. These are generally:

- 1. ACF staff prepares the scope of services including desired product specifications
- ASD Purchasing advertises the proposed activity and upon request, disseminates a bid package containing all the information necessary for qualified timber buyers

- 3. The prospective buyer reviews the scope of services for the project, locates the stand. evaluates the timber being sold, and then completes all requirements and submits the bid package
- 4. ACF and ASD staffs review the bids, select the winning bidder and complete the award process. The contract will go to the County Manager or to the Board of County Commissioners for approval depending on value
- 5. The vendor will complete the work according to the contract with due regard for the impact on neighbors, road network, and adjacent property values
- 6. County staff will monitor the work, reconcile the load, scale and trucking tickets with the receipts, and deposit the proceeds in the appropriate revenue account. The accounts will be identified by the preserve-specific accounting nomenclature sequence in use by the County for Alachua County Forever-managed preserves. For example, fund 326-5574.365.20-00 would deposit the proceeds in a fund specifically for the Lake Alto Preserve
- 7. Those proceeds may then be expended on stewardship projects that further the goals of the adopted management plans and annual work plans for the sites.

The County should also retain a number of loggers under contract who can respond to calls for salvage harvests. This would allow for getting wood to market rapidly and minimize the loss of revenue in a flooded market.

Table 2 below shows expected revenues that may be generated by the first thinning of stands managed by the County. The per ton value of the timber used to calculate the potential revenue was based on \$9.00/ton for pine pulpwood and \$12.00/ton for Chip-and-Saw (prices as of 3rd Qtr 2010) and can be expected to fluctuate over time as economic conditions, supply and weather conditions exert their influence on the market (Table 3). By keeping a close eye on market fluctuations, staff can take advantage of any price increases that coincide with the desired thinning dates.

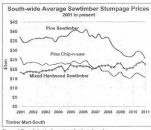




Figure 9 Trends in timber prices for last decade

Revenues generated by these timber sales should be used for stewardship of the Alachua County Forever-managed preserves. This is appropriate since these trees were considered part of the property when it was purchased. It is also appropriate to spend the proceeds on a different Preserve if the harvested site does not need the revenues and the recipient site does to achieve the BoCC approved.

The disposition of the funds also depends on the legal constraints and funding covenants that govern the trees and the property. For example, according to the recorded Grant Covenants, revenues from properties that were acquired with Florida Communities Trust grants must be used on management activities that occur on the same property from which the trees were harvested.

The Business Plan - A Static Document for Specific Management of Dynamic Ecosystems

The data presented here will become stale as management and natural forces take effect. Therefore this Plan is a document that will need to be modified many times. New management techniques, variable economic conditions, Acts of God, forces of nature, new markets, and current markets that disappear over time should all be considered, judged by their merits and incorporated into the Plan if they are beneficial to the desired management goals. The original components should be constantly evaluated for relevance to the Plan's objectives over time and either modified or discarded as needed. The Plan is no more than the first step of a long and ever-changing path of public stewardship of these assets.

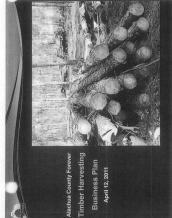

BASAL AREA	The cross section area of the stem or stems of a plant or of all plants in a stand,
	generally expressed as square units per unit area. Tree basal area is used to determine percent stocking and is the cross section area of a tree stem in square feet, commonly measured at breast height (4.5' above ground) and inclusive of bark, usually computed by using diameter at breast height (d.b.h.) or tallied through the use of basal area factor angle gauge.
CANOPY	A layer or multiple layers of branches and foliage at the top or crown of a forest's trees.
CHIP	Small piece of wood used to make pulp. Chips are made either from wood waste in a sawmill or pulpwood operation, or from pulpwood specifically cut for this purpose. Chips are larger and coarser than sawdust
CHIP-n-SAW	A cutting method used in cutting lumber from trees that measure between 6 and 14 inches diameter at breast height. The process chips off the rounded outer layer of a log before sawing the remaining cant or rectangular inside section into lumber. Chip-n-saw mills provide a market for trees larger than pulpwood and smaller than sawtimber.
CLEAR-CUT HARVEST	A harvesting and regeneration method that removes all trees within a given area. Clear-cutting is most commonly used in pine and hardwood forests, which require full sunlight to regenerate and grow efficiently.
CO-DOMINANT TREES	Trees or shrubs with crowns receiving full light from above, but comparatively little from the sides. Crowns usually form the general level of the canopy. (In stagnated stands will be small-sized and crowded on the sides).
CORD	A stack of round or split wood consisting of 128 cubic feet of wood, bark, and air space. A standard cord measures 4 feet by 4 feet by 8 feet. A face cord or short cord is 4 feet by 8 feet by any length of wood under 4 feet.
CROWN	Upper part of a tree, including the branches and foliage.
CROWN CLOSURE (COVER)	The percentage of the ground covered by a vertical projection of the outermost perimeter of the natural spread of the foliage of plants.
CRUISE	A survey of forestland to locate timber and estimate its quantity by species, products, size, quality, or other characteristics.
EVEN-AGED MANAGEMENT	A forest management method in which all trees in an area are harvested at one time or in several cuttings over a short time to produce stands that are all the same age or nearly so. This management method is commonly applied to shade- intolerant conifers and hardwoods.
INTENSIVE FOREST MANAGEMENT	Utilization of a wide variety of silvicultural practices, such as planting, thinning, fertilization, harvesting, and genetic improvement, to increase the capability of the forest to produce fiber.
MERCHANTABLE	Logs exceeding a minimum size and a minimum usable volume that are suitable for sale.
OLD-GROWTH STAND	Ecosystems distinguished by old trees and related structural attributes. Old growth encompasses the later stages of stand development which typically differ from earlier stages in a variety of characteristics that may include tree size,

	accumulations of large dead woody material, number of canopy layers, specie composition, and ecosystem function. The age at which old growth develops an the specific structural attributes that characterize old growth will vary widel according to forest type, climate, site conditions and disturbance regime. Fo example, old growth in fire-dependent forest types may not differ from younge forests in the number of canopy layers or accumulation of down woody material However, old growth is typically distinguished from younger growth by several of the following structural attributes: • Large trees for species and site. • Wide variation in tree sizes and spacing. • Accumulations of large-size dead standing and fallen trees that are high relative to earlier stages. • Decadence in the form of broken or deformed tops or bole and root decay. • Multiple canopy layers. • Canopy gaps and understory patchiness.
OVERSTORY	Layer of foliage in a forest canopy including the trees in a timber stand. Tall mature

PRESCRIBED CONTROLLED BUF	or The use of fire under specific environmental conditions to achieve forest management objectives. Used to reduce hazardous fuel levels, control unwanted vegetation, favor desired vegetation, and improve visibility and wildlife habitation.
ROTATION	The number of years required to establish and grow trees to a specified size, product, or condition of maturity.
SALES TYPES	Lump-sum Sale – The sale of timber in which the price is agreed upon before any trees are removed. Unit Sale (or pay as cut) - The buyer makes regular payments based on mill receipts. Sealed Bid Sale - A timber sale, usually offered through a consulting forester, in which buyers submit sealed bids. Can be lump-sum or pay as cut. Negotiated Sale - A timber sale in which the buyer and the seller negotiate an arm's length stumpage price. Can be lump-sum or pay as cut.
SALVAGE CUT	The harvesting of dead or damaged trees or of trees in danger of being killed by insects, disease, flooding, or other factors in order to save their economic value.
SAWLOG	or A log or tree that is large enough (usually 10 to 12 inches in diameter) to be sayed
SAWTIMBER	into lumber. Minimum log length is typically 8 feet.
SELECTIVE CUTTIN	The periodic removal of individual trees or groups of trees to improve or regenerate a stand.
SILVICULTURE	The art, science, and practice of establishing, tending, and reproducing forest stands of desired characteristics. It is based on knowledge of species characteristics and environmental requirements.
SLASH	(a) Tree tops, branches, bark, or other residue left on the ground after logging or other forestry operations. (b) Tree debris left after a natural catastrophe.
STAND	An easily defined area of the forest that is relatively uniform in species composition or age and can be managed as a single unit.

STAND CONDITION	A classification of forest stands based upon the age of maturity and structure of the overstory and understory. See old-growth and young-growth stands.				
STOCKING	A description of the number of trees, basal area, or volume per acre in a forest stand compared with a desired level for balanced health and growth. Most often used in comparative expressions, such as well-stocked, poorly stocked, or overstocked.				
STUMPAGE PRICE	The price paid for standing forest trees.				
THINNING	A tree removal practice that reduces tree density and competition between tree in a stand. Thinning concentrates growth on fewer, high-quality trees, provide periodic income, and generally enhances tree vigor. Heavy thinning can benef wildlife through the increased growth of ground vegetation.

Executive Summary

The Board of County Commissioners requested in February 2009 that all county advisory boards be given sunset dates as a mechanism for allowing automatic periodic reviews of each board. The Historical Commission will sunset on April 30, 2011 unless the County Commission takes action, and the Historical Commission requests approval for extensions.

Background

The Historical Commission was re-established in 1991 and again in 2009, and is currently comprised of eleven (11) Boardappointed citizens and one (1) appointed Alternate who are each knowledgeable of local history and culture. A copy of the resolution 09-062 currently in effect (since July 2009) with all the responsibilities indicated is included for information purposes. At the meeting in March 2011 the Historical Commission requested staff to place this request to extend the sunset date past April 30, 2011. The recommended resolution requiring action would extend the Historical Commission's susred tate to April 30, 2018. Such seven (7) year extension would be consistent with the general direction provided by the BoCC to the Advisory Board Coordinator. The recommended resolution also includes revision to the reporting requirement as specified in the February 2011 Rules of Procedure for Advisory Boards. The Historical Commission promotes, preserves and protects Alachua County history, represents the County in matters pertaining to history and provides leadership in advancing the identification, protection, preservation and interpretation of cultural resources. Efforts include promoting the state historic marker program and assisting local historical organizations. In recent years the Historical Commission has provided letters of support to Alachua County Forever and Alachua Conservation Trust for land conservation of sites with unique local history, since the Florida Forever grant program includes this criteria. Another unique program of particular interest to family genealogists is the Alachua County Virtual Cemetery, and unince database of cornetery grave markers. Recently the Florida Public Archaeology Network has been providing technical assistance to this project. The Historic Preservation Element of the Comprehensive Plan requires a Historic Resources Master Plan and the Historic Commission is assisting staff with this project. A photo is included of the Historical Commission meeting of March 2010. Persons left to right in photo are as follows. William Valentino; Jenny Wolfe; Bill Breeze; Verdell Robinson; Melanie Barr, Ashley Wood (Chair); Kendra Gillum; Karen Kirkman; Florence Van Arnam; Amanda Aubuchon; and Carl Rose.

WHEREAS, on July 14, 2009, Resolution 09-062 rescinded and restated said Resolutions in order to provide for a sunset date and to amend the responsibilities, duties, and operations of this Committee; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners wishes to extend the sunset date and amend the operations of this Committee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. Resolution 09-062 is hereby amended as follows:

Section 2. <u>Designated Special Committee</u>. This Advisory Committee is designated as a Special Committee. The sunset date for the Advisory Committee is April 30th, 29142018.

Section 5. 8) Reports. The Advisory Committee shall submit all reports and communications directly to the County Commission Chair—Advisory Board Program Coordinator, with a copy to the County Manager or designee. Historical Commission Staff Liaison. The Advisory Board Program Coordinator will forward the correspondence to the County Commission Chair and the County Manager. Any Advisory Committee reports required by the Alachua County Commission's Rules of Procedure shall be submitted in accordance with said Rules.

Section 2. Effective Date. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA, RE-ESTABLISHING THE ALACHUA COUNTY HISTORICAL COMMISSION; ESTABLISHING THE MEMBERSHIP AND QUALIFICATIONS; ESTABLISHING THE RESPONSIBILITIES AND DUTIES; ESTABLISHING PROVISIONS FOR OPERATION; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on March 19, 1991, the Board of County Commissioners of Alachua County adopted Ordinance 91-3 re-establishing the Alachua County Historical Commission; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners has decided to dissolve and reestablish the Alachua County Historical Commission;

NOW THEREFORE, LET IT BE RESOLVED BY THE ALACHUA COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS:

- Section I. <u>Advisory Board Established</u>. The Board of County Commissioners of Alachua County, Florida (Board) hereby re-establishes the Alachua County Historical Commission (Advisory Committee).
- Section 2. <u>Designated Special Committee</u>. This Advisory Committee is designated as a Special Committee. The sunset date for the Advisory Committee is April 30th, 2011.
- Section 3. Membership and Qualifications. The Advisory Committee shall consist of no more than eleven (11) voting members appointed by the Board plus one alternate member, staggered so that approximately one-third of the positions identified in subsection 3.A. below will be appointed each year. All appointments shall be for three (3)-year terms. Current members may continue to serve until their term expiration date, including those in positions that are to be eliminated.
- A. <u>Voting Members</u>. Vacancies for the eleven (11) positions plus the alternate member position shall be advertised and appointed by the County, and shall represent the following categories:
 - Alachua County resident (at large) Eleven (11) members
 - 2) Alachua County resident (at large) alternate member

Knowledge of local history is the main criteria for appointment. Applicants are encouraged from local history organizations. A list of historical organizations in Alachua County is available at http://web.dcp.ufl.edu/juna/Historic/reservation/historg.htm.

Section 4. Responsibilities and Duties. The responsibility of the Advisory Committee shall be to:

- Promote, preserve and protect Alachua County's historic resources; it shall be the duty of the Historic Commission to (1) represent Alachua County in matters pertaining to the history, and (2) provide leadership in advancing the identification, protection, preservation, and interpretation of Alachua County's cultural heritage.
- Provide historical research and provide documentation as needed for exhibits, educational programs and pamphlets about County history. The Historical Commission shall encourage, and may assist, local organizations such as museums, libraries and archives, historical, archaeological, and genealogical societies, and other institutions having historical objectives.
- 3. Provide assistance and advice on the following matters as related to County history:
 - Review and make recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners regarding proposed modifications and/or revocations to scenic road corridor designations;
 - Review requests for letters of support regarding applications to Florida Communities
 Trust and other grant programs requiring review and documentation of historic resources;
 - C. Review of sites proposed for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places;
 - D. Review all applications for the preparation and erection of historical markers, tablets or monuments, to commemorate historical sites, events, or individuals.
- 4. Review all nomination proposals to the Alachua County Historic Structures Survey.
- Assist the Board of County Commissioners in locating grant funding and, when directed by the Board of County Commissioners, assist in the preparation of grant applications.

Section 5. Operations. The Advisory Committee shall be guided by the by-laws approved by the Advisory Committee and the Alachua County Commission's Rules of Procedure. The by-laws shall include the following provisions and such other provisions as the Advisory Committee may deem appropriate:

- 1) <u>Elections.</u> The Advisory Committee shall annually elect one of its members as Chair, one member as Secretary, and such other officers as the Advisory Committee deems necessary to meet its needs. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by election at the next regular meeting following the date the vacancy occurred.
- 2) Meetings. Meetings of the Advisory Committee or any subcommittee thereof, shall be open to the public and the media, and shall be conducted in compliance with the Sunshine Law, Section 286.011, Florida Statutes. The County Manager or his or her designee shall produce minutes of the meetings which shall be submitted to the Advisory Committee for approval.

The Chair shall preside and conduct meetings of the Advisory Committee according to the most recent edition of Alice Sturgis' Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure. Regular meetings are scheduled and announced by the County Manager or designee (staff liaison). Special meetings may be called by the Chair or by any three (3) members of the Advisory Committee upon forty-eight (48) hours written notice to all members and to the County Manager or hisfart designee.

3) Agenda. The Chair shall be responsible for the meeting agenda. The County Manager or designee shall serve as staff liaison to the Advisory Committee and shall aid in preparing and distributing the agenda prior to the meeting. The County Manager or designee, or any member of the Advisory Committee may place an item on the agenda by notifying the Chair prior to the preparation of the agenda.

 Subcommittees, Subcommittees comprised of members of the Advisory Committee may be appointed by the Chair.

- 5) Quorum. A majority of the Advisory Committee membership positions filled shall constitute a quorum. Recommendations and decisions of the Advisory Committee must be made by a majority vote of those present and voting.
- Attendance. The attendance policy for the Advisory Committee shall be in accordance with the attendance policy for boards and committees set forth in the Alachua County Commission's Rules of Procedure.
- 7) <u>Compensation</u>, Members of the Advisory Committee shall receive no compensation for the performance of their duties and responsibilities.
- 8) Reports. The Advisory Committee shall submit all reports and communications directly to the County Commission Chair with a copy to the County Manager or designee. Any Advisory Committee reports required by the Alachua County Commission's Rules of Procedure shall be submitted in accordance with said Rules.

Section 6. Effective Date. This resolution shall take effect 10 days after its adoption. DULY ADOPTED in regular session, this 1/4 day of 1/2 half., A.D., 2009.

Executive Summary

Additional funds are required for the Engineer of Record (HNTB) to provide post design services on the SW 62nd Blvd Connector Interim projects. In order to secure additional funds for post design services, it is necessary to approve a resolution and the Local Agency Program Agreement (LAS) Supplemental Agreement No. 5.

Background

The County has received the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU) Federal Earmark grant funding in the amount of approximately 86.5 Million after recision. \$2 Million is allocated for the Planning, Project Development & Environment (PD&E) study and Design for the \$W Oxfold Blvd 4-Lane Arterial, and \$4.5 Million is allocated for right-of-way acquisition for the project. The expenditure of these funds is monitored by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). The Public Works Expartment is Local Agency Program (LAP) certified by the FDOT

to manage this project. On June 12, 2007, the Board awarded a professional services contract to HNTB for a corridor study, a Project Development and Environment (PD&E) study and 100% construction plan development in the amount of \$997,948. On July 8, 2008 an amendment to the Agreement in the amount of \$371,206 was approved for additional PD&E services to evaluate all four viable alternatives. On October 21, 2008 the Board approved the scope of services for the design of three interim projects associated with the SW 62nd Blvd Connector Project. A second amendment to the Agreement with HNTB in the amount of \$511,191 was approved by the board on December 9, 2008 to complete 60% design plans for the three interim projects included in the scope. On December 11, 2008 the MTPO approved the transfer of \$5.8M from right-of-way funds to be used for design, construction and construction engineering inspection (CEI) for the SW 62nd Boulevard Interim projects. On January 12, 2009, the County adopted a resolution to enter into the Supplemental LAP Agreement No. 1 with the FDOT for use of these funds for design, construction and CEI for the interim projects. The Supplemental LAP Agreement No. 1 was approved by FDOT on June 15, 2009 which allowed the transfer of additional design funds to complete 100% design plans. A third amendment to the Agreement with HNTB in the amount of \$240,059 was approved on August 11, 2009 to complete 100% plans. With this amendment, the total planning, PD&E, and design amount is \$2,120,404. On March 23, 2010, the Board approved the 90% design plans and directed staff to finalize the plans and proceed with the bid phase. The county was notified that additional funds in the amount of \$134,752.59 are available to supplement the Construction Engineering Inspection (CEI) line item of the LAP agreement. The adjusted total amount of CEI funds of \$422,625.59 was approved by FDOT on May 25, 2010 through a Supplemental LAP Agreement No. 3. The LAP Supplemental Agreement No. 4 was approved by the BoCC on April 26, 2010 to add additional funds to CEI. The consultant providing the CEI services will assist the County in the construction administration, management, engineering and inspection services to ensure compliance with specific requirements of FDOT and assist the County in meeting the deadlines outlined in the LAP agreement for completion of the construction of the three interim projects.

Issues

Approval of the supplement is needed for staff to secure the additional funding for post design services for the three interim projects. Without this LAP Supplement, our engineer-of-record (HNTB) will not be able to certinute to provide post design services for the three interim projects. This could potentially delay the construction of the three interim projects and could impact the county's ability to meet the deadlines outlined in the LAP agreement for completion of the construction of the three interim projects.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Agency has the authority to enter into said Agreement and to undertake the project hereinafter described, and the Department has been granted the authority to function adequately in all areas of appropriate jurisdiction integrated in the implementation of an integrated and balanced transportation system and is authorized under Section 334.044, Florida Statutes to enter into this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises and representations herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1.00 Purpose of Agreement: The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the Department's participation in the Planning, PD&E and Design of SW 62" Blvd. / 4 Lane Arterial Connector in Alachua County, Florida and as further described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hered, hereinafter called the project, and to provide Departmental financial assistance to the Agency and state the terms and conditions upon which such assistance will be provided and the understandings as to the manner in which the project will be understandings as to the manner in which the project will be understandings.
- 1.01 Modifications and Additions: Exhibit(s) A & B are attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof,
- 2.00 Accomplishment of the Project:
- 2.01 General Requirements: The Agency shall commence, and complete the project as described in EXHIBIT "A" with all practical dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner, and in accordance with the provisions herein, and all applicable laws. The project will be performed in accordance with all applicable Department procedures, guidelines, manuals, standards, and directives as described in the Department's <u>Local Agency Program Manual</u>, which by this reference is made a part hereof as if fully set forth herein.
- A full time employee of the Agency, qualified to ensure that the work being pursued is complete, accurate, and consistent with the terms, conditions, and specifications of this Agreement shall be in charge of each project.
- 2.02 Expiration of Agreement: The Agency agrees to complete the project on or before June 30, 2009. If the Agency does not complete the project within this time period, this Agreement will expire on the last day of scheduled completion as provided in this paragraph unless an extension of the time period is requested by the Agency and grained in writing by the DEPARTIMENT prior to the expiration of the Agreement. Expiration of this Agreement will be considered termination of the project. The cost of any work performed after the expiration date of the Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department.
- 2.03 Pursuant to Federal, State, and Local Law. In the event that any election, referendum, approval, permit, notice, or other proceeding or subtroization is requisite under applicable law to enable the Agency to enter into this Agreement or to undertain the project hereunder, or to observe, assume or carry out any of the provisions of the Agreement, the Agency will initiate and consummate, as provided by law, all actions necessary with respect to any such matters so requisite.
- 2.04 Funds of the Agency: The Agency shall initiate and prosecute to completion all proceedings necessary, including Federal- aid requirements, to enable the Agency to provide the necessary funds for completion of the project.

2.05 Submission of Proceedings, Contracts and Other Documents: The Agency shall submit to the Department such data, reports, records, contracts and other documents relating to the project as the Department and the Federal Highway Administration may require.

3.00 Project Cost:

- 3.02 Department Participation: The Department agrees to participate, including contingencies, in the project cost to the extent provided in Exhibit "B". This amount includes Federal-aid funds which are limited to the actual amount of Federal-aid participation.
- 3.03 Limits on Department Funds: Project costs eligible for Department participation will be allowed only from the date of this Agreement. It is understood that Department participation in eligible project costs is subject to:
 - a) Legislative approval of the Department's appropriation request in the work program year that the project is scheduled to be committed;
 - b) Availability of funds as stated in paragraphs 3.04 and 3.05 of this Agreement;
 - c) Approval of all plans, specifications, contracts or other obligating documents and all other terms of this Agreement;
 - d) Department approval of the project scope and budget at the time appropriation authority becomes available.
- 3.04 Appropriation of Funds: The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature.
- 3.05 Multi-Year Commitment: In the event this Agreement is in excess of \$25,000 and has a term for a period of more than one year, the provisions of Section 339.135(6)(a), Florida Statutes, are hereby incorporated:
 - "(a) The department, during any fiscal year, shall not expend money, incur any liability, or enter into any contract which, by its terms, involves the expenditure of money in excess of the amounts budgeted as available for expenditure during such fiscal year. Any contract, verbal or written, made in violation of this subsection is outland void, and no money may be paid on such contract. The department shall require a statement from the comptroller of the Department that funds are available prior to entering into any such contract or other binding commitment of funds. Nothing herein contained shall preven the making of contracts for periods exceeding 1 year, but any contract so made shall be executory only for the value of the services to be rendered or agreed to be paid for in succeeding fiscal years, and this paragraph shall be incorporated versathin in all contracts of the Department which are for an amount in excess of \$25,000 and which have a term for a period of more than 1 year."
- 3.06 Notice to Proceed: No cost may be incurred under this contract until the Agency has received a Notice to Proceed from the Department.
- 3.07 Limits on Federal Participation: Federal-aid funds shall not participate in any cost which is not incurred in conformity with applicable Federal and State law, the regulations in 32 C.F. and 48 C.F.R., and policies and procedures prescribed by the Division Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA). Federal funds shall not be paid on account of any cost incurred prior to authorization by the FHWA to the Department to proceed with the project or part thereof involving such cost. [23 CFR.13 (a)]. If FHWA or the Department extermines that any amount claimed is not eligible, Federal participation may be approved in the amount determined to be adequately supported, the Department shall notify the Agency in writing citing the reasons why titems and amounts are not eligible for Federal participation. Where correctable non-compliance with provisions of law or FHWA requirements exists, Federal funds may be withheld until compliance is obtained. Where non-compliance is not correctable, eff-WA or the Department may deep participation in parcel or project costs in part or in total.

For any amounts determined to be ineligible for Federal reimbursement for which the Department has advanced payment, the Agency shall promptly reimburse the Department for all such amounts within 90 days of written notice.

4.00 Project Estimate and Disbursement Schedule: Prior to the execution of this Agreement, a project schedule of funding shall be prepared by the Agency and approved by the Department. The Agency shall maintain said schedule of funding, carry

out the project and shall incur obligations against and make disbursements of project funds only in conformity with the latest approved schedule of funding for the project. The schedule of funding may be revised by mutual written agreement between the Department and the Agency. If revised, a copy of the revision should be forwarded to the Department's Comptroller and to the Department's Federal-Aid Program Office. No increase or decrease shall be effective unless it complies with fund participation requirements established in Exhibit "8" of this Agreement and is approved by the Department's Comptroller.

5.00 Records:

- 5.01 Establishment and Maintenance of Accounting Records: Records of costs incurred under terms of this Agreement shall be mainteined and made available upon request to the Department stall times during the period of this Agreement and for five (5) years after final payment is made. Costs in excess of the latest approved schedule of funding or attributable to actions which have not received the required approval of the Department shall not be considered eligible costs.
- 5.03 Documentation of Project Costs: All costs charged to the project, including any approved services contributed by the Agency or others, shall be supported by properly executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts or vouchers evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges.
- 5.04 Audit Reports: Recipients of federal and state funds are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

The administration of resources awarded by the Department to Alachua County may be subject to audits and/or monitoring by the Department, as described in this section.

MONITORING: In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and Section 215.97, Florida Statutes, as revised (see "AUDITS" below), monitoring procedures may include, but not be limited to, on-site visits by Department staff, limited scope audits as defined by OMB Circular A-133, as revised, and/or other procedures. By entering into this Agreement, the recipient agrees to comply and cooperate fully with any monitoring procedures/process deemed appropriate by the Department. In the event the Department determines that a limited scope audit of the recipient is appropriate, the recipient agrees to comply with any additional instructions provided by the Department staff or Alachua County regarding such audit. Alachua County further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations or audits deemed necessary by the Chile Financial Officer (CFO) or Auditor General.

AUDITS

PART I: FEDERALLY FUNDED: Recipients of federal funds (i.e., state, local government or non-profit organizations as defined in OMB Circular A-133, as revised) are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

- 1. In the event that the recipient expends \$500,000 or more in Federal awards in its fiscal year, the recipient must have a single or program-specific audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of OMB Circular A-133, as revised. Exhibit 1 of this Agreement indicates Federal resources awarded through the Department by this Agreement. In determining the Federal awards expended in its fiscal year, the recipient shall consider all sources of Federal awards, including Federal resources received from the Department. This section does not limit the authority of the Department to conduct or arrange for the conduct of additional audits or evaluations of state financial assistance or limit the authority of any other state official.

Offsetting any amount pursuant to this section shall not be considered a breach of contract by the Department.
- 7.00 The Department's Obligations: Subject to other provisions hered, the Department will honor requests for eminutement of to the Agency in amounts and at times deemed by the Department to be proper to ensure the carrying out of the project and payment of the eligible costs. However, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Department may elect by notice in witting not to make a payment if:
- 7.01 Misrepresentation: The Agency shall have made misrepresentation of a material nature in its application, or any supplement thereto or amendment thereof, or in or with respect to any document of data furnished therewith or pursuant hereto:
- 7.02 Litigation: There is then pending litigation with respect to the performance by the Agency of any of its duties or obligations which may jeopardize or adversely affect the project, the Agreement or payments to the project;
- 7.03 Approval by Department: The Agency shall have taken any action pertaining to the project, which under this Agreement, requires the approval of the Department or has made related expenditure or incurred related obligations without having been advised by the Department that same are approved;
- 7.04 Conflict of Interests: There has been any violation of the conflict of interest provisions contained herein; or
- 7.05 Default: The Agency has been determined by the Department to be in default under any of the provisions of the Agreement.
- 7.06 Federal Participation: The Department may suspend or terminate payment for that portion of the project which the FHWA or the Department acting in lieu of the FHWA may designate as ineligible for Federal-aid.
- 7.07 Disallowed Costs: In determining the amount of the payment, the Department will exclude all projects exist incurred by the Agency prior to the effective date of this Agreement or the date of subnization, costs incurred after the expiration of the Agreement, costs which are not provided for in the latest approved schedule of funding for the project, and costs attributable to account or costs which are not provided for in the latest approved schedule of funding for the project, and costs attributable to account or costs which are not provided for in the latest approved schedule of funding for the project, and costs attributable to account or costs which are not provided in writing but the Department.

If the Department determines that the performance of the Agency is not satisfactory, the Department shall have the option of (a) immediately terminating the Agreement or (b) suspending the Agreement and notifying the Agency of the deficiency with a requirement that the deficiency be corrected within a specified time, otherwise the Agreement will be terminated at the end of such time. Suspension of the contract will not affect the time period for completion of the agreement.

If the Department requires termination of the Agreement for reasons other than unsatisfactory performance of the Agency, the Department shall notify the Agency of such termination, with instructions as to the effective date of termination or specify the stage of work at which the Agreement is terminated.

If the Agreement is terminated before performance is completed, the Agency shall be paid for the work satisfactorily performed. Payment is to be on the basis of substantiated costs.

8.02 Action Subsequent to Notice of Termination or Suspension. Upon receipt of any final termination or suspension notice under this paragraph, the Agency shall proceed promptly to carry out the actions required therein which may include any or all of the following: (a) necessary action to terminate or suspend, as the case may be, project activities and contracts and such other action as may be required or desirable to keep to the minimum the costs upon the basis of which the financing is to be computed; (b) furnish a statement of the project activities and contracts, and other undertakings the cost of which are otherwise includable as project costs. The termination or suspension shall be carried out in conformity with the latest schedule, plan, and cost as approved by the Department or upon the basis of terms and conditions imposed by the Department or upon the basis of terms and conditions imposed by the Department or the failure of the Agency to furnish the schedule, plan, and estimate within a reasonable time. The closing out of Federaf financial participation in the project shall not constitute a waiver of any claim which the Department may otherwise have arising out of this Agreement.

9.00 Contracts of the Agency:

9.01 Third Party Agreements: Except as otherwise authorized in writing by the Department, the Agency shall not execute any contract or obligate Isself in any manner requiring the disbursement of Department funds, including consultant or construction contracts or amendments thereto, with any third party with respect to the project without the written approval of the Department. Failure to obtain such approval shall be sufficient cause for nonpayment by the Department. The Department psecifically reserves unto itself the right to review the qualifications of any consultant or contractor and to approve or disapprove the employment of the same.

9.02 Compliance with Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act: It is understood and agreed by the part for lens the net to that participation by the Department in a project with an Agency, where said project involves a consultant contract for engineering, architecture or surveying services, is contingent on the Agency complying in full with provisions of Section 287.055. Floridat Statutes, Consultants Competitive Negotiation Act. At the discretion of the Department, the Agency will involve the Department in the Consultant Selection Process for all projects. In all cases, the Agency's Attorney shall certify to the Department that selection has been accomplished in compliance with the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act.

10.00 Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy and Obligation:

By signing and submitting this Agreement, the Agency is providing the certification set out below:

The inability of the Agency to provide the certification set out below will not necessarily result in denial of participation in this covered transaction. The Agency shall submit an explanation of why it cannot provide the certification set out below. The certification or explanation will be considered in connection with the Department's determination whether to enter into this transaction. However, failure of the Agency to furnish a certification or an explanation shall disqualify such the Agency from participation in this transaction.

The certification in this clause is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when the Department determined to enter into this transaction. If it is later determined that the Agency knowingly rendered an eroneous certification, in addition to other remedies available, the Department may terminate this transaction for cause of default.

The Agency shall provide immediate written notice to the Department if any time the Agency learns that its certification was erroneous when submitted or has become erroneous when submitted or has become erroneous by reason of changed circumstances. The terms "covered transaction," "debarred," "suspended," ineligible, "lower tier covered transaction," "participant," "person," primary covered transaction, "participant," person, "primary covered transaction," "principal," "proposal," and "voluntarily excluded," as used in this clause, have the meanings set out in the Definitions and Coverage sections of rules implementing Executive Order 12549. The Agency further agrees by submitting this Agreement that it shall not knowingly enter into any contracts with a person who is debarred, suspended, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this covered transaction, unless authorized by the Department.

The Agency may rely upon a certification of a prospective sub-contractor that the person is not debarred, suspended, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from the covered transaction, unless it knows that the certification is erroneous. Nothing contained in the foregoing shall be construed to require establishment of a system of records in order to render in good faith the certification required by this clause. The knowledge and information of the Agency is not required to exceed that which is normally processed by a prudent person in the ordinary course of business dealings.

Unless authorized by the Department, if the Agency knowingly enters into a contract with a person who is suspended, debarred, ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction, in addition to other remedies available, the Department may terminate this transaction for cause or default.

Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion;

The Agency certifles, by execution of this Agreement, that neither it nor its principals is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarrent, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction by any Federal department or agency.

Where the Agency is unable to certify to any of the statements in this certification, an explanation shall be attached to this proposal.

12.00 Restrictions, Prohibitions, Controls, and Labor Provisions:

12.01 Equal Employment Opportunity: In connection with the carrying out of any project, the Agency shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, age, religion, color, sex, national origin, disability or marital status. The Agency will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, age, religion, color, gender, national origin, disability or marital status. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Agency shall insert the foregoing provision modified only to show the particular contractual relationship in all is contracts in connection with the development of operation of the project, except contracts for the standard commercial

supplies or raw materials, and shall require all such contractors to insert a similar provision in all subcontracts, except subcontracts for standard commercial supplies or raw materials. When the project involves installation, construction, demolition, removal, sitle improvement, or similar work, the Agency shall post, in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment for project work, notices to be provided by the Department setting forth the provisions of the nondiscrimination clause.

12.04 Public Entity Crime: A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.

12.05 Discrimination: In accordance with Section 287.134 F.S., an entity or affiliate who has been placed on the Discriminatory. Vendor List, kept by the Florida Department of Management Services, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work, may not submit bids on leases or freat property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor, or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity.

12.06 Prohibited Interests: Neither the Agency nor any of its contractors or their subcontractors shall enter into any contract, subcontract, or arrangement in connection with the project or any property included or planned to be included in the project in which any member, officer or employee of the Agency or the locality during his tenure or for two years the metter has any interest, direct or indirect. If any such present or former member, officer or employee involutarily apouts or hard to the beginning of his tenure any such interest, and if such interest is immediately disclosed to the Agency, the Agency prior approval of the Department may waive the prohibition contained in this subsection, provided, that any such present subcontract, or arrangement.

The Agency shall insert in all contracts entered into in connection with the project or any property included or planned to be included in any project, and shall require its contractors to insert in each of their subcontracts, the following provision:

"No member, officer or employee of the Agency or of the locality during his tenure or for two years thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof."

The provisions of this subsection shall not be applicable to any agreement between the Agency and its fiscal depositories, or to any agreement for utility services the rates for which are fixed or controlled by a Governmental agency.

12.07 Interest of Members of, or Delegates to, Congress: No member or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be admitted to any share or part of the Agreement or any benefit arising therefrom.

13.00 Miscellaneous Provisions:

13.01 Environmental Regulations: The Agency will be solely responsible for compliance with all applicable environmental regulations and for any liability arising from non-compliance with these regulations and will reimburse the Department for any loss incurred in connection therewith. The Agency will be responsible for securing any applicable permits.

13.02 Department Not Obligated to Third Parties: The Department shall not be obligated or liable hereunder to any party other than the Agency.

13.03 When Rights and Remedies Not Waived: In no event shall the making by the Department of any payment to the

Agency constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Department of any breach of covenant or any default which may then exist on the part of the Agency and the making of such payment by the Department, while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Department with respect to such breach or default.

- 13.04 How Agreement Is Affected by Provisions Being Held Invalid: If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.
- 13.05 Bonus or Commission: By execution of the Agreement, the Agency represents that it has not paid and, also, agrees not to pay, any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of its application for the financing hereunder.
- 13.06 State Law: Nothing in the Agreement shall require the Agency to observe or enforce compliance with any provision thereof, perform any other act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable State law, provided, that if any of the provisions of the Agreement violate any applicable State law, the Agency will at once notify the Department in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Department and the Agency to the end that the Agency may proceed as soon as possible with the project.
- 13.07 Notification of Claims: When the Department receives a notice of claim for damages that may have been caused by the Agency in the performance of services required under this Agreement, the Department will immediately forward the claim and Agency. The Agency and the Department will explain the Claim and report their findings to each other within 14 working days and will jointly discuss options in defending the claim. The Department and the Agency will each pay its own expensions, and trail, if any. However, if only one party participates in the defense of the claim at trial, that party is responsible for all expenses at trial.
- 13.08 Plans and Specifications: In the event that this Agreement involves constructing and equipping of facilities on the State lighway System, the Agency shall submit to the Department for approval all appropriate plans and specifications covering the project. The Agency shall require that the language of this section be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients

shall certify and disclose accordingly.

State: No funds received pursuant to this contract may be expended for lobbying the Legislature or a State agency.

Executive Summary

Citizens have notified Public Works of parked vehicles on the side of SW 75th Street in front of Kanapaha Park. Public Works staff has investigated, and has determined that the parking of these vehicles creates a safety and maintenance problem along SW 75th Street from SW 41st Place to the northern property line of Kanapaha Park. The Department recommends extending the no parking zone to SW 36th Avenue to prevent people from parking to the north of the park and accessing the park from the sidewalk via the gate in the fence (Approximately 1800°)

Background

SW 750 Street is currently classified as an arterial roadway with an average daily traffic volume of 13,700. Citizens have complained to the Public Works Department about people parking on the side of the roadway in front of Kanapaha Park. Public Works staff conducted a field visit and confirmed these complaints. Parking these vehicles on the side of the road creates a safety hazard because vehicles are parked within the clear zone and back out onto a major facility with a high traffic volume. Entering and exiting the roadway in this manner also damages the turf and creates oftp-offs at the edge of pavement creating additional safety and maintenance issues. 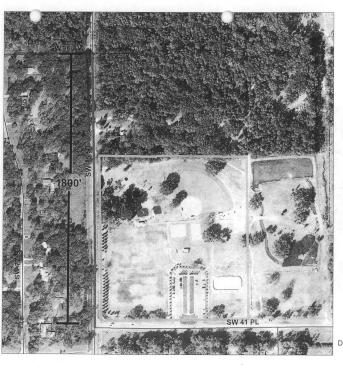

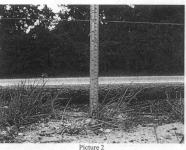

Drop-offs at the edge of pavement are created when vehicles drive off the road to park on the right-of-way. The maximum drop-off's in 2008, as shown in Picture 2 above, were between 2"-3". These drop-off's have increased to 4"-6" as shown in Picture 3 below.

The vehicles parking on the roadway kill the grass causing erosion as shown in Picture 4.

The eroded soil is deposited at the bottom of the slope, filling the ditch. Some soil can also be deposited downstream creating sedimentation issues at culverts.

Picture 5, above, shows an area located where the sidewalk on Tower Road merges onto the Kanapaha Park property. A gap in the fence allows provides excellent access for those parked in the right-of-way to the picinic areas. Almost all of the vegetation has died in this area causing crosion of the front and back slopes of the swale. A significant dropoff has also been created at the edge of pavement. The picture below shows the same area with the landscaping and fencing that was added to try and prevent the parking. The area has experienced more crosion and an increase in edge of pavement drop-off's since the landscaping was installed, as shown in Picture 6.

Members of the Gainesville Police Department notified Public Works of parked vehicles on the side of SE 15th Street in front of T.B. McPherson Park. Public Works staff has investigated, and has determined that the parking of these vehicles creates a safety problem along SE 15th Street from SE 23rd Place to SE 15th Avenue. The total length of the no parking one is 2,684?

Background

SE 15th Street is currently classified as a major collector with an average daily traffic volume of 3,000 and a posted speed limit of 45 mph. Staff from the Gainesville Police Department noting the Public Works Department of a potential safety issue associated with people parking on the side of the roadway in front of T.B. McPherson Park, Public Works staff conducted a field visit and confirmed these complaints. Parking these vehicles on the side of the road creates a safety hazard because vehicles are parked within the clear zone and back out not a major facility. Bartering and extiting the roadway in this manner also damages the turf and creates drop-offs at the edge of pavenment creating additional safety and maintenance issues. Executive Summary

Periodically the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) solicits applications for the County Incentive Grant Program (CIGP). This solicitation is for the 2014/15 fissal year. The program is a 50:50 matching grant for transportation projects. Staff has prepared applications for two transportation projects that are of appropriate scale and that would meet the goals of the program.

Background

Florida Statute 339.2817 provides for the County Incentive Grant Program (CIGP). The grant program provides for up to a 50:50 matching grant for transportation projects. The County has received funding from the CIGP in a previous year for the SW 24th Avenue project. SW 8th Ave/SW143rd St and NW 23rd Avenue are two of the top priority projects in the adopted Capital Improvements Element.

Issue

If either of these projects are selected by FDOT, the County will be required to enter into an agreement with the State to fund and

construct the proposed projects. The County currently has a sufficient balance in the Southwest District impact fee district to provide the matching funds for the SW 8th Ave/SW 143rd St project. The SW 23rd Avenne project is a larger scale project due to the widening of the bridge over 1-75. If this project is selected, saff will discuss an approviace plassing with the FDOT and review private sector infrastructure commitments in the vicinity with an eye towards reprioritizing those commitments or bringing a Transportation Special District plan (Tax Increment Financing) for the Northwest District back before the Board. The current Financing for the Northwest District back before the Board. The current Florids Senate budget proposal has \$80 million as a statewide allocation to the CIGP.

Fiscal Recommendation

There is no fiscal commitment in submitting the applications to the program. If either of these projects is selected by the FDOT, Staff will be coming back before the Board to discuss the available funding sources and there will be a need for the County to match the FDOT grant.

- Policy 1.1.3 The Capital Improvements Element shall be consistent with the North Central Florida Strategic Regional Policy Plan and the State Comprehensive Plan.
- All public facility improvements shall be consistent with the other elements of Policy 1.1.4 the Comprehensive Plan. This shall be implemented by including for all projects in the Capital Improvement Program, an analysis of consistency with the Comprehensive Plan.

For private package treatment plants, community water systems, and non-community water systems, the level of service standards shall be the minimum design and operating standards as established by the authorized local, regional, water management district, state, or federal regulatory agency.

> Public Schools LOS Standard (based on Public School Facilities Element)

> > The uniform, district-wide LOS standards shall be 100% of Permanent Program Capacity [see definition] for elementary, middle and high schools. This LOS standard shall apply to all concurrency service areas (CSA) as adopted in the Interlocal Agreement, except on an interim basis for the three elementary school concurrency service areas listed below. The interim LOS standards for these three elementary school concurrency service areas shall be as follows for the periods specified below:

High Springs CSA - 120% of permanent program capacity through 2010-2011:

Newberry CSA - 115% of permanent program capacity through 2010-2011:

West Urban CSA - 115% of permanent program capacity through 2010-2011

These LOS standards shall be applied to School Concurrency Service Areas (SCSAs) as specified in the Public School Facilities Element.

Alachua County shall adopt LOS guidelines for Category "C" public Policy 1.2.5 facilities, and include those facilities in the CIP. These LOS guidelines are to be used for analysis and identification of Capital Improvement Project needs for these facilities to be included in the Capital Improvement Program. These level of service guidelines shall be for advisory purposes only. The LOS guidelines for Category "C" public facilities are the following:

Fire LOS guidelines are as follows:

- 1. In the Urban Service Area, initial unit response LOS guideline is within 4 minutes for 80% of all emergency responses within a 12 month period. Fire suppression/ protection service level for all properties in the Urban Service Area shall be at the ISO (Insurance Service Office) Class Protection 4 or better. Land development regulations shall require that 100% of development shall provide water supply served by hydrants.
- 2. In the Urban Cluster, initial unit response LOS guideline is within 6 minutes for 80% of all emergency responses within a 12 month period. Fire suppression /protection service level for all properties in the Urban Cluster shall be at the ISO (Insurance Service Office) Class Protection 6 or better. Land development regulations shall require that 100% of development shall provide water supply served by hydrants.
- 3. In the rural area, initial unit response LOS guideline is within 12 minutes for 80% of all emergency responses within a 12 month period. Fire suppression/protection service level for all properties in the Rural Area shall be at the ISO (Insurance Service Office) Class Protection of <10. Development will provide adequate water supply for fire suppression and protection, and fire service compliant fire connections, required through land development regulations.
- 4. The County shall update the Fire Service Master Plan and evaluate capital and related operational needs to meet these LOS guidelines. This update shall include identification of funding sources that could be established as part of a financially feasible plan to meet these guidelines. This update and adoption of a financially feasible plan shall serve as a basis for consideration of an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan to establish level of service standards for Fire Rescue services as part of the County's concurrency management requirements.
- B. Jail space LOS guidelines based on trends in population growth and composition, crime rate and related factors including but not limited to state and national incarceration rates. LOS guidelines for alternatives to jail such as Work Release and various forms of community supervision should increase in a proportion equal to or exceeding increases in Jail space.

- C. Government buildings and facilities LOS guidelines based on Alachua County Master Space Plan adopted by the Board of County Commissioners on June 13, 1995, and any amendments thereto. Facilities shall incorporate and recognize urban design principles. Life cycle costs should be considered in the design and construction of government facilities. The County shall implement an Energy Conservation Plan including a program to track the use of energy and water in facilities owned by the County and reducing energy consumption as it relates to budgetary constraints. The County shall require energy efficient retrofits of existing facilities and will ensure energy efficient objectives are met in the planning and construction of any new facilities.
- D. Preservation lands Preservation lands shall be prioritized for public acquisition consistent with Section 6 of the Conservation and Open Space Element. A level of service guideline for preservation lands shall be developed as part of the land conservation master plan addressed in Objective 6.1 of the Conservation and Open Space Element.
- E. Alachua County shall adopt guidelines for roads functionally classified as local, as indicated below:
- 1. The land development regulations shall include standards, criteria, and procedures to ensure that an adequate system of roads functionally classified as local provides safe and maintainable multimodal access to new development that will use such roads. These regulations shall include design standards to ensure that the structural integrity and volume capacity of such roads are adequate based on projected trips to and from such development and shall take into account requirements for fire-fighting and other emergency and service vehicle access. Evaluation and approval of new development proposals shall include assessment of impact on and capacity of directly connected existing local roads.
 - 2 The land development regulations shall include guidelines, standards, and procedures for the identification of existing local graded roads providing access to existing development that are deficient based on findings that the condition of such roads is below or is projected to be below that required to meet minimum standards for public safety based on factors such as accidents, indications of inaccessibility to emergency and service vehicles, indications of inability to properly maintain, and projected traffic volumes in relation to the condition of the road. A management program for such roads identified as deficient shall be developed by the County Public Works Department for consideration as part of the annual Capital Improvements Program update. This shall include identification of the cost of required maintenance or modifications necessary to remedy identified deficiencies, identification of existing or proposed sources of funding such expenditures, and identification

of areas proposed for deferral of further development pending remedy of existing local road deficiencies. (based on Transportation Mobility Element Policy 1.1.3.2)

OBJECTIVE 1.3

Maintenance of adopted LOS standards to meet existing and future facility needs by coordinating land use decisions with a schedule of capital improvements.

- Policy 1.3.1 Require all public facilities constructed in unincorporated Alachua County, to be consistent with the Capital Improvements Element and the Comprehensive Plan.
- Policy 1.3.2 Require Category "A" and "B" public facilities and services needed to support development to be available concurrent with the impacts of development and require issuance of a Certificate of Level of Service Compliance (CLSC) as a condition of all final development orders. "Concurrent" shall mean that all adopted LOS Standards shall be maintained or be achieved within a reasonable time frame as set out in 1.3.2 (A-D) below. Failure to receive a Certificate of Level of Service Compliance will preclude the issuance of any final development order on the project or project phase, until the requirements of 1.3.2 (A-D) have been satisfied.
 - A. For potable water, sewerage, solid waste and storm water management, the following standards must be met to satisfy the concurrency requirement and to receive a Certificate of Level of Service Compliance:
 - The necessary facilities and services are in place at the time a development permit is issued; or
 - A development permit is issued subject to the condition that the necessary facilities will be in place when the impacts of development occur; or
 - The necessary facilities are under construction at the time a development permit is issued and will be in place when the impacts of development occur; or
 - 4. The necessary facilities and services are guaranteed in an enforceable development agreement that includes the provisions of Policy 1.3.2(A-C). An enforceable development agreement may include, but is not limited to: (1) development agreements pursuant to section 163.3220. Florida Statutes, or (2) an agreement or development order issued pursuant to Chapter 380, Florida Statutes. Any such agreement must guarantee that the necessary facilities and services will be in place when the impacts of development occur.
 - B. For recreation, the concurrency requirement may be satisfied by:
 - . Compliance with the requirements of 1.3.2-A(1-4); or
 - At the time the development permit is issued, the necessary facilities and services are the subject of a binding executed contract which provides for the commencement of actual construction of the required facilities or the provision of services within one year of the issuance of the development permit or

- The necessary facilities and services are guaranteed in an enforceable development agreement which requires commencement of construction of the facilities within one year of the issuance of the applicable development permit. Such enforceable development agreements may include, but are not limited to, development agreements pursuant to Section 163,3220. Florida Statutes, or an agreement or development order issued pursuant to Chapter 380, Florida Statutes.
 - For transportation facilities, except Transportation Concurrency Exceptions for Projects that Promote Public Transportation consistent with Policy 1.1.10 of the Transportation Mobility Element, the concurrency requirement may be satisfied by:
 - Compliance with 1.3.2-A(1-4) and/or 1.3.2-B(1-3); or
 - Inclusion of a County or Florida Department of Transportation road project in the five year Capital Improvements Program where actual construction is scheduled to commence in or before the third year of the five year plan and is needed to maintain the adopted level of service standards. If such projects in the County or FDOT five year plan are moved to later years, or otherwise amended, Alachua County shall assess the impact of such changes. A Plan Amendment shall be required in order to eliminate, defer or delay construction of any road project listed in the 5-Year Capital Improvements Schedule which is needed to maintain the adopted level of service standard.
 - 3. Within Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts:
 - Development shall satisfy transportation concurrency obligations through payment of a multi-modal transportation fee consistent with Policy 1.1.7 of the Transportation Mobility Element. This provision shall not exempt Developments of Regional Impact from statutory requirements for proportionate share mitigation.
 - In order to achieve the level of service standard for pedestrians and bicyclists, the facility shall run the entire length of the roadway segment. A pedestrian facility shall be either a multiuse path on one (1) side of the roadway or sidewalks on both sides of the roadway. A multi-use path along a roadway shall result in a LOS B for bicyclists. The LOS for bicycle and pedestrian travel is the goal for all collector and arterial roadways within the Urban Cluster by 2030, not a standard that is intended to be achieved on an annual basis for each roadway.
 - Express Transit Service shall be provided for a minimum of two (2) hours during both the AM and PM peak periods. The LOS for Express Transit Service shall be achieved starting by 2015 on each of the four (4) routes shown on the Express Transit Corridors map. The peak hour frequency for each route shall be a minimum of 30 minutes by 2015, 20 minutes by 2017 and 15 minutes by 2020. Service hours may be extended to three (3)

hours and additional service added to meet demand and maintain fifteen (15) minute headways based on the capacity and productivity of the Service. The addition of Express Transit Service to serve Transit Oriented Development(s) on the Parker Road Corridor as shown on the Rapid Transit Corridor Map will require an update to the Multi-Modal Transportation Capital Improvement Program.

- Within each Transportation Mobility District, achievement of the LOS for all functionally classified County and Non SIS State Roadways shall be based on an Areawide LOS. The Areawide LOS analysis shall be divided into north-south and east-west roadways. The Areawide LOS shall be determined by dividing the sum (Σ) of total traffic by the sum (Σ) of the total maximum service volume at the adopted LOS standard for all functionally classified County and Non SIS State Roadways.
- The LOS for SIS facilities within the Urban Cluster shall be addressed through the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) Mitigation Plan (Alachua County Growth Management Department January 26th, 2010). The SIS Mitigation Plan identifies mitigation measures such as the construction of parallel roadways serving similar travel demand patterns. dedicated transit lane(s), access management and transit service. Mitigation projects, consistent with the SIS Mitigation Plan, shall be included in the Multi-Modal Transportation Capital Improvements Program. The SIS Mitigation Plan may be amended, in consultation with FDOT, during updates to the Capital Improvements Element.
- D. For public schools, the concurrency requirement may be satisfied by:
 - Adequate school facilities will be in place or under construction within three years, as provided in the School Board 5-Year District Facilities Plan for School Concurrency adopted as part of this element, after the issuance of the final subdivision, final plat or final site plan for residential development; or,
 - Adequate school facilities are available in an adjacent SCSA, and when adequate capacity at adopted LOS Standards will be in place or under construction in the adjacent SCSA within three years, as provided in the School Board 5-Year District Facilities Plan for School Concurrency, after the issuance of the final subdivision, final plat or final site plan approval; or,
 - The developer executes a legally binding commitment to provide mitigation proportionate to the demand for public school facilities to be created by development of the property subject to the final subdivision, plat or site plan (or functional equivalent) as provided in the Public School Facilities Element.

- Policy 1.3.3 The Concurrency Management System (CMS) shall include at a minimum the following components:
 - Procedures for issuance of a Certificate of Level of Service Compliance (CLSC) as a condition of Final Development Orders.
 - B. Use of the five-year Capital Improvements Program which shall (1) be financially feasible based on currently available revenue sources, and (2) include both necessary facilities to maintain adopted level of service standards to serve new development and the necessary facilities required to eliminate existing deficiencies which are a priority to be eliminated during the five year Capital Improvement Program planning period.
 - C. Use of the 2030 Multi-Modal Transportation Capital Improvement Program.
 - Determination that the capital project funds are programmed in the CIP (see 1.6.5).

Management of the land development and capital improvements programming processes so that public facility needs do not exceed Alachua County's ability to fund and provide needed capital improvements identified in the other elements of this plan.

- Policy 1.4.1 Alachua County shall address the Capital Improvements Program including existing deficiencies needs as part of the annual budgeting process. This shall include:
 - A. Evaluation of backlog of deficiencies, current, short-range, and long range needs for infrastructure including needs to maintain adopted LOS standards for transportation, recreation and open space, solid waste, storm water management, and potable water and sanitary sewerage.
 - Update of the County's 5 year Capital Improvements Program and 2030 Multi-Modal Transportation Capital Improvement Program.
 - C. Evaluation of, and necessary adjustment to, adopted LOS standards as part of twice a year Comprehensive Plan Amendment cycle based in part on availability of funding, and information from the development monitoring system.
 - Identification of changes to the Capital Improvements Element regarding funding and expenditures consistent with adopted or newly adjusted LOS standards.
 - Identification of necessary amendments to other elements of the Comprehensive Plan.

- Establishment of policy direction for the final operating and capital budget affected by capital improvements.
- Identification of long range capital needs through a twenty year capital projects list.
- Policy 1.4.2 Maximize use of joint venture solutions to mutual capital facility needs experienced by Alachua County government, other state and local entities, and private enterprise, including solutions utilizing local governments' development agreements as described in 163.3220-163.3243, F.S.
- Policy 1.4.3 Provide incentives and otherwise direct the land development process in a way that maximizes use of existing public facilities, particularly those facilities that have the capacity to maintain adopted LOS standards.
- Policy 1.4.4 Within the Future Land Use Element, designate those areas within which priority will be given to provision of public facility improvement needed to address LOS deficiencies to serve new development needs, and provide for density and intensity of development within those areas consistent with this priority.

Establish priorities for capital improvement projects in a manner that achieves and maintains adopted LOS standards, addresses future growth and remedies existing deficiencies within the shortest time frame possible consistent with fiscal capacity and priorities adopted for elimination of deficiencies, while maintaining and protecting the County's investment in existing capital facilities.

- Policy 1.5.1 The capital improvements needed to repair, renovate, or replace obsolete or worn out facilities shall be determined by the Board of County Commissioners upon the recommendation of the County Manager.
- Policy 1.5.2 Alachua County shall set the relative priorities for improvement projects within types of public facilities as:
 - Capital improvements to be funded with a funding source other than impact fees shall be evaluated in accordance with the criteria listed below. Projects eligible for the use of impact fees shall be evaluated consistent with Policy 1.8.2.

Priority 1 - The repair, remodeling, renovation, or replacement of obsolete or worn out facilities that contribute to achieving or maintaining adopted LOS standards.

Priority 2 - New public facilities and improvements or modifications to existing public facilities that eliminate public hazards

Priority 3 - New public facilities and improvements or modifications to existing public facilities that are needed to maintain health, safety, and welfare.

Priority 4 -New public facilities or improvements to existing public facilities that are required by contractual obligation or legal mandates.

Priority 5 - New and expanded facilities that reduce or eliminate deficiencies relative to LOS standards for existing demands. Projects to address deficiencies to serve existing development or approved vested development in urban service areas designated in the Future Land Use Element shall have priority within this category.

Priority 6 - New or expanded facilities, including land acquisition, that are needed to maintain adopted LOS for new development and redevelopment during the next five years. Projects to serve new development within urban service areas designated in the Future Land Use Element shall have priority within this category.

In the event that capacity of public facilities is insufficient to serve all applicants for development orders, the priorities shall be as follows:

 Capital Improvements to serve DRIs and vested (i.e., where development has commenced and is continuing in good faith) final development orders issued prior to plan adoption. Criteria to rank the following shall be established in the Concurrency Ordinance: Projects subject to development agreements. Final development orders not vested. Non-final development orders. Other categories of development based on the Comprehensive Plan policies.

OBJECTIVE 1.6

Programming and funding of capital projects consistent with the Goals, Objectives, and Policies of the Comprehensive Plan and Future Land Use Map, to maintain adopted LOS standards, and/or meet other public facility needs not dictated by LOS standards.

- Policy 1.6.1 Establish an annual Capital Improvement Review process, with appropriate citizen participation, to:
 - A. Document recent development activity in Alachua County and municipalities within the County and identify additional capital improvement needs generated by this development activity.
 - B. Evaluate current levels of service for each facility type.
 - Adjust population and employment projections to reevaluate locational needs and adjust public facility needs as necessary.

- Recommend major and minor modifications to the Capital Improvement Program list based on the annual review.
- Policy 1.6.2 Fund all capital improvements identified in the CIP within the time frames specified.
- Policy 1.6.3 Annually adopt a Capital Budget consistent with the Capital Improvements Program.
- Policy 1.6.4 Establish appropriate capital project funds to implement the CIP and Capital Budget. These funds shall be comprised of various funding sources from which appropriate capital funding shall be derived. Alachua County shall annually review existing funding sources and consider alternative funding sources for the Capital Project Funds.
- Policy 1.6.5 Where possible, the County shall use specialized revenue sources corresponding to the type of facility provided (i.e., gas tax for road modifications).
- Policy 1.6.6 Utilize ad valorem millage as the revenue of last resort to fund items shown for which insufficient specialized sources of revenue are available. However, ad valorem millage should be adjusted on an annual basis to obtain funding for projects where no other revenues are available to fund those projects.
- Policy 1.6.7 Adequately address financing for major public facility needs not related to maintaining an adopted level of service standard. Those needs should be addressed annually during the update of the Capital Improvement Program.
- Policy 1.6.8 Creative methods for achieving protection of preservation lands shall be used where appropriate. Funding for the Alachua County Forever program shall be as specified in Conservation and Open Space Objective 6.2.
- Policy 1.6.9 A land conservation program for the purchase, preservation, and management of natural areas and open space shall be established according to Conservation and Open Space Element Section 6.
- Policy 1.6.10 Maximum utilization of user fees, intergovernmental transfers, and other funding sources shall be utilized to limit reliance on local ad valorem revenues for funding capital improvements.
- Policy 1.6.11 Ensure public sector's implementation of the Comprehensive Plan by the timely and efficient provision of public facilities.
- Policy 1.6.12 Alachua County shall consider a Sustainability Index for use in assessing proposed capital projects.

Cautious use of long term financing to implement certain major capital projects.

- When the County finances projects through the issuance of bonds, it will pay Policy 1.7.1 back the bonds within a period not to exceed the useful life of the project, but in no event to exceed 30 years. The County will issue long-term debt only for the purposes of constructing or acquiring capital improvements or for making major renovations to existing capital facilities.
- All County debt shall be subject to County budget and financial policies Policy 1.7.2 including requirements for financing, maturity limitations, general debt limitations, debt issuance restrictions, refunding, disclosure requirements, arbitrage reporting, investment of bond proceeds, and short-term and interim financing.
- The County shall establish a debt management policy. Decisions on debt Policy 1.7.3 issuance shall take into account factors such as:
 - Legal constraints on debt capacity and various financing alternatives.
 - Constraints contained in currently outstanding debt documents.
 - The urgency of the capital requirements to be met and the economic costs of delays.
 - Willingness and financial ability of taxpayers to pay for the capital improvements.
 - Proper balance between internal and external financing. Current interest rates and other market considerations.
 - The financial condition of the County.
 - The types, availability, and stability of revenues to be pledged for repayment of the debt.
 - Type of debt to be issued.
 - The nature of the projects to be financed and whether or not the project to be financed is self-supporting.
- Policy 1.7.4 The County shall not construct or acquire a public facility using debt financing if it is unable to adequately provide for the identifiable annual operation and maintenance costs of the facility, or the County shall disclose the limitation on the ability to meet such costs.

Explore the full range of possible revenue sources to address capital improvement needs.

- Policy 1.8.1 The County shall investigate potential new funding sources including user fees, impact fees, mobility fees, multi-modal transportation fees, transportation utility fees, gas taxes, storm water utility fees, ad valorem tax revenues, special assessments, backlog authorities, Community Development Districts and other sources allowed by law.
- Alachua County may use impact fees, mobility fees, multi-modal transportation Policy 1.8.2 fees, transportation utility fees, backlog authorities, dedications, and exactions, among other means consistent with legal standards, to ensure that owners and developers of future development projects will provide or pay for capital improvements, for public facilities, necessary to address the impacts of the development.

Alachua County Comprehensive Plan: 2001-2020

- Policy 1.8.3 The County shall utilize current funding sources and identify, as part of the Recreation Master Plan, appropriate new funding sources (e.g., utility tax, user fees, benefit districts and special assessments) for the provision of recreation site maintenance and operations. New funding mechanisms such as user fees at County parks shall be structured so that accessibility to low-income individuals is affirmatively enhanced.
- Alachua County shall expand the availability of recreational opportunities by Policy 1.8.4 seeking agreements with recreational facility and program providers to serve multi-jurisdictional areas based on the findings of the Recreation Master Plan. These agreements shall address issues that include provision of operations and maintenance, capital improvements and capital funding liabilities and other appropriate issues. The County shall implement the most efficient and effective use of public funds to provide comprehensive recreation programs and opportunities for the public. The County shall contract with public or private organizations for such services where it has been demonstrated that they provide the most beneficial recreational programs.

Limit capital improvements that may directly or indirectly, through accompanying development, degrade environmentally sensitive areas or other natural resources important to health, safety, and welfare of the citizens and environment of Alachua County. These resources are identified in the Conservation and Open Space Element and include but are not limited to: preservation areas and conservation areas such as wetlands, surface waters, well field protection areas, listed species habitat, significant geological features, strategic ecosystems, flood plains, areas containing designated specimen and champion trees, County-designated scenic corridors, mineral resources, and aquifer recharge areas.

- The principles and policies of the Conservation and Open Space Element shall be a primary factor in decision-making concerning new or expanded public facilities, as established in Objective 1.2 of the Conservation and Open Space
- Policy 1.9.2 An inventory of natural resources and analysis of potential impacts upon those resources shall be required for all projects that are proposed for inclusion in the capital improvements program. The inventory and analysis shall be conducted according to the procedures as outlined in Policy 3.4.1.of the Conservation and Open Space Element
- Policy 1.9.3 All capital improvement projects shall be located, designed, constructed, and maintained to avoid, minimize, and mitigate adverse impacts to preservation and conservation areas in accordance with Objective 3.6 of the Conservation and Open Space Element.
- Policy 1.9.4 Appropriate conservation, arboricultural, and horticultural standards shall be used in the design, construction, and maintenance of capital improvement projects in order to promote energy conservation, enhance habitat connectivity, provide for the safe passage of wildlife, and improve scenic quality, consistent with Objectives 5.3 and 5.4 of the Conservation and Open Space Element.

To establish the process for establishment of a Transportation Concurrency Backlog Authority (TCBA), consistent with Florida Statute 163.3182 for Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts to address backlog transportation facilities and identify multi-modal mitigation consistent with the Multi-Modal Transportation Capital Improvements Program. The following policies establish the process for adoption of Transportation Concurrency Backlog Plans within the Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts as part of future updates to the Capital Improvements Element.

- Policy 1.10.1 A Transportation Concurrency Backlog Area (TCBA) may be established within any portion of the Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts to address backlog transportation facilities.
- Policy 1.10.2 A Transportation Concurrency Backlog Plan (TCBP) shall be developed for each TCBA and shall include the following elements:
 - A. Designated Transportation Concurrency Backlog Area
 - List and map of backlog roadways and if applicable interchanges
 - C. Analysis of the extent roadways are over capacity
 - D. Proposed multi-modal mitigation, cost of mitigation and capacity added
 - E. Access and Corridor Management modifications
 - F. Local roadway connectivity plan
 - G. Projected development and revenue
 - H. Projected tax and multi-modal transportation fee revenue generated
 - . The percentage of the tax increment to be utilized for mitigation
- Policy 1.10.3 A TCBA proposed for development within a Urban Service Area, to extent permitted by Jaw, shall be required to include in the TCBP mitigation in the form of phased frequent transit service along rapid transit corridors that connects the TCBA with a centrally located transit hub on the University of Florida campus, the Downtown transit transfer station and the Eastside Activity Center. Phased transit service shall be as follows:
 - A. Phase 1: AM and PM peak hour headways of 20 minutes for a span of service of 4 hours and off-peak headways of 40 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours.
 - B. Phase 2: AM, aftermoon and PM peak hour headways of 15 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours and off-peak headways of 30 minutes for a span of service of 8 hours.
 - C. Phase 3: AM, afternoon and PM peak hour headways of 10 minutes for a span of service of 8 hours, off-peak headways of 20 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours and early morning and late evening off-peak headways of 30 minutes for a span of service of 4 hours.
 - Policy 1.10.4 A Transportation Concurrency Backlog Plan for the Southwest District 1 Area may be adopted as part of the Capital Improvements Element of the Comprehensive Plan within 6 months of establishment of a Transportation

Concurrency Backlog Authority pursuant to Section 163.3182, Florida Statutes. The Southwest District 1 Transportation Concurrency Backlog Plan dated October 13, 2010 will serve as a framework for the TCBP to be considered for adoption in the Comprehensive Plan.

Policy 1.10.5 Any TCBP adopted by the Board of County Commissioners shall be included as part of the update of the Capital Improvements Element.

OBJECTIVE 1.11

To establish the process for creation of a Transportation Special District (TSD) for Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts, consistent with the County's home rule authority. Any Transportation Special District Plan (TSDP) adopted by the Board of County Commissioners shall be consistent with the Capital Improvements Element. The following policies establish the process for adoption of a Transportation Special District Plan (TSDP) within the Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts as part of future updates to the Capital Improvements Element.

- Policy 1.11.1 A Transportation Special District (TSD) may be established within any portion of the Urban Cluster Transportation Mobility Districts to fund multi-modal transportation.
- A Transportation Special District Plan (TSDP) shall be developed for each TSD Policy 1.11.2 and shall include the following elements:
 - A. Designated Transportation Special District (TSD)
 - B. Proposed multi-modal transportation projects, including transit service
 - C. Access and Corridor Management modifications
 - D. Local roadway connectivity plan
 - E. Projected development and revenue
 - F. Projected tax and multi-modal transportation fee revenue generated
- A TSD proposed for development within a Transportation Concurrency Policy 1.11.3 Exception Area shall be required to include in the TSDP mitigation in the form of phased frequent transit service along rapid transit corridors that connects the TSD with a centrally located transit hub on the University of Florida campus, the Downtown transit transfer station and the Eastside Activity Center. Phased transit service shall be as follows:
 - A. Phase 1: AM and PM peak hour headways of 20 minutes for a span of service of 4 hours and off-peak headways of 40 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours.
 - B. Phase 2: AM, afternoon and PM peak hour headways of 15 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours and off-peak headways of 30 minutes for a span of service of 8 hours.
 - C. Phase 3: AM, afternoon and PM peak hour headways of 10 minutes for a span of service of 8 hours, off-peak headways of 20 minutes for a span of service of 6 hours and early morning and late evening off-peak headways of 30 minutes for a span of service of 4 hours.

- Policy 1.11.4 The TSDP shall be adopted by reference under this policy and shall include the title and date of the TSD. The following are the adopted TSD:
 - A. Reserved,
 - B. Reserved,
 - C. Reserved,
 - D. Reserved
- Policy 1.11.5 Any TSDP adopted by the Board of County Commissioners shall be included as part of the annual update of the Capital Improvements Element.

General Project Description

The connection of SW 8th Avenue from SW 143rd St in Jonesville to SW 20th Avenue adjacent to I-75 has been Alachua County's top priority transportation project for several years. This roadway, once completed, will provide a significant amount of parallel capacity to SR 26 (Newberry Road), a State Intermodal System Facility. The existing portions of SW 8th Avenue now carry between 2,000 to 4,000 Average Annual Daily Trips (AADT). The County recently resurfaced and added 4' bike lanes to the facility between SW 122rd St and SW 75th St. Additionally, The County is in the design process on the reconnection and reconstruction of the road between SW 75th St and SW 20th Ave. The object of this application to the County Incentive Grant Program is to complete the portion of SW 8th Avenue that lies between SW 143rd St and SW 122rd St and to upgrade the portion of SW 143rd St which will connect SW 8th Ave to SR 26. The projected capacity of the completed roadway is 16,400 AADT. The roadway will be two lanes with bike lanes and a multi-use path. Intersection treatments along the roadway may include round-a-bouts and signalized intersections.

Project Scope

The proposed project totals 1.4 miles and includes:

- Resurfacing and upgrading SW 143rd St from SR 26 to SW 8th Ave. including 4' bike lanes and a multiuse path.
- Construction of SW 8th Ave from SW 143rd St to SW 137th Way including 2 travel lanes, 4' bike lanes and a multiuse path.
- Construction of SW 8th Ave from SW 133rd Way to SW 122nd St including 2 travel lanes, 4rd bike lanes and a multiuse path.
- Signal installation and intersection improvements at SW 8th Ave and SW 122nd St.

Project Cost Estimate

Total Cost: \$7,200,000 x 50:50 Match = \$3,600,000 FDOT Share: \$3,600,000 County Share

General Project Eligibility

The Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) County Incentive Grant Program has two primary eligibility requirements:

1. Located on the SHS or relieve traffic congestion on the SHS.

SW 8^{th} Avenue is located one mile to the south of SR 26, a State Strategic Intermodal System facility. The connection of SW 143^{rd} St and SW 8^{th} Ave from the developing area

of Jonesville into the employment and activity centers within the City of Gainesville provides a very practical reliever to SR 26. Other County projects along this corridor will eventually provide a connection at SW 20th Ave and cross 1-75 on a widened 4 lane bridge which will further relieve traffic congestion at the 1-75/SR 26 interchange.

The proposed project is included in both the adopted Alachua County Comprehensive Plan and the Gainesville/Alachua County Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization's 2035 Long Range Transportation Plan. The proposed project is a highly ranked project in both plans.

Other Project Evaluation Criteria

- FDOT also has several other suggested project evaluation criteria for the County Incentive Grant Program:
- a. The project will encourage, enhance, or create economic benefits.

The proposed project will provide for a multimodal connection inside the County's designated Urban Cluster. The corridor will relieve traffic congestion on the State's designated Strategic Intermodal System (SR 26) and provide for the efficient movement of people, goods and services.

 The likelihood that assistance would enable the project to proceed at an earlier date than the project could otherwise proceed.

State assistance will allow this project to proceed immediately. Without State assistance the County will be required to wait until enough funding is obtained through local sources to fund the project in full. This will further delay congestion relief on SR 26.

 The extent to which assistance would foster innovative public-private partnerships and attract private debt or equity investment.

A significant portion of the proposed project is located within the currently developing Town of Tioga, a traditional neighborhood development. The County has been and will continue to coordinate with the private landowner, in the design and construction of SW 8th Avenue. The roadway cross section will continue to maintain an off-road multiuse path for bicycle and pedestrian movement and will be designed and constructed in a manner which is sensitive to the context of this mixed use community. The County and the landowner have discussed entering into a developer's agreement related to this project to further foster the public-private partnership.

d. The extent to which the project uses new technologies, including intelligent transportation systems, which enhance the efficiency of the project.

The proposed project will likely include a traffic signal at SW 8th Avenue and SW 122nd St as well as connect to the signal at SR 26 and SW 143nd St. Any additional signals will be connected via fiber optic connection into the Alachua County/City of Gainesville's Intelligent Transportation System which coordinates all signals within Alachua County.

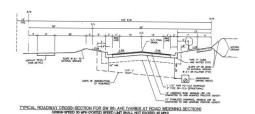
e. The extent to which the project helps to maintain or protect the environment.

The SW 8th Avenue corridor contains a large number of heritage live oak trees. The proposed cross section preserves these trees to provide shade to the roadway and the multiuse path. The designated bike lanes and multiuse path will provide a connection between a mixed use traditional neighborhood development and the Jonesville Activity Center, providing for non-automotive mobility to and from these locations. Additionally, this roadway provides for a gridded roadway network in the area as opposed to concentrating traffic on the SIS corridor. This will provide for congestion relief, thereby reducing associated tailpipe emissions. There are no wetlands or significant habitat within the project area.

 The extent to which the project includes transportation benefits for improving intermodalism and safety.

The project will connect the Jonesville Activity Center and the Town of Tioga traditional neighborhood development with a multiuse path and designated bike lanes. Further, the County has received transportation enhancement funding to construct a multiuse path along 8th Avenue east of SV 122th St. These multimodal connections will provide for true transportation mode choice in the area. Additionally, the County has plans for Express Transit Service starting in 2015 along SR 26 to the Jonesville Activity Center. Allowing for automotive traffic to utilize SW 8th Avenue as a parallel facility will provide for a more efficient transit route through reduced congestion on SR 26.

General Project Description

The widening of NW 33rd Avenue from 2 lanes to 4 lanes from NW 59th Terr to NW 98th St is one of the County's top priority transportation projects. The project includes a widened bridge over I-75 and includes one segment of the County's Bus Rapid Transit System.

General Project Eligibility

The Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) County Incentive Grant Program has two primary eligibility requirements:

- Located on the SHS or relieve traffic congestion on the SHS.
 - NW 23rd Avenue is located one mile to the north of SR 26, a State Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) facility. It is also located one mile south of SR 222 (NW 39th Ave) an emerging SIS facility. The increased capacity of NW 23rd Ave will provide additional connectivity between the developing area surrounding Santa Fe College and the employment and activity centers within the City of Gainesville. It provides a very practical reliever to SR 26 and SR 222. The County has additional funded projects along this corridor including widening the remaining portion of NW 23rd Avenue to NW 55th St and resurfacing the remainder of NW 23rd Avenue to US 441. This project provides for 14,400 Average Annual Daily Trips of additional capacity which will relieve traffic congestion on SR 26 and SR 222 as well as providing for additional capacity crossing 1-75.

- FDOT also has several other suggested project evaluation criteria for the County Incentive Grant Program:
- a. The project will encourage, enhance, or create economic benefits.

The proposed project will provide for a multimodal connection inside the County's designated Urban Cluster. The corridor will relieve traffic congestion on the State's designated Strategic Intermodal System (SR 26 and SR 222) and provide for the efficient movement of people, goods and services. The additional capacity will provide for a more efficient connection between Santa Fe College and the University of Florida which is increasingly becoming an important economic connection in the community.

b. The likelihood that assistance would enable the project to proceed at an earlier date than the project could otherwise proceed.

State assistance will allow this project to proceed immediately. Without State assistance the County will be required to wait until enough local funding is collected to fund the project in full. This would further delay the traffic congestion relief on SR 26 and SR 222.

c. The extent to which assistance would foster innovative public-private partnerships and attract private debt or equity investment.

There are several large developments include the Newbery Village, Santa Fe Village Development of Regional Impact and Springhills Development of Regional Impact. These three developments have committed to constructing the first two legs of the County's Planned Rapid Transit infrastructure consisting of dedicated transit lanes that will connect to the proposed widening of NW 23rd Avenue. The County will be coordinating with these private sector entities to have the corridors constructed in coordinated manner.

d. The extent to which the project uses new technologies, including intelligent transportation systems, which enhance the efficiency of the project.

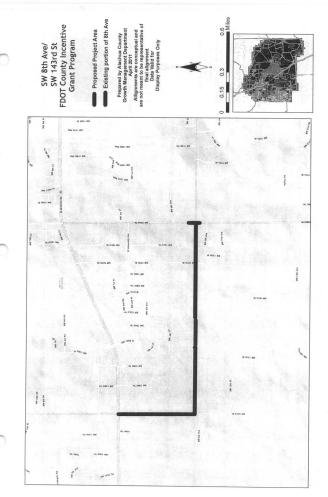
The proposed project will include traffic signals at NW 83rd St, Fort Clarke Blvd and NW 98th St. All signals will be connected via fiber optic connection into the Alachua County/City of Gainesville's Intelligent Transportation System which coordinates all signals within Alachua County. The signals at NW 83rd St and Fort Clarke Blvd will include transit signal priority enhancements in order to implement the County's Northwest Rapid Transit Line.

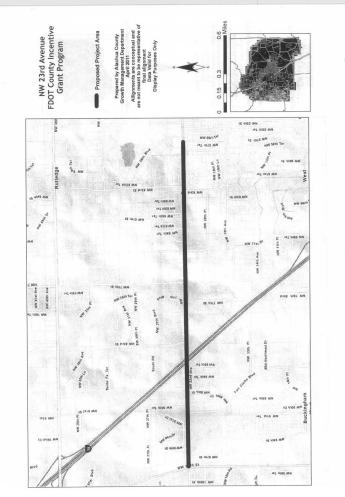
e. The extent to which the project helps to maintain or protect the environment.

Executive Summary

This Resolution and Memorandum of Agreement between Alachua County and the FDOT is in connection with the proposed Archer Braid Bike Path/Trail from the City of Archer to SW 91st Street. The work is programmed for design,construction and construction engineering by the FDOT as a design/build project in FY2012

Background

As part of the FDOT's five-year work program, the FDOT will be undertaking the construction of the Archer Braid Bike Path/Trail from the City of Archer to the intersection of Archer Road and SW 91st Street. It is anticipated that the approximately 6 mile long trail will be located in the old railroad bed that is now owned by the City of Gainesville. This project is in the approved County Transportation Improvement Program. The FDOT requires a Memorandum of Agreement and enabling Resolution for the project in order to proceed with construction.

Issues

There are some issues anticipated with the memorandum of agreement and the supporting resolution. However, if the agreement and resolution were not approved, \$1,986,000 in transportation funding would be lost and the cost of the project would need to be borne completely by Alachua County in order to be completed. The agreement requires the County to participate in the Department of Homeland Security. The agreement requires the County to indemnify the FDOT for all claims other than those caused by the FDOT. The FDOT will not remove this indemnification clause. Finally, there is a clause in the agreement netwerby the FDOT are request the County remove the bike path within 60 days of a formal request. The FDOT is ware that that the Archer Braid trail is a high priority in the County's bike/ped work program. The intent of the "maintenance/repair and restore" language is to make sure the facilities are maintained for the benefit of public health, safety or welfare, etc. The bke path/ratil will not be located within the FDOT right-of-way except for a few crossing points and the likelihood of their requesting the removal of the facility is remote unless the County falls to maintain the facility. Again, this is standard contract language for the FDOT and they will not remove this clause.

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into this day of . by and between the STATE OF FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION, an agency of the State of Florida, hereinafter called the Department, and Algachua County Board of County Commissioners hereinafter called the Agency.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Agency has the authority to enter into this Agreement and to undertake the project hereinafter described, and the Department has been granted the authority to function adequately in all areas of appropriate jurisdiction neutoding the implementation of an integrated and balanced transportation system and is authorized under Section 339.12, Florida Statutes, to enter into this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises and representations herein, the parties agree as follows:

1.00 Purpose of Agreement: The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the Department's participation in the design of the Archer Braid Bike Path 1 Trail from SR 24 I Archer Road to Kanapaha Park in Alachau County, Plorida and as further described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, hereinafter called the project," and to provide Department financial assistance to the Agency and state the terms and conditions upon which such assistance will be provided and the understandings as to the manner in which the project will be understanding.

1.01 Attachments: Exhibit(s) A.B.F.L. & 1 are attached and made a part hereof.

2.01 General Requirements: The Agency shall complete the project as described in Exhibit "A" with all practical dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner, and in accordance with the provisions herein, and all applicable laws. The project will be performed in accordance with all applicable Department procedures, guidelines, manuals, standards, and directives as described in the Department's Local Agency Program Manual, which by this reference is made a part hereof as if fully set forth herein. Time is of the assence as to each and every obligation under this Agreement.

A full time employee of the Agency, qualified to ensure that the work being pursued is complete, accurate, and consistent with the terms, conditions, and specifications of this Agreement shall be in charge of each project.

Removal of Any Unbilled Funds

If Agency fails to timely perform its obligations in submitting invoices and documents necessary for the close out of the project, and said failure results in a loss of the remaining unbilled funding either by Federal withdrawal of funds or loss of State appropriation authority (which may include both federal funds and state funds, if any state funds are on the project), Agency will be responsible for the remaining unbilled funds on the project. No other funds will be provided by the Department. Agency waives the right to contest such removal of funds by the Department, if said removal is directly related to Federal (FHMQ) withdrawal of funds or loss of State appropriation authority due to Local Agency's failure or nonperformance. In addition to loss of funding, the Department will consider de-certification of said Agency for future LAP projects.

Removal of All Funds

If all funds are removed from the project, including amounts previously billed to the Department and reimbursed to the Agency, and the project is off the state highway system, then the department will have to request repayment for the previously billed amounts from the Local Agency. No state funds can be used on off-system projects.

- 2.02 Expiration of Agreement: The Agency agrees to complete the project on or before <u>Decembers</u>, 2012. If the Agency does not complete the project within this time period, this Agreement will expire on the last day of the scheduled completion as provided in this paragraph unless an extension of the time period is requested by the Agency and granted in writing by the Department prior to the expiration of this Agreement. Expiration of this Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department prior to the expiration of this Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department.
- 2.03 Pursuant to Federal, State, and Local Laws: In the event that any election, referendum, approval, permit, notice or other proceeding or authorization is requisite under applicable law to enable the Agency to enter into this Agreement or to undertake the project hereunder or to observe, assume or carry out any of the provisions of the Agreement, the Agency will initiate and consummate, as provided by law, all actions necessary with respect to any such matters so requisite.
- 2.04 Agency Funds: The Agency shall initiate and prosecute to completion all proceedings necessary, including federal-aid requirements, to enable the Agency to provide the necessary funds for completion of the project.
- 2.05 Submission of Proceedings, Contracts, and Other Documents: The Agency shall submit to the Department such data, reports, records, contracts, and other documents relating to the project as the Department and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) may require.

3.00 Project Cost:

- 3.01 Total Cost: The total cost of the project is \$150,000.00. This amount is based upon the schedule of funding in Exhibit "B." The Agency agrees to bear all expenses in excess of the total cost of the project and any deficits involved. The schedule of funding may be modified by mutual agreement as provided for in paragraph 4.00.
- 3.02 Department Participation: The Department agrees to participate, including contingencies, in the project cost to the extent provided in Exhibit 'B." This amount includes federal-aid funds which are limited to the actual amount of federal-aid participation.
- 3.03 Limits on Department Funds: Project costs eligible for Department participation will be allowed only from the date of this Agreement. It is understood that Department participation in eligible project costs is subject to:
 - a) Legislative approval of the Department's appropriation request in the work program year that the project is scheduled to be committed;
 - b) Availability of funds as stated in paragraphs 3.04 and 3.05 of this Agreement;
 - Approval of all plans, specifications, contracts or other obligating documents and all other terms of this Agreement; and
 - d) Department approval of the project scope and budget at the time appropriation authority becomes available.
- 3.04 Appropriation of Funds: The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature. If the Department's funding for this project is in multiple fiscal years, funds approval from the Department's Comproller must be received each fiscal year prior to costs being incurred. See Exhibit 1º for funding levels by fiscal year. Project costs utilizing these fiscal year funds are not entire the contract of the provided of the provided provided in the provided provided in the provided pr
- 3.05 Multi-Year Commitment: In the event this Agreement is in excess of \$25,000 and has a term for a period of more than one year, the provisions of Section 339.135(6)(a), Florida Statutes, are hereby incorporated:
 - "(a) The department, during any fiscal year, shall not expend money, incur any liability, or enter into any contract which, by its terms, involves the expenditure of money in excess of the amounts budgeted as

available for expenditure during such fiscal year. Any contract, verbal or written, made in violation of this subsection is null and void, and no money may be paid on such contract. The department shall require a statement from the comptroller of the Department that funds are available prior to entering into any such contract or other binding commitment of funds. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the making of contracts for periods exceeding 1 year, but any contract so made shall be executory only for the value of the services to be rendered or agreed to be paid for in succeeding fiscal years, and this paragraph shall be incorporated verbatim in all contracts of the Department which are for an amount in excess of \$25,000 and which have a term for a period of more than 1 year."

3.06 Notice-to-Proceed: No cost may be incurred under this Agreement until the Agency has received a written Noticeto-Proceed from the Department.

3.07 Limits on Federal Participation: Federal-aid funds shall not participate in any cost which is not incurred in conformity with applicable Federal and State laws, the regulations in 23 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) and 49 C.F.R., and policies and procedures prescribed by the Division Administrator of FHWA. Federal funds shall not be paid on account of any cost incurred prior to authorization by the FHWA to the Department to proceed with the project or part thereof involving such cost (23 C.F.R. 1.9 (a)). If FHWA or the Department determines that any amount claimed is not eligible, federal participation may be approved in the amount determined to be adequately supported and the Department shall notify the Agency in writing citing the reasons why items and amounts are not eligible for federal participation. Where correctable non-compliance with provisions of law or FHWA requirements exists, Federal funds may be withheld until compliance is obtained. Where non-compliance is not correctable, FHWA or the Department may deny participation in parcel or project costs in part or in total.

For any amounts determined to be ineligible for federal reimbursement for which the Department has advanced payment. the Agency shall promptly reimburse the Department for all such amounts within 90 days of written notice,

4.00 Project Estimate and Disbursement Schedule: Prior to the execution of this Agreement, a project schedule of funding shall be prepared by the Agency and approved by the Department. The Agency shall maintain said schedule of funding, carry out the project, and shall incur obligations against and make disbursements of project funds only in conformity with the latest approved schedule of funding for the project. The schedule of funding may be revised by mutual written agreement between the Department and the Agency. If revised, a copy of the revision should be forwarded to the Department's Comptroller and to the Department's Federal-aid Program Office. No increase or decrease shall be effective unless it complies with fund participation requirements of this Agreement and is approved by the Department's Comptroller.

5.00 Records:

- 5.01 Establishment and Maintenance of Accounting Records: Records of costs incurred under the terms of this Agreement shall be maintained and made available upon request to the Department at all times during the period of this Agreement and for 5 years after the final payment is made. Copies of these documents and records shall be furnished to the Department upon request. Records of costs incurred include the Agency's general accounting records and the project records, together with supporting documents and records of the Agency and all subcontractors performing work on the project and all other records of the Agency and subcontractors considered necessary by the Department for a proper audit of costs. If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the 5-year period, the records shall be retained until all litigation, claims or audit findings involving the records have been resolved.
- 5.02 Costs Incurred for Project: The Agency shall charge to the project account all eligible costs of the project except costs agreed to be borne by the Agency or its contractors and subcontractors. Costs in excess of the programmed funding or attributable to actions which have not received the required approval of the Department shall not be considered eligible costs.
- 5.03 Documentation of Project Costs: All costs charged to the project, including any approved services contributed by the Agency or others, shall be supported by properly executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts or vouchers evidencing in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges.
- 5.04 Audit Reports: Recipients of federal and state funds are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

The administration of resources awarded by the Department to the Agency may be subject to audits and/or monitoring by the Department, as described in this section.

Monitoring: In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and Section 215.07, Florida Statutes, as revised (see "Audits" below), monitoring procedures may include, but not be limited to, on-site visits by Department staff, limited scope audits as defined by OMB Circular A-133, as revised, and/or other procedures. By entering into this Agreement, the recipient agrees to comply and cooperate fully with any monitoring procedures/processes deemed appropriate by the Department. In the event the Department lata limited scope audit of the recipient is appropriate, the recipient agrees to comply with any additional instructions provided by the Department staff to the Agency regarding such audit. The Agency further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations or audits deemed necessary by the FDOT's Office of Inspector General (OIG), and the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) or Auditor General.

Audits

Part I - Federally Funded: Recipients of federal funds (i.e., state, local government or non-profit organizations as defined in OMB Circular A-133, as revised) are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

- 1. In the event that the recipient expends \$500,000 or more in federal awards in its fiscal year, the recipient must have a single or program-specific audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of OMB Circular A-133, as revised. Exhibit 1°1 of this Agreement indicates federal resources awarded through the Department by this Agreement. In determining the federal awards expended in its fiscal year, the recipient shall consider all sources of federal awards, including federal resources received from the Department. The determination of amounts of federal awards expended should be in accordance with the guidelines established by OMB Circular A-133, as revised. An audit of the recipient conducted by the Auditor General in accordance with the provisions OMB Circular A-133, as revised, will meet the requirements of this part.
- In connection with the audit requirements addressed in Part I, paragraph 1 the recipient shall fulfill the requirements relative to auditee responsibilities as provided in Subpart C of OMB Circular A-133, as revised.
- 3. If the recipient expends less than \$500,000 in federal awards in its fiscal year, an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of OMB Circular A-133, as revised, is not required. However, if the recipient elects to have an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of OMB Circular A-133, as revised, the cost of the audit must be paid from non-federal resources (i.e., the cost of such an audit must be paid from recipient resources obtained from other than federal entities).
- Federal awards are to be identified using the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA) title and number, award number and year, and name of the awarding federal agency.

Part II - State Funded: Recipients of state funds (i.e., a non-state entity as defined by Section 215.97(2) (i), Florida Statutes) are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

- 1. In the event that the recipient expends a total amount of state financial assistance equal to or in excess of \$800,000 in any fiscal year of such recipient, the recipient must have a state single or project-specific audit for such fiscal year in accordance with Section 215.97. Florida Statutes, applicable rules of the Executive Office of the Sovernor and the CPG, and Chapters 10.550 (local governmental entities) or 10.660 (nonprofit and for-profit organizations). Rules of the Auditor General. Exhibit 11 to this Agreement indicates state financial assistance awarded through the Department by this Agreement, in determining the state financial assistance expended in its fiscal year, the recipient shall consider all sources of state financial assistance, including state financial assistance exceived from the Department, other state agencies, and other non-state entities. State financial assistance does not include federal direct or pass-through awards and resources received by a non-state entity for federal program matching requirements.
- In connection with the audit requirements addressed in Part II, paragraph 1, the recipient shall ensure that the
 audit complies with the requirements of Section 215.97(7). Florida Statutes. This includes submission of a
 financial reporting package as defined by Section 215.97(2) (d). Florida Statutes, and Chapters 10.550 (local
 governmental entities) or 10.550 (nonprit and for-port) froganizations), Rules of the Auditor General.
- If the recipient expends less than \$500,000 in state financial assistance in its fiscal year, an audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 215.97, Florida Statutes, is not required. However, if the recipient

elects to have audit conducted in accordance with the provisions of Section 215.97, Florida Statutes, the cost of the audit must be paid from the non-state entity's resources (i.e., the cost of such an audit must be paid from the recioient's resources obtained from other than State entities).

 State awards are to be identified using the Catalog of State Financial Assistance (CSFA) title and number, award number and year, and name of the state agency awarding it.

Part III - Other Audit Requirements: The recipient shall follow up and take corrective action on audit findings. Preparation of a Summary Schedule of Prior Year Audit Findings, including corrective action and current status of the audit findings is required. Current year audit findings require corrective action and status of findings.

Records related to unresolved audit findings, appeals or litigation shall be retained until the action is completed or the dispute is resolved. Access to project records and audit work papers shall be given to the Department, the Department of Financial Services, and the Auditor General. This section does not limit the authority of the Department to conduct or arrange for the conduct of additional audits or evaluations of state financial assistance or limit the authority of any other state official.

The recipient shall ensure that the upon request for a period of at least 5 years from the date the audit report is issued, unless extended in writing by the Department.

5.05 Inspection: The Agency shall permit, and shall require its contractors to permit, the Department's authorized representatives and authorized sigents of FHWA to inspect all work, workmanship, materials, payrolfs, and records and to audit the books, records, and accounts pertaining to the financing and development of the project.

5.06 Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Statistical Report: For any project requiring additional right-of-way, the Agency must submit to the Department an annual report of its real property acquisition and relocation

assistance activities on the project. Activities shall be reported on a federal fiscal year basis, from October 1 through September 30. The report must be prepared using the format prescribed in 49 C.F.R. Part 24, Appendix B, and be submitted to the Department no later than October 15 of each year.

6.00 Requisitions and Payments: Requests for reimbursement for fees or other compensation for services or expenses incurred shall be submitted in detail sufficient for a proper pre-audit and post-audit thereof (Section 287.058(1)(a), Florida Statutes).

All recipients of funds from this Agreement, including those contracted by the Agency, must submit bills for any travel expenses, when authorized by the terms of this Agreement, in accordance with Section 112.061, Florid

If, after project completion, any claim is made by the Department resulting from an audit or for work or services performed pursuant to this Agreement, the Department may offset such amount from payments due for work or services done under any agreement which it has with the Agency owing such amount if, upon demand, payment of the amount is not made within 80 days to the Department. Offsetting any amount pursuant to this paragraph shall not be considered a breach of contract by the Department.

- 7.00 Department Obligations: Subject to other provisions hereof, the Department will honor requests for reimbursement to the Agency in amounts and at times deemed by the Department to be proper to ensure the carrying out of the project and payment of the eligible costs. However, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, the Department may elect by notice in writing not to make a payment of
- 7.01 Misrepresentation: The Agency shall have made misrepresentation of a material nature in its application, or any supplement thereto or amendment thereof or in or with respect to any document of data furnished therewith or pursuant hereto:
- 7.02 Litigation: There is then pending litigation with respect to the performance by the Agency of any of its duties or obligations which may jeopardize or adversely affect the project, the Agreement or payments to the project;
- 7.03 Approval by Department: The Agency shall have taken any action pertaining to the project which, under this Agreement, requires the approval of the Department or has made related expenditure or incurred related obligations without having been advised by the Department that same are approved;
- 7.04 Conflict of Interests: There has been any violation of the conflict of interest provisions contained here in paragraph 12.07.
- 7.05 Default: The Agency has been determined by the Department to be in default under any of the provisions of the Agreement.
- 7.06 Federal Participation: The Department may suspend or terminate payment for that portion of the project which the FHWA, or the Department acting in lieu of FHWA, may designate as ineligible for federal-aid.
- 7.07 Disallowed Costs: In determining the amount of the payment, the Department will exclude all projects costs incurred by the Agency pior to the effective date of this Agreement or the date of authorization, costs incurred after the expiration of the Agreement, costs which are not provided for in the latest approved schedule of funding in Exhibit 1st for project, costs agreed to be borne by the Agency or its contractors and subcontractors for not meeting the project commencement and final invoice time lines, and costs attributable to goods or services received under a contract or other arrangements which have not been approved in writing by the Department.
- 7.08 Final Invoices: The Agency must submit the final invoice on the project to the Department within 120 days after the completion of the project. Invoices submitted after the 120-day time period may not be paid.
- 8.00 Termination or Suspension of Project:
- 8.0.1 Termination or Suspension Generally: The Department may, by written notice to the Agency, suspend any or all of its obligations under this Agreement until such time as the event or condition resulting in such suspension has ceased or been corrected or the Department may terminate this Agreement in whole or in part at any time the interest of the

Department requires such termination.

(a) if the Department determines that the performance of the Agency is not satisfactory, the Department shall notify the Agency of the deficiency be corrected within thirty (30) days of such notice. Such notice shall provide reasonable specificity to the Agency of the deficiency be corrected within thirty (30) days of such notice. Such notice shall provide reasonable specificity to the Agency of the deficiency that requires correction. If the deficiency is not corrected within such time period, the Department may either (1) immediately terminate the Agreement as set forth in paragraph 8,(b) below, or (2) take whatever action is deemed appropriate by the Department to correct the deficiency. - (c) If the Agreement is terminated before the project is completed, the Agency shall be paid only for the percentage of the project satisfactorily performed for which costs can be substantiated. Such payment, however, shall not exceed equivalent percentage of the contract price. All work in progress will become the property of the Department and will be turned over promptly by the Agency.
- 8.02 Action Subsequent to Notice-of-Termination or Suspension: Upon receipt of any final termination or suspension notice under this paragraph. The Agency shall proceed promptly to carry out the actions required therein which may include any or all of the following: (a) necessary action to terminate or suspend, as the case may be, project activities and contracts and such other action as may be required or desirable to keep to a minimum the costs upon the basis of which the filmancing is to be computed; (b) furnish a statement of the project activities and contracts and other undertakings the cost of which are otherwise includable as project costs. 9.02 Compliance with Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act: It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that participation by the Department in a project with the Agency, where said project involves a consultant contract for engineering, architecture or surveying services, is confingent on the Agency's complying in full with provisions of Section 227, 055, Florida Statutes, Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act. At the discretion of the Department, the Agency will be involve the Department to the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act. At the discretion of the Department that selection process for all projects. In all cases, the Agency's attorney shall certify to the Department that selection has been accomplished in compliance with the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act.

10.00 Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy and Obligation: It is the policy of the Department that DBE's, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Pert 26, as amended, shall have the opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Department funds under this Agreement. The DBE requirements of applicable federal and state laws and regulations apply to this Agreement.

The Agency and its contractors agree to ensure that DBE's have the opportunity to participate in the performance of this Agreement. In this regard, all recipients and contractors shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and regulations to ensure that the DBE's have the opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. The Agency and its contractors and subcontractors shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of contracts, entered pursuant to this Agreement. Furthermore, the Agency agrees that:

11,00 Compliance with Conditions and Laws: The Agency shall comply and require its contractors and subcontractors to comply with all terms and conditions of this Agreement and all federal, state, and local laws and regulations to this project. Execution of this Agreement acconstitutes a certification that the Agency is in compliance with, and will require its contractors and subcontractors to comply with, all requirements imposed by applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, including the 'Certification Regarding Debarment, Suspension, Ineligibility and Voluntary Exclusion – Lower Tier Covered Transactions, "in 49 C.F.R. Part 29, when applicable.

12.00 Restrictions, Prohibitions, Controls, and Labor Provisions:

12.01 Equal Employment Opportunity: In connection with the carrying out of any project, the Agency shall not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, age, religion, color, sex, national origin, disability or marital status. The Agency will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment without regard to their race, age, religion, color, gender, national origin, disability or marital status. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: employment upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The Agency shall insert the foregoing provision modified only to show the particular contractual relationship in all its contracts in connection with the development of operation of the project, except contracts for the standard commercial supplies or raw materials. When the project involves installation, construction, demolition, removal, site improvement or similar work, the Agency shall post, in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment for project work, notices to be provided by the Department setting forth the provisions of the nondiscrimination clause.

12.02 Title VI - Civil Rights Act of 1964: The Agency will comply with all the requirements imposed by Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation issued thereunder, and the assurance by the Agency pursuant thereto.

The Agency shall include provisions in all contracts with third parties that ensure compliance with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 49 C.F.R. Part 21, and related statutes and regulations.

12.03 Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA): The Agency will comply with all the requirements as imposed by the ADA, the regulations of the Federal government issued thereunder, and assurance by the Agency pursuant thereto.

12.04 Public Entity Crime: A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not

submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity; and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor it.

- 12.05 Discrimination: In accordance with Section 287.134, Florida Statutes, an entity or affiliate who have been placed on the Discriminatory Vendor Lisk, kept by the Florida Department of Management Services, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide goods or services to a public entity, may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity.
- 12.06 Suspansion, Revocation, Denial of Qualification or Determination of Contractor Non-Responsibility: An entity or affiliate who has had its Certificate of Qualification suspended, revoked, denied or have further been determined by the Department to be a non-responsible contractor may not submit a bid or perform work for the construction or repair of a public building or public work on a contract with the Agency.
- 12.07 Prohibited Interests: Neither the Agency nor any of its contractors or their subcontractors shall enter into any contract, subcontract or parameters are ment in connection with the project or any properly included or planned to be included in the project in which any member, officer or employee of the Agency or the locality during tenure or for 2 years thereafter has any interest, direct or indirect. If any such present or former member, officer or employee involuntarily acquires or had acquired prior to the beginning of tenure any such interest, and if such interest is immediately disclosed to the Agency, the Agency, with prior approval of the Department, may waive the prohibition contained in this paragraph provided that any such present member, officer or employee ishall not participate in any action by the Agency or the locality relating to such contract, subcontract or paramegment.

The Agency shall insert in all contracts entered into in connection with the project or any property included or planned to be included in any project, and shall require its contractors to insert in each of their subcontracts, the following provision:

"No member, officer or employee of the Agency or of the locality during his tenure or for 2 years thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof."

The provisions of this paragraph shall not be applicable to any agreement between the Agency and its fiscal depositories or to any agreement for utility services the rates for which are fixed or controlled by a governmental agency.

12.08 Interest of Members of, or Delegates to, Congress: No member or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit arising therefrom.

13.00 Miscellaneous Provisions:

- 13.01 Environmental Regulations: The Agency will be solely responsible for compliance with all the applicable revironmental regulations, for any liability arting from non-compliance with these regulations, and will reimburse the Department for any loss incurred in connection therewith. The Agency will be responsible for securing any applicable permits.
- 13.02 Department Not Obligated to Third Parties: The Department shall not be obligated or liable hereunder to any individual or entity not a party to this Agreement.
- 13.03 When Rights and Remedies Not Walved: In no event shall the making by the Department of any payment to the Agency constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Department of any breach of covenant or any default which may then exist on the part of the Agency and the making of such payment by the Department, while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Department with respect to such breach or default.
- 13.04 How Agreement Is Affected by Provisions Being Held Invalid: If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance, the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.

13.05 Bonus or Commission: By execution of the Agreement, the Agency represents that it has not paid and, also agrees not to pay, any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of its application for the financing hereunder.

13.06 State Law: Nothing in the Agreement shall require the Agency to observe or enforce compliance with any provision or perform any act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable state law. If any of the provisions of the Agreement violate any applicable state law, the Agency will at once notify the Department in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Department and the Agency to the end that the Agency may proceed as soon as possible with the project.

13.07 Plans and Specifications: In the event that this Agreement involves constructing and equipping of facilities on the State Highway System, the Agency shall submit to the Department for approval all appropriate plans and specifications covering the project. The Department will review all plans and specifications and will issue to the Agency a written approval with any approved protines of the project and comments or recommendations covering any remainder of the project deemed appropriate. After resolution of these comments and recommendations to the Department's satisfaction, the Department will issue to the Agency a written approval with said remainder of the project.  - b) Properly mulch plant beds;

 - e) Properly prune all plants which responsibility includes removing dead or diseased parts of plants and/or pruning such parts thereof which present a visual hazard for those using the roadway; and

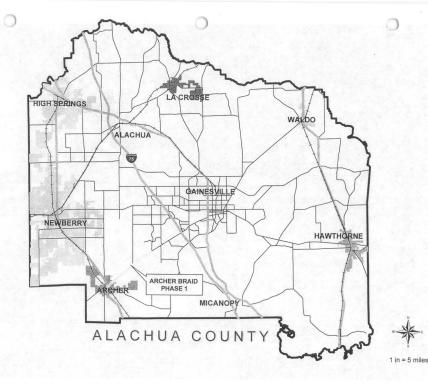

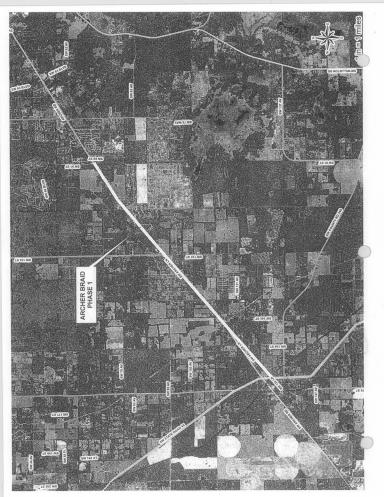

Executive Summary

These Resolutions and LAP Agreement between Alachua County and the FDOT is in connection with the proposed Archer Braid Bike Path/Trail from the City of Archer to SW 91st Street. The work is programmed for the design portion of the project and establishes the budget for this portion of the project. A subsequent LAP agreement will be required for the construction portion of the project.

Background

As part of the FDOT's five-year work program, the County will be undertaking the design of the Archer Braid Bike Path/Trail from the intersection of Archer Road and SW 91st Street and SW Archer Road to Kanapaha Park. It is anticipated that the trail will be located in rights-of-way of SW 91st Street, SW 46th Boulevard and SW 75th Street. This project is in the approved County Transportation Improvement Program. The PDOT requires a LAP Agreement and enabling Resolution for the project in order to proceed with construction.

Issues

There are some issues anticipated with the memorandum of agreement and the supporting resolution. However, if the agreement and resolution were not approved, \$1,986,000 in transportation funding would be lost and the cost of the project would need to be borne completely by Alachua County in order to be completed. The agreement requires the County to participate in the Department of Homeland Security. The agreement requires the County to maintain the facility once it is installed. Additionally, the agreement requires the County to indemnify the FDOT for all claims other than those caused by the FDOT. The FDOT will not remove this indemnification clause. Finally, there is a clause in the agreement whereby the FDOT can request that the County remove the bike path within 60 days of a formal request. The FDOT is aware that that the Archer Braid trail is in high priority in the County's bike/ped work program. The intent of the "maintenance/repair and restore" language is to make sure the facilities are maintained for the benefit of public health, safety or welfare, etc. The bike path/trail will not be located within the FDOT right-ofway except for a crossing point on Archer Road and the likelihood of their requesting the removal of the facility is remote unless the County fails to maintain the facility. Again, this is standard contract language for the FDOT and they will not remove this clause.

WHEREAS, the Agency has the authority to enter into this Agreement and to undertake the project hereinafter described. and the Department has been granted the authority to function adequately in all areas of appropriate jurisdiction including the implementation of an integrated and balanced transportation system and is authorized under Section 339.12, Florida Statutes, to enter into this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants, promises and representations herein, the parties agree as

- 1.00 Purpose of Agreement: The purpose of this Agreement is to provide for the Department's participation in the design of the Archer Braid Bike Path / Trail from SR 24 / Archer Road to Kanapaha Park in Alachua County, Florida and as further described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, hereinafter called the "project," and to provide Department financial assistance to the Agency and state the terms and conditions upon which such assistance will be provided and the understandings as to the manner in which the project will be understanding completed
- 1.01 Attachments: Exhibit(s) A.B.F.L & 1 are attached and made a part hereof.
- 2.01 General Requirements: The Agency shall complete the project as described in Exhibit "A" with all practical dispatch, in a sound, economical, and efficient manner, and in accordance with the provisions herein, and all applicable laws. The project will be performed in accordance with all applicable Department procedures, guidelines, manuals, standards, and directives as described in the Department's Local Agency Program Manual, which by this reference is made a part hereof as if fully set forth herein. Time is of the essence as to each and every obligation under this Agreement.

A full time employee of the Agency, qualified to ensure that the work being pursued is complete, accurate, and consistent with the terms, conditions, and specifications of this Agreement shall be in charge of each project.

Removal of Any Unbilled Funds

If Agency fails to timely perform its obligations in submitting invoices and documents necessary for the close out of the project, and said failure results in a loss of the remaining unbilled funding either by Federal withdrawal of funds or loss of State appropriation authority (which may include both federal funds and state funds, if any state funds are on the project), Agency will be responsible for the remaining unbilled funds on the project. No other funds will be provided by the Department. Agency waives the right to contest such removal of funds by the Department, if said removal is directly related to Federal (FHWA) withdrawal of funds or loss of State appropriation authority due to Local Agency's failure or nonperformance. In addition to loss of funding, the Department will consider de-certification of said Agency for future LAP projects.

Removal of All Funds

If all funds are removed from the project, including amounts previously billed to the Department and relimbursed to the Agency, and the project is off the state highway system, then the department will have to request repayment for the previously billed amounts from the Local Agency. No state funds can be used on off-system projects.

- 2.02 Expiration of Agreement: The Agency agrees to complete the project on or before <u>December</u> 31, 2012. If the Agency does not complete the project within this time period, this Agreement will expire on the last day of the scheduled completion as provided in this paragraph unless an extension of the time period is requested by the Agency and granted in writing by the Department prior to the expiration of this Agreement. Expiration of this Agreement all the considered termination of the project. The cost of any work performed after the expiration date of this Agreement will not be reimbursed by the Department.
- 2.03 Pursuant to Federal, State, and Local Laws: In the event that any election, referendum, approval, permit, notice or other proceeding or authorization is requisite under applicable law to enable the Agency to enter into this Agreement or to undertake the project hereunder or to observe, assume or carry out any of the provisions of the Agreement, the Agency will initiate and consummate, as provided by law, all actions necessary with respect to any such matters so requisite.
- 2.04 Agency Funds: The Agency shall initiate and prosecute to completion all proceedings necessary, including federal-aid requirements, to enable the Agency to provide the necessary funds for completion of the project.
- 2.05 Submission of Proceedings, Contracts, and Other Documents: The Agency shall submit to the Department such data, reports, records, contracts, and other documents relating to the project as the Department and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) may require.

3.00 Project Cost:

- 3.01 Total Cost: The total cost of the project is \$ 150,000.00. This amount is based upon the schedule of funding in Exhibit "B." The Agency agrees to bear all expenses in excess of the total cost of the project and any deficits involved. The schedule of funding may be modified by mutual agreement as provided for in paragraph 4.00.
- 3.02 Department Participation: The Department agrees to participate, including contingencies, in the project cost to the extent provided in Exhibit "B." This amount includes federal-aid funds which are limited to the actual amount of federal-aid participation.
- 3.03 Limits on Department Funds: Project costs eligible for Department participation will be allowed only from the date of this Agreement. It is understood that Department participation in eligible project costs is subject to:
 - a) Legislative approval of the Department's appropriation request in the work program year that the project is scheduled to be committed:
 - b) Availability of funds as stated in paragraphs 3.04 and 3.05 of this Agreement;
 - c) Approval of all plans, specifications, contracts or other obligating documents and all other terms of this Agreement; and
 - d) Department approval of the project scope and budget at the time appropriation authority becomes available.
- 3.04 Appropriation of Funds: The Department's performance and obligation to pay under this Agreement is contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Legislature. If the Department's funding for this project is in multiple fiscal years, funds approval from the Department's Comptroller must be received each fiscal year prior to costs being incurred. See Exhibit "8" for funding levels by fiscal year. Project costs utilizing these fiscal year finds are not eligible for reimbursement! fincurred prior to funds approval being received. The Department will notify the Agency, in writing, when funds are available.
- 3.05 Multi-Year Commitment: In the event this Agreement is in excess of \$25,000 and has a term for a period of more than one year, the provisions of Section 339.135(6)(a), Florida Statutes, are hereby incorporated:
 - "(a) The department, during any fiscal year, shall not expend money, incur any liability, or enter into any contract which, by its terms, involves the expenditure of money in excess of the amounts budgeted as

available for expenditure during such fiscal year. Any contract, verbal or written, made in violation of this subsection is null and void, and no money may be paid on such contract. The department shall require a statement from the comproller of the Department that funds are available prior to entering into any such contract or other binding commitment of funds. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the making of contracts for periods exceeding 1 year, but any contracts on made shall be executory only for the value of the services to be rendered or agreed to be paid for in succeeding fiscal years, and this paragraph shall be incorporated verbatim in all contracts of the Department which are for an amount in excess of \$25,000 and which have a term for a period of more than 1 year."

3.06 Notice-to-Proceed: No cost may be incurred under this Agreement until the Agency has received a written Noticeto-Proceed from the Department.

3.07 Limits on Federal Participation: Federal-ald funds shall not participate in any cost which is not incurred in conformity with applicable Federal and State laws, the regulations in 23 Code of Federal Regulations (C.F.R.) and 49 C.F.R. and policies and procedures prescribed by the Division Administrator of F-MVA. Federal funds shall not be paid on account of any cost incurred prior to authorization by the FHWA to the Department to proceed with the project or part thereof involving such cost (25 C.F.R. 19 (a)). If FHWA or the Department to proceed with the project or part eligible, federal participation may be approved in the amount determined to be adequately supported and the Department shall notify the Agency in writing cliting the reasons why items and amounts are not eligible for federal participation with provisions of law or FHWA requirements exists, Federal funds may be withheld until compliance is obtained. Where non-compliance is not correctable, FHWA or the Department may deny participation in pareol or project costs in part or in total.

For any amounts determined to be ineligible for federal reimbursement for which the Department has advanced payment, the Agency shall promptly reimburse the Department for all such amounts within 90 days of written notice.

4.00 Project Estimate and Disbursement Schedule: Prior to the execution of this Agreement, a project schedule of funding shall be prepared by the Agreey and approved by the Department. The Agreey shall maintain said schedule of funding, carry but the project, and shall incur obligations against and make disbursements of project funds only in conformity with the latest approved schedule of funding for the project. The schedule of funding may be revised by mutual written agreement between the Department and the Agency. If revised, a copy of the revision should be forwarded to the Department's Pederal-aid Program Office. No increase or decrease shall be effective unless it complies with fund participation requirements of this Agreement and is approved by the Department's Comproller.

5.00 Records:

- 5.01 Establishment and Maintenance of Accounting Records: Records of costs incurred under the terms of this Agreement shall be maintained and made available upon request to the Department at all times during the period of this Agreement and for 5 years after the final payment is made. Copies of these documents and records shall be furnished to the Department upon request. Records of costs incurred include the Agency's general accounting records and the project records, together with supporting documents and records of the Agency and all subcontractors performing work on the project and all other records of the Agency and subcontractors considered necessary by the Department for a proper audit of costs. If any litigation, claim or audit is started before the expiration of the 5-year period, the records shall be retained until all filligation, claims or audit findings involving the records have been resolving, claims or audit findings involving the records have been resolving.
- 5.02 Costs incurred for Project: The Agency shall charge to the project account all eligible costs of the project except costs agreed to be borne by the Agency or its contractors and subcontractors. Costs in excess of the programmed funding or attributable to actions which have not received the required approval of the Department shall not be considered eligible costs.
- 5.03 Documentation of Project Costs: All costs charged to the project, including any approved services contributed by the Agency or others, shall be supported by property executed payrolls, time records, invoices, contracts or vouchers evidencine in proper detail the nature and propriety of the charges.
- 5.04 Audit Reports: Recipients of federal and state funds are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:
- The administration of resources awarded by the Department to the Agency may be subject to audits and/or monitoring by the Department, as described in this section.

Monitoring: In addition to reviews of audits conducted in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and Section 215.97.
Fiorida Statutes, as revised (see Audits' below), monitoring procedures may include, but not be limited to, on-site visits by Department staff, limited scope audits as defined by OMB Circular A-133, as revised, and/or other procedures. By entering into this Agreement, the recipient agrees to comply and cooperate fully with any monitoring procedures/processes deemed appropriate by the Department. In the event the Department determines that a limited scope audit of the recipient is appropriate, the recipient agrees to comply with any additional instructions provided by the Department staff to the Agency regarding such audit. The Agency further agrees to comply and cooperate with any inspections, reviews, investigations or audits deemed necessary by the FDOT's Office of Inspector General (OIG), and the Chief Financial Officer (CFO) or Auditor Ceneral.

Audits

Part I - Federally Funded: Recipients of federal funds (i.e., state, local government or non-profit organizations as defined in OMB Circular A-133, as revised) are to have audits done annually using the following criteria:

- 9.01 Third Party Agreements: Except as otherwise authorized in writing by the Department, the Agency shall not execute any contract or obligate itself in any manner requiring the disbursement of Department funds, including consultant or construction contracts or amendments thereto, with any third party with respect to the project without the written approval of the Department. Failure to obtain such approval after all be sufficient cause for nonsymment by the Department. The Department specifically reserves unto itself the right to review the qualifications of any consultant or contractor and to approve or disapprove the employment of the same.
- 9.02 Compliance with Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act: It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that participation by the Department in a project with the Agency, where said project involves a consultant contract for engineering, architecture or surveying services, is contingent on the Agency's complying in full with provisions of Section 275.055, Florida Statutes, Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act. At the discretion of the Department, the Agency will involve the Department in the consultant selection process for all projects. In all cases, the Agency's attorney shall certify to the Department that selection has been accomplished in compliance with the Consultants' Competitive Negotiation Act.
- 10.00 Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) Policy and Obligation: It is the policy of the Department that DBE's, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 26, as amended, shall have the opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Department funds under this Agreement. The DBE requirements of applicable federal and state laws and regulations apply to this Agreement.

The Agency and its contractors agree to ensure that DBE's have the opportunity to participate in the performance of this Agreement, in this regard, all recipients and contractors shall take all necessary and reasonable steps in accordance with applicable federal and state laws and regulations to ensure that the DBE's have the opportunity to compete for and perform contracts. The Agency and its contractors and subcontractors shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the award and performance of contracts, entered pursuant to this Agreement. 12.03 Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA): The Agency will comply with all the requirements as imposed by the ADA, the regulations of the Federal government issued thereunder, and assurance by the Agency pursuant thereto.

12.04 Public Entity Crime: A person or affiliate who has been placed on the convicted vendor list following a conviction for a public entity crime may not submit a bid on a contract to provide any goods or services to a public entity; may not

submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity, may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity, and may not transact business with any public entity in excess of the threshold amount provided in Section 287.017, Florida Statutes, for CATEGORY TWO for a period of 36 months from the date of being placed on the convicted vendor list.

- 12.05 Discrimination: In accordance with Section 287.134, Florida Statutes, an entity or affiliate who to has been placed on the Discriminatory Vendor List, kept by the Florida Department of Management Services, may not submit a bid on a contract to provide goods or services to a public entity; may not submit a bid on a contract with a public entity for the construction or repair of a public building or public work; may not submit bids on leases of real property to a public entity; may not be awarded or perform work as a contractor, supplier, subcontractor or consultant under a contract with any public entity.
- 12.06 Suspension, Revocation, Denial of Qualification or Determination of Contractor Non-Responsibility: An entity or affiliate who has had its Certificate of Qualification suspended, revoked, denied or have further been determined by the Department to be a non-responsible contractor may not submit a bid or perform work for the construction or repair of a public building or public work on a contract with the Agency.
- 12.07 Prohibited Interests: Neither the Agency nor any of its contractors or their subcontractors shall enter into any contract, subcontract or strongement in connection with the project or any property included or planned to be included in the project in which any member, officer or employee of the Agency or the locality during tenure or for 2 years thereafter has any interest, direct or indirect, if any such present or former member, officer or employee involuntarily acquires or had acquired prior to the beginning of tenure any such interest, and if such interest is immediately disclosed to the Agency, with prior approval of the Department, may waive the prohibition contained in this paragraph provided that any such present member, officer or employee shall not participate in any action by the Agency or the locality relating to such contract, subcontract or arrangement.

The Agency shall insert in all contracts entered into in connection with the project or any property included or planned to be included in any project, and shall require its contractors to insert in each of their subcontracts, the following provision:

"No member, officer or employee of the Agency or of the locality during his tenure or for 2 years thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof."

The provisions of this paragraph shall not be applicable to any agreement between the Agency and its fiscal depositories or to any agreement for utility services the rates for which are fixed or controlled by a governmental agency.

12.08 Interest of Members of, or Delegates to, Congress: No member or delegate to the Congress of the United States shall be admitted to any share or part of this Agreement or any benefit arising therefrom.

13.00 Miscellaneous Provisions:

- 13.01 Environmental Regulations: The Agency will be solely responsible for compliance with all rehaplicable revironmental regulations, for any liability arting from non-compliance with these regulations, and will rehaplicable be partment for any loss incurred in connection therewith. The Agency will be responsible for securing any applicable permits.
- 13.02 Department Not Obligated to Third Parties: The Department shall not be obligated or liable hereunder to any individual or entity not a party to this Agreement.
- 13.03 When Rights and Remedies Not Walved: In no event shall the making by the Department of any payment to the Agency constitute or be construed as a waiver by the Department of any breach of coverant or any default which may then exist on the part of the Agency and the making of such payment by the Department, while any such breach or default shall exist, shall in no way impair or prejudice any right or remedy available to the Department with respect to such breach or default.
- 13.04 How Agreement Is Affected by Provisions Being Held Invalid: If any provision of this Agreement is held invalid, the remainder of this Agreement shall not be affected. In such an instance, the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.

13.05 Bonus or Commission: By execution of the Agreement, the Agency represents that it has not paid and, also agrees not to pay, any bonus or commission for the purpose of obtaining an approval of its application for the financing hereunder.

13.06 State Law: Nothing in the Agreement shall require the Agency to observe or enforce compliance with any provision or perform any act or do any other thing in contravention of any applicable state law. If any of the provisions of Agreement violate any applicable state law, the Agency will at once notify the Department in writing in order that appropriate changes and modifications may be made by the Department and the Agency to the end that the Agency may proceed as soon as possible with the project.

13.07 Plans and Specifications: In the event that this Agreement involves constructing and equipping of facilities on the State Highway System, the Agency shall submit to the Department for approval all appropriate plans and specifications covering the project. The Department will review all plans and specifications and will issue to the Agency a written approval with any approved protions of the project and comments or recommendations covering any remainder of the project deemed appropriate. After resolution of these comments and recommendations to the Department the Department will issue to the Agency a written approval with said remainder of the project. Failure to obtain this written approval shall be sufficient cause of nonpayment by the Department. The Agency will physically include Form FHWA-1737 in all its contracts and subcontracts.

13.08 Right-of-Way Certification: Upon completion of right-of-way activities on the project, the Agency must certify compliance with all applicable federal and state requirements. Certification is required prior to advertisement for or solicitation of bids for construction of the project, including those projects for which no right-of-way is required.

13.09 Agency Certification: The Agency will certify in writing, prior to project closeout that the project was completed in accordance with applicable plans and specifications, is in place on the Agency's facility, adequate title is in the Agency's name, and the project is accepted by the Agency as suitable for the intended purpose.

13.10 Agreement Format: All words used herein in the singular form shall extend to and include the plural. All words used in the plural form shall extend to and include the singular. All words used in any gender shall extend to and include all cenders.

13.11 Execution of Agreement: This Agreement may be simultaneously executed in a minimum of two counterparts, each of which so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts together shall constitute one in the same instrument.

13.12 Restrictions on Lobbying:

Federal: The Agency agrees that no federally-appropriated funds have been paid, or will be paid by or on behalf of the Agency, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence any officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with the convergence of the Congress or any federal contract, the making of any federal and, the making of any federal and, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment or modification of any federal contract, orant, loan or cooperative agreement.

If any funds other than federally-appropriated funds have been paid by the Agency to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this Agreement, the undersigned shall complete and submit Standard Form-LLL. "Disclosure Form to Report Lobbying," in accordance with its instructions.

The Agency shall require that the language of this paragraph be included in the award documents for all subawards at all tiers (including subcontracts, subgrants, and contracts under grants, loans, and cooperative agreements) and that all subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.

Specifically, the Agency agrees to:
 - a) Properly water and fertilize all plants, keeping them as free as practicable from disease and harmful insects:
 - b) Properly mulch plant beds;
 - c) Keep the premises free of weeds:
 - d) Mow and/or cut the grass to the proper length;
 - e) Properly prune all plants which responsibility includes removing dead or diseased parts of plants and/or pruning such parts thereof which present a visual hazard for those using the roadway; and
 - f) Remove or replace dead or diseased plants in their entirety, or remove or replace those plants that fall below original Project Standards.

The Agency agrees to repair, remove or replace at its own expense all or part of the project that falls below Project Standards caused by the Agency's failure to maintain the same in accordance with the provisions of this LMA. In the event any part or parts of the project, including plants, has to be removed and replaced for whatever reason, then they shall be replaced by parts of the same grade, size, and specification as provided in the original plans for the project. Furthermore, the Agency agrees to keep litter removed from the project highway.

- 2. Maintenance of the project shall be subject to periodic inspecialors by the Department. In the event that any of the aforementioned responsibilities are not carried out or are otherwise determined by the Department to not be in conformance with the applicable Project Standards, the Department, in addition to its right of termination under paragraph 4(a), may at its option perform any necessary maintenance without the need of any prior notice and charge the cost thereof to the Agency.
- 3. It is understood between the parties hereto that any portion of or the entire project may be removed, relocated or adjusted at any time in the future as determined to be necessary by the Department in order that the adjacent state road be widened, altered or otherwise changed to meet with the future criteria or planning of the Department. The Agency shall be given notice regarding such removal, relocation or adjustment and shall be allowed 60 days to removal end of the project at its own cost. The Agency will own that part of the project it removed. After the 60-day removal period, the Department will become the owner of the unresolved portion of the project, and the Department then may remove, relocate or adjust the project as it deems best, with the Agency being responsible for the cost incurred for the removal of the project.
 - 4. This LMA may be terminated under any one of the following conditions:

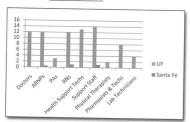

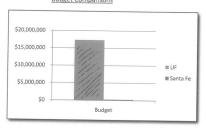

NACo Opposes Preferential Tax Treatment for Online Travel Companies

Issue: Legislative initiatives would preempt state and local taxing authority over Online Travel Companies (OTCs).

NACo policy: NACo opposes legislative initiatives that would preempt state and local taxing authority over OTCs.

Background: Hotel taxes are a vital revenue source for counties across the nation. Some jurisdictions funnel these revenues into the general fund and are used for a myriad of public purposes, including fire and police services. Some communities use these funds to promote local tourism, which creates jobs and pumps badly needed funds into local economies. And some localities use these funds to pay bond obligations used to finance the construction of convention centers, sports facilities, and other public buildings.

However, this revenue source is being threatened by efforts of the OTCs to obtain preferential tax treatment at the expense of local government budgets. The OTCs, such as Expedia, Travelocity, and Orbitz pay hotels a discounted, wholesale rate for the rooms they book. These rooms are then sold to customers at a higher, retail rate. While customers are charged the applicable hotel tax on the retail rate, the OTCs remit taxes based on the wholesale rate, short-changing local governments while pocketing the difference. This practice is currently the subject of numerous lawsuits across the country. In response, the OTCs are actively lobbying Congress to preempt the authority of state and local governments to impose and collect hotel taxes from the OTCs.

FUND THE MENTALLY ILL OFFENDER TREATMENT AND CRIME REDUCTION ACT

Issue: Support for the Mentally Ill Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Act (MIOTCRA) Program.

NACo policy: NACo supports continued funding for the Mentally III Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Program as a separate line item in the Department of Justice (DOJ) Bureau of Justice Assistance State and Local Law Enforcement Assistance Account.

Action needed: Urge your congressional delegations to support full funding (\$50 million) for the MIOTCRA program, and oppose efforts to consolidate MIOTCRA into the Department of Justice's Drug, Mental Health, and Problem Solving Court Initiative

Background: The nation's local jails are increasingly becoming the dumping grounds for the mentally ill. Of the 10 million people entering county jails each year, it is estimated that 24 percent are displaying a pattern of symptoms that are indicative of psychotic behavior. Most of these individuals have committed only minor infractions, more often the manifestation of their illness than the result of criminal intent.

The MIOTCRA program provides assistance to states and communities to create new programs or expand existing programs that can both reduce costs and help mentally ill offenders return to productive lives. State and local governments can use these grants for a broad range of activities, including establishing jail diversion programs, mental health courts, creating or expanding community-based treatment programs, or providing in jail treatment and transitional services. In addition, grant funds may be used to enhance training for criminal justice system and mental health system personnel who must know how to respond appropriately to this population.

In 2008, Congress reauthorized the MIOTCRA program for an additional five years at \$50 million annually; however, Congressional appropriators have never fully funded the program. Adding to the uncertainly about MIOTCRA program grant funding is the President's FY12 budget request proposes to consolidate the MIOTCRA program into Department of Justice's Drug, Mental Health, and Problem Solving Court Initiative. While this initiative has merit, this proposal change would not include many of the key elements of MIOTCRA and many of the law enforcement initiatives funded under the program will be lost.

Implementing a wide range of community-based services is infinitely more preferable to jail in terms of addressing the multiple issues facing this population. By keeping the mentally ill within the health and human services system, counties are better able to monitor their condition, provide treatment and dispense medication if needed; public safety is improved, long term state and local costs are reduced, and MIOTCRA assists in helping mentally ill offenders return to productive lives.

NATIONAL CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION ACT

Issue: Support for S. 306, the National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2011.

NACo policy: NACo supports the National Criminal Justice Commission Act.

Action needed: Urge your congressional delegations to cosponsor and support S. 306, the National Criminal Justice Commission Act.

Background: On February 8, 2011, Senator Jim Webb (D-Va..) reintroduced the National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2011 (S. 306). The legislation establishes a Commission which will undertake a comprehensive review of the criminal justice system, encompassing federal, state, local, and tribal criminal justice policies and practices, and make reform recommendations for the President, Congress, state, local, and tribal governments. The bill authorizes \$14 million over two years.

The bill was first introduced on March 26, 2009, and was approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee on nuary 21, 2010, with 39 bipartisan cosponsors. On July 28, 2010, it passed the U.S. House of expresentatives, with the support of Rep. Bill Delahunt (D-Mass.) and Rep. Lamar Smith (R-Texas), now Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee. However, despite strong bipartisan support, the bill was blocked in the U.S. Senate last year.

The National Criminal Justice Commission Act of 2011 outlines the topic areas that the Commission will review and the areas for which recommendations will be made. The Commission will have eighteen months to prepare and submit a final report to Congress and the President.

The Commission will consist of eleven members, and they must have expertise in areas like law enforcement, social services, public health, criminal justice and other relevant areas. A state and local government perspective is one of the itemized expertise areas, and establishing the Commission will assist in improving the public safety, cost effectiveness, administration of the Nation's criminal justice system.

Federal Payment of Stormwater Fees

Issue: Federal payment of stormwater fees

NACo policy: NACo urges Congress, the federal government and its agencies to recognize their responsibility to pay fees for local stormwater management services provided to them.

Latest Action: On January 4, 2011, President Obama signed into law a bill requiring the federal government to pay their fair share of local stormwater management services. The National Association of Counties applauds both Congress and the President for championing this issue.

Background: Prior to the bill's enactment into law, in 15 states and in the District of Columbia, some federal installations such as post offices, other federal buildings and military bases refused to pay local stormwater fees, even though the stormwater program is a federal mandate.

The federal government claimed "sovereign immunity" over the charges, calling it a tax, rather than a fee, and thus, unconstitutional. This translated to millions of dollars of unpaid federal government stormwater bills for a multitude of local governments nationally.

The bill, S. 3481, (P.L. 111-378) was cosponsored by Senators Ben Cardin (Md.) and James Inhofe (Okla.) unanimously passed in both the Senate on December 21 and the House of Representatives on December 22. The bill makes it clear that the federal government is responsible to pay stormwater fees. It goes on to state that stormwater fees are "reasonable service charges," and not a tax. This is a win for counties.

The federal government mandates that local governments manage stormwater runoff and preserve surface water quality through the Clean Water Act, particularly through the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permitting process and the Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) program. In order to secure adequate funding to address these mandates, more than 400 stormwater utilities have been formed throughout the United States.

A stormwater utility is funded by user fees, with a rate structure designed so that all property owners, including those that are tax exempt, pay a fee based on the relative amount of stormwater runoff they put into a public storm drainage system. The amount is based on a calculation of the amount of impervious area on the property. Stormwater fees are essential to maintain and upgrade the infrastructure needed to meet federal mandates while reducing polluted stormwater runoff.

Payment In Lieu of Taxes (PILT) Funding

Issue: Compensation for counties with tax-exempt federal land within their boundaries.

NACo policy: NACo supports full funding of the PILT program, to the authorized levels of P.L.103-379 and beyond.

Action needed: Thank members of your Congressional delegation that supported the inclusion of full PILT funding in the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008 (PL 110-343). Explain that counties will receive full PILT payments through FY2012, and will require a public commitment from members of Congress to support long term funding at its full authorized levels for FY2013 and beyond.

Background: On October 3, 2008, President Bush signed the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act (PL 110-331) into law. Included in the legislation was a provision that provided full authorized funding for PILT for years FY2008 through FY2012. From 1995 to 2007, PILT remained an appropriated program, which was subsequently underfunded year after year. Passage of PL 110-343 represents the highest level of funding in the program's history. In FY2009, the Department of the Interior made \$381.6 million in PILT payments to over 1850 units of local government.

The PILT program was conceived in 1976 to offset costs incurred by counties for services provided to federal employees and families, and to the users of the public lands. These include education, solid waste disposal, law enforcement, search and rescue, health care, environmental compliance, fire fighting, parks and recreation and other important community services.

Annual PILT funding levels remained static for many years. For nearly two decades counties watched the value of their PILT receipts drop due to inflation. In 1995, NACo was successful in securing a new authorization for the program, (PL 103-397), which raised the ceiling for PILT payments from \$105 million to over \$300 million.

NACo will aggressively pursue measures to provide full funding beyond FY2012.

Community Development Block Grant Program and HOME Investment Partnerships Program

Issue: County support for Fiscal Year 2011 and FY 2012 Appropriations for the Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), and the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME).

NACo policy: NACo supports freezing funding for CDBG and HOME programs at current FY 2011 (FY 2010) levels. NACo strongly supports the concept of federal block grant funding for community developments continued commit CDBG funds to projects that are determined to meet local priorities in addressing development, housing, economic infrastructure and low-income needs. NACo also strongly supports the HOME Investment Partnerships Program. HOME allows county governments to design and implement affordable housing programs for low and moderate income persons. NACo supports the flexible funding uses of both CDBG and HOME funds.

Action needed: NACo urges Congress to support freezing funding for CDBG formula grants in the amount of \$3.9 billion. NACo urges Congress to provide \$1.825 billion in formula funding for the HOME program.

Background: The House passed HR 1, the Continuing Resolution (CR) for FY 2011 appropriations which decreases CDBG funding by 62%, reducing it to \$1.5 billion. The Senate is still working on their version of the CR. The Obama Administration's FY 2011 budget includes \$3.9 billion for CDBG and \$1.65 billion for the HOME program. The budget also includes additional funding to support federally-funded, locally based affordable housing, community and economic development programs. Funding for vital affordable housing and community development programs increased in FY010 and those increases need to be sustained in FY 2011, and FY 2012.

The CDBG program provides block grant funding for community development programs. The legislative objective of the Act is to develop viable urban communities, provide decent housing and suitable living environments, and expand economic opportunities for low and moderate income persons. The program provides funding, to metropolitan cities and urban counties through a formula funding system. Entitlement communities receive seventy percent of CDBG funds, and states and small cities receive thirty percent. Specific monetary amounts are also set aside for special purpose grants for such purposes as providing technical assistance, developing work-study programs and revitalization of distressed areas. All CDBG activities must meet one of three national objectives: to principally benefit low and moderate income persons, aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight, or meet other urgent community needs.

The HOME program provides funding for state and local affordable housing programs. Sixty percent of HOME funds are allocated to counties and cities, and forty percent to states. Monies can be applied towards the acquisition, reconstruction, and moderate or substantial rehabilitation activities of housing. Participating jurisdictions can also use HOME funds for tenant-based rental assistance, and have flexibility to design policies and programs that address local affordable housing needs. Through HOME, states and participating local jurisdictions can also create partnerships within the private sector that promote affordable housing.

NACo Supports Increasing Broadband Deployment and Adoption

Issue: NACo supports increasing broadband deployment and adoption of broadband applications to support county services and increase citizens' utilization of broadband.

NACo policy: NACo will work with Congress and the federal government to provide and support county services to the citizens through the deployment of robust broadband capabilities. NACo will also promote the utilization of broadband technologies by county citizens.

Action needed: Ask Senators and Members of Congress to support measures to increase broadband utilization and deployment through incentives to the private sector and public/private partnerships.

Background: The Internet has ceased being a novelty in the lives of Americans and has become a key driver of innovation, jobs creation, and general business. Dial-up Internet services have gone the way of the dinosaur because of their slow speeds and unwieldy interfaces. Broadband use has become much more like a "utility", such as electricity, water and sewer. As more and more public services shift to the Internet, broadband availability becomes even more important.

The health care system is developing newer technologies to use the strength of broadband networks and provide better care to more people through the delivery of telemedicine. Schools and universities are providing online classes and workshops using streaming media over broadband networks.

The future is now, and broadband deployment and utilization is a critical element of future success.

AGRICULTURE AND RURAL AFFAIRS PROPOSED EMERGENCY RESOLUTION

PROPOSED RESOLUTION OPPOSING CUTS TO USDA RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMS IN FY 2011 AND FY 2012

Issue: Proposed Cuts to USDA Rural Development Programs.

Proposed Policy: NACo strongly supports USDA Rural Development programs and urges Congress to oppose proposed cuts to these programs in FY 2011 and FY 2012.

Background: USDA Rural Development funds a broad range of programs that are critical to rural counties. These programs include funding for water/wastewater infrastructure, community facilities, broadband, electric, telephone, housing, renewable energy and business development. USDA Rural Development programs are increasingly critical to rural communities due to the current fiscal situation.

At a minimum, these programs must be maintained at level funding; especially grant funding in order for rural communities to overcome impediments to economic development. The President's FY 2012 Budget for USDA Rural Development programs provides \$2.4 billion in budget authority to support a program level of \$36 billion in loans, grants and other assistance. This represents a cut of over \$568 million or 19 percent in budget authority from the FY 2010 enacted level. Funding levels for FY 2011 also face the prospect of even deeper cuts. For example, the House of Representatives passed a Continuing Resolution for FY 2011 that will cut the Rural Utilities Service and Rural Business-Cooperative Service by 24% below the President's FY 2011 proposal.

NACo calls on Congress to maintain USDA Rural Development program funding levels in both FY 2011 and FY 2012 at the FY 2010 enacted level of \$2.968 billion. This minimum level of funding is needed each year to bolster critical economic development opportunities in rural counties. NACo also supports grant funding for USDA rural water infrastructure and community facilities programs, which are especially critical to economic development efforts in rural communities. NACo supports a funding level of \$474 million for Rural Water and Waste Disposal Grants and opposes the Administration's proposal to cut this key program by \$59 million or 12 percent. NACo supports \$44 million in funding for Community Facility Grants and opposes the administration's proposal to cut the grant program by 139 percent.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: USDA Rural Development programs are critical to the economic vitality of many rural communities.

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COMMUNITY AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT STEERING COMMITTEE

PROPOSED RESOLUTION STRONGLY SUPPORTING A FREEZE ON CDBG FORMULA FUNDING AT 53,948 BILLION FOR FY 2011 and FY 2012

Issue: Proposals have been advanced to reduce formula funding for the Community Development Block Grant program (CDBG) to the FY 2008 level of \$3.59 billion from the FY 2010 level of \$3.948. A proposal from the House Republican Study Group calls for the elimination of all funding for CDBG.

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties (NACo) hereby strongly urges Congress to freeze funding in FY 2011 and FY 2012 for the CDBG program at the FY 2010 level of \$3.948 billion.

Background: Now in its 36th year, CDBG is arguably the Federal Government's most successful domestic program. The CDBG program's success stems from its utility i.e. providing cities, counties and states with flexibility to address their unique affordable housing and neighborhood revitalization needs. Based on data that grantees have reported to the Department of Housing and Urban Development over the past six years, the CDBG Program has:

- Assisted 865,874 low- and moderate-income households through single-family and multifamily residential rehabilitation, homeownership assistance, energy efficient improvements and lead-based paint abatement.
- Created or retained 259,346 jobs for low- and moderate-income persons through a variety of economic development activities;
- Benefitted 22,998,047 low- and moderate-income households through such public improvements as development of senior centers, centers for the disabled and handicapped, health and child care centers and parks and recreation facilities;
- Benefitted 73,863,286 low- and moderate-income households through such public services as
 employment and training, youth services, crime awareness/prevention, fair housing activities, mental
 health services, and services for abused and neglected children.

This is an impressive track record that grantees have compiled in their wise stewardship of CDBG funds. The House-passed version of the Continuing Resolution H.R. 1 would reduce funding by approximately 60% to \$1.5 billion for FY 2011 and HOME by \$180 million to \$1.65 billion

Any reduction in CDBG funding would severely slow down or eliminate thousands of local and state projects and programs that are directly contributing to local and regional recovery. In this current economic climate the need to create and maintain jobs, as well as providing conomic opportunities and services to the less fortunate, is overriding. Maintaining CDBG formula funding at its FY 2010 level of \$3.948 billion would go a long way toward maintaining the Nation's commitment to these and other households.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Freezing CDBG formula finding is crucial to state and local governments that provide services to communities at the grassroots level.

RESOLUTION ON FY 2012 APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

Issue: Support for FY2012 Appropriations for the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties (NACo) urges Congress to support a freeze in FY 2012 funding for core programs of the Department of Housing and Urban Development at the FY 2010 levels. These include: \$3,948 billion in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) formula funding; \$1.825 billion Proposed NACo Interim Resolutions — Morch 2011

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in formula funding for the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME); \$1.865 billion for Homeless Housing Assistance grants, plus an additional amount to fully fund expiring supportive housing and Shelter Plus Care rent subsidy contracts; full funding for existing Section 8 project-based and tenant-based contracts; and \$275 million in Section 108 Loan Guarantee authority; and \$150 million for Sustainable Communities Initiative grants.

Background: The President's FY2012 HUD budget proposes to reduce funding for the CDBG program from \$3.948 billion to \$3.648 billion (7.5%). It also proposes to reduce funding for the HOME program from \$1.825 billion to \$1.65 billion (9.6%). It proposes to eliminate funding for Brownfields Redevelopment Program. Rural Housing and Economic Development Program and Empowerment Zones. It would convert CDBG's Section 108 Loan Guarantee program to a fee based program and increase borrowing authority from the current \$275 million to \$500 million. It includes \$150 million for the Administration's Sustainable Communities Initiative and \$250 million for the Choice Neighborhood Initiative. The House-passed version of the FY 2011 congressional budget resolution (H.R. 1 - Continuing Resolution) contains approximately 60% cut in CDBG funding to \$1.5 billion and a reduction in HOME funding to \$1.65 billion. This version must be reconciled with a yet to be considered Senate version. The current FY 2011 Continuing Resolution expires March 4, 2011.

It is important for the federal government to sustain FY2010 funding levels for affordable housing and economic development programs in both FY 2011 and FY2012. Local governments have used CDBG funds for thousands of activities such as expanding homeownership opportunities; eliminating slum and blight; infrastructure improvements such as roads, water and sewer systems; services at libraries, community centers, adult day care and child after school care facilities; homeless housing assistance; employment training; transportation services; crime awareness; and business and job creation. HOME has an impressive track record, too, in expanding the supply of affordable ownership and rental housing. It is expected that the one million HOME-assisted affordable housing units will be completed in the Spring of 2011.

Congressional support of CDBG, HOME, Section 8 and homeless housing programs will sustain the programs' viability and improve local government flexibility in maintaining vibrant communities. The CDBG and HOME programs have been model federal block grants program for expanding affordable housing opportunities and undertaking neighborhood revitalization.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Full funding of HUD's core programs is crucial to state and local governments that provide services to communities at the grassroots level.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION SUPPORTING RETENTION OF THE ADMINISTRATION'S FORECLOSURE AND NEIGHBORHOOD STABILIZATION PROGRAMS

Issue: Support federal programs that are intended to prevent and address the foreclosure crisis that has been proposed for elimination in Congress.

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties (NACo) urges Congress to support three foreclosure programs - Home Affordable Modification Program (HAMP), the FHA Refinancing Program and the Emergency Mortgage Relief Program and the Neighborhood Stabilization Program 3.

Background: The House Financial Services Committee has proposed legislation that would terminate three Administration programs that address foreclosure prevention—the Home Affordable Modification Program. which has helped 521,630 homeowners modify their subprime mortgages, the FHA Refinancing program and the Emergency Mortgages Relief program that provides funding for up to 12 months for homeowners facing foreclosure. It would also terminate the \$1billion included in the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer

Protection Act of 2010 that provided \$1 billion for the Neighborhood Stabilization Program 3. That program provides funding by formula to counties, cities, and states for acquisition, rehabilitation and disposition of abandoned and foreclosed homes to prevent and address blight. These programs are a critical part of a comprehensive approach to addressing the current housing crisis.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Continued implementation of these programs is needed as part of a national effort to prevent or address forcelosure.

ENVIRONMENT, ENERGY AND LAND USE STEERING COMMITTEE

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON EXEMPTING RENEWABLE BIOMASS EMISSIONS FROM THE EPA'S TAILORING RULE

Issue: Renewable Biomass Emissions and the Greenhouse Gas Tailoring Rule.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports the permanent exemption of emissions from renewable biomass combustion from the Environmental Protection Agency's "Greenhouse Gas Tailoring Rule" and supports policy that recognizes the full carbon benefits of biomass combustion for energy consistent with established and wellsupported science.

Background: During the summer of 2010, the Environmental Protection Agency released a Title V Greenhouse Gas Tailoring Rule that would essentially consider emissions from biomass combustion the same as emissions from fossil fuels.

Scientists and other experts have consistently labeled sustainable biomass energy as "carbon neutral" and "renewable" because forests that produce biomass energy recycle carbon from atmosphere when new trees grow. As the EPA continues the efforts on the Tailoring Rule, counties are concerned that they may reverse a longstanding policy of labeling renewable biomass energy as "carbon neutral" such that the new policy would wrongly treat renewable, carbon-neutral biomass like coal and other traditional fossil fuels. It is important that policy reflect the full benefits of biomass utilization for energy that is consistent with well-supported science.

In January 2011, the EPA decided to postpone rulemaking for 3 years so EPA can gather data and better reflect science on biomass emissions. While counties see the importance of postponing the rulemaking, we recognize that there is now prolonged uncertainty on how biomass emissions will be regulated. This uncertainty will likely deter developers and new investments from making long-term investments in the industry. Furthermore, the outcome of the rulemaking will have an impact on all aspects of the biomass industry (from biomass collection to energy production) which will impact economic growth and opportunity in counties throughout the country. The EPA must recognize the importance of the biomass industry and the critical role it plays in improving the environment, job creation, and allowing our country to reduce its dependence on fossil fuels.

Fiscal Urban/Rural Impact: The construction and operation of biomass plants will provide a means to address forest health. Over the long-term, thinning operations and reduction of combustible materials will reduce fire danger, lower firefighting costs, and help restore forests. New biomass facilities and an increase in biomass demand will boost both iob creation and property tax revenues for counties. The size of the impact will depend upon the number and location of biomass facilities.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON EPA'S BOILER MACT RULE

Issue: EPA's upcoming Boiler MACT rule.

Proposed Policy: NACo urges Congress and the Administration to oppose EPA's final Boiler Maximum Achievable Control Technology (MACT) rule until accurate data is available and the feasibility of implementation concerns are addressed.

NACo further supports EPA's reconsideration process regarding the Boiler MACT rule provided that local government is involved in the reconsideration process.

Background: In June of 2010, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) published the Boiler Maximum Achievable Control Technology (MACT) rule in the Federal Register. At this time, the data available on boiler emissions was not sufficient to accurately depict the capabilities of today's emission controls on boilers. For example, data on biomass emissions was limited to the point that surrogate data (on carbon monoxide for example) was used to develop the rule. The EPA should use its ability under the Clean Air Act to subcategorize the different types of boilers.

The EPA should also consider the economic impacts of implementing the rule before making it final. Depending on the required annual cost of implementation, local economies will suffer due to businesses having to lay off employees or delaying important capital improvement projects because costs are too high.

The boiler rule as proposed will also have a significant impact on local governments that use boilers or process heaters to produce electricity or heat. It would affect boilers used in county buildings such as courthouses, jails, hospitals, clinics or other institutions that use natural gas, fuel oil, coal, or biomass. Non-county operations such as schools, churches, malls, apartment buildings, and businesses will be impacted.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: As proposed, the Clean Air Act Boiler MACT regulations impose billions of dollars in capital costs at facilities across the country. Furthermore, the onerous costs on U.S. manufacturers and small business owners will likely lead to the loss of thousands of manufacturing jobs and inhibit job creation in the biomass industry simply because the costs are too high. For counties across America this means a decrease in economic development in the biomass industry and the loss of jobs and tax revenue.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON STORMWATER RUNOFF FROM LOGGING ROADS Issue: A statutory exemption for stormwater runoff from logging roads.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports legislation that enacts into law the Silvicultural Rule.

Background: On August 17, 2010 the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit held that a National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit is required for stormwater runoff from logging roads

The Clean Water Act (CWA) requires a National Pollution Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit for the discharge of any pollutant to any navigable water (AKA "water of the U.S.") from any point source. Since 1973, rules promulgated by the Environmental Protection Agency ("EPA") have distinguished between point source and non-point source pollution in the CWA. Non-point source pollution in the CWA. Non-point source discharge.

Included in the CWA rules is the so-called Silvicultural Rule found at 40 C.F.R. § 122.27(b)(1), which has remained substantially in its current form since 1976. The Silvicultural Rule specifically defines timber "harvesting operations, surface drainage, or road construction and maintenance from which there is natural runoff" to be "non point source silvicultural activities," and thus, excluded from NPDES permitting requirements.

The Ninth Circuit disagreed with the Silvicultural Rule, holding that stormwater runoff that is collected and channeled in a system of ditches and culverts before being discharged into streams and rivers constitutes a point source, and that EPA lacks authority to promulgate a rule to the contrary. The Ninth Circuit stated that Congress has a history of providing specific statutory exemptions for certain categories of discharges. The court went on to say that federal courts have invalidated EPA regulations that provided similar regulatory exemptions.

The Court's decision has potentially sweeping implications. If broadly read, this opinion would require NPDES permits for every road in the country that is served by ditches or culverts that eventually discharge to natural surface waters and that is not already regulated by the CWA.

The court's opinion also leaves many critical questions unanswered. Even if the opinion were limited to logging roads, what constitutes a logging road? Contrary to the court's assumptions of fact, many forest roads, including the roads at sizes in this case, are not dedicated just to logging. They are used for a variety of purposes, both public and private, beyond just logging. If this is the case, who is responsible for obtaining these required permits? The court did not address whether the permit obligation rests with the owner of the roads or every entity that transports logs on the roads, or even those using the roads to access the forest for recreation. This proposed policy is consistent with current NACo policy that states that stormwater from all roads, gutters and ditches should not be considered a "water of the U.S." under the CWA.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: If rural county owned roads, such as logging or forest roads, require federal NPDES permits, this will be an unfunded mandate and preemption on county governments.

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PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON USFWS WIND SITING GUIDELINES UNDER THE BALD AND GOLDEN EAGLE ACT AND THE MIGRATORY BIRD TREATY ACT

Issue: U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Wind Siting Guidelines and the Bald and Golden Eagle Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

Proposed Policy: NACo urges the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) to reopen the public process and include local governments and consider mitigation and incidental take as they develop the Wind Siting Guidelines under the Bald and Golden Eagle Act and Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

Background: The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has proposed and continues to work on guidelines relating to sitting wind projects and the requirements pertaining to project development under the Bald and Golden Eagle Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. These guidelines have received little input from stakeholders but will detrimentally impact wind power development across the country. This will limit local economic development and the availability of renewable wind energy. Currently USFWS policy requires:

- 1. No siting of wind projects within 6 miles of eagle nests;
- Shutting down wind farms during eagle migratory periods;
 Possible removal of wind turbines if eagle mortality is documented:
- Open ended requirements for monitoring and undefined mitigation criteria; and
- 5. Open ended requirements for the wind industry to fund USFWS research projects.

These requirements are extremely costly and cannot be achieved by developers if they hope to remain viable. Wind power development has been beneficial to many counties across the country (particularly rural counties) by bringing in jobs, tax revenue, and alternative energy.

Counties and other stakeholders should be directly involved with the development of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Wind Siting Guidelines and other guidance documents used to address mitigation and planning around eagles and other birds covered under the Bald and Golden Eagle Act and the Migratory Bird Treaty Act. Counties request that USFWS bring stakeholders to the table when developing policies around wind development on that economic impacts and alternate mitigation may be considered, particularly when the requirements include expensive studies, monitoring, and mitigation.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Although it is not known what the full impact will be to counties, failure to include local government and other stakeholder input when developing the siting guidelines could result in a decrease in economic development, particularly in rural counties. Rural counties would lose revenues generated by wind projects as well as the jobs that are created. Urban counties would lose the benefit of the production and availability of clean, renewable energy.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF GULF COAST RECOVERY AND RESTORATION ISsue: Environmental and economic recovery from the 2010 Gulf Coast oil spill.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports short and long term plans for Gulf Coast recovery. NACo calls on the U.S. Congress to authorize a Gulf Coast Recovery Fund to ensure the environmental and economic recovery of the Gulf region. The recovery fund should be overseen by a Gulf Coast Recovery Council that includes strong local governmental representation. Gulf Coast recovery funds should go directly to local governments.

Background: The Deepwater Horizon oil spill (also referred to as the BP oil spill, the Gulf of Mexico oil spill or the BP oil disaster) is an oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico which flowed for three months in 2010. The impact of the spill still continues to impact counties and parishes even after the well was capped.

In September 2010, Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus released a report entitled: America's Gulf Coast: A Long-Term Recovery Plan After The Deepwater Horizon Oil Spill, detailing ideal for a Gulf Coast recovery plan. The Mabus report outlines "a recommendation for establishment of a congressionally mandated governance structure to oversee and implement these and other sources of funding Congress may appropriate with the goal of a coordinated federal, state, and local long-term recovery strategy." Implementation of the Mabus report is a good first step toward addressing local government concerns in the wake of this disaster, as long as local governments are fully involved in the process.

Gulf Coast counties and parishes have been on the front lines of the Deepwater Horizon oil spill containment, cleanup and recovery effort and have advanced hundreds of millions of local taxpayer dollars to respond to the spill. They continue to provide enhanced social services to meet the needs of people affected by the spill and will play an essential role in leading the restoration and recovery of the Gulf Coast environment and economy. Furthermore, the federal government must recognize that counties and parishes have governmental authority and responsibility to their residents and communities, and are not to be treated as subordinate "stakeholders" in the recovery process.

To date, counties and parishes in the Gulf Coast region have been frustrated and disappointed by the federal government's approach to working with local governments in responding to the Deepwater Horizon oil spill. Most recently, President Obama established a Gulf Coast Ecosystem Restoration Task Force that has no local government representation. This has added to the counties' disappointment and furthers the view that the Obama administration does not fully understand or desire to honor the intergovernmental partnership between counties and the federal government. The NACo Gulf Counties and Parishes Oil Spill Task Force was formed in July of 2010 in response to the Deepwater Horizon oil Spill. It is comprised of a number of affected counties and parishes from Texas, Louisiana, Alabama, Mississippi and Florida.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Benefits to affected counties if established.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON PESTICIDE USE

Issue: National permit program for pesticides.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports H.R. 872, the "Reducing Regulatory Burdens Act of 2011." NACo opposes extension of the EPA's jurisdiction regarding pesticide use in (and around) county streets, gutters, and ditches. Such expansion of authority preempts state and local government authority and creates unfunded mandates.

NACo supports using pesticides in accordance with the instructions on the label and supports strong penalties for those who misuse pesticides in FIFRA.

Background: In recent years, federal courts have ruled that aerial application of a pesticide over and into a "water of the U.S." requires a Clean Water Act (CWA) 402 permit, even when the pesticide use meets other requirements of federal law, including the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA). In 2009, the courts ruled that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) must move forward with regular pesticides under the NPDES program. In June 2009, the EPA rolled out their draft permit program, which will be finalized by April 9, 2011.

NPDES pesticide permits would be required for all pesticide discharges near "waters of the U.S." As originally proposed, the pesticide regulations would have a huge impact on state and local government activities associated with public health, land use, forest and park management, flood control, transportation projects, air and water programs, invasive species control, and endangered species protection. The EPA also intended to include monitoring and reporting requirements for applications impacting a specific number of acres. The draft proposal would also allow citizen suits to move forward. This permit will have devastating effects on county programs, particularly mosquito abatement and noxious weed control efforts, creating huge unfunded mandates for both urban and rural counties.

While this is a federal program, 44 states would be required to implement their own program, based on the finalized regulations. Six states' pesticide program would be directly overseen by the EPA. The tight timeframe is concerning for a number of states who must pass the state regulations through their state legislatures. Since these states have yet to see the revised rules, they are at a loss on how to proceed until the rules become final. This is problematic since the state programs become "official" in April 2011, leaving the states (and localities) open for citizen suits. Also, the responsibility for changing the programs to comply with this process falls upon the unit of local government which manages the program. This can be a mosquito abatement district, a cooperative weed management area, or other such district, but is most commonly an extension of county government.

The Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) is the principal law that authorizes EPA to regulate the manufacture, distribution, sale, and use of pesticides in the United States. Under FIFRA, the EPA is specifically authorized to: strengthen the registration process by shifting the burden of proof to the chemical manufacturer; enforce compliance against barned and unregistered products, and promulgate the regulatory framework missing from the original law. FIFRA has been extremely effective in regulating the use and sale of pesticides to protect human health and preserve the environment. More importantly, FIFRA does not fully preempt state or local law, allowing state and local governments to also regulate pesticide use. The proposed pesticides NPDES program will create unfunded mandates for local governments and preemptions of local authorities.

This proposed policy is consistent with existing NACo policy that states that local streets, gutters and human made ditches should not be considered "waters of the U.S."

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: The fiscal impact could be enormous on counties as they struggle to implement the new pesticides rules, especially for rural counties that have few staff and limited budgets.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON RESPONSIBLE MILITARY OVERWATER PRACTICES Issue: Military sonar use in marine waters.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports focused dialogue and collaboration between counties and the U.S.

Military to continue to improve practices and to mitigate impacts to marine mammals, fisheries, local economies, and natural resources.

Background: The military plays a critical role in our national security. However, certain over and on water military operations include deployment of sonar and detonation devices which are known to cause internal ear damage to marine mammals such as whales and pinnipeds. These animals are then disoriented and unable to properly navigate or feed, often beaching on shore. Due to the biological behavior of whales these animals remain together even in perilous conditions, resulting in devastating outcomes to entire pods. Effective measures to locate marine mammal populations before deployment of equipment should be required as well as retrieval of spent chemical and radiation laden materials where and when possible.

Many United States counties have military installations in their demographics which support maritime platforms. These bases are often a boon to local businesses and are an integrated part of their communities; however there are also impacts with regard to noise, accident potential zones, toxic clean—up and land and marine impacts that cause local citizens to approach county officials for assistance in working out collaborative agreements. It is in NACo's best interest to support counties by providing supportive language as guidance for intergovernmental land and water use policy. This resolution seeks to address maritime military training range complexes in relevant states.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Fiscal impact to counties is negligible and may actually create a cost savings by providing policy language to guide intergovernmental agreements for environment and land use planning thereby preventing costly law suits. Maintaining healthy marine, shoreline and beach environments are economic fishing and tourism drivers.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON OCEAN ACIDIFICATION

Issue: Addressing rising carbon dioxide levels.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports federal funding for continued education and scientific study of ocean acidification.

Background: Ocean acidification is an alarming condition that threatens the health and balance of oceans globally. As carbon dioxide (CO2) levels continue to increase, the resultant effect on calcium based organisms and oxygen producing plankton in the marine environment is to dissolve them, leaving the entire food chain in peril. The anticipated impacts to the fishing and tourism industries are catastrophic.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION CALLING ON CONGRESS TO REPEAL EXPANDED 1099 REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Issue: Form 1099 reporting requirements.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports the repeal of Section 9006 of Public Law 111-148 that expands IRS Form 1099 reporting requirements for counties.

Background: Section 9006 of Public Law 111-148, beginning January 1, 2012, expands the 1099 reporting requirements for counties on payments of \$600 or more to vendors for goods and certain services. County governments will need to file the report to the Internal Revenue Service as well as submit a copy to the vendor receiving the payment.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Although at the national level, the economic recovery is slowly gaining ground, state and local governments will continue to be fiscally stressed in the near term. As such, county governments must still find ways to do more with less as many are still dealing with the impact of reduced staff sizes and decreased resources. Given these challenges, any new administrative burdens will only create undue strain at a critical, yet vulnerable, stage in the overall economic recovery.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION CALLING ON CONGRESS TO REDUCE SPENDING IN THE FY 2013 FEDERAL BUDGET AND SIGNIFICANTLY PAY DOWN THE NATIONAL DEBT

Issue: Oppose further deficit spending by Congress; pay down the national debt.

Proposed Policy: NACo opposes Congressional deficit spending, earmarks, entitlements and other appropriations during FY 2013 that will exceed 1/3 of FY 2013 forecasted revenues. To avert a national fiscal calamity, NACo requests that, barring an immediate military or economic threat to national security, Congress reduce expenditures to work towards a balanced federal budget and make significant yearly strides in paying down the national debt until paid off.

Background:

- Experts have recently reported to President Obama's Bi-Partisan Fiscal Commission that if current spending and revenue trends continue, the ratio of government debt to the gross domestic product will rise to 102 percent by 2015 from 93 percent this year, thus giving the United States a negative or upside debt to GDP ratio for the first time in the nation's history.
- A 1 percent increase in GDP can create almost 1 million jobs, and that 1 percent is what experts think the country is losing because of the federal debt's massive drag on our economy.
- The U.S. debt has grown rapidly with the economic downturn and government spending for the Wall Street bailout, the wars in Afghanistan and Iraq and the economic stimulus.
- 4. The total U.S. debt includes obligations to the Social Security retirement program and other government trust funds. The amount of debt held by investors, which include China and other countries as well as individuals and pension funds, will rise to an estimated \$9.1 trillion this year from \$7.5 trillion last year.
- Unless serious changes occur, the U.S. debt will top \$13.6 trillion this year and climb to an estimated \$19.6 trillion by 2015, according to a Treasury Department report to Congress.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Balancing the budget and paying down the national debt will reduce borrowing costs, free up bank credit and investment capital, improve U.S. treasury bill rates, stimulate job growth

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and other economic activity, and thereby enhance tax bases and tax revenues for local government and avoid impending financial peril to our country the likes of which some European countries are currently experiencing.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION TO CONTROL THE RISING BUDGET DEFICIT

Issue: Proposed measures to reduce the federal deficit and their effects on counties

Proposed Policy: National Association of Counties asserts the following:

- · Congress cannot solve the budget deficit by only cutting domestic, non-military discretionary
- Federal assistance to state and local governments will help mitigate further layoffs. · Federal investment in state and local infrastructure produces private sector jobs.
- Deficit reduction should not be accomplished by shifting costs to counties (e.g. cuts to Medicaid), imposing unfunded mandates, or pre-empting county programs or taxing authority.
- The National Association of Counties supports maintaining federal financial assistance for county programs at the 2010 fiscal year levels.

Background: As President Obama and the U. S. Congress evaluate alternatives to control the Federal Government's rising deficit, counties are concerned that too much emphasis will be placed on reductions to domestic. discretionary spending programs that will affect the American people. When a recession occurs or the economy falters and there is high unemployment, services at the county level are needed most. Historically, there is a greater need for social services, health care, counseling, job training and local economic development during times like we are facing now. Domestic, discretionary programs are critical to the ability of counties to carry out their responsibilities as service providers for both the federal and state governments.

The current economic climate has translated into diminished revenue streams at the local level. Over the past three years, counties have seen revenue collections drastically diminish. Local governments across the nation are facing a perfect storm through a combination of decreased local tax revenues (primarily property and sales) and major reductions in state financial assistance, while at the same time facing an increased demand for social and health services. As a result, counties of all sizes and in all parts of the nation have been forced to institute significant layoffs, furloughs and service reductions. We anticipate that this climate will continue through at least 2014, and perhaps beyond.

While we are not calling for additional increases in assistance like the 2009 stimulus plan, we are asking the Administration and the Congress to consider the following points as they deal with the difficult issue of deficit reduction:

- YOU CAN NOT SOLVE THE BUDGET DEFICIT BY ONLY CUTTING DOMESTIC, NON-MILITARY DISCRETIONARY PROGRAMS. The current national debt is over \$14 trillion. Non-Military, discretionary programs are only 12 percent, or approximately \$430 billion, of the annual federal budget of \$3.6 trillion. These cuts will not put a significant dent in the deficit. So, why decimate important domestic programs carried out by state and local government that serve our national goals and our common residents?
 - FEDERAL ASSISTANCE TO STATE AND LOCAL GOVERNMENTS WILL HELP MITIGATE FURTHER LAYOFFS. According to the Congressional Budget Office, the \$800 billion stimulus plan passed in early 2009 provided a boost to the economy that preserved at least 1.4 million jobs. Even with this assistance, state and local governments still had to shed more than 200,000 jobs in 2010. It would have been even worse without the stimulus package. With the stimulus funds running out in 2011, more layoffs are probable this year. With further major cuts in domestic programs, even more reductions are likely, adding to the already high 9.4% unemployment rate.
- FEDERAL INVESTMENT IN STATE AND LOCAL INFRASTRUCTURE PRODUCES
 PRIVATE SECTOR JOBS. Investment by the Federal Government in county programs such as
 transportation, water and sewer projects, energy efficiency, rural development, CDBG, PILT,
 SRS and others produce both public and private sector jobs, has a multiplier effect, and promotes
 local economic development.

Deteriorating infrastructure is a hindrance to economic expansion, while infrastructure investments unlock untapped potential in our economy leading to higher GDP and increased tax revenues. Counties are responsible for a substantial portion of America's infrastructure – 45% of the nation's bridges, 44% of the roads and highways, one-third of the airports and transit systems, and much of our water and sewer system. We can, therefore, vastly contribute to the creation of jobs and economic recovery.

 DEFICIT REDUCTION SHOULD NOT BE ACCOMPLISHED BY SHIFTING COSTS TO COUNTIES, IMPOSING UNFUNDED MANDATES, OR PRE-EMPTING COUNTY PROGRAMS OR TAXING AUTHORITY. Cost shifting to, or imposing underfunded or unfunded mandates on, state and local government will only exacerbate the current fiscal strain and delay efforts toward economic recovery.

County governments are partners with the states and the federal government in providing important programs and services to the American people. We are working hard, making significant cuts, instituting reforms, and being creative in facing the worst fiscal crisis since the Great Depression. Counties will participate in addressing the challenges our nation is facing and expect the federal government and Congress to do the same without drastically hurting the people we all serve.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impacts: Significant for all counties by potential loss of programmatic financial assistance from the federal government.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF CHARITY CARE REQUIREMENTS FOR NON-PROFIT HEALTH CARE FACILITIES

Issue: Charity care requirements for non-profit and tax-exempt health care facilities.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports imposing charity care requirements on non-profit and tax-exempt health care facilities, including standards that measure facilities' access to and utilization of tax-exempt capital, to objectively determine the amount of actual health care providers tender to those in need against the value of tax exemptions that the facilities receive.

Background: County governments across the United States of America are the health care providers of last resort for the most vulnerable indigent and uninsured residents in our neighborhoods and communities. NACo, in efforts to ensure less cost shifting to county governments, supports federal policies, such as adequate Medicaid funding, to assist in providing health care coverage to such residents and reimbursing county health providers for treatment rendered to our nation's most critical populations. Stable and adequate Medicaid funding, in tandem with how other providers assist in caring for uninsured individuals, directly affects county budgets, local taxpayers who fund government operations and those who rely on public and non-profit providers for their health care needs. The United States Congress and many states and counties have considered or addressed issues related to charity care and tax exemptions, seeking to establish fair but objective benchmarks against which hospitals would be measured to determine the granting or renewing of tax exemptions for providing actual charity health care to those in need. Without objective standards to determine the amount of actual charity health care non-profit and tax-exempt health care facilities provide to members of their neighborhoods and communities. county governments cannot accurately access the performance of health care facilities receiving tax exemptions funded by county government taxpayers. The following issues should be considered in crafting appropriate charity care standards: definitions of "charity care" for the purposes of tax exemption qualification and eligibility: guidelines for counties to consider when determining whether a tax exemption applied for by a non-profit hospital should be granted, rejected, renewed or denied; the current and unique fiscal situations confronting states and units of local government today when making recommendations on the appropriate percentage, level or standard of charity care to qualify for tax exemptions.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Requiring charity care in proportion to tax exemption will significantly decrease the burden of uncompensated care at county hospitals, both urban and rural.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE HEALTHY FOOD FINANCING INITIATIVE Issue: Access to Healthy Foods.

Proposed policy: NACo supports the Healthy Food Financing Initiative (HFFI) and urges Congress and the Administration to authorize and provide adequate resources to implement the initiative in partnership with counties and local jurisdictions.

Background: Roughly 23 million Americans in underserved and low-income communities lack healthy food options and instead frequent fast food and convenience stores selling high-fat and high-sugar processed foods. Underserved and low-income communities lack economic development opportunities and benefits associated with local grocery stores, including the creation of quality jobs and complimentary retail stores and services. Americans in underserved and low income communities have significantly higher rates of obesity, increasing the chances that they will develop serious health problems including type 2 diabetes, heart disease or other chronic health issues. Childhood obesity is a major crisis in many of these communities, affecting over 30 percent of children ages 10-17.

President Obama launched the Healthy Food Financing Initiative (HFFI) in February 2010 in order to tackle this healthy food access challenge. The President's FY 2011 budget included \$345 million dollars for HFFI from three agencies — USDA, Treasury, and HHS. These funds would provide loan and grant financing to attract grocery stores and other fresh food retail to underserved urban, suburban, and rural areas; and renovate and expand existing stores so they can provide the healthy foods that communities want and need.

HFFI would attract investment in underserved communities by providing critical loan and grant financing. These one time resources would help fresh food retailers overcome the higher initial barriers to entry into underserved, low-income rural, suburban, and urban areas. It would also support renovation and expansion of existing stores so they can provide the healthy foods that communities want and need.

The Administration's efforts to fund and implement HFFI have been slowed and curtailed due to lack of congressional appropriations and authorizing language. On November 30, 2010, a bipartisan coalition in the House and Senate introduced Healthy Food Financing Initiative bills designed to overcome these hurdles. These bills were introduced with bipartisan support by Sen. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) and Rep. Allyson Schwartz (D-PA) (S 3986/HR 6462). The bills are likely to be reintroduced in the new Congress and seek to dramatically reduce the number of low-income Americans living in "food desents." Based off a highly successful model in Pennsylvania, the \$500 million Healthy Food Financing Initiative would authorize USDA to administer a mix of federal loans and grants to provide one-time start-up assistance for supermarkets, corner stores, co-ops, and farmers' markets in underserved low-income areas. If passed, the initiative is projected to create or preserve 44,500 long-term jobs and \$0,000 construction jobs - all while helping millions of Americans eat healthier.

The Healthy Food Financing Initiative is a viable, effective, economically sustainable solution to the problem of limited access to healthy foods, and can reduce health disparities, improve the health of families and children, create jobs and stimulate local economic development in low-income and underserved communities.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impacts: The proposed initiative supports growth and job creation in underserved rural, suburban and urban counties.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF PROVISIONS OF THE PATIENT PROTECTION AND AFFORDABLE CARE ACT THAT HELP COUNTY SAFETY NET AND BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PROGRAMS

Issue: Essential need to implement key features of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 (PPACA).

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties supports full funding for, and implementation disabled populations. Specifically, NACo supports the extension of affordable health coverage and benefits including expanding Medicaid – to uninsured and underinsured residents who rely on county health care delivery systems; the coordination of services to ensure that everyone has a medical/health home for efficient, accessible and cost-effective care; the enhancement of access to preventive care and health promotion, for underserved populations; and the promotion of the use of peer supports and counselors, together with effective care coordination that spans health and social support services.

Background: Key features of the PPACA are fully compatible with and supportive of the operations of county safety net agencies including local behavioral health and developmental disability authorities, and promote the coordination and integration of behavioral health and primary care, with the goal of demonstrating the best care and recovery of consumers served by these systems; they support the expansion of the Medicaid program in a manner that does not place a financial burden on state, county and local authorities; they promote care

coordination across Federal programs that serve persons with disabilities; and they extend mental health and substance use care parity legislation to all private and public health plans.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: In the short term, these policies will require additional federal resources. However, over the longer run, this investment will pay off in better health outcomes for low income populations and a greater contribution of persons with disabilities to the economic recovery and productivity of the United States. Although the impact of these policies will be great in urban areas, we expect them to be even greater in rural areas, where such services are currently very sparse.

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HUMAN SERVICES AND EDUCATION STEERING COMMITTEE

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON THE COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT

Issue: The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) has been targeted for serious cuts and program changes.

Proposed policy: NACo supports full funding for CSBG as well as the program's formula grant structure.

Background: The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), which was funded at \$700 million in FY 2010, is being cut by approximately 50 percent in the House Continuing Resolution for FY 2011 (H.R. 1) as well as the President's proposed FY 2012 budget. Additionally, the President's budget includes language that would "introduce competitiveness" into CSBG. While the proposed budget doesn't provide further details, this language is being interpreted as a proposal to change CSBG to a totally competitive grant process.

CSBG operates in 90 percent of the nation's counties through a network of more than 1,100 eligible public or private entities, many of which are community action agencies (CAAs). CSBG grants go to the states, but they are mandated to pass through 95 percent of the funds to the eligible entities. Many of these anti-poverty agencies also serve as the local Head Start agency and the local energy assistance agency. After Hurricane Katrina, many CSBG agencies played a key role in helping individuals who were displaced. CSBG agency boards are composed of local elected officials and community representatives.

Turning CSBG into competitive grants would disadvantage smaller communities that don't have the wherewithal to hire grant writers. It should be noted that CSBG already has a competitive component. States are allowed to use a percentage of their allocation for discretionary grants.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Would preserve county funds

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF STRENGTHENED FEMA OUTREACH AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE FOR FLOOD HAZARD MAPPING

Issue: Flood Hazard Mapping and Strengthening FEMA's outreach and technical assistance with counties.

Proposed Policy: NACo urges the U.S. Congress to fully support a transparent and fiscally reasonable process by which counties and residents can revise and amend FEMA's Digital Flood Insurance Rate Maps. Additionally, NACo urges the federal government to enhance flood hazard mapping outreach and technical assistance in local communities.

Background: In 2009, in an effort to modernize maps, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) issued an updated Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) with major changes from the previous versions. The 2009 FIRMs significantly expand the Special Flood Hazard Areas (SFHAs) delineated within many counties, especially coastal counties. These changes will affect future land use and development on a number of private and public properties, and require affected property owners with home loans from federal lending institutions to purchase flood insurance.

FEMA has begun to work on further revisions to the 2009 Flood Maps. FEMA expects that the revised flood maps will be completed and become effective sometime in 2012 or 2013. The revisions will incorporate updated topographical data and hydraulic and hydrologic modeling. In this regard, FEMA anticipates that its new coastal hydrodynamic model of coastal areas such as the San Francisco Bay will account for tidal action, wave run up, and storm surge; and may ultimately raise the 100-year water levels by up to two feet. If so, this will further expand the limits of Special Flood Hazard Areas in the affected counties.

FEMA has published notices of new maps in the Federal Register and local newspapers in many instances. However, many counties have indicated that FEMA has not engaged directly with communities in a public process. As a result, direct community outreach and response to residents' questions has been left to the local jurisdictions. This has especially been hard for the affected communities, since the local officials do not necessarily have all the answers to questions on FEMA's approach, analysis, and study assumptions in creating the map updates.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: There will be minimal federal costs associated with the adoption of this policy. The potential savings for county residents as a result of the commission's work is expected to be substantial.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF LEVEES AND FLOOD CONTROL STRUCTURES

Issue: Addressing Treatment of Existing Levees and Flood Control Structures in FEMA Flood Insurance Studies producing new Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMS).

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties supports H.R. 764 and similar bills that ensure fair treatment of existing levees and flood control structures under the national flood insurance program.

Background: The Fair Treatment of Existing Levees Act of 2011, H.R. 764, was introduced on February 17, 2011 and declares that FEMA may not use the assumption that an existing levee or flood structure does not exist to designate an area as having new flood hazards pursuant to issuance, revision, updating or any other purpose to implement changes in flood insurance maps. An exception will be granted in cases where no affected community notifies FEMA of objections to the Administrator's hazard modeling processes within 90 days of

On February 3 and February 18, 27 US Senators and 49 Members of Congress respectively, signed letters to the Honorable W. Craig Fugate, Administrator of the US Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) addressing this very issue.

FEMAs current "without levees" modeling policy assumes that a levee or flood control structure that exist in reality, is completely removed, without analysis, before proceeding with their modeling process. This policy results in reduced precision of flood maps, and necessarily the overstatement of the risk of flooding in some areas and understating the risk of flooding in other areas further eroding public confidence in the mapping process.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Letters sent to Administrator Fugate state "in cases where FEMA treats a flood control structure as if it has been completely wiped off the map, we may be unnecessarily devaluing property and hurting the economies of cities, towns, counties and businesses." ... "When American jobs are at risk, FEMA should use the methods readily available to it rather than settle for an all-or-nothing approach, thus shifting the financial burden from the federal government to local governments and their citizens." It is understood that levees and flood control structures, both riverine and coastal are vital infrastructure to virtually all of the U.S.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT FOR THE NATIONAL INITIATIVE ON CYBER EDUCATION (NICE)

Issue: Support of the National Initiative on Cyber Education (NICE)

Proposed Policy: NACo supports the National Initiative on Cyber Education.

Background: Cybersecurity has been identified as one of the most serious economic and national security challenges in the nation. Established by the Federal Government, the National Initiative for Cybersecurity Education (NICE) is seeking to address this challenge head on with a strategy to build a cyber savvy nation through training and awareness. NICE has evolved from President Obama's Comprehensive National Cybersecurity Initiative, and extends its scope beyond the federal workplace to include civilians and students in kindergarten through post-graduate school. One of the goals of NICE is to establish an operational, sustainable and continually improving cybersecurity education program for the nation to use sound cyber practices that will enhance the nation's security.

The National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) is leading the NICE initiative to ensure coordination, cooperation, focus, public engagement, technology transfer and sustainability. Additionally, the initiative is represented by the following four tracks:

- Track 1: National Cybersecurity Awareness Lead: Department of Homeland Security (DHS);
- Track 2: Formal Cybersecurity Education Co-Lead Department of Education (DoED) and Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP);
 - Track 3: Federal Cybersecurity Workforce Structure Lead: Office of Personnel Management (OPM); and
- Track 4: Cybersecurity Workforce Training and Professional Development Tri-Leads: Department of Defense (DoD), Office of the Director of National Intelligence (ODNI), Department of Homeland Security (DHS).

Through collaborative partnerships between federal, state and local governments, industry, academia, non-government organizations and the general public, NICE hopes to educate raise and public awareness about cybersecurity so our nation is resilient to cyber incidents and cyber threats.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Urban and rural residents will benefit equally by increased awareness and education. Private partners and grants will supplement in-kind community member participation.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION SUPPORTING GOALS OF NACO'S VETERANS AND MILITARY SERVICE TASK FORCE WITH RESPECT TO JOB TRAINING AND ACCESS TO EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

Issue: Veterans access to job training and employment services.

Proposed Policy: NACo supports the goals of the NACo Veterans and Military Service Task Force (VMSTF) to develop county best practices and policies that serve to promote job training and employment services to veterans and military service members.

Background: NACo has convened a Veterans and Military Service Task Force (VMSTF) to engage and highlight county best practices and policies to promote innovative programs, services and benefits for our nation's military, veterans and their families. Among the key objectives is to highlight best practices and policies in employment services and access to employment.

The goal of the NACo Veterans and Military Service Task Force (VMSTF) is to engage NACo and its members to develop and highlight county best practices and policies to promote innovative programs, services and benefits for our nation's military, veterans and their families. Program integration will include coordination with veterans' service organizations and appropriate federal and state government agencies to highlight key NACo objectives, including the County Government Works campaign.

In order to include veterans and military service issues in health and human service planning, delivery, coordination and outreach, the Task Force will focus primarily on best practices and policies in four subject areas:

- 1. Physical and mental health, substance abuse, suicide prevention;
- 2. Housing and homelessness;
- 3. Employment services and access to employment; and
- 4. Justice including law enforcement, courts and probation.

The U.S. Department of Labor, Veterans' Employment and Training Service (VETS) offers employment and training services to eligible veterans.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: Increasing access to job training and employment services for veterans and military service members.

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Issue: Chain of command for Forest Service Law Enforcement Personnel

Proposed Policy: NACo supports a change in Forest Service personnel organization to place law enforcement officers under the direction of Forest Supervisors.

Background: Several decades ago, there was reported abuse of Forest Service procedures, allegedly involving Service line officers. As a response, and at the urging of, among others, the Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics, the law enforcement branch of the Service was "stovepiped", meaning that these officers no longer were supervised by local or regional authority, but answered instead directly to the Washington Office. As a result, there can be little to no interaction between enforcement officers and the local supervisors and line officers

As timber harvest has dramatically declined, there is no longer a reason to isolate these enforcement officers from the chain of command. In fact, the loss of interaction has resulted in adverse public relations between the Forest Service and forest communities. When new personnel are transferred into areas without an understanding of the area's culture and the agency's interdependence upon the community, all too often the result is public conflict

If there is direct supervision and accountability to local Forest Service officials, there is a much greater opportunity for such conflicts to be resolved before it becomes a community issue. A positive influence on public relations for the agency would be of great benefit for all parties involved.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: No fiscal impact, with a positive impact on rural communities' relationship with the Forest Service.

PROPOSED RESOLUTION TO RESCIND DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR SECRETARIAL **ORDER 3310**

Issue: Rescind DOI Secretarial Order 3310.

Proposed Policy: The National Association of Counties strongly urges that Secretary Salazar immediately rescind Order 3310 that calls for the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to inventory "Wild Lands" and manage them for wilderness without Congressional approval. NACo urges Congress to enact legislation stating unequivocally that Congressional approval is required prior to any special designation of federally managed public lands.

Background: Secretary Salazar Issued Order 3310 overturning the established policy on new wilderness inventories on public land, eliminating public process and violating the intent of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act (FLPMA), as only Congress has the authority to designate lands as Wilderness. Secretarial Order 3310 directs the Bureau of Land Management to begin to inventory, designate, and manage Federal lands as Wilderness, independent of the United States Congress. It undermines the established public process for land use planning and expressly violates the intent of the Federal Land Policy and Management Act, as only Congress has the authority to designate lands as Wilderness.

Counties should be fully involved as affected partners in any process to designate wilderness. Congress and Federal agencies should coordinate with affected counties when considering special land use designations that impact the use and status of public lands. NACo strongly opposes the actions by the Interior Department and maintains our members' position opposing Federal land management agency actions that limit access and multiple use of lands that otherwise would be available to the public (i.e. Wilderness Study Areas, "Wild Lands," or any other de facto wilderness designation).

In the Norton vs Utah settlement, BLM and Utah acknowledged that "management of Post-603 lands to preserve their alleged wilderness character is inconsistent with FLPMA's Section 603 limited delegation of authority," (par. 17 at p. 8) and that BLM "will not establish, manage, or otherwise treat public lands, other than Section 603 WSAs and Congressionally designated wilderness, as WSAs or as wilderness pursuant to the Section 202 process absent congressional authorization." (par. 5 at p. 12)

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: The active management of America's Public lands to accommodate beneficial multiple uses is essential to the public health, safety and economic vitality of communities across the United States. Public lands that receive special designations are removed from multiple use and prohibit activities vital to the nation, including mineral exploration and harvesting, ranching, agriculture, energy generation from renewable resources, military training, and most types of recreational activities. Revenues generated from public land support critical state and local government services and loss of such revenues would further cripple the economies of local communities and place unnecessary new burdens on State and local government and school budgets.

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TELECOMMUNICATIONS AND TECHNOLOGY STEERING COMMITTEE

PROPOSED RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF THE WHITE HOUSE WIRELESS INNOVATION AND INFRASTRUCTURE INITIATIVE

Issue: Support of the White House wireless innovation and infrastructure initiative.

Proposed policy: NACo supports the goals of the Administration's Wireless Innovation and Infrastructure Initiative.

Background: In his State of the Union address, President Obama set the goal of enabling businesses to provide high-speed wireless services to at least 98 percent of all Americans within five years. The rollout of the next generation of high-speed wireless—the "4G" technology now being deployed in the United States by leading carriers—promises considerable benefits to our economy and society. More than 10 times faster than current high speed wireless services, this technology promises to benefit all Americans, bolster public safety, and spur innovation in wireless services, equipment, and applications. By catalyzing private investment and innovation and reducing the deficit by \$9.6 billion, this initiative will help the United States win the future and compete in the 21st century economy.

- Nearly Double Wireless Spectrum Available for Mobile Broadband: The President has set the goal of freeing up 500 MHz of spectrum for everything from smartphones to wireless broadband connectivity for laptops to new forms of machine-to-machine communication within a decade. Critical to realizing this goal are "voluntary incentive auctions" and more efficient use of government spectrum, estimated to raise \$27.8 billion over the next decade.
- Provide At Least 98 percent of Americans with Access to 4G High-Speed Wireless: Private investments are extending 4G to most of the Nation. Rural communities are important to all of America and the jobs and infrastructure investment in advanced telecommunications networks for rural areas can't be forgotten as they transition the Universal Service funding mechanisms. The President's initiative would support a one-time investment of \$5 billion and reform of the "Universal Service Fund" to ensure millions more Americans will be able to use this technology.
- Catalyze Innovation Through a Wireless Innovation (WIN): To spur innovation, \$3 billion of the spectrum proceeds will go to research and development of emerging wireless technologies and applications.
- Develop and Deploy a Nationwide, Interoperable Wireless Network for Public Safety: The President's Budget calls for a \$10.7 billion commitment to support the development and deployment of a nationwide wireless broadband network to afford public safety agencies with far greater levels of effectiveness and interoperability. An important element of this plan is the reallocation of the D Block for public safety and \$500 million within the WIN Fund.
- Cut the Deficit By \$9.6 Billion over the next decade: Nearly \$10 billion of spectrum auction revenue will be devoted to deficit reduction.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impacts: Substantial opportunities for counties to improve economic development and spur job creation.

TRANSPORTATION STEERING COMMITTEE

PROPOSED RESOLUTION ON ELIGIBILITY FOR FUNDING THROUGH THE FEDERAL LANDS HIGHWAY PROGRAM

Issue: Eligibility for road improvement funding.

Proposed Policy: Congress should amend the Federal Lands Highway Program to make it available to fund improvements to any road that accesses or passes through federally managed forest lands, specifically including lands managed by the U.S Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management.

transportation access to and through the National Forest System (NFS) lands for visitors, recreationists, resource users and others, which is not met by other transportation programs. Forest Highways assist in rural and community development, economic development and promotion of tourism and travel. Reconstruction, rehabilitation, safety and ad preservation projects on roads serving the National Forest System are all eligible under the program.

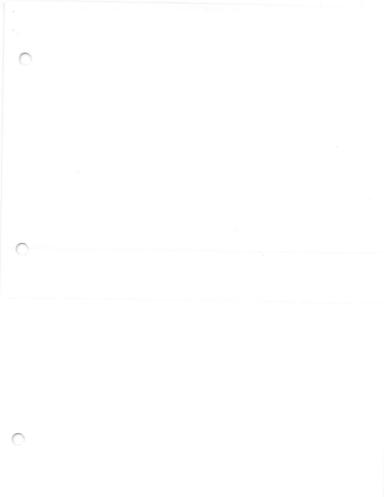
Oregon's counties have accessed millions of dollars in federal funds through grant projects that are solicited by the State Department of Transportation.

However, in addition to National Forest lands, Oregon is home to over 2 million acres of land under the Department of Interior's Bureau of Land Management. Due to the language authorizing this program in SAFETEA-LU, roads that access and pass through these federal forests are ineligible for assistance under the Forest Highway Program.

In Lane County, McGowan Creek Road, milepost 2.5 has been the site of one vehicle crash that resulted in a fatality and several other serious injury wrecks. This road is under the management and maintenance of the Bureau of Land Management. In jointly seeking to apply for funding to fix this particular risk, Lane County and the BLM discovered they were in-eligible to apply for funding through the Federal Lands Highway Program.

Fiscal/Urban/Rural Impact: If this change were to occur, it could provide funding to address hazardous road issues on roads that access or pass through lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management in addition to roads which access or are managed by the National Forest Service.

Opening Doors

Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness :: 2010

Implementation Update

Background

On June 22, 2010, the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH) unveiled the nation's first-ever comprehensive federal strategic plan to prevent and end homelessness. Opening Doors: The Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness serves as a roadmap for joint action by the 19 USICH member agencies. The Plan is focused on four key goals:

- Finish the job of ending chronic homelessness in five years;
- Prevent and end homelessness among Veterans in five years;
- Prevent and end homelessness for families, youth, and children in ten years; and
- Set a path to ending all types of homelessness.

This implementation update includes events and work related to progress made on Opening Doors. USICH has hosted or participated in a series of events related to the goals and strategies in Opening Doors:

- In September, HUD held HEARTH/HMIS conferences in Atlanta and Denver. The conference promoted best
 practices to reduce and end homelessness. Over 1,000 HMIS administrators, Continuum of Care leaders, and
 ESG and HPRP grantees from across the country engaged with USICH Executive Director Barbara Poppe and
 Deputy Directors Sharon Price and Anthony Love, as well as representatives from HHS, VA, and Labor about how
 the federal plan relates to efforts in local communities.
- Pursuant to the strategies outlined in Opening Doors that promote collaboration and alignment at all levels of government, USICH senior staff has presented the plan across the country, including at nearly two dozen national, statewide, and major metropolitan area conferences, and to Regional and State Interagency Councils on Homelessness, while also encouraging communities to align their work with the Plan. USICH played a supporting role in the new Los Angeles Business Leaders Task Force on Homelessness' plan, Home for Good. The goals in Home for Good of ending chronic homelessness and Veterans homelessness in five years are aligned with goals for these groups in Opening Doors.
- On December 1, 2010 with the Department of Justice's Access to Justice Initiative, USICH co-sponsored "Searching for Balance: Civic Engagement in Communities Responding to Homelessness" —we organized a day long discussion for 80 people representing 20 communities to discuss alternatives to criminalization of homelessness. Law enforcement, courts, city officials, federal partners and advocates were all in attendance.
- On January 26, 2011, USICH hosted a discussion per the HEARTH Act, in response to the GAO report called
 "Homelessness: A Common Vocabulary Could Help Agencies Collaborate and Collect More Consistent Data." A
 report to the Council and to Congress will be issued as an outcome of the convening.

In addition, USICH has been working with its Council member agencies to make continued progress on the goals of Opening Doors:

Chronic homelessness

- On December 16, 2010 USICH held the fourth and final Council meeting for 2010. In attendance were four
 Cabinet Secretaries including HUD Secretary Shaun Donovan, Labor Secretary Hilda Solis, Veterans Affairs
 Secretary Eric Shinseki and Education Secretary Arne Duncan. Melody Barnes, Director of the White House
 Domestic Policy Council also joined. Labor Secretary Hilda Solis was elected Chair for 2011 with Health and
 Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius as Vice-Chair. An action plan to finish the job of ending chronic
 homelessness was adopted.
- In October 2010, USICH organized a Listening Session at the Center for Medicaid in Baltimore with
 representatives from across HHS and other partner agencies with practitioners in the field to discuss effective
 integrated care models for people who have experienced chronic homelessness, and to discuss the challenges
 and lessons learned from organizations that operate these programs as they relate to Medicaid expansion under
 the affordable Care Act.
- USICH met with Dr. Donald Berwick and his senior team at the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services
 (CMS). USICH hopes to identify ways to encourage states to adopt Medicaid plans that will best assist people
 experiencing homelessness, as well as possible demonstration projects through health reform initiatives to learn
 more about how to ensure better health outcomes for people experiencing or most at risk of homelessness.
- USICH has been participating in regular planning meetings with HUD and HHS around Opening Doors' Chronic
 Homelessness Signature Initiative. The initiative, which was included in the President's FY2011 Budget, would
 connect vouchers with health and social services provided through Medicaid and wraparound services funded
 through SAMHSA. This initiative is intended to help 4,000 people experiencing chronic homelessness move off
 the streets and out of shelter. Congress' decision to enact a Continuing Resolution rather than appropriations
 bills will alter the near term plans; the planning group is meeting to determine the course of action to continue
 the progress.

Veterans' homelessness

- On November 3, USICH held its third Council meeting of 2010. In order to tackle barriers for Veterans to access
 mainstream resources, the Council committed to develop and then disseminate key policy guidance about all
 federal programs, services and benefits available to Veterans and their families. The plan will help identify and
 remove barriers to mainstream program access for Veterans and their families at risk of or experiencing
 homelessness.
- In December 2010, VA and USICH organized a two day National Forum on Veterans Homelessness for four hundred people—federal staff, advocates, VISN directors and staff, and housing and service providers who work with Veterans. Three Cabinet Secretaries spoke at the Forum. Among other notable mentions, VA Secretary Shinseki directed each Veterans Health Administration (VHA) entity director to hold an organizational meeting before the end of February to develop local plans to end Veterans homelessness.

- VA and HUD have provided permanent housing to more than 20,000 Veterans and families through the HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (HUD-VASH) program with an additional 10,000 being housed in the next year.
- VA has recently released a Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for the new Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) Program. The SSVF Program grants will fund nonprofit organizations and consumer cooperatives so they can provide supportive services, including rental assistance, that promote housing stability for very lowincome veteran families currently residing in or transitioning into permanent housing.
- A component of the VA's plan to end homelessness among Veterans in 5 years is promoting use of management
 systems to monitor outcomes for both individual Veterans and the programs that serve them. Accordingly, the
 VA announced on December 21 that it plans to fully participate in Homeless Management Information Systems
 (HMIS) over the next 12 months, and VA-funded homeless assistance providers will be required to participate in
 their local HMIS before or by March 31, 2011.

Family, youth, and children homelessness

- Building upon the goal to prevent and end family, youth, and children homelessness by 2020, USICH has
 engaged with the Department of Education's senior leadership. In early September, USICH met with Education
 Secretary Arne Duncan, Assistant Deputy Secretary Kevin Jennings, Assistant Secretary for Elementary and
 Secondary Education Thelma Melendez de Santa Ana, and Special Assistant Kathryn Young to discuss their
 collaborative approach to the growing population of children experiencing homelessness. Recently, an intraagency workgroup has been established to bring all of the Department's resources to the table.
- USICH has been participating in the development of Opening Doors' families and children signature initiative with HUD, HHS, and Education. The signature initiative, included in the President's FY 2011 budget, calls for 6,000 supportive housing vouchers through a collaboration between the three agencies. While awaiting Congressional budget decisions, HUD, HHS, and Education are moving forward with planning. With targeted Housing Choice Vouchers through HUD, mainstream services like Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) through HHS, and homeless student identification and service coordination by Education's homeless liaisons in school systems, this comprehensive initiative aims to create incentives that encourage interagency collaboration at both the federal and local levels to prevent and end homelessness for families.
- USICH along with HUD, HHS, Education, and Labor are exploring how the Youth Signature Initiative might be shaped. Executive Director Poppe hosted youth focus groups in New York City and Columbus, Ohio, as well as visiting model programs in California, New York, and Ohio. USICH is participating in an inter-agency work group on youth in transition.

Introduction

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program is arguably the Federal Government's most successful domestic program. The CDBG program's success stems from providing funds to counties, cities and states with flexibility to address their unique affordable housing and neighborhood revitalization, and community development needs. The program provides funding to metropolitan cities and urban counties through a formula funding system. Entitlement communities receive seventy percent of CDBG funds, and states and small cities and counties receive thirty percent. All CDBG activities must meet one of three national objectives: to principally benefit low and moderate income persons, aid in the prevention or elimination of slums or blight, or meet other urgent community needs. Counties commit CDBG funds to projects that are determined to meet local priorities in addressing development, housing, economic infrastructure and low-income needs.

County governments have an impressive track record compiled through their wise stewardship of CDBG funds. In this current economic climate the need to create and maintain jobs, as well as providing economic opportunities and services to the less fortunate, is overriding. That is why maintaining CDBG formula funding at its FY 2010 level for FY 2011 at \$3.9 billion is so important. To demonstrate this, the National Association of Counties has produced this publication which provides a snapshot of successful county Community Development Block Grant programs that reflect outstanding local uses of these funds.

Counties Tell Their Stories:

Successful Community Development Block Grant Programs

On December 16, 2009, President Obama Signed into law H.R. 3288, The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2010. The Act funded the Community Development Block Grant formula program (CDBG) at \$3.9 billion for FY2010. Currently, there are ongoing discussions in Congress on reducing discretionary spending in FY2011 that include decreasing CDBG by 8 percent to 62 percent, and some have proposed complete elimination of the program. Any reduction in spending, however, would severely impact low and moderate-income families, the main beneficiaries of the program, and would be a detriment in meeting citizen's needs. CDBG funds vital affordable housing, infrastructure and economic development project social services in urban, suburban and rural communities. The following case studies illustrate the importance and effectiveness that the CDBG programs have on state and local governments.

California

Los Angeles County, California

Of the \$3.9 billion available from the Community Development Block Grant for FY 2010 Appropriations Act of 2010, Los Angeles County received approximately \$32 million.

According to 2009 Census data, the poverty rate for Los Angeles County was higher than the national average (16% versus 14.3%); and, in fact, the County had more poor residents than any single State except New York, Texas, and California as a whole. These proposals to reduce funding to CDBG would take dollars from the programs and services we use to meet the needs of this substantial economically disadvantaged population. For example, over the last five (5) years, CDBG funds in the County have been used to:

- · Create or retain 1,109 jobs;
- · Provide loans and technical assistance to over 14,000 businesses;
- Provide assistance to over four (4) million individuals in unincorporated areas and participating cities in Los Angeles County;
- Preserve 6,217 housing units:
- Provide improvements to almost 23,000 facilities; and
- Remove over 28 million square feet of graffiti.

The total amount of CDBG funds allocated in the State of California was about \$500 million in FY 2010 result in an approximately \$45 million loss State-wide. Entitlement jurisdictions in Los Angeles County account for about \$171 million, or 34 percent, of the total amount awarded throughout the State.

San Luis Obispo County, CA

Since 2001, San Luis Obispo County, CA has used CDBG funds to support nearly 40 different programs aimed at helping low-income and marginalized members in their county. Some of the most notable programs include Big Brothers Big Sisters, Boys & Girls Club, a county-wide literacy initiative program called Literacy Council, and Loaves and Fishes, a local program that distributes food to low-income person within the county. One particularly special program called Transitional Food and Shelter uses CDBG funds to provide emergency shelter in motels and apartments in the county to those homeless persons who are sick and/or disabled, which prevents them from staying at a regular homeless shelter.

Georgia

The Georgia State CDBG Program has resulted in over 1,724 community development initiatives implemented by 498 separate, rural local governments that have successfully delivered tangible, long lasting benefits. Since 2005, these grants have helped complete 660 infrastructure projects assisting 177,490 people and 211 disaster assistance projects that have assisted 247,040. These projects have revitalized communities and provided new housing, new or retained jobs, and new or consolidated public services to individuals and families who were poor and lacked opportunity. The following are examples of projects within in the state that have used CDBG funds to help accomplish their initiatives:

Cook County, GA

Cook County, GA and the City of Adel received \$500,000 in CDBG funds that leveraged over \$1.4 million in local funds and contributions to establish a Workforce Development Center. This project, which received over \$400,000 in local business contributions, collaborated with Valdosta Technical College and the Department of Labor to address local workforce development needs. Since 1992, The State CDBG program has funded 20 similar projects that assist with workforce development, literacy training, or facilitate language training for Georgia's low- and moderate- income Hispanic population. More than 8,700 people have been trained through these projects.

Atkinson County, GA

Atkinson County, GA and the City of Willacoochee, once a thriving timber, family farming and garment community, has been plagued with economic stagnation and destitution largely caused by globalization and economic restructuring. Atkinson County and Willacoochee received \$500,000 in CDBG funds to aid in the purchase and renovation of an abandoned railroad for use by a new company, Langboard, which would invest millions of dollars into a newly engineered wood mill. Upon the purchase of the railroad, Langboard moved forward with a \$76 million investment in a new automated mill that has created over 135 high-quality jobs. The facility has also expanded the regional market for the area's timber and generated additional rail traffic that

supports the small, independent company now operating the railroad in the rural area. Since 1992, the State CDBG program has funded 190 similar projects where the installation of "commercial and industrial infrastructure" initiated economic development in Georgia's rural, non-entitlement local governments.

Clayton County, GA

The Alzheimers Services Project in Clayton County, GA was constructed through a project called Alzheimers Services Building Construction Project. Alzheimers Services Center was built to improve and extend the quality of life of persons with Alzheimers disease and their caregivers. The program addresses those goals by providing education, referrals, supportive counseling, support groups, Adult Day Health Care and Respite to clients within the south metro area.

Adult Day Care services are offered five days per week from 7:30 AM to 6:00 PM. Clients benefit from medical monitoring, therapeutic activities, nutritious meals, socialization and physical exercise. Family members are able to continue in the work force knowing that their loved one is well cared for. Caregivers also benefit from information and consultation with professional staff, peer support and the knowledge that they are not alone in the unpredictable journey that is care-giving.

The project which was started in October 2009 and completed in August 2010 is a new facility that includes a fenced outdoor walking trail; an outdoor fountain & seating area; four patient bedrooms; nurse's station; exercise room; large dining hall & commercial kitchen and; a community room with fireplace. The amount of CDBG funding was \$1,560,000 and the site is approximately 4 acres. The facility is 12,000 square feet. Others who contributed to the success of the project include:

Four-acre site donated by private donor Clayton County Government:

- Ongoing maintenance services

Gwinnett County, GA

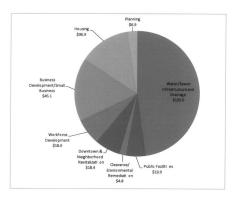
Using nearly \$1.9 million in federal Community Development Block Grant Fund (includes Recovery Act funds) the county was able to accomplish the following in FY 2010:

- The Gwinnett County Senior Services Center construction was completed using Federal Community Development Block Grant [CDBG] Recovery Act funds and Federal Entitlement CDBG Program funds. The building was placed in use on 11/1/10 and a dedication ceremony was held on 12/10/10.
- The Partnership Against Domestic Violence used a \$1,630,000 loan from Gwinnett County Federal CDBG Program funds to acquire an existing building that will be renovated for use as a shelter for battered women.
- Creative Enterprises used \$353,000 loaned from Gwinnett County Federal CDBG Program funds to acquire the former American Red Cross building for use as an education and training center for adults with disabilities.
- 4. Gwinnett County expended over \$10 million from Federal Neighborhood Stabilization Program grant funds and over \$3 million from repaid NSP loans to acquire and rehabilitate 77 foreclosed single-family homes and 92 foreclosed townhomes. The 77 homes are being resold to homebuyers, and the townhomes are being rented to working families by their non-profit owner.
- Disbursed Federal Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program [HPRP] Recovery Act funds [\$551,080] and Federal Emergency Shelter Grant funds [\$219,892.70] to six nonprofit agencies that sheltered and housed 1,010 persons who were homeless or in danger or becoming homeless.
- 6. Disbursed \$256,024.26 to two non-profit organizations that provided housing counseling to 1,916 homeowner and homebuyer households. Many of the clients served were seeking education to help them avoid foreclosure. Others were receiving homebuyer education to help them be better informed and responsible homeowners.

South Carolina

Nearly \$275 million in CDBG funds have been invested in 185 different South Carolina towns, cities and counties over last 10 years. Results include:

- New or improved public infrastructure in 144 communities, providing safe and reliable public water, sanitary sewer that meets environmental quality standards and drainage to eliminate flooding
- · Preservation and development of 8,260 affordable housing units in 75 communities
- Improvement of quality of life for more than 851,000 South Carolina residents, the majority from low and moderate income households
- Creation of more than 5,700 new jobs
- Improved community sustainability and economic competitiveness for 52 communities, through downtown revitalization, workforce development, improved infrastructure and neighborhood revitalization
- Improved accessibility for public facilities and services in 28 communities including community centers, health clinics, fire stations and Wi-Fi technology
- Elimination of blighted structures and environmental remediation projects in 14 communities to remove obstacles to economic competitiveness
- In the last five years alone, more than 70% (\$108 million) of the \$148 million in CDBG funds received have been invested in the state's less developed counties

South Dakota First Regional Development District

Assuming a standard of \$75,000 per job, the District would either expect to create or retain an estimated 100 jobs. This program works for the small communities with low and moderate income levels because there are few actual grant programs that will pay for brick and mortar projects. These are projects that provide the basic necessities for a respectable quality of life-clean drinking water, proper treatment of sanitary waste, streets, fire halls and community meeting rooms.

Illinois

DuPage County, IL

DuPage County, IL has used CDBG funds to reconstruct and renovate various low to moderate income communities in their county. The first project, Habitat Pioneer Prairie Project is located in West Chicago, and used \$400,000 in CDBG funds to aid in the creation of the Pioneer Prairie subdivision of 11 homes to be constructed by Habitat. DuPage Habitat has installed the sanitary sewer, roadway, street lighting, and the portions of sidewalk and parkway trees that are associated with homes sold or under construction. To date, four homes have been sold, two will be sold in early 2011, and the final five will be constructed in 2011. Habitat serves families below 65% Median Federal Income (MFI).

The second project, the Wood Avenue & Ellis Street Reconstruction Project (CD09-01) located in Bensenville, used an additional \$488,985 in CDBG funds to reconstruct streets including street, sewer, water and sidewalk improvements. It was completed in July 2010 and will serve 285 people 75 percent of whom are low-moderate income. Lastly, the Ray Graham Iona Gloss Specialized Living Center (SLC) Rehab project, located in the Village of Addison, used CDBG funds to make site improvements and critical interior repairs. Improvements to the SLC, which serves as a home to 100 residents who are severely disabled and in the HUD extremely low-income bracket (0-30% MFI), include a fire sprinkler system retrofit; new flooring; replaced air-

conditioning; replaced asphalt driveways and parking areas; replaced the roof and windows of administration building; rehabbed and painted 26 bathrooms; installed a security system; and the installation of special privacy windows which meet state standards.

Pennsylvania

Centre County, PA

Centre County, PA has addressed several health and safety issues in their most rural communities using CDBG funds. CDBG funds have significantly improved the quality of life as well as laid the foundation for enhancing economic development to low-income and fixed income communities in Centre County. One of the villages that were assisted with CDBG funds is Clarence. Clarence suffered from prolonged water outages, dirty water, using unfiltered surface water and was even identified by the EPA as a Significant Non-Complier (SNC) as specified by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). CDBG funds were used to install a new water storage tank, new water mains to connect the tank to the existing system and replace much of the old, undersized water mains in the township. This new system, used in conjunction with local authorities, successfully lifted Clarence Village to appropriate SDWA levels.

In other villages within Centre County, CDBG funds aided in the purchase of water mains, valves, fire hydrants, services lines, fitting, stone, blacktop, concrete, topsoil and seed. It is also estimated that projects funded with CDBG funds lead to 6 full time positions for the course of the project.

Cumberland County, PA

Cumberland County, PA has a strong track record of using Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) and HOME Investment Partnership Program funds to support affordable housing throughout the county. In addition, the county leveraged CDBG funds to create businesses and jobs through their successful County-wide Shopsteading Program and through their Revolving Loan Program (in partnership with Cumberland County Economic Development). The county used CDBG funds to provide assistance to a host of non-profit organizations that serve the county's poorest and neediest residents - from homeless prevention assistance, to assistance for residents with AIDS. Finally, CDBG funds were used to allow many of Cumberland's municipalities to create public facilities to support low-income residents, as well as provide accessibility improvements for their handicapped residents.

Since 1999, Cumberland County has used \$1,249,180 in CDBG to assisted nearly 100 residents. Leveraging \$594,228 in CDBG funds, Cumberland County's two business loan programs have created over twenty jobs for low-to-moderate income individuals since 2005. Finally, the county used CDBG funds to support the development of a number of public facilities throughout the local municipalities. Since 2000, \$2,115,556 was used for 31 facilities - ranging from public sewer and road improvements, to sidewalk repair, public parks, and several community centers. Also since 2000, over \$916,000 was spent to make 15 existing public facilities accessible for handicapped residents and \$612,000 for 8 facilities for developmentally disabled residents.

Franklin County, PA

In 2006 the Metal Township Municipal Authority (MTMA) requested assistance from the County for funding the installation of a sewage line in the village of Fannettsburg located in Metal Township. The MTMA requested \$500,000 of entitlement CDBG funding to install the sewer line to 29 homes in Fannettsburg. They were using the CDBG funding together with other federal funding to complete the project. Total cost of the installation of the line was estimated to be \$900.000.00.

In the 2006 funding year the Franklin County Board of Commissioners decided to support the project as a multi-year project with completion in 2009. In 2006 the project was awarded \$70,000, in 2007 the project was awarded \$75,000, and \$262,000 in 2008. The project was completed by the MTMA in 2008.

By using its local workforce, the MTMA was able to save approximately \$85,000 which was reallocated by the County on another eligible CDBG project.

The project was successful, because by using CDBG funding together with local and federal match funding the MTMA was able to provide public sewer to the Village of Fannettsburg. It was also able to eliminate a public hazard as most of the septic systems in the village where in a state of disrepair. By installing the sewer line, the MTMA was able to decrease a significant amount of underground pollution which improved the quality of the village well water. By using CDBG funding the MTMA was able to provide public sewage at a reduced cost to the Village of Fannettsburg.

Lycoming County, PA

Sewer Lateral and Tapping Fee Assistance Projects --The County of Lycoming and two of the direct state entitlement communities in the County, have assisted 787 households with direct CDBG grants to assist with the installation, repair, or replacement of privately owned sewer laterals that connect to municipal systems and with tapping fees to connect these systems. These grants, totaling over \$1.5 million, provided greatly needed financial assistance to these low-to-moderate income families and countless jobs to local contractors. These sewer improvement projects provided a healthier environment by eliminating sewerage contamination in private wells, local water supplies, and our stream and rivers.

Maryland

Montgomery County, MD

Montgomery County is an entitlement jurisdiction, currently receiving \$5.5 million in CDBG funds. Our funds have been used to spur private investment and transit-oriented redevelopment in Silver Spring and other commercial areas, providing jobs and employment opportunities. We use the CDBG program for infrastructure improvements, to assist local, small businesses with funds for façades, to leverage private funds for the creation and preservation of affordable housing, and in partnership with dozens of nonprofit service providers whose staff members provide an array of social services for our most needy, including job training and placement and supported employment. We have eliminated nearly 1,100 positions in County government over the past two years - about 10 percent of the entire County workforce. More jobs would be lost without CDBG funds, County jobs and also those of nonprofit staff delivering services.

Three specific programs that Montgomery County has used CDBG to fund have proven very successful for their target communities. Homeowner Rehabilitation is a program that conducts housing rehabilitation and weatherization for low-income homeowners in areas within the County most impacted by the recession and foreclosure crisis. Positive Youth Development is a program that uses CDBG funds to provide safe, quality, and accessible out-of school activities for low-income students at-risk of academic failure and/or gang involvement. Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) Activities is a program that uses CDBG funds to design and implement activities to enhance public safety in neighborhoods impacted by the recession and foreclosure crisis. These activities include addressing inadequate lighting and enhancing pedestrian safety by creating more visual access in public areas.

A Wider Circle, a non-profit partner, picked up 2,000,000 pounds of donated furniture, items that would otherwise have gone to waste, and distributed it to families living with nothing. Combined with other programs and services, A Wider Circle served more than 2,000 families in Montgomery County in 2010 and CDBG funds made much of this work possible.

Virginia

Dickenson County, VA

Dickenson County, VA, in Southwest Virginia, has experienced decades of high poverty rates and unemployment. To combat this problem, economic development that creates jobs continues to be the top priority, and the recruitment of technology-based customer-service call centers has proven to be a sound economic development strategy. To make it more convenient for workers, Dickenson County collaborated with many local non-profit organizations, including People Inc., to construct a 10,000 square foot, state-of-the-art child care facility to serve workers with children at Nexus Communications and Travelocity using CDBG funds.

The County created 160 jobs using the Economic Development Investment Funds, JM Huber Project, and leveraged \$1,131,292.00 in local funding to match the \$2,795,708.00 CDBG funds. The projects completed within the county with this funding include:

Pinal County, AZ

Pinal County, AZ used CDBG funds in conjunction with the Adelante Juntos Coalition to design and implement the Neighborhood Meth Watch Program. The program had three objectives; to raise community awareness of the use, distribution and manufacture of crystal methamphetamines; to mobilize communities to identify and address drug activity in neighborhoods; to build community relations with area law enforcement that would create safe, effective partnerships that will result in reduced and ultimately eliminate crystal meth use in communities. This initiative proved to be successful as there has been a 33 percent increase in drug related arrests, a 17 percent decrease in property crime and a 22 percent increase in individuals seeking treatment and recovery resources in the project communities.

Metal Township is a rural Township and one of the poorest townships in Franklin County. The project was able to be funded by CDBG because Fannettsburg met the low-mod income qualification of CDBG based on an income survey conducted by the Township and the County.



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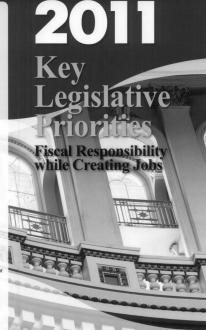

Fiscal Responsibility while Creating Jobs

he 112th Congress presents a challenge and opportunity to work in a biparisina fashion identifying issues of common interest between the newly elected congressional leadership and America's counties. After an historic election that promotes divided governance opportunities with messages to reduce operament spending, and create jobs NACo will be seeking ways to hold counties sharmless while promoting job growth opportunities. Efforts simed at job retention and creation in America's counties is essential. Counties continue to suffer lay-offs and service reductions as the economy regains its footing.

We will defend continued funding for county programs, which are but a fraction of federal funding, yet create jobs and provides needed services at the county level. We will remain vigilant that funding reductions on on create overly burdensome mandates as unintended consequences. NACO's "Restore the Partnership" campaign will continue with the new congress in order to educate leaders of the role of county governments in our communities and the effects of Washington decision making to our mutual constituents.

The NACo Board of Directors, eleven Steering Committees, Large Urban and Rural County Caucuses have adopted the key priorities listed below which are consistent with our efforts to hold counties harmless while seeking common ground on fiscal responsibility issues and job creation. We will be advocating these and other priorities throughout the year. The issues below are equally important and are not presented in priority order.

· Promote county fiscal relief and save jobs

Support for a commitment to maintaining, federal financial assistance to counties to at least 2010 levels for country programs such as PLTSRS/ CDBG/HOME/EDA/Justice & Public Safety programs/investments in local workforce development; plans/Pridectal/docidal services and other domestic programs that are essential in creating and maintaining jobs while providing assistance for our distance.

Save jobs by repealing the three percent tax withholding requirement.

Congress should immediately repeal Section 511 of Pt. 109-222 requiring local government to collect a three pericent withholding tax for goods and services contracts in order for us to send to the IRS. This costly unfunded mandate takes effect January 1, 2012, requiring action in this first session of the 112th Congress. Countins must act as agents of the RS and begin purchasing equipment, begin training and create systems to begin collecting taxes for the lifts with no federal assistance, an unacceptable unfunded mandate that even the business community agrees is onerous in creating and maintaining jobs.

Support job creation by enacting aviation and surface transportation program reauthorizations

Reauthorization of the federal airport and availion programs needs to be completed. NACO supports a welf-linded Airport Improvement Program with guaranteed funding from the aviation trust funds and increased funding for the Essential Air Service and the Shail Communities Air Service Programs. Congress should develop a comprehensive legislative effort to create jobs by providing robust funding for bridges, highways, mass transit, assistance for rural roads and other local infrastructure needs by reauthorizing the highway, transit, and safety programs. Congress should explore the various financing sources available to fully fund the Highway Trust Fund into the future while addressing metropolitan congestion and rural road safety. Enactment of these programs will help build our nation's infrastructure and create additional prolypoment opportunities.

Opposition to job killing unfunded mandates and preemptions

NAC is constantly vigilant against legislative or regulatory initiatives that undermine local government decision making and contributes to reductions in our workforce. The partnership with federal policy makers should recognize local government roles and not preempt county authority on issues such as land use, rights of way and other local functions which reduces county resources and adversely affects job retention by reducing revenues. Adequate federal financial assistance should be provided for these key responsibilities.

Support county health priorities.

NACo will continue to work with Congress and the Administration to improve and implement the provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act that help counties build healthy communities and ensure affordable access to health care for all Americans.

Support Job Creation by Making Rural Development a Priority within Farm Bill Reauthorization.

NACo supports reauthorization of the Farm Bill and funding for key prosions such as rural development, agriculture, nutrition, research and conservation. NACo supports all titles of this key piece of legislation, particularly rural development programs and strategies that promet under prosperity. NACo supports an enhanced commitment to USDA Rural Development programs and a new emphasis on flexible strategies which allow counties and their regional partners to focus on local economic assets, priorities and goals. NACo supports USDA Rural Development's grant and loan programs which bolster and leverage local limitatives to enhance and maintain water and wastewater infrastructure, community facilities, broadband infrastructure, rural business programs and rural housing, NACo also supports enhancing renewable energy grograms and assistance for beginning and young farmers.

Executive Summary

This is the continuation of the hearing that began on March 22, 2011 to consider TowerCom's request for approval of a 178 foot monopole personal wireless service facility (PWSP). The first hearing was continued to allow the applicant into the discuss possible visual mitigation options with the neighboring property owner to the west. The applicant is proposing a monopole design, which is a slim silhouette with the antenna on the outside of the structure. The applicant intends to use flush mounted antenna, which will reduce the silhouette of the tower. This request for a 178 foot tower in the Agriculture land use designation falls under the Tier Three category of the Personal Wireless Facilities ordinance (Chapter 404, Article 12) and as such requires approval of a special use permit by the Board of County Commissioners.

Background

A hearing was held on March 22, 2011 by the County Commission to consider this request for a special use permit. The discussion at that hearing centered around the visual impact of the tower on the property just to the west of this site. The hearing was continued to allow the applicant time to meet with the adjacent property owner to discuss landscaping and other mitgation options to lessen the visual impact of the tower on the neighboring property. That meeting has occurred and a consensus has been reached to plant I & Live Oaks approximately 17 feet high at planting along the western property boundary of the neighboring from the control of the neighboring from the nei

property. TowerCom was originally requesting approval of a 199 foot monopole with standard mounted antenna. Staffs initial review of the request, including analyzing the photosimulations and reviewing the radio frequency (RF) data for Sprint, concluded that the tower could be lower and still give Sprint their service coverage. This conclusion prompted the applicant to submit additional RF information to the Countys RF consultant. The second RF review came to the conclusion the tower could be lower and still provide Sprints service, especially once Sprint completed their system design and added more towers in the area. This review did highlight the loss of coverage at both 145 feet and 125 feet. Staff asked the applicant to consider using flush mounted antenna to decrease the visual impact of the tower on the neighboring properties. The applicant has now changed their proposal to reduce the tower height by 21 feet and use flush mounted antenna. The original photosims, included with the application attachment, show the tower visible from two views. The applicant revised the photosims for the two views (attached). The reduction in height and especially the use of close-mounted antenna reduces the visual impact considerably. In addition, the landscaping to the west of the tower compound will minimize the impact to the neighboring property.

The tower has an impact on the property immediately west of the site as no trees separate the two properties. Both RF reviews indicated the tower could be lower than the requested height (originally 199 feet), as low as 125 feet, however with loss of coverage at each increment.

- This Special Use Permit is issued to allow construction and operation of a 178

The applicant shall ensure that any damage caused during the installation of additional wireless equipment on the tower is repaired within thirty days of the completion of each installation.

The applicant shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws, rules, regulations, and ordinances, including Chapter 404, Article 12 of the Alachua County Unified Land Development Regulations, now and hereafter in force, which may be applicable to the use of the site. Any violation of the above conditions shall be grounds for suspension or revocation of this Special Use Permit by the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners.

Bases:

- 1. Policy 5.2.1 of the Future Land Use Element lists criteria that shall be used to determine the appropriateness of potential locations for institutional uses including compatibility of the scale and intensity of the use in relationship to surrounding uses, taking into account impacts such as, noise, lighting, visual effect, traffic generation, odors. As shown in the photo simulations, the structure will not have a visual impact on most of the surrounding properties. The use of flush mounts and lowering the height from the original request combined with the additional landscaping to the west of the tower compound further reduces the visual impact on neighboring properties. The surrounding area is characterized by agricultural land, some rural residential neighborhoods and a church. Trees cover much of the area immediately surrounding the subject property. The monopole design with flush mounted antenna is one of the preferred tower designs. The proposed tower is consistent with Policy 5.2.1.
- 2. Objective 5.5 of the Future Land Use requires designing and locating personal wireless service facilities, among other institutional uses, to eliminate or minimize adverse visual impacts. This tower is being located on a rural property edged in wooded areas and is not visible on most of the photosimulations. The monopole design, flush mounted antenna and height under 200 feet (178 feet) so as to not need lighting minimizes adverse visual impact on the landscape.
- Policy 7.1.2 of the Future Land Use Element states that proposed changes to the zoning map shall consider consistency with the Comprehensive Plan, availability and capacity of public facilities, the relationship of the proposed

development to existing development in the vicinity and environmental justice issues. There are adequate public facilities to serve the proposed PWSF. CR 241 is a paved County Road and there is an easement to the property. This use only generates 1-2 trips per month. A cell tower has no impact on schools, water and sewer, and will not cause the LOS for Emergency Service s to be exceeded. There are no environmental justice issues associated with this special use permit request. The surrounding zoning is A (Agriculture). There are some residences in the area and agricultural fields. This proposed tower will not be inconsistent with the surrounding zoning and uses as cell service is needed in all areas of the County. The Comprehensive Plan requires designing and locating personal wireless service facilities in the least visually intrusive manner and to minimize or eliminate adverse visual impact. This request for a 178 foot tower with flush mounts is consistent with Policy 7.1.2.

4. Policy 5.8 of the Future Land Use Element states that The County shall facilitate the deployment of personal wireless services and facilities (PWSFs) in a manner that balances needs for economic development, environmental protection, and minimization of adverse visual impacts in Alachua County.

PWSFs should: ...use the least obtrusive mount for deploying service, including minimizing the height and silhouette to have the minimum visual impact possible. Approval of the Special Use Permit for the tower allows Sprint to provide service in this area. The monopole design with flush mounted antenna is one of the least visually obtrusive means of constructing a new PWSF at this height and is consistent with Policy 5.8.

- 5. Policies 1.2.4 and 1.2.5 of the Capital Improvements Element require public facilities to be available concurrent with new development. There are adequate public facilities to serve the proposed PWSF. CR 241 is a paved County Road and there is an easement to the property. This use only generates 1-2 trips per month. A cell tower has no impact on schools, water and sewer, and will not cause the LOS for Emergency Service s to be exceeded.
- 6. Section 404.54 (c) of the Unified Land Development Code states that proposed PWSFs shall be located in an area where the adverse visual impact on the community is minimized, as demonstrated by the Visual Impact Analysis Report described in §404.57(c). The Visual Impact Analysis and photosimulations demonstrate that the tower will not be visible from most of the surrounding area. Lowering the antenna height to 170 feet (total height to 178 feet) from the originally requested 199 feet, using flush mounts and adding the landscaping to the west minimizes the visual impact of the tower further and is consistent with Section 404.54(c).
- 7. Section 404.54(c) of the Unified Land Development Code (ULDC) states that all PWSFs should be designed in such a way to minimize the adverse visual impact on the community. This may include reducing the height and silhouette in order to create the least adverse visual impact. The minimum height necessary to provide the applicant carrier's designed service to the area should be utilized, as verified by an independent radio frequency (RF) analysis. In general, a monopole tower or concealed tower is considered to have less visual impact than alternative tower designs. The proposed tower is a monopole design with flush mounted antenna. In addition, the applicant decreased the height from the initial

- request and added landscaping to the west of the tower compound. The adverse visual impact has been minimized consistent with Section 404.54(c).
- 8. Section 402.124 of the ULDC describes the criteria for review of special use permits. The Board of County Commissioners shall, as part of a decision to approve an application for a special use permit, make a finding that the proposed use is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and Unified Land Development Code (ULDC) and is compatible with the existing and future land use pattern, and that the use will not adversely affect the health, safety, and welfare of the public. As shown in the above bases, the application is consistent with both the Comprehensive Plan and the ULDC. The tower, as proposed in its design is compatible with the surrounding land uses and the use will not adversely affect the health, safety, or welfare of the public.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption. DULY ADOPTED in regular session this 26nd day of April, A.D., 2011.

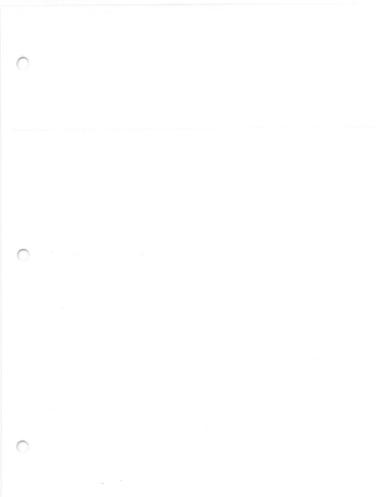

Dear Missy:

This is a response to the supplemental engineering showing provided by the Applicant. Their data consisted of several maps showing predicted coverage of the subject cell at several antenna heights including 125, 145 and 180 feet.

I have prepared the attached exhibit which uses the Applicant's predicted coverage at 180 ft. On the map are splotches of pink areas that show the differences with the Applicant's coverage map at 125 ft. The pink areas are where the Applicant predicts signal levels will be less than -95 (dBm. I presume). I have also added a pattern that is representative of the Applicant's proposed antenna (field) patterns. This is the line that resembles a three-leaf clover centered on the proposed site.

The pink areas to the northwest and northeast occur where the power from the antennas is lowest. Note that there are white areas among the pink indicating signals below the desired level occurring also at 180 ft. The pink areas southwest are mixed with white areas and are at the effective edge of the proposed cell.

Cellular systems employ highly directional, narrow beam antennas in order to achieve enough gain at 1900 MHz to be effective at reasonable distances. Cells are established and radiation is adjusted to fill-in the areas where adjacent cell antennas are the weakest. Properly spaced and oriented, the system of cells can provide essentially complete coverage.

The proposed cell is situated where cells will be required to the northwest and northeast to provide seamless coverage. When this happens the recommended 125 ft. antenna height will be appropriate.

Comprehensive Plan And ULDC Consistency Statement

The proposed facility should be found consistent with the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan as a whole and specifically with the policies outlined below.

The proposed facility is considered an institutional use per the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan. Policy 5.1.1 of the Future Land Use Element states that Potential locations for major future institutional uses are identified on the Future Land Use Maps. Institutional uses may be allowed in other land use categories designated on the Future Land Use Map, and implemented in accordance with the guidance and policies within this Section 5.0., and within the Comprehensive Plan as a whole.

The proposal is consistent with Policy 5.1.1, which allows institutional uses in all land use categories.

Policy 5.1.2.c states that Public Utility, Communications or Infrastructure Services (e.g. utility transmission and distribution facilities, landfills) are considered institutional uses in Alachua County.

The proposed use is a communications towers and is thus consistent with this policy.

Policy 5.2.1 of the Future Land Use Element establishes criteria for the location of institutional uses. These include:

a. Optimum service area;

The proposed location has been selected because of a need in this section of the County for a communications tower to enable the Carrier Applicant, Sprint, to provide wireless telecommunications service to the County's residents and to aide various emergency service providers, in accordance with the Telecommunications Act of 1996. Sprint RF propagation data has been provided demonstrating the need for the proposed facility.

b. Optimum operating size;

The applicant is requesting a tower height that would accommodate the needs of Applicant Carrier, Sprint, and provide for the co-location of additional Carriers in an

attempt to minimize the need for additional communications tower in this section of the County.

Access to clientele.

The clientele using this tower will be Sprint and other wireless services providers servicing this area of the County. A communications tower in this location will increase wireless service coverage and help to eliminate dead spots for both in-vehicle coverage and in-building coverage in this growing northwest part of Alachua County and within the Jonesville area.

 d. Compatibility of the scale and intensity of the use in relationship to surrounding uses, taking into account impacts such as, noise, lighting, visual effect, traffic generation, odors.

The proposed communications tower has been designed as a monopole tower with a height below the height required for FAA Navigational Hazard lighting. This design will in effect minimize both daytime and night time visual impacts. The planned facility will accommodate the co-location of additional Carriers which will minimize the potential impacts posed by the need for additional PWSF's. The proposed facility will not generate any noise greater than that of standard household air conditioning units and emergency power generators. PWSF's generate a minimal amount of traffic and no odors.

e. Nature of service provision.

The nature of the service provided by a PWSF is a service which is used by the immediate surrounding area and passersby.

f. Needs of the clientele.

The RF Propagation Maps submitted as a part of the SUP application indicate the needs of the surrounding clientele which will be satisfied by the proposed facility.

Availability and adequacy of public infrastructure to serve the particular use.

There is currently in place the infrastructure necessary to support the proposed PWSF. These needs are restricted solely to power and telephone services.

 Preservation and strengthening of community and neighborhood character through design.

The neighborhood character is preserved through the design of the tower type and height. The proposed PWSF minimizes potential visual impacts by utilizing existing treed vegetative buffers and not triping the need for navigational hazard lighting. The

proposed facility strengthens the community by providing a personal service that is highly sought in growing communities.

Consistency with the goals, objectives, and policies of the Conservation and Open Space Element.

Photo simulations have been provided to determine the visual impact of the proposed 199 foot monopole communications tower. The proposed tower will be used by Sprint to provide wireless telecommunications service to the residents of Alachua County in accordance with Sprint's contract with the Federal Government.

The proposed tower being a monopole tower means the tower will have a potentially smaller footprint on the ground over all a slimmer silhouette, which will reduce the visual impact. As the proposed height does not exceed 200 feet in height, lighting will not be required by the FAA.

The photo simulations taken from seven different points in the neighborhoods surrounding the proposed PWSF indicate that the tower site is well buffered by existing tree lines along the West, North, and East sides. The greatest visibility is View G, approximately 1,965 feet from the tower. The tree canopy blocks views of the tower from all other points except View D, which is approximately 3,618 feet from the tower. In this view, the trees partially hide the tower but it is still slightly visible.

In accordance with I above, the proposed PWSF is not in a flood plane. The construction of the PWSF, including utility routes and access routes will not impact any existing wetland areas. This is consistent with the Conservation and Open Space Element of the Comprehensive Plan. The proposed monopole tower structure at a height below 200 feet poses a minimum chance of bird kills as birds fly or migrate through the area. We believe this type of facility at the proposed location best meets the requirements of the Comprehensive Plan.

Policy 5.2.2 states that institutional uses shall be designed and located for integration into the surrounding community. Land use decisions concerning the location of institutional uses shall take into consideration environmental justice.

The proposed 199 foot monopole tower as stated represents the minimal potential for environmental consequences, specifically potential bird kill. When weighing the two factors, the potential for bird kill and visual impact on and integration into the community, we believe the proposed structure provides a minimal overall environmental and visual impact and is therefore is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

Section 7.1.2 of the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan states that 'Proposed changes in the zoning map shall be considered in light of the Comprehensive Plan and its various elements, and shall also be considered in light of:

- consistency with the goals, objectives, policies and adopted maps of the Comprehensive Plan:
- the availability and capacity of public facilities required to serve the development:
- the relationship of the proposed development to existing development in the vicinity and considerations relating to environmental justice.

As discussed above, the proposed tower is consistent with the relevant Comprehensive Plan policies and it is consistent with the Plan as a whole. The proposed communications tower will have minimal impact on the public facilities necessary to serve this area. The future land use designation and zoning of the surrounding properties are the same as the subject property. Surrounding land uses include single-family residences and small agricultural pursuits. Roughly 16 trips per month will be required for maintenance of the tower; therefore traffic will not be an issue for the residents. The proposed special exception is thus consistent with Policy 7.1.2 of the Future Land Use Element of the Comprehensive Plan and the Plan as a whole.

Levels of Service

The Alachua County Comprehensive Plan Capital Improvement Element requires that the public facilities and services needed to support development be available concurrent with the impacts of development and that issuance of a Certificate of Level of Service Compliance (CLSC) be a condition of all final development orders. 'Concurrent' shall mean that all adopted levels of service (LCS) standards shall be maintained or achieved within a reasonable timeframe. Per Policies 1.2.4 and 1.2.5 of the Capital Improvements Element of the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan, LOS standards have been adopted for various types of public facilities.

Traffic

The proposed development is considered to have a de minimus traffic impact (fewer than 10 average annual daily trips) and therefore is exempt from requiring a transportation concurrency determination.

Mass Transit

Policy 1.2.4 (F) states that a paratransit system shall be maintained in unincorporated Alachua County in order to provide 24-hour ambulatory and wheelchair service on a demand-responsive basis. MV/Paratransit is providing paratransit service to the site. The Regional Transit System does not provide regular service to this location.

Water and Sewer

Central water and sewer are not available at this site. The area utilizes well and septic.

Drainage

Policy 1.2.4 (D) states that the minimum drainage LOS standard for residential development requires a floor elevation of one (1) foot above the 100-year/critical duration storm elevation. Any development at this site will be required to meet this standard at the time of final DRC approval.

Solid Waste

Policy 1.2.4 (C) states that the minimum level of service standard for solid waste disposal used for determining the availability of disposal capacity to accommodate demand generated by existing and new development, at a minimum, shall be 0.73 tons per person per year. In the year 2001-2002, there was generated 3.9 pounds/day (0.71 tons/year per person) in Alachua County (Source: Alachua County Public Works Department Website). Any development at this site will be required to meet these minimum LOS standards as part of development plan approval.

ULDC Consistency

The proposed request is consistent with the applicable requirements of the Unified Land Development Code as outlined below.

Section 402.124 of the Land Development Code lists criteria for approval of a special use permit. Any proposed use for such a special use permit shall be reviewed to ensure that it is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and ULDC, that it is compatible with the existing land use pattern and future land uses, that it will not adversely affect the health, safety, and welfare of the public.

The proposed communications tower is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan as described in detail above. The Unified Land Development Code Section 404.50 lists requirements for Broadcasting or Communications towers. Those requirements are that in the event of a collapse, the tower should be wholly contained within the confines of the property, all parts of the tower, including supports, anchors or guy wires should be setback at least five feet from the property line; all towers shall comply with the Airport Impact Overlay District; and towers exceeding 200 feet in height shall perform a visual impact analysis. This application meets all of these requirements. The visual impact analysis, in the form of photosimulations has been performed and is attached to this special use permit application.

The Carrier, Sprint, has submitted RF data supporting their need for this site in order to provide adequate wireless telecommunications service to the residents of Alachua County in accordance with their contract with the federal government. The Telecommunications Act of 1996 has established the fact that wireless telecommunications service is critical to the public health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the United States of America.

No surface water bodies were observed within the proposed tower compound or adjacent to the proposed ingress/egress and utility easements during the November 8, 2010, site inspection.

WETLANDS & BUFFERS

No wetland or buffer areas were observed within or adjacent to the proposed lease parcel or utility and ingress/egress easements during the November 8, 2010, site inspection. The National Wetlands Inventory identified no wetlands within 1.0 miles of the center of the tower (see page 12 of Attachment D). Although a wetland assessment was not performed as part of this investigation, normal buffer requirements of local and state regulations could apply to development activities, if wetlands are determined to be present.

FLOODPLAIN

The parent tract does not appear to lie within the 100-year or the 500-year flood zone. 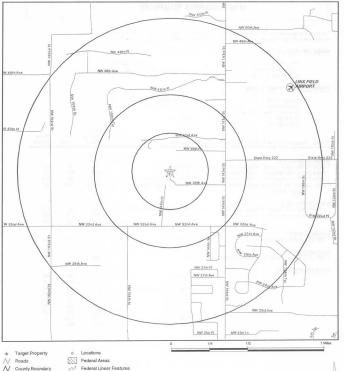

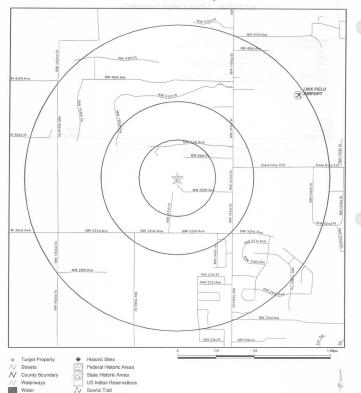

The lacustrine systems includes all nontidal wetlands related to swamps, bogs & marshes. The estuarine system consists of deepwater tidal habitats and where ocean water is diluted by fresh water. The palustrine system includes nontidal wetlands dominated by trees and shrubs and where salinity is below. 5% in tidal areas. All of these systems are divided in subsystems and then further divided into class.

National Wetland Inventory Maps are produced by transferring gathered data on a standard 7.5 minute U.S.G.S. topographic map. Approximately 52 square miles are covered on a National Wetland Inventory map at a scale of 1:24,000. Electronic data is compiled by digitizing these National Wetland Inventory Maps.

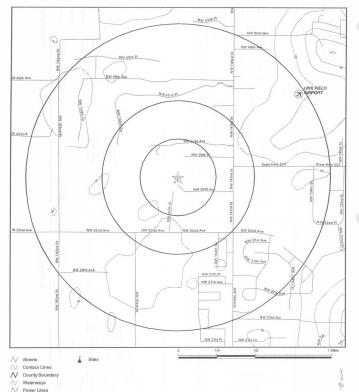

PURPOSE: Alachua County, Neighborhood Workshop

SUBJECT: Application for a SUP in association with a PWSF.

Prior to the call to order, attendees were asked to Sign-In on the sheets provided (see attached). Project information was presented on tables at the front of the room. Included was the Master Development Plan; compound improvement plan; Tower Elevation plan and photo simulations.

Jerry Muldowney, P. E., the project's design engineer, called the Workshop to Order at approximately 6:05 PM. Three members of the general public were present. Two of those present were adjoining property owners.

Mr. Muldowney opened the Workshop with a short presentation which first addressed the purpose of the Workshop and the County's desire to make sure the local residents were properly informed as to what was being proposed and the anticipated public hearing dates.

Mr. Muldowney then provided information in connection with the site acquisition process which detailed how the property in question came to be selected by the applicant. The presentation then provided the participants with information regarding: the type of tower being proposed; the proposed tower height and the FAA navigational hazard lighting requirements; the co-location opportunities provided by the proposed PWSF; the photo simulation methodology was discussed together with the individual view points.

The floor was then opened to general discussion:

Ms. Myers voiced a concern about the ability to see the tower facility outside the window of her house. She also voiced a concern that her property value might be negatively impacted by the proposed development. Ms. Myers indicated that she would like to see information concerning the last three towers built in Alachua County and their affect on surrounding property values. Meeting Minutes November 18, 2010 Page Two

Mr. Muldowney indicated that the applicant did not have this information. He informed the workshop participants that they could contact Missy Daniels at the County to discuss the Application. Mr. Muldowney stated that he had never seen conclusive evidence regarding affected property values. He stated that a nearby tower site might have the affect of prolonging the sale period of a property.

Mr. Muldowney went on to discuss various buffering techniques which could be used to buffer Ms. Myers' window views from the tower facility. Ms. Myers indicated that she maintained horse pasture around her dwelling and did not want any landscape buffers planted between her house and the tower facility.

Ms. Myers asked why the facility was not being located at the Church or some other commercial property. She was informed that the church was contacted, that they did show an interest at first, but were unable to reach an agreement with the developer. Ms. Myers was informed that there were no commercial properties located within the RF Search Ring.

Mr. Hoover then asked about the affect of the tower on TV reception. Mr. Hoover was informed that his cable/digital TV signal would not be affect by the tower transmissions.

Ms. Myers then stated no need to worry about a buffer because the entire area was going downhill and she would like to sell her property and move away.

Mr. Muldowney advised the group that they should not bother attempting to discuss health concerns in the public hearing because this was one area of concern that the Boards could not consider. He advised that a discussion regarding impacted aesthetics could be considered by the Boards.

There was no more discussion.

The Workshop ended at 6:35 PM.

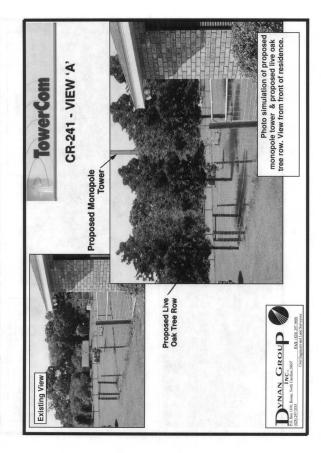

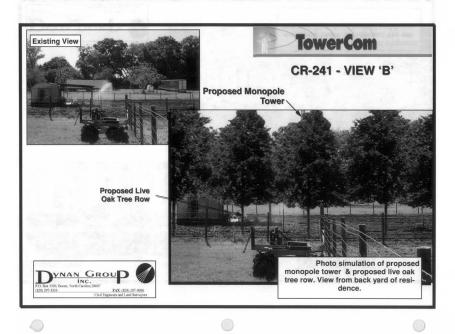

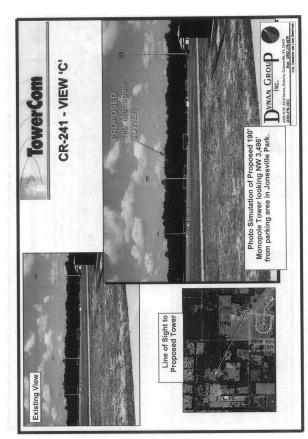

PHOTO SIMULATION METHODOLOGY

The process used to generate the enclosed photo simulation is a quantitative approach, which precisely creates the effect or anticipated visual impact of proposed tall structures.

The computations utilized to prepare the simulation are based on the theory of photogrammetry, which is the science of measurement by means of photographs. The scale and position of objects in photographs vary according to the distance and position of the corresponding actual of object relative to the camera. The photogrammetric relationship between height and distance is an inverse proportionate relationship.

When necessary, both horizontal and oblique photographs are utilized to control the accurate placement of the simulated tall structure within the target photograph. The height of the proposed tall structure in the target photograph is based on data obtained from a certified balloon test performed at the proposed site.

Both reference photographs and target photographs are produced on 35 mm film utilizing a fixed 50 mm camera lens. A 50 mm camera lens is used because when combined with a 35 mm film format, it is considered to best approximate the viewpoint of the human eye.

The procedure utilized to produce our photo simulations is listed below:

- Reference photographs are taken of existing similar tall structures with known or measured heights, at a known distance from the tall structure.
- Target photographs are taken of the proposed tall structure location during a certified balloon test from various points of interest. Hand held GPS is used to determine the distance from the camera lens to the proposed tall structure location.
- Photographs are developed digitally and are up-loaded into an image-editing program, which is utilized to generate the photo simulation.
- Based on reference photograph and target photograph intelligence, the pictorial height and placement of the simulated tall structure is calculated and placed within the target photograph.
- · All target photographs are printed and checked utilizing a direct scale method.

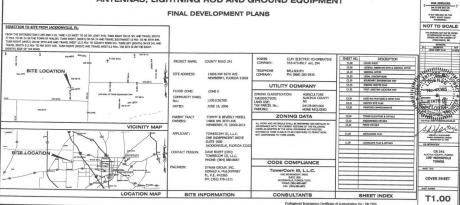

I have analyzed this Sprint/Nextel Application with respect to County zoning regulations. Sufficient data was included in the Application to permit a technical analysis.

My analysis considered compliance with PWSF technical requirements of Chapter 404, Article 12 of the ULDC. Additionally, studies of FAA, FCC and Maximum Permissible Radiation Exposure standards (IEEE 095.1-2005) were performed. A study of potential towers revealed that there are no alternate towers. These studies are available upon request.

Results of a study of the height necessary to provide the required service are shown in the table.

The proposed tower is adjacent to two other Sprint sites located at 2.4 and 3.3 miles. The coverage area required from this application's site is roughly one-half those distances, or 1.2 and 1.6 miles. Calculations were performed out to 3 miles. The table illustrates the 1900 MHz losses that will occur at several distances and antenna height as computed using a standard Cost-Hata method. The last column of the table indicates the average loss over the entire (0.5 - 3.0 mil) distance at each indicated antenna height, relative to the requested antenna height (-200 ft).

It is evident that an antenna height of 125 ft. above the ground, if greater than local tree heights, will provide adequate coverage in the area between the adjacent cells. Further, the 3.3 dB average loss at 125 ft. indicates an impreceptible loss in any other direction compared with coverage from a 200 ft antenna height.

My technically based recommendation is for granting this request based on the the information studied. In my opinion an antenna 125 ft. above ground will provide equivalent service as indicated by a Cost-Hata study. These conclusions are valid irrespective of antenna type if the radiated power is as stated in the application.

Non-technical factors were not investigated.

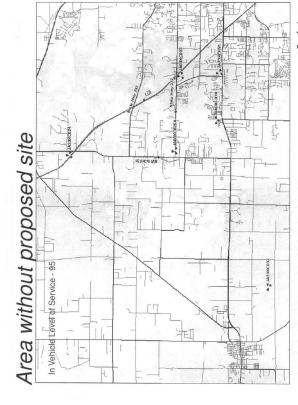

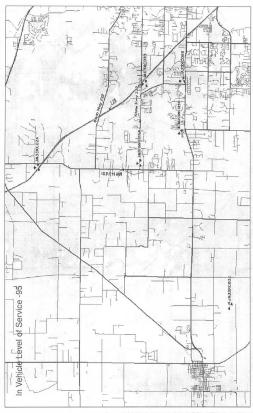

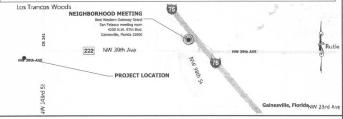

Issues raised at First Hearing 3/22/11

- Visual impact on neighboring property to the west
- Maintenance of easement road



Agreement with Adjacent Property Owner

- Create a 160 LF landscape buffer along the western portion of the Myers' backyard fence.
- Planting 18 4" caliber Live Oak trees approximately 17' in height when planted.
- Plant trees 8' to 10' on center, with the plantings staggered on a 5' perpendicular to insure appropriate separation to encourage good health and vitality of the new plant material.

Agreement with Adjacent Property Owner

- Low volume irrigation system which utilizes a water source provided by the Myers' with a power source provided by TowerCom.
- The irrigation system will be enabled for the first 180 days after placing the new plant material.
- TowerCom will guarantee the health and vitality of plant material for one year after planting.

Condition Added to Resolution

The applicant shall maintain the access easement to the site during construction of the tower. Prior to final release of the site, the applicant shall regrade the access easement. The applicant shall ensure that any damage caused during the installation of additional wireless equipment on the tower is repaired within thirty days of the completion of each installation.

Agreement with Adjacent Property Owner

- All new plant material shall be Florida Fancy Grade # 1 or better, healthy, disease free, and pest free.
- The Myers' shall have final approval of the actual location of all new plant material

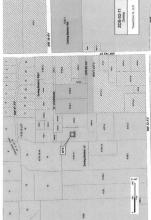

Developer's Agreement Resolution for rescission of Resolution 05-26, the Springhills DRI Development Order

Executive Summary

The Springhills Development of Regional Impact Development Order was originally adopted in 1999 and then amended in 2005 with the adoption of Resolution 05-26. Since that time Alachua County has designated an 'urban service area' as defined by s. 163.3164 Florida Statutes in its adopted Comprehensive Plan. The entire Springhills development is within the boundaries of the urban service area. Section 380.06(29)(c) Florida Statutes provides that any proposed development within a designated 'urban service area' (as defined in s.163.3164 F.S.) is exempt from the development-of-regional- impact process. Section 380.06(29) (e) Florida Statutes provides that within the urban service area any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be 'governed by' s. 380.115(1) F.S. Section 380.115(1)(b) Florida Statutes provides that upon request of the 'developer or landowner, the development-of-regionalimpact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed'. The developer and predominate landowner, PR Gainesville, has requested rescission of Resolution No. 05-26. As of the date of this request to rescind the Development Order there is no mitigation that is currently due, though there is mitigation attributable to approved and constructed development that has not yet been performed. County Staff and the property owner, PR Gainesville Limited Partnership (aka PREIT) have agreed that a Developer's Agreement assuring that the mitigation will be completed concurrent with the future development of the site is appropriate and in the best interest of both parties and the public. To that end, the County has determined that PR Gainesville's request to rescind the development order, with the conditions and obligations provided for in this Developer Agreement, is consistent with Section 380.115(1)(b), Florida Statutes, and that rescission is appropriate.

Background

The Springhills Development of Regional Impact Development Order was originally adopted in 1999 and then amended in 2005 with the adoption of Resolution 05-26. In October of 2010, the County Commission approved the request of the current Springhills landowners to amend the Comprehensive Plan text and land use map for about half of the DRI property. Springhills is now required to be developed as a Traditional Neighborhood and Transit Oriented Development. The current development order is no longer consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and must either be amended through the DRI process or rescinded in accordance with s. 380.115, F.S. in order for Springhills to develop. Also in 2010 Alachua County designated an 'urban service area' as defined by s. 163.3164 Florida Statutes in its adopted comprehensive plan and the entire Springhills development is within the boundaries of this urban service area. Section 380.06(29)(c) Florida Statutes provides that any proposed development within a designated 'urban service area' (as defined in s.163.3164 F.S.) is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact process. Section 380.06(29)(e) Florida Statutes provides that within the urban service area any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be 'governed by' s. 380.115(1) F.S. Section 380.115(1)(b) Florida Statutes provides that upon request of the 'developer or landowner, the development-of-regional-impact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed. The developer and predominate landowner, PR Gainesville, has requested rescission of Resolution No. 05-26. The development order has a number of mitigation requirements triggered by various phases of development, specifically, 'At the time of issuance of the last construction permit for (listed projects) or prior to completion of Phase II, whichever occurs first, construction of a right turn storage lane for eastbound to southbound movements at the southwest corner of the intersection of NW 39th Avenue and NW 91st Street shall commence and must be completed prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy on the last of the listed projects or the last of Phase II projects, whichever first occurs. Before initiation of Phase II of the Springhills DRI development, the following transportation improvements shall be in place: extension of left turn lanes on all approaches and northbound and southbound right turn lanes at NW 92nd Court /NW 39th Avenue Intersection; and extend left turn lanes on all approaches and northbound and southbound right turn lanes at NW 91st Street/NW 39th Avenue intersections. As of the date of this request to rescind the Development Order there is no mitigation that is currently due, though there is the above listed mitigation attributable to approved and constructed development that has not yet been performed. In order to assure that development impacts from approved and constructed development are appropriately mitigated, PR Gainesville and Alachua County believe it is in the best interests of the parties and the public that the substance and timing of transportation mitigation requirements are specified in an enforceable developer agreement that is binding on the developer and successors in interest. The County has also determined that PR Gainesville's request to rescind the development order, with the conditions and obligations provided for in this Developer Agreement, is consistent with Section 380.115(1)(b), Florida Statutes, and that rescission is appropriate.

Issues

Need to ensure that mitigation not yet due but attributable to development that has already occurred on site will be completed. Developer's Agreement needs to be approved along with the Rescission of the Development Order, Resolution 05-26.

RESOLUTION NO. 05-26

A RESOLUTION OF ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA, AMENDING A DEVELOPMENT ORDER PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 380, FLORIDA STATUTES, ON AN APPLICATION FOR DEVELOPMENT APPROVAL FILED BY THIRTY-NINTH AVENUE, INC., AND HAUFLER PROPERTIES, INC., A DEVELOPMENT OF REGIONAL IMPACT: PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE HEREOF.

WHEREAS, On February 22, 2005, Haufler Properties, Inc. et al, through its authorized agent, Eng, Denman, & Associates, filed a Notice of Proposed Change (NOPC) for a Substantial Deviation Determination on February 22, 2005 to the approved SpringHills Development of Regional Impact Development Order Resolution No. 99-73.

WHEREAS, On December 23, 1997, Thirty-Ninth Avenue, Inc., and Haufler Properties. Inc., hereinafter referred to as "Applicant", through its authorized agent, Canin Associates, filed an Application for Development Approval (which, together with the Application for Development Approval Appendices, dated December, 1997; the First Request for Additional Information dated April, 1998; the Second Request for Additional Information dated July, 1998; written correspondence from Cecelia Bonifay, Esquire, attorney for the Applicant, to Charles Justice, Executive Director of the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, dated July 22, 1998; written correspondence from Jason L. Canin of Charles Wayne Consulting to Steven Dopp, Senior Planner with the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, dated March 8, 1998; the Revised Transportation Impacts Analysis for SpringHills Development of Regional Impact, dated April 2, 1999, as amended by "Addendum to April 2, 1999, SpringHills Transportation Impacts Analysis" dated April 23, 1999; a Traffic Analysis Study for SpringHills Shopping Center, Burger King and Sonny's Restaurants dated November, 1998; and written correspondence from Ronald P. Manley of Canin Associates to Charles Justice, dated April 2, 1999, is hereinafter referred to as the "ADA") for a Development of Regional Impact (DRI) with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, the Florida Department of Community Affairs (DCA), and the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council (NCFRPC) pursuant to the provisions of Section 380.06, Florida Statutes, as amended.

WHEREAS, certain of those properties owned by Applicant have been either sold, conveyed, transferred or have changed ownership such that the following individuals and/or entities own those properties described in the Application for Development Approval (ADA) for the SpringHills DRI. The following individuals or entities (hereinafter referred to as the "Owner" or "Applicant") own the

Property which is the subject of this Development Order: Gateway to Gainesville, Inc.; Oscar E. Haufler Revocable Trust; Haufler Brothers, Ltd.; Eugene B. Haufler Revocable Trust; NRB, Inc.; O&E Partnership, Ltd.; Thirty-Ninth Avenue, Ltd.; Haufler Properties, Inc.; Ernest L. Haufler Revocable Trust; and Springhill Investment, Inc; A legal description of the Property governed by this Development Order is attached as Exhibit 1 and incorporated herein: and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has the authority to file the Application for Development Approval (ADA) and the Applicant/Owner has the authority to obtain a Development Order with respect to the Property in accordance with Section 380.06, Florida Statutes; and

WHEREAS, The ADA proposes the development of SpringHills, a $\,$ mixed-use $\,$ development located in Alachua County; and

WHEREAS, The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, as the governing body of the local government having jurisdiction pursuant to Chapter 380.06, Florida Statutes, is authorized and empowered to consider ADA's for DRI's; and

WHEREAS, The public notice requirements of Chapter 380.06, Florida Statutes, have been satisfied; and

WHEREAS, The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has, on April 12, 2005, held a duly noticed public hearing on the Notice of Proposed Change for a Substantial Deviation Determination (filed 2/22/05) and has heard and considered testimony and documents received thereon; and

WHEREAS, The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has, on June 28, 1999, held a duly noticed public hearing, continued to July 19, 1999, continued again to July 26, 1999, on the ADA and has heard and considered testimony and documents received thereon; and

WHEREAS, The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has received and considered reports and recommendations of the NCFRPC; and

WHEREAS, All interested parties and members of the public were afforded the opportunity to participate in the application hearing on the subject DRI before the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners; and

WHEREAS, The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has reviewed the above referenced documents, as well as all related testimony and evidence submitted by each party and members of the general public; now, therefore, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. That, this Resolution shall constitute the Development Order (Order) of Alachua County issued in response to the NOPC, attached hereto as Exhibit A, and the ADA filed by the Applicant, for development of SpringHills, a DRI. The scope of development to be permitted pursuant to this Order includes the activities described in the ADA, which ADA is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Composite Exhibit A-1.

Section 2. That, this Resolution shall rescind and replace in its entirety Resolution 99-73.

Section 3. That, the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, having received the above-referenced documents, and having received all related comments, testimony and evidence submitted by each party and members of the general public, finds there is substantial competent evidence to support the following findings of fact:

- A. That, the Applicant submitted to the County the materials attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> and Composite Exhibit A-1, which are by reference made a part hereof.
- B. That, the NOPC submitted by the Applicant does not constitute a Substantial Deviation pursuant to Chapter 380.06(19), F.S.
- C. That, the Applicant proposes the development of SpringHills, a mixed-use development located in Alachua County.
- D. That, the proposed development is not located in an area of critical state concern as designated pursuant to Section 380.05, Florida Statutes, as amended.
- E. That, the project is consistent with the local comprehensive plan and local land development regulations.
- F. That, the development will not unreasonably interfere with the achievement of objectives of the adopted State Land Development Plan applicable to the area and that the development is consistent with the State Comprehensive Plan, Chapter 187, Florida Statutes.
- G. That, the development is consistent with the report and recommendations of the NCFRPC submitted pursuant to Subsection 380.06(12), Florida Statutes, by the Applicant's compliance with the terms and conditions of this Order.

- H. That, this Development Order is substantially consistent with the Preliminary Development Agreement entered into on January 31, 1998, by the Applicant/Owner and the Florida Department of Community Affairs pursuant to Subsection 380.032(3) and 380.06(8), Florida Statutes and Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.) R. 9J-20185
 - I. That, the Applicant/Owner's agent for the NOPC for a Substantial Deviation Determination is Ralph Eng, Eng, Denman & Associates, whose office address is 2404 NW 43" Street, Gainesville, FL 32606 and the Applicant/Owner's agent for the ADA is Cecelia Bonifay, Esquire, Akerman, Senterfitt & Eidson, P.A., whose office address is 255 South Orange Avenue. 17th Floor. Orlando. Florida 32801.

Section 3. That, the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners having made the above findings of fact, reaches the following conclusions of law:

- A. That, these proceedings have been duly conducted pursuant to applicable law and regulations, and based upon the record in this proceeding, the various departments of the County and the Applicant are authorized to approve/conduct development as described herein, subject to the conditions, restrictions and limitations set forth herein.
- B. That, the review by the County, the NCFRPC and other participating agencies and interested citizens reveals that the impacts of this development are adequately addressed pursuant to the requirements of Chapter 380.06, by the terms and conditions of this Order and the ADA. To the extent that the ADA is inconsistent with the terms and conditions of this Order, the terms and conditions of the Order shall prevail.

Section 4. That, having made the above findings of fact and drawn the above conclusions of law, it is ordered that the ADA as amended is hereby approved, subject to the following conditions, restrictions and limitations:

(1) Incorporation of ADA.

The ADA shall be as it is defined in the first paragraph of page one of this Development Order and is hereby incorporated and made a part hereof as Exhibit A_{\sim} L. The master plan map (Map H) is hereby incorporated and made a part hereof as Exhibit B (and attached to this Development Order as Appendix B).

(2) General Description of Project.

The following is a description of the project subject to the terms of this Order:

The total number of residential dwellings will not exceed 1,971.

(1,454 multi-family units and 517 single family units)

The total amount of area for office purposes shall not exceed 495,000 square feet of gross leasable floor area.

The total amount of area for retail commercial purposes shall not exceed 801,342 square feet of gross leasable floor area.

The total amount of area for warehousing purposes shall not exceed 459,471 square feet of gross leasable floor area.

The total number of hotel rooms shall not exceed 752.

The total acreage for the various land uses to be accommodated on-site shall be as shown in Table 10-1 of the ADA. In the event of conflicting statements in other parts of the ADA, the numbers appearing on the table, which are repeated below, shall take precedence.

The land uses by Phase to be accommodated on-site shall be as shown below. In the event of conflicting statements in other parts of the ADA, the numbers appearing on the table, which are repeated below, shall take precedence. However, prior to the initiation of Phase III, in conjunction with the results of the transportation update to the ADA and subsequent negotiations between the County and the Applicant/Owner, the BoCC will reassess the density and intensity of the proposed land uses to ensure that there is adequate provision for transportation infrastructure to serve the development approved in this Order for Phases III and IV. Should the transportation infrastructure be found inadequate to serve the development approved in this Order for Phases III and IV, the Applicant/Owner may propose any of the following options:

- Revise the land uses in the development program;
- 2) Increase its contribution to the cost of construction;
- Enter into a joint financing agreement or Development Agreement to support the cost of new construction:

- 4) Apply an alternative financing mechanism to meet any unfunded needs;
- Adopt and implement alternative measures as allowed by this Development Order or Florida law.

The BoCC may approve the applicant's proposal or other mitigation. The BoCC reserves the right to subject Phases III and IV to a down-zoning, unit density reduction, or intensity reduction as required to assure transportation facilities will be adequate to accommodate the impacts of the approved development should an agreement not be reached through the above referenced methods.

(3) Definitions

For the purposes of this Development Order, the terms listed below shall be defined as follows:

- ADA Application for Development Approval, as defined in the first paragraph of page one of this Development Order.
- (b) BoCC Alachua County Board of County Commissioners
- (c) CDD community development district a local unit of special-purpose government which is created pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, and limited to the performance of those specialized functions by Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, the boundaries for which are contained wholly within a single county; the governing head of which is a body created, organized, and constituted and authorized to function specifically as prescribed in Chapter 190, Florida Statutes, for the delivery of urban community services; and the formation, power, governing body, operation, duration, accountability, requirements for disclosure, and termination of which are as required by general law.
- (d) CMS concurrency management system any and all ordinances, resolutions and regulations adopted by Alachua County to implement the requirements of Section 163.3202(2)(g), Florida Statutes.
- (e) DCA Florida Department of Community Affairs
- (f) FDOT Florida Department of Transportation
- (g) FFWCC Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, formerly the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission
- (h) FIHS Florida Intrastate Highway System
- (i) GRU Gainesville Regional Utilities
- (j) Mitigative measures measures that mitigate for each transportation impact on significantly impacted roadways. Such measures may be in the form of: Scheduling of facility modifications in the form of binding and enforceable commitments for construction of needed roadway modifications concurrent with the impacts of development by the local government, the applicant, or the state (91-2.045(7)(a)1, FA.C.); Alternative Concurrency Provisions in the form of a schedule of modifications that appropriately addresses impacted facilities through alternative concurrency provisions as adopted in the Comprehensive Plan where such alternate provisions or measures are specifically adopted in the Plan and are fully outlined in

the Development Order (9J-2.045(7)(a)2, F.A.C.); Proportionate share payments where the affected jurisdiction agrees to accept proportionate share payments as adequate mitigation (9J-2.045(7)(a)3, F.A.C.); Level of service monitoring included in the Development Order that provides for either binding commitments for needed improvements or that the local government cease issuing building permits at such time as the roadway is projected to operate over its adopted level of service until binding commitments are identified (9J-2.045(7)(a)4, F.A.C.); or a combination of the aforementioned measures, or other measures which are proposed and reviewed in the ADA, including the provision for capital facilities for mass transit (e.g. buses for fixed route service, vehicles for van-pool or ride share programs) or the provision of programs that provide alternatives to the single occupancy vehicle (9J-2.045(7)(a)5, F.A.C.).

- Owner The person and/or entity currently holding title to the real property subject to this Development Order and each of his/its successors or assigns for any portion of the property.
- (o) Proportionate Fair Share¹ a contribution from a developer or owner of a DRI to the local government or the governmental agency having maintenance responsibility for those facilities, which makes adequate financial provision for the public transportation facilities needed to accommodate the impacts of the proposed development on roadways outside the local government of jurisdiction's Concurrency Management System area. The proportionate share contribution shall be deemed to make adequate financial provision for such facilities if it is equal to or greater than the sum of the costs of improvements attributable to the proposed development derived from the application of the following formula. The costs of improvements attributable to the proposed development are based upon the sum of the cost of

The amount of any proportionate share payment to be accepted by the county shall be determined at the time of the award of the contract for the modification to which the proportionate share applies.

improving each significantly impacted state and regional roadway which will operate at worse than the level of service standard in the local government's approved comprehensive plan or the Florida Department of Transportation level of service standards for roads on the Florida Intrastate Highway System at each project stage or project phase and at project buildout. The proportionate share of the cost of improvements of each such roadway is calculated according to the following formula:

[DRI trips/(SV increase)] x cost

- DRI trips = cumulative number of the trips from the proposed development expected to reach the roadway during the peak hour from the complete buildout of a stage or phase being approved.
 - SV increase = the change in peak hour maximum service volume of the roadway resulting from construction of the improvement necessary to maintain the adopted level of service.
- 3. Cost = cost of construction, at the time of developer payment, of an improvement necessary to maintain the adopted level of service. - (p) The Project the work and development that is to occur on the Property as permitted by this Development Order.
- (q) The Property or this Property the real property subject to this Development Order as specifically described in Exhibit 1 and any portion thereof which may be sold, transferred, assigned or otherwise subsequently conveyed.
- (r) Regional roadway A roadway shall be considered "regional" if it is defined as regional in the North Central Florida Regional Policy Plan.
- (s) PUD Planned Unit Development, as defined by Alachua County Unified Land Development Code Chapter 392, Zoning Districts: Article IV. Planned Unit Development District.
- (t) Roadway an existing or planned road segment in its entirety or any portion thereof, including intersections and interchanges.

- (u) RTS Regional Transit System
- (v) SJRWMD St. John's River Water Management District
- (w) SOV Single Occupant Vehicle
- (x) TMA Transportation Management Association, defined for this Development Order as The SpringHills Transportation and Botanical Water Gardens Association, Inc., a not for profit corporation pursuant to the Florida Not For Profit Corporation Act.
- (y) TSM/TDM Transportation System Management/Transportation Demand Management

(4) Applicant Commitments

The Applicant has committed to the following actions to mitigate the potential adverse impacts associated with the development. Any specific conditions included as part of the Development Order which conflict with the commitments identified herein shall supersede those commitments.

- The Applicant will construct the project as described in the Notice of Proposed Change for a Substantial Deviation Determination (filed 2/22/05) and the Application for Development Approval (ADA), as defined in the first paragraph of this Development Order.
- 2. The Applicant will provide hookups to centralized secondary wastewater treatment service owned and operated by Gainesville Regional Utilities (GRU) from all offices, retail commercial establishments, warehousing and industrial developments, and multiple-family residences within the project site. Additionally, the Applicant will provide hookups to centralized secondary wastewater treatment service owned and operated by Gainesville Regional Utilities from all single-family residences located in all quadrants of the project site. (ADA, pg. 18-1, A & pg. 18-2, D; 1st Request, pg. 74, 24-A.2; RPC Clearinghouse Meeting)
- Centralized water service will be provided to all development, including all residences, within the project. (ADA, pg. 17-1, A.1; 1st Request, pg. 74, 24.A.2)
- No water wells will be constructed on the project site unless permitted/required by Alachua County and/or the St. Johns River Water Management District (SJRWMD). (ADA, pg. 17-1, A.1. & C.1.)
- The project will conform to the rules of the St. Johns River Water Management District pursuant to Rule 40C-42, F.A.C., and Alachua County for stormwater management and erosion. (ADA, pg. 19-1 A)
- Post-development runoff will not exceed pre-development runoff from the site in terms of water quantity/dispersal times or water quality as per Rules 40C-40 and 40C-42, F.A.C., (ADA, pg. 19-4 B)

- Master drainage facilities receiving stormwater discharge from the development will be operated and maintained by an owners association and/or by a separate stormwater utility. (ADA, pg. 19-8, E)
- The Applicant will record a restrictive covenant with the land title as per Rule 9J-2.044(5)(b)1, F.A.C., which requires that the use of hazardous materials be restricted through legally binding instruments to amounts less than those specified in Rule 9J-2.044(5)(a)1 and 2, F.A.C.(1st Request, pg. 29, Part III)
- The Applicant commits to the development of individual parcels within the project site incorporating a number of energy conservation measures, including:
 - Separating buildings from heat absorbing surfaces;
 - Use land massing and building orientation to channel breezes and control sunlight;
 - Energy efficient designs for lighting, electrical, heating, and air conditioning equipment; and
 - Innovative energy conservation construction techniques. (ADA, pg. 29-2, D)
- 10. Ten acres of the project site have been identified as jurisdictional wetlands and 59 acres will be maintained as open space. The acreage will be owned and maintained by a non-public entity. The Applicant may implement requirements for open space ownership and maintenance responsibility through a Developer's Agreement with Alachua County. (ADA, pg. 21-1, A & C)
- 11. Three acres of the project site will be maintained as a park. The acreage will be owned and maintained by a non-public entity. The Applicant may implement requirements for recreation ownership and maintenance responsibility through a Developer's Agreement with Alachua County, (1st Request, pg. 107, 26.C & 26.G)

- A pedestrian/bicycle system will be developed within areas classified as Open Space as depicted on Map H of the Application for Development Approval. (ADA, pg. 26-1, A)
- A property owners association or a CDD will be established which will have operation and maintenance responsibilities for the common areas after project completion. (1st Request, pg. 107, 26.C)
- 14. Prior to the beginning of Phase III, the Applicant will re-assess the adequate/affordable housing impact of the project using the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council's affordable housing demand, supply, and need methodology and will mitigate the project's affordable housing impact, should a significant impact be determined, using one or a combination of the following three options as allowed by Rule 91-2.048, F.A.C.:
 - Construction of adequate housing units on-site, or reasonably accessible to the development site;
 - Payment to an appropriate affordable housing trust fund; and/or
 - c. Dedicated direct rent or ownership subsidies to the development's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employees in a sufficient amount to satisfy the adequate housing need identified for each salary income range within that stage or phase's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employee households. (2nd Request, pg. 64-65)
- 15. During the construction phases of the project, work practice standards will be adopted to minimize the generation of fugitive particulate matter emissions. These practice standards will include compliance with open burning regulations (if open burning is necessary), watering or the use of other dust suppressants as necessary, and the re-vegetation of all developed areas as quickly as possible after development. (ADA, pg. 22-23)
- An application will be made to the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission for an Incidental Take Permit. The Applicant will purchase 7.46 acres of

off-site gopher tortoise habitat located within the FFWCC's mitigation park at the time of the submittal of the application. (ADA, pg. 12-11, Wildlife)

- 17. Wetlands W-1 through W-3, W-5 through W-7, W-9 through W-11, and W-13 through W-15 as described and mapped in the ADA, will be preserved in their natural state. Their hydroperiods will be maintained or, where practicable, enhanced, through the discharge of treated stormwater. Protective upland buffers consistent with the provisions of Chapter 359, Alachua County Unified Land Development Code will be established around these wetlands. (ADA n. p. 13-5.3)
- The wetlands referenced in the previous Applicant commitment will be dedicated as
 conservation areas (via easement or fee simple dedication) in accordance with
 permitting criteria elements of the St. Johns River Water Management District's
 MSSW/ERP permitting program. (ADA, pg. 13-5,3)
- 19. A series of wet/dry detention basins will be constructed upstream of the deeper depression areas planned for use as retention basins. Retention and detention basins shall be located throughout other portions of the project site to allow for physical settling and filtration of the first flush of storm runoff. (ADA, pg. 14-5)
- Best management practices and commonly used methods of erosion control will be
 employed during site clearing and grading. Such methods include positive site
 grading, silt fencing for control of water-induced erosion, and sprinkling for control
 of wind-induced erosion. (ADA, pg. 15-3, C)
- Upon completion of construction, seeding, mulching, and sodding will be employed, as appropriate, to control erosion. (ADA, pg. 15-3, C)
- Any organic soils or suitable overburden materials which may be excavated during backfilling operations will be employed on the site during the landscaping phase of site development. (ADA, pg. 15-3, D)
- 23. Development within floodprone areas within the Northwest quadrant will be limited to one road crossing and utilities as shown on Map C of the Application for Development Approval (ADA). The top of the road will be 88.00 feet above median sea level (msl) and the utilities will be designed to prevent contamination of

floodwaters by infiltration and/or exfiltration. A compensation storage volume will be created within the flood stage, below 88.00 feet msl, to offset the additional rumoff volume discharged downstream from the project. (ADA, pg. 16-2, C)

(5) Condition: Recreation and Open Space

This development shall maintain the County's adopted level of service for recreation of 3.0 acres of improved recreation site per 1,000 persons in the unincorporated area of the County. Prior to Phases III and IV, the Applicant shall address how the development is maintaining compliance with the County's recreation concurrency requirements through submittal of a parks and recreation assessment and mitigation plan. This plan shall be reviewed and approved by the Alachua County Department of Growth Management and the Alachua County Department of Public Works within 30 days of submittal by the Applicant. In the event that the level of service for recreation falls below the adopted standard, concurrency for parks and recreation can be mitigated using one of the following methods:

- Compliance with the requirements of Alachua County Comprehensive Plan Capital Improvements Element Policy1.3.2-A(1-4); or
- At the time the development permit is issued, the necessary facilities and services are the subject of a binding executed contract which provides for the commencement of actual construction of the required facilities or the provision of services within one year of the issuance of the development permit; or
- 3. The necessary facilities and services are guaranteed in an enforceable development agreement which requires commencement of construction of the facilities within one year of the issuance of the applicable development permit. Such enforceable development agreements may include, but are not limited to, development agreements pursuant to Section 163.3220, Florida Statutes, or an agreement or Development Order issued pursuant to Chapter 380, Florida Statutes, 191-5.0055 (2)(b)]

No building permits for Phases III and IV shall be issued until the parks and recreation assessment and mitigation plan has been approved by the Alachua County Department of Growth Management and the Alachua County Department of Public Works.

(6) Conditions: Transportation

- The FDOT has committed that the following road projects will begin construction no later than fiscal years 2001/2002.
 - Interstate 75 interchange at NW 39th Avenue (SR 222) Reconstruct interchange and widen NW 39th Avenue west past NW 98th Street
 - SR 26 (Newberry Road) from west of CR 241 South to CR 241 North - Widen to 4 lanes.
 - SR 121 (NW 34th Street) at NW 39th Avenue (SR 222) extend right turn lanes.

These road projects are considered by Alachua County and the Applicant to be in place for all development proposed within Alachua County and are used in determining whether the County's traffic concurrency requirements have been met.

Construction of these projects provides capacity which is needed to serve traffic from SpringHills. If any of these projects are delayed beyond FY 2001/2002, then SpringHills Development of Regional Impact (DRI) can be expected to have an even greater impact on the transportation system and, therefore, the Applicant shall amend or modify the traffic analysis as appropriate. Based on the revised or amended analysis, the Development Order may be amended.

b) For the specific purposes of the following transportation conditions, the SpringHills (DRI) shall be defined into phases based on the land use matrix found in Section 4, Subsection (2) General Description of the Project, in this Development Order.

- Prior to the initiation of Phase II, the Applicant shall be responsible to insure that the following modifications to the transportation system shall be in place:
 - Construct a covered bus shelter to serve the new bus route which will access the Northeast quadrant.
 - Extend left turn lanes on all approaches and northbound and southbound right turn lanes at NW 92st Court/NW 39st Avenue Intersection. (Per page 15 of the SpringHills Shopping Center, Burger King and Sonny's Restaurant Traffic Analysis Study.)
 - Extend left turn lanes on all approaches and northbound and southbound right turn lanes at NW 91* Street/NW 30* Avenue intersection. (Per page 15 of the SpringHills Shopping 30* Avenue King and Sonny's Restaurant Traffic Analysis Study.)
- d) At the time of issuance of the last construction permit for the following projects: SpringHills Shopping Center Phase I, SpringHills Shopping Center Outparcels (4 outparcels consisting of 2 proposed banks and 2 proposed type A restaurants), the Burger King Restaurant, and the Sonny's restaurant, or prior to the completion of Phase II, whichever occurs first, the Applicant shall commence or cause to commence construction of an eastbound right turn lane at NW 91" Street/NW 39" Avenue intersection. The construction of this project must be complete prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy for the last of the above referenced projects, or the last of the Phase II projects, whichever occurs first.
- e) Access management modifications to NW 39th Avenue between and including NW 91th Street and NW 92th Court agreed to by Alachua County and the Applicant, and approved by the Florida Department of Transportation must be in place prior to the completion of Phase II. No median openings shall be considered along NW 39th Avenue between NW 92th Court and NW 91th Street.

- f) Per 91-2.045 (7)(a), F.A.C., a specific annual traffic monitoring program shall be submitted to the County by SpringHills DRI within 60 days following the issuance of the final Development Order. The Alachua County Public Works Department shall approve the methodology and reporting requirements described in this program within 60 days of receipt. The reports shall include procedures and methods to monitor levels of service and to identify the actual trip generation and distribution of Project traffic on monitored roadways and intersections. The annual data collected in this report shall be compared to the data presented in the final transportation report submitted for the ADA. Thereafter, the methodology and reporting requirements shall be included in the report. The report and any proposed changes to the methodology shall be submitted annually to the Alachua County Public Works Department at least 45 days prior to the report deadline for review and consideration of revision due to changes in traffic monitoring technology, or changes in the level of immact of this DRI.
- Beginning with the approval of this Development Order and in conjunction with the annual monitoring reports required by Section 11 of this Development Order, the Applicant shall submit annual reports per 91-2.045(7)(a)4, F.A.C., as described in Condition 6.f. showing the existing project traffic for am peak, pm peak and annual daily trips, existing traffic volumes, turning movements counts, existing levels of service and projected levels of service based on reserved trips on those road segments listed below, including all signalized intersections along the listed road segments, and any other segments identified where the project traffic is determined to be significant (as defined by Section 91-2.045(6), F.A.C.) at the time the study is conducted. Project traffic shall include "... the impacts of all existing project development, all permitted project development, and all project development likely to receive building permits ... " during the next year (91-2.045(7)(a)4b. F.A.C.)
 - NW 39th Avenue from CR 241 to NW 43th Street
 - NW 23rd Avenue from NW 98th Street to NW 55th Street (initially)
 - NW 23rd Avenue from NW 98th Street to western terminus (after construction)
 - NW 98th Street from NW 23th Avenue to NW 39th Avenue
 - NW 83rd Street from NW 23rd Avenue to NW 39th Avenue

- 6) I-75 from SR 26 (Newberry Road) to NW 39th Avenue
- 7) I-75 entrance and exit ramps at NW 39th Avenue.

The annual report shall also document mass transit modifications, bicycle/pedestrian modifications, and any other TSM/TDM strategies undertaken to date to reduce single occupant vehicle (SOV) trips, and changes in mass transit frequency and level of service as well as bicycle/pedestrian levels of service, when such levels of service are adopted by the BoCC. The Annual Monitoring Report shall evaluate and recommend mitigative measures involving/including local street networks, transit, bicycle/pedestrian facilities, and services to address any transportation system capacity deficiencies identified in the report for the year being monitored.

h) If a road segment is shown by monitoring not to meet adopted level of service standards2, and if the traffic on that segment from SpringHills is significant (as defined by Section 9J-2.045(6), F.A.C.), then the approval of any development projected to generate additional trips on the identified segment shall require funding commitments for the identified mitigative measures. The mitigative measures must be identified in this Development Order or the Development Order must be amended pursuant to Section 380.06(19)(f), Florida Statutes, to identify mitigative measures for the roadways or intersections failing to meet the adopted level of service standard No additional general purpose lanes on NW 39th Avenue shall be considered an acceptable mitigative measure, unless contained in the MTPO adopted Long-Range Transportation Plan. As used in this Development Order. funding commitments shall mean that the County has provided for construction/implementation in the third (3rd) year of its capital improvement program, FDOT has provided for construction/implementation in the third (3rd) year of its work program, or other public or private entity or partnership has committed, through an executed development agreement, to construct/implement the mitigative measures within three (3) years. A stop order will be issued for any further development generating trips in excess of

[&]quot;The maximum service volumes associated with the adopted level of service standards may be determined through approved analysis procedures, including, but not limited to, Florida Department of Transportation generalized tables, spreadsheet applications ART_PLAN_ART_TAB, FREE_TAB, or other software. Methods of determining maximum service volume should be in compliance with the methodologies/procedures established and used in the MTPO Annual Level of Service Report.

the amount triggering the need for a described modification for which there is no funding commitment as defined above. Any development authorized in this Development Order which received approval through the County's Development Review Process prior to the stop order, and has a valid Certificate of Level of Service Compliance, shall be allowed to proceed in accordance with conditions in this Development Order and any conditions in the site plan. If it is necessary for the Applicant to finance required roadway modifications, Alachua County may enter into a Joint Participation Agreement (JPA) with the Applicant to accommodate reimbursement. The JPA shall be based upon terms and conditions acceptable to both the County and the Applicant.

- i) Nothing in this Development Order shall be construed to exempt this project or any portion thereof, from the requirements of Chapter 365 "Concurrency Management" of the Alachua County Unified Land Development Regulations. All proposed development associated with this DRI shall be required to meet concurrency requirements and obtain preliminary and final certificates of level of service compliance at the time of site plan approval. Provided however Alachua County and the Applicant/Owner/Developer may enter into a development agreement that allows tip reservations and compliance with concurrency requirements for this development where the developer provides for adequate financing or construction/implementation of mitigative measures.
- j) Prior to the initiation of Phase III, the Applicant shall prepare an update to the ADA transportation study supplement dated April 2, 1999, for Phases III and IV of the Project. As part of this update, the study must identify needed mitigative measures for, at a minimum, road segments listed in Condition 6.g. including all signalized intersections along all listed road segments. The study shall specifically investigate and make recommendations on non-auto modifications (including, but not limited to, park and ride lots, mass transit, bicycle, and pedestrian enhancements) which will help reduce SOV trips. The study shall identify strategies to reduce the number of trips on the regional road network by connecting the different quadrants of the development, and connecting this project with adjoining development. In addition, the study shall investigate opportunities for new roadway facilities to provide and promote route choice, including at a minimum, the extensions of NW 83rd Street, NW 122nd Street, NW 23rd Avenue, NW 31" Avenue and an I-75 overpass through the Project connecting the extension of NW 83rd Street and

the western boundary of the Project. Trip credits will be granted for the mitigative measures listed above, e.g. mass transit, park and ride lots, by Alachua County Public Works Department based on documentation of the mitigative measures to be undertaken by the Applicant/Owner and supported by appropriate data. Alachua County Public Works Department shall track trip generation credits granted to the owner applicant. The trip generation credits shall be coordinated with the applicant and reported annually in the monitoring report. In addition, through the study and/or the SpringHills Transportation Management Association (TMA), the Applicant shall make a good faith effort to coordinate transit service and other trip reduction strategies with Santa Fe Community College and AvMed Health Services.

The transportation update must be prepared utilizing a methodology reviewed by the Florida Department of Community Affairs, the Florida Department of Transportation, Alachua County Public Works Department, City of Gainesville, and the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council. After review by these agencies the methodology must be approved by Alachua County Public Works Department and the Department of Community Affairs (9J-2.045(7)(a)4, F.A.C.). The study shall be submitted to FDOT, NCFRPC and the City of Gainesville for review and comment. This study must identify modifications that are consistent with current FDOT, Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization (MTPO), and Alachua County plans and policies. Any modifications identified must be approved by the appropriate agency. The DRI Development Order shall be amended to include all additional transportation mitigation measures. The proposed Development Order amendment shall be submitted by the applicant to Alachua County, the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, and the Florida Department of Community Affairs for substantial deviation determination pursuant to Chapter 380.06 (19), Florida Statutes. Unless the Development Order amendment, as determined by the NCFRPC, contains adequate transportation mitigation measures to accommodate the anticipated traffic for all phases of the development, the amendment shall constitute a substantial deviation.

k) Notwithstanding the arrangements able to be achieved within the SpringHills TMA, the Applicant shall coordinate with the Gainesville Regional Transit Service in Alachua County for the expansion of transit routes to serve the SpringHills DRI and provide for integration with existing transit service in or adjacent to the DRI study area and the regional transit service area prior to the initiation of Phase II. Furthermore, the Applicant shall establish a verifiable tip reduction program prior to the initiation of Phase III, including as a minimum, guaranteed ride home to all employees participating in the ride-share program within the Spring-Hills DRI boundary, and shall establish a ride-sharing database to link together those employees desiring to car pool or van pool. All expenditures related to a ride matching program and a guaranteed ride home program shall be borne by the Applicant or a designated organization formed to provide this service. If the annual monitoring report indicates that the trip reduction program is operating more effectively than the model used with the revised transportation impact study estimated, then additional trip reduction credits may be granted. Prior to the completion of Phase III, a part-time rideshare co-ordinator shall be provided to facilitate the trip reduction strategies. The provision of the ride share coordinator may be coordinated through the Spring-Hills TMA.

- In the interest of safety, and to promote alternative forms of transportation, the Applicant shall provide a plan for an on-site system of bikeways and pedestrian circulation for all of Phase I. The system on-site bikeways associated with Phase I shall be substantially complete or provided for prior to the initiation of Phase II.
- m) Prior to the initiation of the Phase II, the Applicant shall submit to Alachua County for review and approval, a conceptual map identifying the internal transportation system for the entire project. Prior to the initiation of each phase hereafter, the Applicant shall submit to Alachua County, for review, maps clearly identifying the transportation system for that phase. The internal transportation system associated with a given phase shall be complete prior to the initiation of the next phase.
- n) Bicycle lockers or bicycle racks, transit passenger shelters and transit parking bays, consistent with Alachua County Land Development Regulations and RTS policies and requirements, shall be constructed to augment and facilitate the operations of transit service to the site in Phase II and in all future phases in conjunction with the extension of transit service. Transit pull-out bays and transit shelters, and their location as required by Alachua County Public Works Department and Department of Growth Management and the Applicant's trip reduction strategies shall be constructed by the applicant within the site boundary following approval by the Alachua County Public

Works Department. The location of transit facilities will be approved by the transit provider in cooperation with Alachua County. The Applicant shall consult with Gainesville Regional Transit System in order to determine the appropriate number and location of pull-out bays and transit shelters. The Applicant shall promote and encourage variable work hours and flextime participation by on-site employers.

- o) The transportation system within the site shall be developed in an interconnected manner to the maximum extent feasible. The internal transportation system shall be stubbed out to allow access and interconnections with adjacent properties both within and outside the DRI boundary, where appropriate, as determined by Alachua County Public Works Department. The transportation system shall be designed so that multiple roads, bike-paths and sidewalks can continue into any adjacent development in an effort to integrate adjacent properties and limit the impacts to the arterial roadway system. The exact number and location of streets, paths and sidewalks to be stubbed out will be determined during the site plan approval process.
- p) Sidewalks shall be constructed along both sides of all collector and arterial internal roadway where feasible, as determined by Alachua County Public Works Department. On collector and arterial roadways, where in-street bike lanes are not provided, pathways shall be constructed to a width of at least 8 feet to accommodate/facilitate bicycle and pedestrian traffic. Within residential areas, sidewalks shall be constructed to a width of at least 5 feet in accordance with current Alachua County standards. Speed calming techniques shall be implemented on all appropriate roadways to promote lower speeds and promote the use of bicycles and walking by increasing the safety and comfort level of all bicyclists and pedestrians. In all areas of SpringHills, where cycling will be accomplished on off-street and on-street facilities, appropriate signage and markings identifying bikways shall be installed at the time of implementing the bikway system. Special consideration shall be given to roadways connecting residential areas with employment and commercial centers.
- To facilitate multi-modal transportation, separate pedestrian (sidewalk) access with appropriate safety buffering as determined in the design standards

shall be provided to all commercial and office structures. Sidewalk access will also be provided between transit stops and nearby residential and commercial development.

r) The Applicant/Owner shall be solely responsible for the following modifications to roadways and intersections that provide direct access into and within the Project. The following projects shall be constructed or scheduled for construction as determined to be necessary in the annual monitoring report, or at such time as the annual monitoring report identifies that 1660 cumulative external pm peak hour trips for Phase II are being generated, whichever occurs first.

Phase II Modifications

Channelize intersection of NW 97th Court and NW 39th Avenue

Signalize intersection of NW 92nd Court and NW 39th Avenue (or other mitigative measure as determined accepted by Alachua County, the Applicant, and FDOT.)

Extend NW 97th Court as a new two (2) lane road south to NW 98th Street.

The Applicant/Owner shall be solely responsible for any additional modifications that provide direct access into the Project and any additional modifications to the internal transportation system, as determined by Alachua County Public Works Department to be site-related improvements, identified through the site plan review process, or the transportation study update prepared as required by this Development Order.

- s) The Applicant/Owner shall insure development adjacent to NW 39^a Avenue is set-back to allow for the construction of any special use lanes or turn lanes necessary to accommodate transportation impacts in Phases III and IV. The Applicant may receive impact fee credits at the time said property is dedicated for public use.
- t) The following roadways when constructed will be built to Alachua County standards and dedicated to and accepted by Alachua County following roadway construction as necessary to serve individual development phases:

- (1) the northern extension of NW 98th Street, (2) the northern extension of NW 92th Court, and (3) the northern extension of NW 91th Street, (4) the east-west connector (NW 41th Place) between the NW 98th Street extension and NW 97th Blvd. and (5) the east-west connector (in the 4300 Block) between the NW 92th Court extension and NW 96th Blvd.
- u) In addition to the previously described conditions, the Applicant shall have the right to participate to the fullest extent possible in any and all combined future mitigation measures that utilize the joint resources of federal, state, county, local and private funding programs to offset Project impacts, less the proportionate share contribution. The SpringHills development reserves the right to utilize and participate in any other alternative financing measures enacted to address transportation needs. Alachua County agrees to consider all reasonable alternative transportation solutions including, but not limited to, alternative financing, trip reduction strategies, construction of parallel facilities, pipelining of modifications as defined in HB 17 and the associated implementing rule.
- v) In the event that a roadway modification is identified which is not compatible with the adopted policy of the FDOT, MTPO or Alachua County, the Applicant, Alachua County and the party/parties having maintenance and/or jurisdictional responsibility for the facility shall determine alternate mitigation solutions to provide for the movement of goods and people.
- w) If Alachua County adopts any additional transportation impact fees in the future affecting the type and/or location of development within this Project, the developer may petition the local government, and the local government shall modify the affected provisions of the Development Order to give the developer credit for any contribution of land for a public facility, or construction, expansion, or contribution of land for a public facility, or construction or expansion of a public facility, or a portion thereof, required by the Development Order toward an impact fee or exaction for the same need, per Chapter 380.06(16)(b) Florida Statutes. Impact fee credits will not be issued for internal streets constructed to serve the DRI and dedicated to the Public except for those streets outlined in Condition (t). The Applicant/Owner will be liable for any future impact fees to the extent that the impact fees required are not satisfied by impact fee credits.

- The Applicant shall support and encourage any necessary amendments of the adopted Gainesville Urbanized Area Long-Range Transportation Plan to include Guine three transportation system modifications determined necessary, and for which the Applicant has any responsibility, to accommodate the impacts of the Project not considered cost feasible in the Long-Range Transportation Plan.
- y) The transportation mitigative measures associated with each phase or alternate mitigative measures as determined by the transportation study update or annual monitoring and included in an amended Development Order must be completed prior to the initiation of the next phase, regardless of funding source. The mitigative measures for Phases I and II and the conceptual mitigative measures for Phases III and IV as proposed by the applicant in the ADA are listed in Appendix A for information only.

(7) Condition: Housing

The development of this DRI shall include a variety of housing types meeting a full range of housing prices.

Prior to the initiation of Phases II, III, and IV, the Applicant shall re-assess the cumulative affordable housing impact of the project (including Phase I, which was the subject of the Preliminary Developer's Agreement) using the East Central Florida Regional Planning Council's affordable housing demand, supply, and need methodology and shall develop a plan for mitigating the project's affordable housing impacts consistent with Rule 9J-2.048, F.A.C.. This methodology and mitigation plan shall be based on the types and amounts of development that are specified in the Development Order, rather than the original ADA. Implementation of the mitigation plan shall occur within the phase in which the need is identified, or earlier. Should the mitigation occur on-site, mitigation shall not be concentrated, but shall be dispersed throughout the site. The threshold of significance is triggered if the cumulative adequate housing need exceeds 5 percent of the residential threshold or 50 units, which ever is greater (Rule 9J-2.048(7), F.A.C.). In the event that Alachua county adopts more stringent affordable housing policies, pursuant to 9J-2.048, F.A.C., the Applicant/Owner shall comply with those policies for any development which has not received final development plan approval from the Development Review Committee after the County adopts revised affordable housing policies.

Any significant identified unmet affordable housing need of the project shall be mitigated prior to construction of the next phase using one or a combination of the following three options as allowed by Rule 91-2.048, F.A.C.. Mitigation of the project's significant impact on adequate affordable housing shall be guaranteed to be affordable initially, in the case of owner-occupied housing, or remain affordable for a minimum period of fifteen years, in the case of rental housing, in one of the following ways:

- a. Construction of affordable housing units on-site or reasonably accessible to the development site, sufficient to equal in number the affordable housing need identified for each salary income range within that phase's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employee households; or
- b. Payment to an appropriate affordable housing trust fund of funds dedicated to, and sufficient in amount to result in, the rehabilitation of unoccupied substandard housing or construction of reasonably accessible affordable housing units equal in number to the affordable housing need identified for each salary income range within that phase's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employee households; or
- c. Dedicated direct rent or ownership subsidies to the development's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employees sufficient in amount to satisfy the affordable housing need identified for each salary income range within that phase's very low-, low-, and moderate-income employee households.

For purposes of this condition, the term "reasonably accessible" means a commute time from the principal access point of the place of employment in the development to the location of adequate housing by private or public conveyance of twenty minutes (during peak hour) or a commute distance of ten miles, whichever is less. This distance and time determination shall be established from the use of traffic analysis zones.

No certificates of occupancy (CO) for occupancies included in this development for Phases II, III, and IV shall be issued until the affordable housing assessment and mitigation plan is in place. Assessment of housing impacts, and a final mitigation plan, must be in place prior to the commencement of development for each phase of the DRI. The Applicant/Owner shall comply with the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan Policies and Land Development Regulations in effect on the date that each affordable housing impact assessment is submitted. At such time as the assessment and mitigation plan has been finalized, the Applicant shall submit it to Alachua County, the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, and the Florida Department of Community Affairs for substantial deviation determination pursuant to Chapter 380.06(19). Florida Statutes. Unless the assessment and mitigation plan, as determined by the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, substantially complies with the terms of this condition, it shall constitute a substantial deviation.

(8) Conditions: Vegetation and Wildlife

- a) The Applicant shall provide evidence to Alachua County, the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, and the Florida Department of Community Affairs that an off-site gopher tortoise habitat mitigation park has been acquired by the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission in the name of this DRI for the purpose of mitigating the project's adverse impacts to gopher tortoise habitat.
- Prior to the initiation of Phase II, the Applicant shall conduct surveys of all
 upland forest habitat identified on Map D in the ADA document for the
 presence of listed plant species.
 - Activities affecting all listed plant species found on-site shall satisfy the requirements of Chapter 581.185, Florida Statutes, Rule 5B-40, F.A.C., and be consistent with the goals and policies of the North Central Florida Strategic Regional Policy Plan and the Alachua County Comprehensive Plan. The Applicant shall develop a plan for the mitigation of adverse impacts to all listed plant species identified on the project site.
- No land clearing, removal of vegetation, or other development activities of Phases II, III, and IV shall occur until Conditions (8).a. and (8).b. above have been addressed. At such time as the plan has been finalized, the Applicant shall submit it to Alachua County, the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, and the Florida Department of Community Affairs for

substantial deviation determination pursuant to Chapter 380.06(19), Florida Statutes. Unless the listed plant species survey and mitigation plan, as determined by the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, substantially complies with each item in subsection (8).b. above, the plan shall constitute a substantial deviation.

d) Category I non-native plant species as published in the Florida Exotic Pest Plant Council's annual list of Florida's most invasive species shall be prohibited in new landscaping throughout the project area.

(9) <u>Conditions</u>: Water

- a) The Applicant shall prepare a water quality monitoring program (WQMP) which includes groundwater monitoring. The proposal shall be designed to determine the effects of the stormwater management system and of the development in general on the groundwater. The WQMP shall include monitoring well locations, parameters for analysis, and project quality assurance. The WQMP shall include a quarterly and cumulative annual reporting system with copies of the reports being submitted to Alachua County and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection within fifteen days of receipt of the monitoring data from the reporting laboratory. Alachua County, with comments from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, shall evaluate the reports and reserve the right to recommend changes in parameters, sampling locations and sampling frequencies if so warranted.
- b) The Applicant may, annually, request changes in the monitoring program. Such requests shall include the facts and analysis of those facts that they feel would justify the requested change(s). Such requests shall be evaluated by Alachua County, with comments from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection, and a timely response provided to the Applicant. Items that will be considered in evaluating requests include geologic and hydrologic features of the site, past monitoring results, potential water quality impacts from activities that are occurring on the site, potential water quality impacts from future activities on the site, the current policies, federal, state.

and local, related to groundwater protection, and then current scientific knowledge related to groundwater protection.

- c) The proposal shall include a requirement that if the WQMP indicates violations of State of Florida water quality standards as a result of on-site sources, the Applicant and/or its successor in interest, shall take actions to reduce pollutants to meet the State standards. The actions and timeframes required to implement the actions shall be determined by Alachua County with comments from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.
- if) No certificates of occupancy (CO) for Phases II, III, and IV shall be issued until the WQMP is in place. At such time as the plan has been finalized, the Applicant shall submit it to Alachua County, the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, the Florida Department of Community Affairs, and the Florida Department of Environmental Protection for substantial deviation determination pursuant to Chapter 380.06(19), Florida Statutes. Unless the program, as determined by the North Central Florida Regional Planning Council, substantially complies with each item in subsections (9).a, b, and c. above, the program shall constitute a substantial deviation.

(10) Community Development District (CDD)

- a) The Applicant/Owner may file an application to create a Community Development District (CDD) pursuant to Chapter 190, Florida Statutes. The purpose of the CDD will be to perform those specialized functions as set forth in the Florida Statutes which involve the delivery of community services to the residents and property owners of the SpringHills Development of Regional Impact area.
- b) The formation, powers, governing body, operation, duration, accountability, requirements for disclosure, and termination shall be done as required by Chapter 190, Florida Statutes.

(11) Conditions: Land Use and Design

- a) Prior to commencement of development of Phase II, an overall conceptual zoning master plan covering all lands within the DRI, to be implemented in the form of a PUD for each quadrant of the DRI, shall be submitted to the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners for review and approval; the master plan and subsequent development phases shall be consistent with Article 4 Planned Unit Development of the Alachua County Land Development Regulations. The conceptual zoning master plan shall show land use densities and intensities including estimated number of dwelling units, and non-residential square footage by area, and shall at a minimum address the overall traffic circulation system, pedestrian and bicycle paths, transit accommodations, drainage, open space/recreational, conservation areas, and utility provisions in a manner consistent with the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners adopted design standards for the DRI.
- A set of Design Control Standards addressing land use, lots and buildings, architecture, landscaping, signage, lighting, streets, and parking, service areas and dumpsters, at a minimum shall be submitted to the Department of Growth Management for final review 30 days following the issuance of the final Development Order. The Design Control Standards shall then be presented to the Board of County Commissioners at a public hearing for adoption and approval within 60 days of receipt. These Design Standards shall be adopted by ordinance as an overlay district for the SpringHills Activity Center in the Alachua County Unified Land Development Code. An architectural/design review committee shall be established to review and approve each proposed development prior to the final site plan approval by Alachua County Development Review Committee. architectural/design review committee shall consist of the Alachua County Director of Growth Management, or designee, an architect, a landscape architect, an engineer, a representative from the community appointed by the BoCC, and an individual appointed by the Applicant. Members of professional expertise shall be jointly selected by the County and the Applicant. Should the BoCC establish a county-wide architectural review committee, that committee shall serve this function.
- c) In the event Alachua County adopts new land development regulations and/or development-related fees, the Applicant/Owner shall comply with the new/revised land development regulations and/or development-related fees for development which has not received final development plan approval

from the Development Review Committee. Such regulations may include, but are not limited to:

- water
- wastewater
- stormwater management
 - education
- parks and recreation
- greenspace/open space and conservation
- law enforcement
- fire protection and emergency medical services
- solid waste
- vegetation and wildlife
- mass transit
- transportation facilities
- Section 5. That, physical development authorized by this Order shall commence no later than one year from the effective date of this order; and the buildout date for project completion is the year 2020.
- Section 6. That, this amended Order shall remain in effect for a period of seventeen (17) years from the effective date of this Order.
- Section 7. That, this Order shall be binding upon the Applicant/Owner, assigns, or successors- in- interest.
- Section 8. That, the definitions contained in Chapter 380.06, Florida Statutes, shall control the interpretation and construction of any terms of this Order.
- Section 9. That, the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, agrees that, except for the development approved for Phases III and IV, as set out herein, the approved DRI shall not be subjected to down-zoning, unit density reduction, or intensity reduction, for a period of seventeen (17) years following the effective date of the amended Order, unless it can be demonstrated that substantial changes in the conditions underlying the approval of the

Order have occurred or that the Order was based on substantially inaccurate information provided by the Applicant, or that the change is clearly established by the County to be essential to the public health, safety, or welfare. Provided, however, prior to the initiation of Phase III, in conjunction with the results of the transportation update to the ADA and subsequent negotiations between the County and the Applicant/Owner, the BoCC will reassess the density and intensity of the proposed land uses to ensure that there is adequate provision for transportation infrastructure to serve the development approved in this Order for Phases III and IV, the Applicant/Owner may propose any of the following options:

- Revise the land uses in the development program;
- 2) Increase its contribution to the cost of construction:
- Enter into a joint financing agreement or Development Agreement to support the cost of new construction;
- Apply an alternative financing mechanism to meet any unfunded needs;
- Adopt and implement alternative measures as allowed by this Development Order or Florida law.

The BoCC may approve the applicants proposal or other mitigation. The BoCC reserves the right to subject Phase III and IV to a down-zoning, unit density reduction, or intensity reduction as required to assure transportation facilities will be adequate to accommodate the impacts of the approved development should an agreement not be reached through the above referenced methods.

Section 10. That, Alachua County is responsible for insuring compliance with this Order. Monitoring shall be accomplished by review of the Annual Report, building permits, certificates of occupancy, plats, if applicable, and by on-site observations.

Section 11. That, the Applicant shall submit an annual report in accordance with Section 380.06(18), Florida Statutes, and operative DCA rules to Alachua County, NCFRPC, the DCA and other agencies as may be appropriate on May 1st of each year during the term of this Order. Every Development Order shall require the annual monitoring report to include the following (91-2.025(7)):

(a) Any changes in the plan of development, or in the representations contained in the Application for Development Approval, or in the phasing for the reporting year and for the next year;

- (b) A summary comparison of development activity proposed and actually conducted for the year;
- (c) Identification of undeveloped tracts of land, other than individual single family lots, that have been sold to a separate entity or developer;
- (d) Identification and intended use of lands purchased, leased or optioned by the developer adjacent to the original DRI site since the Development Order was issued;
- (e) A specific assessment of the developer's and the local government's compliance with each individual condition of approval contained in the DRI Development Order and the commitments which are contained in the Application for Development Approval and which have been identified by the local government, the Regional Planning Council or the Department of Community Affairs as being significant;
- (f) Any known incremental DRI applications for development approval or requests for a substantial deviation determination that were filed in the reporting year and to be filed during the next year;
- (g) An indication of a change, if any, in local government jurisdiction for any portion of the development since the Development Order was issued;
- (h) A list of significant local, state and federal permits which have been obtained or which are pending by agency, type of permit, permit number and purpose of each;
- (i) A statement that all persons have been sent copies of the annual report in conformance with Subsections 380.06(15) and (18), Florida Statutes; and
- (j) A copy of any recorded notice of the adoption of a Development Order or the subsequent modification of an adopted Development Order that was recorded by the developer pursuant to Paragraph 380.06(15)(f), Florida Statutes.
- Section 12. That, the Alachua County Director of Growth Management is hereby directed to send copies of this Order, within seven (7) days of the effective date of this Resolution, to the Applicant/Owner, NCFRPC and the DCA.
- Section 13. That, this Order shall be deemed rendered upon transmittal of copies of this Order to the recipients specified in Chapter 380.06, Florida Statutes.
- Section 14. That, the Applicant/Owner shall record a notice of adoption of this Order pursuant to Chapter 380, and shall furnish the Building Inspector of Alachua County a copy of the recorded notice.
- Section 15. That, it is understood that any reference herein to any governmental agency shall be construed to mean any future instrumentality which may be created or designated

as successor-in-interest to, or which otherwise possesses any of the powers and duties of any referenced governmental agency in existence on the effective date of this Order.

Section 16. Effective Date.

- A. The Development Order shall take effect upon the occurrence of both of the following:
 - 1) adoption by the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners; and
 - transmittal, within seven (7) calendar days of the adoption of the Development Order, to the DCA.
- B. If this Development Order is appealed pursuant to Section 380.07, Florida Statutes, the effectiveness of this Development Order shall be stayed until such time as all appeals have been withdrawn or finally resolved pursuant to Section 380.07, Florida Statutes.
- C. Alachua County shall also send copies of this Development Order, within seven (7) calendar days of the date of approval, to the NCFRPC and the Applicant.
- Section 17. That, in the event that any portion or section of this Order is determined to be invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining portions or sections of this Order shall remain in full force and effect.

APPENDIX C: EQUIVALENCY MATRIX FOR INFORMATION ONLY

At the July 26, 1999, public hearing for the SpringHills Development of Regional Impact, the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners amended the Development Order to include the following provision:

The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners directs staff to strike the matrix and explanatory language (beginning on page 5 where it states "SpringHills may exchange land uses...." including the equivalency matrix on page 6, and ending with the words "trigger the need for a substantial deviation review" at the end of the first paragraph on page 6) and move said matrix and explanatory language to an appendix; and, add text which directs staff to review the matrix and cooperate with the developer, who may submit the matrix and explanatory language as an amendment to the Development Order.

SpringHills may exchange land uses within the development based on the matrix below, provided that the change does not create any of the following conditions: A net increase in total PM peak hour traffic generated by the development; failure of any public facility to meet its adopted level of service standards (as of the date of the land use exchange) or a cumulative net change in any land use category of greater than 5%. Provided, however, nothing in this section shall be construed as an exemption from the substantial deviation requirements of 380.06(19), Florida Statutes. Any proposed changes in location of land uses within this development will be consistent with the Alachua County Comprehensive Land Use Plan. Changes in the development program that are made through this exchange shall be reported individually and cumulatively in the DRI annual report.

For example:

The applicant wishes to exchange 5,000 st of office for hotel rooms. 5,000 sq ft office multiplied by the conversion factor of 3.358 per 1000 sq ft equals 17 hotel rooms (5000*3.358/1000=16.79). Since 5,000 sq ft of office and 17 hotel rooms are less than 5% of their respective approved land uses, the exchange is allowed. If the applicant then proposes to exchange 30 multi-family units for hotel rooms, the exchange is calculated based on the table: 30 multi-family units multiplied by the exchange rate of 1.075 per unit equals 32 hotel rooms (30*1.075/1=32.25). The 30 multi-family units are less than 5% of the allowed multi-family land use, however the 32 hotel rooms, with the previous exchange of 17 hotel rooms (a total of 49 hotel rooms), cumulatively is greater than 5% of the allowed hotel rooms, therefore the 2th exchange proposed would trigger the need for a substantial deviation review.

380.115 Vested rights and duties; effect of size reduction, changes in guidelines and standards.

- (1) A change in a development-of-regional-impact guideline and standard does not abridge or modify any vested or other right or any duty or obligation pursuant to any development order or agreement that is applicable to a development of regional impact. A development that has received a development-of-regional-impact development order pursuant to s. 380,0.6, but is no longer required to undergo development-of-regional-impact review by operation of a change in the guidelines and standards or has reduced its size below the thresholds in s. 380,065, but, shall be governed by the following procedures:
- (a) The development shall continue to be governed by the development-of-regional-impact development order and may be completed in reliance upon and pursuant to the development order unless the developer or landowner has followed the procedures for rescission in paragraph (b). Any proposed changes to those developments which continue to be governed by a development order shall be approved pursuant to s. 380.06(19) as it existed prior to a change in the development-of-regional-impact guidelines and standards, except that all percentage criteria shall be doubled and all other citreria shall be increased by 10 percent. The development-of-regional-impact development order may be enforced by the local government as provided by ss. 380.06(17) and 380.11.
- (b) If requested by the developer or landowner, the development-of-regional-impact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed.
- (2) A development with an application for development approval pending, pursuant to s. 380.06, on the effective date of a change to the guidelines and standards, or a notification of proposed change pending on the effective date of a change to the guidelines and standards, may elect to continue such review pursuant to s. 380.06. At the conclusion of the pending review, including any appeals pursuant to s. 380.07, the resulting development order shall be governed by the provisions of subsection (1).
- (3) A landowner that has filed an application for a development-of-regional-impact review prior to the adoption of an optional sector plan pursuant to s. 163.3245 may elect to have the application reviewed pursuant to s. 380.06, comprehensive plan provisions in force prior to adoption of the sector plan, and any requested comprehensive plan amendments that accompany the application.

380.06 Developments of regional impact.

(29) EXEMPTIONS FOR DENSE URBAN LAND AREAS.

- (a) The following are exempt from this section:
- 1. Any proposed development in a municipality that qualifies as a dense urban land area as defined in s. 163.3164:
- Any proposed development within a county that qualifies as a dense urban land area as
 defined in s. 163.3164 and that is located within an urban service area as defined in
 s.163.3164 which has been adopted into the comprehensive plan; or
- 3. Any proposed development within a county, including the municipalities located therein, which has a population of at least 900,000, which qualifies as a dense urban land area under s. 163.3164, but which does not have an urban service area designated in the comprehensive plan.
- (b) If a municipality that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s. 163.3164 designates any of the following areas in its comprehensive plan, any proposed development within the designated area is exempt from the development-of-regionalimpact process:
- Urban infill as defined in s. 163.3164;
- 2. Community redevelopment areas as defined in s. 163.340;
- 3. Downtown revitalization areas as defined in s. 163.3164;
- 4. Urban infill and redevelopment under s. 163.2517; or
- 5. Urban service areas as defined in s. $\underline{163.3164}$ or areas within a designated urban service boundary under s. $\underline{163.3177}(14)$.
- (c) If a county that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s. <u>163.3164</u> designates any of the following areas in its comprehensive plan, any proposed development within the designated area is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact process:
- 1. Urban infill as defined in s. 163.3164;
- 2. Urban infill and redevelopment under s. 163.2517; or
- 3. Urban service areas as defined in s. 163.3164.
- (d) A development that is located partially outside an area that is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact program must undergo development-of-regional-impact review pursuant to this section.
- (e) In an area that is exempt under paragraphs (a)-(c), any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be governed by s. 380.115(1). A pending application for development approval shall be governed by s. 380.115(2). A development that has a pending application for a comprehensive plan amendment and that elects not to continue development-of-regional-impact review is exempt from the limitation on plan amendments set forth in s. 163.3187(1) for the year following the effective date of the exemption.

Dear Missy:

This firm represents PR Gainesville Limited Partnership, the developer and predominant land owner of properties within the existing approved development of regional impact known as the SpringHills DRI. The property now owned by PR Gainesville Limited Partnership was purchased from the previous developer and owner in 2006.

The purpose of this letter is to request rescission of the existing SpringHills Development of Regional Impact (DRI) development order (Resolution 05-26 attached as Attachment 11).

As you know, legislative action taken by the Florida Legislature and the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners (BOCC) has eliminated the DRI process for properties within the boundaries of the recently approved urban service area which is now part of the County's comprehensive plan. All of the PR Gainesville Limited Partnership SpringHills DRI properties lie within the adopted urban service area.

Section 380.06(29)(c) Florida Statutes provides that any proposed new development within a designated 'urban service area' (as defined in s.163.3164 F.S.) established by a county that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s.163.3264 F.S., is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact process. Chapter 380.06(29)(c) F.S. further provides that in such areas 'any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be 'governed by 's. 380.115(1) Florida Statutes.

Section 380.115 Florida Statutes, among other things, deals with the impact that changes in development-of-regional-impact (DRI) guidelines and standards may have upon a development that has received a DRI development order when the changes are such that the development no longer reaches DRI thresholds. In that situation, the statute provides that the development shall continue to be governed by the DRI development order unless the developer or landowner requests a 'rescission' of the development order. The procedure for rescission is provided in Section 380.115(1)(b) F.S. which states:

> If requested by the developer or landowner, the development-of-regionalimpact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed.

Unlike 'abandonment' of a DRI development order for which a rule exists in the Florida Administrative Code' articulating a prescribed process to be followed, no similar rule exists for 'rescission', notwithstanding the fact that the statutory provision authorizing rescission contained in Section 380.115 F.S. has existed for a long time. Apparently, until recently, there has been little 'rescission' activity in the state so there was little need for rulemaking. Thus, there is no prescribed process beyond what is stated in Section 380.115(1)(b) F.S.. There is no specific form to complete, submittals to provide, list of agencies to notify or forms of notice to provide.

The recent adoption of the 'rescission' provision in Section 380.06(29)(c) F.S. applicable in counties that have adopted urban service areas (and similar provisions for municipalities and counties that are statutorily designated 'dense urban land areas') has generated a fair amount of rescission activity. In the absence of clear direction from the state beyond what is found at Section 380.115(1)(b) F.S. provided above, local governments have been improvising.

A review of information available on the internet and provided to this firm by staff at the Florida Department of Community Affairs (DCA)² reveals that a relatively simple process is being used by local jurisdictions. I am also advised that DCA has no plan to establish by rule any prescribed process to be followed by local jurisdictions. Instead, the agency is only requesting that local jurisdictions that rescind DRI development orders by resolution or ordinance provide the agency with a certified copy of the rescission document.

A review of rescission actions taken by a number of local jurisdictions reveal that the application typically takes the form of a simple letter request from the developer or owner with an explanation of how the request qualifies for rescission under Section 380.115(1)(b) F.S. Often the applicant provides an itemization of applicable mitigation requirements and information showing how each of the mitigation requirements have been satisfied. After a local government staff review to verify that all applicable mitigation requirements are in fact satisfied, local jurisdictions either take the request to an advisory board before bringing it to the governing body or take it directly to the governing body. Upon 'showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed,' the requested

rescission is approved. Once approved, a certified copy of the local government action is provided to DCA. No prior notice to DCA, the regional planning council or neighboring jurisdictions of such rescission action is required. It appears from the examples that I have seen that some jurisdictions provide mailed notice to property owners within the DRI in addition to publication of notice in the newspaper while others only publish a notice in the newspaper.

It appears to me that the notice and public hearing requirements of Section 125.66(4)(b) Florida Statutes is what needs to be followed. It states in relevant part that:

- (b) In cases in which the proposed ordinance or resolution changes the actual list of permitted, conditional, or prohibited uses within a zoning category, or changes the actual zoning map designation of a parcel or parcels of land involving 10 contiguous acres or more, the board of county commissioners shall provide for public notice and hearings as follows:
- 1. The board of county commissioners shall hold two advertised public hearings on the proposed ordinance or resolution. At least one hearing shall be held after 5 p.m. on a weekday, unless the board of county commissioners, by a majority plus one vote, elects to conduct that hearing at another time of day. The first public hearing shall be held at least 7 days after the day that the first advertisement is published. The second hearing shall be held at teast 10 days after the first hearing and shall be advertised at least 5 days prior to the public hearing.
- 2. The required advertisements shall be no less than 2 columns wide by 10 inches long in a standard size or a tabbild size newspaper, and the headline in the advertisement shall be in a type no smaller than 18 point. The advertisement shall not be placed in that portion of the newspaper where legal notices and classified advertisements appear. The advertisement shall be placed in a newspaper of general presidence that portion of general interest and readerfiship in the community pursuant to chapter 50, not one of limited subject matter. It is the legislative intent that, whenever possible, the advertisement shall appear in a newspaper that is published at least 5 days a week unless the only newspaper in the community is published less than 5 days a week. The advertisement shall be in substantially the following form:

NOTICE OF (TYPE OF) CHANGE

The (name of local governmental unit) proposes to adopt the following by ordinance or resolution: (title of ordinance or resolution).

A public hearing on the ordinance or resolution will be held on (date and time) at (meeting place).

Except for amendments which change the actual list of permitted, conditional, or prohibited uses within a zoning category, the advertisement shall contain a geographic location map which clearly indicates the area within the local government covered by the proposed ordinance or resolution. The map shall include major street names as a means of identification of the general area.

3. In lieu of publishing the advertisements set out in this paragraph, the board of county

> commissioners may mail a notice to each person owning real property within the area covered by the ordinance or resolution. Such notice shall clearly explain the proposed ordinance or resolution and shall notify the person of the time, place, and location of both public hearings on the proposed ordinance or resolution.

PR Gainesville Limited Partnership will reimburse the county for all costs associated with whichever form of notice the county determines is necessary and appropriate.

Attached as Attachment 2 is a proposed rescission resolution that has been prepared for your assistance and is modeled after similar rescission ordinances and resolutions being adopted by other Florida local jurisdictions. For further assistance, a draft letter has also been prepared to be used when submitting a certified copy of the approved resolution to DCA following its approval by the BOCC and is attached as Attachment 3.

After rescission of the SpringHills DRI development order, the underlying land use will remain in effect as will all zoning that is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use designations.

This firm has undertaken a careful review of Resolution No. 05-26 to identify all mitigation obligations that have been triggered by the existing development on the property. Following is a description of what was found.

As you know, the DRI has four phases. Below is a table that indicates what development is permitted within each of the four phases. Phase I development has not been completed so most of the mitigation requirements have not been triggered.

Following is a list of mitigation requirements identified in Resolution 05-26 that have not been triggered.

Should the transportation infrastructure be found inadequate to serve the development approved in the Order for Phases III and IV, the applicant/Owner may propose any of the following options:

- Section 4, Paragraph (4), 14. (page 14 of Resolution) Affordable housing reassessment required prior to the 'beginning of Phase III.
- Section 4, Paragraph (5), Recreation requires demonstration that the adopted level of service is met prior to Phases III and IV.
- 4. Section 4, Paragraph (6), Transportation
 - Subparagraph c) on page 18 requires certain mitigation improvements prior to initiation of Phase II.
 - b. Subparagraph d) on page 18 requires mitigation measures at the 'time of issuance of the last construction permit for the following projects: SpringHills Shopping Center Phase I, SpringHills Shopping Center Outparcels (4 outparcels consisting of 2 proposed banks and 2 proposed type A restaurants), the Burger King Restaurant and the Sonnys restaurant, or prior to completion of Phase II, whichever occurs first, the Applicant shall commence or cause to commence construction of an eastbound right turn lane at NW 91st Street/NW 39^{sh} Avenue intersection. The construction of this project must be complete prior to the issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy for the last of the above referenced projects, or the last of the Phase II projects, whichever occurs first.

The four outparcels remain undeveloped and Phase I is not complete so that this mitigation requirement has not been triggered.

- Subparagraph c) on page 18 requires access management modifications to NW 39th avenue in place prior to the completion of Phase II.
- Subparagraph j) on page 21 requires a transportation update and identification of mitigation measures prior to initiation of Phase III.
- e. Subparagraph k) on page 22 requires coordination with Gainesville Regional Transit for expansion of transit routes prior to initiation of Phase II and establishment of a verifiable trip reduction program prior to the initiation of Phase III and provision of a part-time rideshare coordinator prior to completion of Phase III.
- f. Subparagraph I) on page 23 requires that a bikeway and pedestrian circulation system for all of Phase I to be substantially complete prior to initiation of Phase II.
- g. Subparagraph n) on page 23 requires bicycle lockers or racks, transit shelters and parking bays to augment transit service to the site in Phase II and subsequent phases.
- Subparagraph r) on page 25 requires a number of transportation improvements when 1,660 cumulative external pm peak hour trips for Phase II are being generated.
- Section 4, Paragraph (7) Housing on page 27 calls for re-assessment of the cumulative affordable housing impact of the project prior to the initiation of Phases II, III and IV and to determine appropriate mitigation based on identified unmet need.
- Section 4, Paragraph (8) Vegetation and Wildlife on page 29 provides requirements in subparagraph a) and b) which subparagraph c) requires must be met before any land clearing, removal of vegetation or other development activities of Phases II. III and IV shall occur.

The only mitigation requirement identified in Resolution 05-26 that must have been completed by now are the roadway improvements called for in Section 4, Paragraph (6), subparagraph a) on page 17 that the Florida Department of Transportation was to have

constructed before October 1, 2002. All of the improvements have been completed though we are unable to verify that the improvements occurred before October 1, 2002.

Finally, there is an Appendix A to the development order that contains information about Mitigative Measures Proposed by the Applicant that is only provided for "information" purposes. These items are only informational and do not impose any mitigation 'requirements.'

There are no additional provisions contained within Resolution 05-26 that impose mitigation obligations on the owner at this point in the development (i.e., before completion of Phase I).

SECTION 3. That Resolution No. 05-29 is hereby rescinded and shall be of no further force and effect. This rescission of such development order does not affect the effectiveness and requirements of any other developer agreements, county approvals, permits, development orders, zoning or land use approvals.

Prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy for any development for which final development plan approval is hereafter issued for properties previously governed by Resolution No. 05-26 and east of I-75, PR Gainesville shall seek authorization from the Florida Department of Transportation to construct, or have constructed, an eastbound right turn lane at the NW 91st Street and NW 39th Avenue intersection, and if so authorized, make said improvement.
- 3. Impact of the Development. PR Gainesville agrees that the improvements required by this Developer's Agreement are necessary to mitigate impacts to the public road system and that the requirements meet the 'essential nexus' and 'rough proportionality' requirements established by the United States supreme Court in the cases of Nollan v. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to waive any legal rights PR Gainesville might assert regarding any other property owned by PR Gainesville or any development approval being sought by PR Gainesville other than the approvals specifically referenced herein.
- 5. Notices. Except as otherwise provided herein, any notice, acceptance, request, or approval from either party to the other party shall be in writing and sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and shall be deemed to have been received when either deposited in the United States Postal Service mailbox or personally delivered with signed proof of delivery.

WHEREAS, as of the date of this Developer Agreement, there is no mitigation that is currently due, though there is mitigation attributable to approved and constructed development that has not yet been performed; and

WHEREAS, Section 380.06(29)(c) Florida Statutes provides that any proposed development within a designated 'urban service area' (as defined in s.163.3164 F.S.) established by a county that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s.163.3264 F.S., is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact process; and

WHEREAS, Alachua County has designated an 'urban service area' as defined by s. 163.3164 Florida Statutes in its adopted comprehensive plan; and

WHEREAS, the entire Springhills development is within the boundaries of the urban service area; and

WHEREAS, 380.06(29)(e) Florida Statutes provides that within the urban service area 'any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be 'governed by' s. 380.115(1) F.S.; and

WHEREAS, 380.115(1)(b) Florida Statutes provides that upon request of the 'developer or landowner, the development-of-regional-impact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed; and

WHEREAS, the developer and predominate landowner, PR Gainesville has requested rescission of Resolution No. 05-26; and

WHEREAS, in order to assure that development impacts from approved and constructed development are appropriately mitigated, PR Gainesville and Alachua County believe it is in the best interests of the parties and the public that the substance and timing of transportation mitigation requirements are specified in an enforceable developer agreement that is binding on the developer and successors in interest; and

WHEREAS, the County has determined that PR Gainesville's request to rescind the development order, with the conditions and obligations provided for in this Developer Agreement, is consistent with Section 380.115(1)(b), Florida Statutes, and that rescission is appropriate; and

WHEREAS, PR Gainesville has agreed to enter this Developer Agreement for the purpose of ensuring timely provision of said improvements.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and undertakings herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the parties agree as follows:

1. Recitals Incorporated. The above recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein.

2. Transportation System Improvements.

a. Prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy for any development for which final development plan approval is hereafter issued for properties previously governed by Resolution No. 05-26, PR Gainesville shall seek authorization from the Florida Department of Transportation to extend, or have extended, eastbound and westbound left turn lane approaches on NW 39^{th} Avenue at the NW 92^{nd} Court and NW 91^{st} Street intersections, and if so authorized, make said improvements; and

- b. Prior to issuance of a certificate of occupancy for any development for which final development plan approval is hereafter issued for properties previously governed by Resolution No. 05-26 and east of I-75. PR Gainesville shall seek authorization from the Florida Department of Transportation to construct, or have constructed, an eastbound right turn lane at the NW 91st Street and NW 39th Avenue intersection, and if so authorized, make said improvement.
- 3. Impact of the Development. PR Gainesville agrees that the improvements required by this Developer's Agreement are necessary to mitigate impacts to the public road system and that the requirements meet the 'essential nexus' and 'rough proportionality' requirements established by the United States supreme Court in the cases of Nollan v. California Coastal Commission and Dolan v. City of Tigard. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to waive any legal rights PR Gainesville might assert regarding any other property owned by PR Gainesville or any development approval being sought by PR Gainesville other than the approvals specifically referenced herein.
- 4. Burden of Property Owner's Rights. PR Gainesville further agrees that the requirement to construct the transportation improvements set forth in Section 2 above, in no way inordinately burdens an existing use of the property or vested right to a specific use of the property. Nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to waive any legal rights PR Gainesville might assert regarding any other property owned by PR Gainesville or any development approval being sought by PR Gainesville or the than the approvals specifically referenced herein.
- 5. Notices. Except as otherwise provided herein, any notice, acceptance, request, or approval from either party to the other party shall be in writing and sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and shall be deemed to have been received when either deposited in the United States Postal Service mailbox or personally delivered with signed proof of delivery.

This Agreement shall be binding on the parties, and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, legal representatives, successors, and assigns of the parties, and shall be a covenant running with the Property and be binding upon the successors and assigns of the Developer and upon any person, firm, corporation, or entity who may become the successor in interest to the Property.
- 7. Entire Agreement: This document incorporates and includes all prior negotiations, correspondence, conversations, agreements or understandings applicable to the matters contained herein and parties agree that there are no commitments, agreements or understandings concerning the subject matter of this Agreement that are not contained in this document.
- 8. Amendments. It is further agreed that no modification, amendment or alteration in the terms or conditions contained herein shall be effective unless contained in a written document executed with the same formality.
- 9. Compliance with all Requirements. Nothing contained herein shall relieve PR Gainesville or its successors or assigns from obtaining any local, regional, state, or federal permits, or compliance with any applicable ordinances, laws, rules, or regulations necessary for the development of any of its properties previously governed by Resolution 05-26.
- 10. Annexation. This Agreement is not intended to be, and indeed is not, a "development agreement" within the meaning of Section 163.3220-163.3243, F.S. The parties shall not be deprived of their rights and obligations, and this Agreement shall not be terminated, modified, or affected, by operation of a municipal annexation of any portion of the Property.

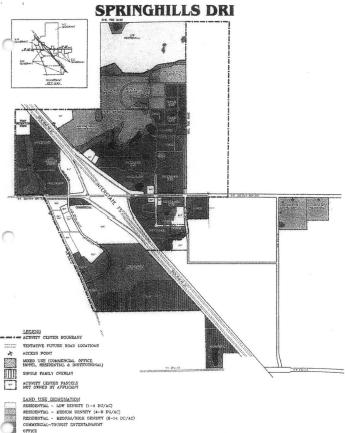

380.115 Vested rights and duties; effect of size reduction, changes in guidelines and standards.

- (1) A change in a development-of-regional-impact guideline and standard does not abridge or modify any vested or other right or any duty or obligation pursuant to any development order or agreement that is applicable to a development of regional impact. A development that has received a development-of-regional-impact development order pursuant to s. 380.06, but is no longer required to undergo development-of-regional-impact review by operation of a change in the guidelines and standards or has reduced its size below the thresholds in s. 380.065, but is hall be governed by the following procedures:
- (a) The development shall continue to be governed by the development-of-regional-impact development order and may be completed in reliance upon and pursuant to the development order unless the developer or landowner has followed the procedures for rescission in paragraph (b). Any proposed changes to those developments which continue to be governed by a development order shall be approved pursuant to s. 380.06(19) as it existed prior to a change in the development-of-regional-impact guidelines and standards, except that all percentage criteria shall be doubled and all other citreria shall be increased by 10 percent. The development-of-regional-impact development order may be enforced by the local government as provided by ss. 380.06(17) and 380.11.
- (b) If requested by the developer or landowner, the development-of-regional-impact development order shall be rescinded by the local government having jurisdiction upon a showing that all required mitigation related to the amount of development that existed on the date of rescission has been completed.
- (2) A development with an application for development approval pending, pursuant to s. 380.06, on the effective date of a change to the guidelines and standards, or a notification of proposed change pending on the effective date of a change to the guidelines and standards, may elect to continue such review pursuant to s. 380.06. At the conclusion of the pending review, including any appeals pursuant to s. 380.07, the resulting development order shall be governed by the provisions of subsection (1).
- (3) A landowner that has filed an application for a development-of-regional-impact review prior to the adoption of an optional sector plan pursuant to s. 163.3245 may elect to have the application reviewed pursuant to s. 380.06, comprehensive plan provisions in force prior to adoption of the sector plan, and any requested comprehensive plan amendments that accompany the application.

380.06 Developments of regional impact.

(29) EXEMPTIONS FOR DENSE URBAN LAND AREAS.

- (a) The following are exempt from this section:
- 1. Any proposed development in a municipality that qualifies as a dense urban land area as defined in s. $\underline{163.3164}$;
- Any proposed development within a county that qualifies as a dense urban land area as
 defined in s. 163.3164 and that is located within an urban service area as defined in
 s.163.3164 which has been adopted into the comprehensive plan; or
- Any proposed development within a county, including the municipalities located therein, which has a population of at least 900,000, which qualifies as a dense urban land area under s. 163.3164, but which does not have an urban service area designated in the comprehensive plan.
- (b) If a municipality that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s. 163.3164 designates any of the following areas in its comprehensive plan, any proposed development within the designated area is exempt from the development-of-regionalimpact process:
- 1. Urban infill as defined in s. 163.3164;
- 2. Community redevelopment areas as defined in s. 163.340;
- Downtown revitalization areas as defined in s. 163.3164;
- 4. Urban infill and redevelopment under s. 163.2517; or
- 5. Urban service areas as defined in s. $\underline{163.3164}$ or areas within a designated urban service boundary under s. $\underline{163.3177}(14)$.
- (c) If a county that does not qualify as a dense urban land area pursuant to s. 163.3164 designates any of the following areas in its comprehensive plan, any proposed development within the designated area is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact process:
- Urban infill as defined in s. <u>163.3164</u>;
- 2. Urban infill and redevelopment under s. 163.2517; or
- Urban service areas as defined in s. 163.3164.
- (d) A development that is located partially outside an area that is exempt from the development-of-regional-impact program must undergo development-of-regional-impact review pursuant to this section.
- (e) In an area that is exempt under paragraphs (a)-(c), any previously approved development-of-regional-impact development orders shall continue to be effective, but the developer has the option to be governed by s. 380.115(1). A pending application for development approval shall be governed by s. 380.115(2). A development that has a pending application for a comprehensive plan amendment and that elects not to continue development-of-regional-impact review is exempt from the limitation on plan amendments set forth in s. 163.3182(1) for the year following the effective date of the exemption.

163.3164 Local Government Comprehensive Planning and Land Development Regulation Act; definitions.—As used in this act:

- (1) "Administration Commission" means the Governor and the Cabinet, and for purposes of this chapter the commission shall act on a simple majority vote, except that for purposes of imposing the sanctions provided in s. 163,3184(11), affirmative action shall require the
 - approval of the Governor and at least three other members of the commission.
- (2) "Area" or "area of jurisdiction" means the total area qualifying under the provisions of this act, whether this be all of the lands lying within the limits of an incorporated municipality, lands in and adjacent to incorporated municipalities, all unincorporated lands within a county, or areas comprising combinations of the lands in incorporated municipalities and unincorporated areas of counties.
- (3) "Coastal area" means the 35 coastal counties and all coastal municipalities within their boundaries designated coastal by the state land planning agency.
- (4) "Comprehensive plan" means a plan that meets the requirements of ss. <u>163.3177</u> and <u>163.3178</u>.
- (5) "Developer" means any person, including a governmental agency, undertaking any development as defined in this act.
- (6) "Development" has the meaning given it in s. 380.04.
- (7) "Development order" means any order granting, denying, or granting with conditions an application for a development permit.
- (8) "Development permit" includes any building permit, zoning permit, subdivision approval, rezoning, certification, special exception, variance, or any other official action of local government having the effect of permitting the development of land.
- (9) "Governing body" means the board of county commissioners of a county, the commission or council of an incorporated municipality, or any other chief governing body of a unit of local government, however designated, or the combination of such bodies where joint utilization of the provisions of this act is accomplished as provided herein.
- (10) "Governmental agency" means:
 - (a) The United States or any department, commission, agency, or other instrumentality thereof.
 - (b) This state or any department, commission, agency, or other instrumentality thereof.
- (c) Any local government, as defined in this section, or any department, commission, agency, or other instrumentality thereof.
- (d) Any school board or other special district, authority, or governmental entity.
- (11) "Land" means the earth, water, and air, above, below, or on the surface, and includes any improvements or structures customarily regarded as land.
- (12) "Land use" means the development that has occurred on the land, the development that is proposed by a developer on the land, or the use that is permitted or permissible on the land under an adopted comprehensive plan or element or portion thereof, land development regulations, or a land development code, as the context may indicate.
- (13) "Local government" means any county or municipality.
- (14) "Local planning agency" means the agency designated to prepare the comprehensive plan or plan amendments required by this act.
- (15) A "newspaper of general circulation" means a newspaper published at least on a weekly basis and printed in the language most commonly spoken in the area within which it circulates, but does not include a newspaper intended primarily for members of a particular professional or occupational group, a newspaper whose primary function is to carry legal notices, or a newspaper that is given away primarily to distribute advertising.
- (16) "Parcel of land" means any quantity of land capable of being described with such definiteness that its locations and boundaries may be established, which is desided by its owner or developer as land to be used, or developed as, a unit or which has been used or developed as a unit.

- (17) "Person" means an individual, corporation, governmental agency, business trust, estate, trust, partnership, association, two or more persons having a joint or common interest. or any other legal entity.
- (18) "Public notice" means notice as required by s. 125.66(2) for a county or by s. 166.041(3)(a) for a municipality. The public notice procedures required in this part are established as minimum public notice procedures.
- (19) "Regional planning agency" means the agency designated by the state land planning agency to exercise responsibilities under law in a particular region of the state.
- (20) "State land planning agency" means the Department of Community Affairs.
- (21) "Structure" has the meaning given it by s. 380.031(19).
- (22) "Land development regulation commission" means a commission designated by a local government to develop and recommend, to the local governing body, land development regulations which implement the adopted comprehensive plan and to review land development regulations, or amendments thereto, for consistency with the adopted plan and report to the governing body regarding its findings. The responsibilities of the land development regulation commission may be performed by the local planning agency.
- (23) "Land development regulations" means ordinances enacted by governing bodies for the regulation of any aspect of development and includes any local government zoning, rezoning, subdivision, building construction, or sign regulations or any other regulations controlling the development of land, except that this definition shall not apply in s. 163,3213.
- (24) "Public facilities" means major capital improvements, including, but not limited to, transportation, sanitary sewer, solid waste, drainage, potable water, educational, parks and recreational, and health systems and facilities, and spoil disposal sites for maintenance dredging located in the intracoastal waterways, except for spoil disposal sites owned or used by ports listed in s. 403.021(9)(b).
- (25) "Downtown revitalization" means the physical and economic renewal of a central business district of a community as designated by local government, and includes both downtown development and redevelopment.
- (26) "Urban redevelopment" means demolition and reconstruction or substantial renovation of existing buildings or infrastructure within urban infill areas, existing urban service areas, or community redevelopment areas created pursuant to part III.
- (27) "Urban infill" means the development of vacant parcels in otherwise built-up areas where public facilities such as sewer systems, roads, schools, and recreation areas are already in place and the average residential density is at least five dwelling units per acre, the average nonresidential intensity is at least a floor area ratio of 1.0 and vacant, developable land does not constitute more than 10 percent of the area.
- (28) "Projects that promote public transportation" means projects that directly affect the provisions of public transit, including transit terminals, transit lines and routes, separate lanes for the exclusive use of public transit services, transit stops (shelters and stations), office buildings or projects that include fixed-rail or transit terminals as part of the building, and projects which are transit oriented and designed to complement reasonably proximate planned or existing public facilities.
- (29) "Urban service area" means built-up areas where public facilities and services, including, but not limited to, central water and sewer capacity and roads, are already in place or are committed in the first 3 years of the capital improvement schedule. In addition, for counties that qualify as dense urban land areas under subsection (34), the nonrural area of a county which has adopted into the county charter a rural area designation or areas identified in the comprehensive plan as urban service areas or urban growth boundaries on or before July 1, 2009, are also urban service areas under this definition.
- (30) "Transportation corridor management" means the coordination of the planning of designated future transportation corridors with land use planning within and adjacent to the

corridor to promote orderly growth, to meet the concurrency requirements of this chapter, and to maintain the integrity of the corridor for transportation purposes.

- (31) "Optional sector plan" means an optional process authorized by s. 163.3245 in which one or more local governments by agreement with the state land planning agency are allowed to address development-of-regional-impact issues within certain designated geographic areas identified in the local comprehensive plan as a means of fostering innovative planning and development strategies in s. 163.3177(11)(a) and (b), furthering the purposes of this part and part I of chapter 380, reducing overlapping data and analysis requirements, protecting regionally significant resources and facilities, and addressing extraiurisdictional impacts.
- (32) "Financial feasibility" means that sufficient revenues are currently available or will be available from committed funding sources for the first 3 years, or will be available from committed or planned funding sources for years 4 and 5, of a 5-year capital improvement schedule for financing capital improvements, such as ad valorem taxes, bonds, state and federal funds, tax revenues, impact fees, and developer contributions, which are adequate to fund the projected costs of the capital improvements identified in the comprehensive plan necessary to ensure that adopted level-of-service standards are achieved and maintained within the period covered by the 5-year schedule of capital improvements. A comprehensive plan shall be deemed financially feasible for transportation and school facilities throughout the planning period addressed by the capital improvements schedule if it can be demonstrated that the level-of-service standards will be achieved and maintained by the end of the planning period even if in a particular year such improvements are not concurrent as required by s. 163.3180.
- (33) "Agricultural enclave" means an unincorporated, undeveloped parcel that:
 - (a) Is owned by a single person or entity;
 - (b) Has been in continuous use for bona fide agricultural purposes, as defined by s. 193.461, for a period of 5 years prior to the date of any comprehensive plan amendment application;
 - (c) Is surrounded on at least 75 percent of its perimeter by:
 - Property that has existing industrial, commercial, or exidential development; or 2. Property that the local government has designated, in the local government's comprehensive plan, zoning map, and future land use map, as land that is to be developed for industrial, commercial, or residential purposes, and at least 75 percent of such property is existing industrial, commercial, or residential development;
 - (d) Has public services, including water, wastewater, transportation, schools, and recreation facilities, available or such public services are scheduled in the capital improvement element to be provided by the local government or can be provided by an alternative provider of local government infrastructure in order to ensure consistency with applicable concurrency provisions of s. 163.3180; and
 - (e) Does not exceed 1,280 acres; however, if the property is surrounded by existing or authorized residential development that will result in a density at buildout of at least 1,000 residents per square mile, then the area shall be determined to be urban and the parcel may not exceed 4,480 acres.
- (34) "Dense urban land area" means:
 - (a) A municipality that has an average of at least 1,000 people per square mile of land area and a minimum total population of at least 5,000;
 - (b) A county, including the municipalities located therein, which has an average of at least 1,000 people per square mile of land area; or
 - (c) A county, including the municipalities located therein, which has a population of at least 1 million.

The Office of Economic and Demographic Research within the Legislature shall annually calculate the population and density criteria needed to determine which jurisdictions qualify as dense urban land

areas by using the most recent land area data from the decennial census conducted by the Bureau of the Census of the United States Department of Commerce and the latest available population estimates determined pursuant to s. 186.901. If any local government has had an annexation, contraction, or new incorporation, the Office of Economic and Demographic Research shall determine the population density using the new jurisdictional boundaries as recorded in accordance withs . 171.091. The Office of Economic and Demographic Research shall submit to the state land planning agency a list of jurisdictions that meet the total population and density criteria necessary for designation as a dense urban land area by July 1, 2009, and every year thereafter. The state land planning agency shall publish the list of jurisdictions on its Internet website within 7 days after the list is received. The designation of jurisdictions that qualify or do not qualify as a dense urban land area is effective upon publication on the state land plannina gency's Internet website.

FY10 Annual Report of the Alachua County Fair Housing/Human Rights Board

To: The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners

The Alachua County Human Rights Ordinance, Chapter 111 of County Code, prohibits discrimination in employment, housing and public accommodations, based on race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marial status or disability (and familial status in Jousing complaints). The Equal Opportunity (EO) Division investigates discrimination complaints and presents a final investigative report to the Fair Housing/Human Rights Board (the board) which is appointed by the County Commission. Based on the results of the investigation, the board renders a determination as on whether or not there is sufficient evidence that a violation of the Human Rights Ordinance has occurred. Jurisdiction is the unincorporated areas of Alachua County, and does not include other governmental entities such as the City of Gainesville, University of Florida, the Alachua County School Board, or Constitutional Officers.

Fair Housing/Human Rights Board FY10 Work-Plan

The board's main objective is to review and make determinations on formal complaints of discrimination and to assist in public education and outreach efforts under the Human Rights Ordinance.

Summary of Activity

During the fiscal year, October 1, 2009 through September 30, 2010, the EO Division received 119 intakes (requests for information, technical assistance or to file a discrimination complaint. Of the 119 intakes, 83 involved employment, 11 involved housing, 6 involved public accommodations, 15 involved public service issues and 4 involved small business enterprises. 30 clients were formally counseled regarding complaint resolution and filing options. Technical assistance was provided where appropriate to help resolve complaints informally or to refer to the appropriate external agencies.

Formal Investigations (Unincorporated Areas of Alachua County)

Two complaints of discrimination against local employers were formally investigated by the EO Division and closed with a determination of no probable cause.

Complaint Referrals (Non-jurisdictional Complaints)

The EO Division provides technical assistance to citizens with non-jurisdictional complaints. This includes helping to properly frame the complaint and complete the required paperwork for referral to the appropriate state or federal agency. EO staff also provides assistance as requested to review the response from the state or federal agencies and provide guidance on the investigative process.

During the past fiscal year, 6 complaints were referred to the Florida Commission on Human Relations (FCHR). All 6 were employment complaints. The status of the 6 complaints is shown in the table below:

- Conducted ADA training for the local chapter of Society of Human Resources Managers (SHRM) on July 8, 2010.
- Partnered with the City of Gainesville to present the highly successful first annual
 Gainesville-Alachua County Employment Law Seminar for public and private employers.
 Over 100 people participated and the evaluations rated the conference as "Excellent".
 Speakers included employment law attorneys and representatives from the EEOC, the
 University of Florida, Alachua County and City of Gainesville.
- Promoted the services of the office by participating in:
 - Census Awareness Day in March.
 - The 5th Avenue Arts Festival in April.
 - The HR Career Expo in April.

WITNESSETH

Whereas, the County desires to employ the Contractor to provide re-roofing services for the Alachua County Supervisor of Elections Warehouse located at 915 SE 5th Street, Gainesville, FL (The 'Project'); and,

Whereas, the Contractor is qualified to provide these services

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

 <u>Term</u>. This agreement is effective on the date first written above and continuing through completion of the Project as detailed on the issued Notice to Proceed (Exhibit 1) unless earlier terminated as provided herein.

The County's performance and obligation to pay under this agreement is contingent upon a specific annual appropriation by the Board of County Commissioners. The parties hereto understand that this Agreement is not a commitment of future appropriations.

- <u>Duties of the Contractor</u>. The Contractor shall have and perform the following duties, obligations, and responsibilities to the County As provided in Attachment "A"
- 3. <u>Representations and Warranties</u>. By executing this Agreement, the Contractor makes the following express representations and warranties:
 - 3.1. The Contractor is a professional qualified to perform the services described.
 - 3.2. The Contractor warrants all the work performed by the Contractor is adequate and sufficient to meet the requirements and accomplish the purposes of the agreement.
 - 3.3. The Contractor acknowledges that the County's review of the work performed in no way diminishes the Contractor's warranty pertaining to the work performed,
- 4. <u>Method of Payment</u>. For all services actually, timely and faithfully performed, the Contractor will be paid as follows:

- 4.1. The Contractor shall be paid a sum not to exceed \$Eighteen Thousand nine hundred ninety seven DOLLARS (\$ 18,997.00), for the contract term, allocated in the following manner:
- 4.1.1. Payment will be made in accordance with the Schedule of Values attached hereto (Attachment A)
- 4.2. As a condition precedent for any payment, the Contractor shall submit an invoice to the County requesting payment for services properly rendered and expenses due upon acceptable completion of the Project. The Contractor's invoice shall describe with reasonable particularity each service rendered, the date thereof. The Contractor's invoice shall be accompanied by such documentation or data in support of expenses for which payment is sought as the County may require. Each invoice shall constitute the Contractor's representation to the County that the services indicated in the invoice have reached the level stated, have been properly and timely performed as required herein, that the expenses included in the invoice have been reasonably incurred in accordance with this Contract, that all services provided have served a public purpose, that all obligations of the Contractor covered by prior invoices have been paid in full, and that the amount requested is currently due and owing, there being no reason known to the Contractor that payment of any portion thereof should be withheld. Submission of the Contractor's invoice for final payment shall further constitute the Contractor's representation to the County that, upon receipt by the County of the amount invoiced, all obligations of the Contractor to others, including its consultants, incurred in connection with the Project, will be paid in full. The Contractor shall submit invoices to the County at the following address:

- 4.4. No Additional reimbursable expenses will be paid under this Agreement.
- Duties of the County. The County shall have and perform the following duties, obligations, and responsibilities to the Contractor: Provide access to Project site
- 6. Notice. Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement any notice of default or termination from either party to the other party must be in writing and sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, or by personal delivery with receipt. For purposes of all notices,

7. Default and Termination.

7.1. The failure of the Contractor to comply with any provision of this Contract will place the Contractor in default. Prior to terminating the Contract, the County will notify the Contractor in writing. This notification will make specific reference to the provision which gave rise to the default. The County will give the Contractor seven (7) days to cure the default. The Facilities Manager is authorized to provide written notice of default on behalf of the County, and if the default situation is not corrected within the allotted time the Administrative Services Director is authorized to provide final termination notice on behalf of the County to the Contractor.

and

7.2. The County may also terminate the Contract without cause by providing written notice to the Contractor. The County Manager is authorized to provide written notice of termination on behalf of the County. Upon such notice, Contractor will immediately discontinue all services affected (unless the notice directs otherwise); and, deliver to the County all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimate, summaries, and such other information and materials as may have been accumulated by the Contractor in performing this Agreement, whether completed or in process. In the event of such termination for convenience, Contractor's recovery against County shall be limited to that portion of the Contract amount earned through the date of termination, but Contractor shall not be entitled to any other or further recovery against County, including, but not limited to, damages, consequential or special damages, or any anticipated fees or profit on portions of the work not performed.

7.3. If funds to finance this Contract become unavailable, the County may terminate the Contract with no less than twenty-four hours notice in writing to the Contractor. The County will be the final authority as to the availability of funds. The County will pay the Contractor for all work completed prior to any notice of termination.

9. Project Records.

- 9.1. For a period of five (5) years, or fifteen (15) years if related to a capital improvement project, after the completion of all work to be performed, or as required by Chapter 119, Florida Statutes (Public Records Act) and schedules published by the Florida Bureau of Archives and Records Management, or federal requirements, whichever period is greater, the Contractor shall keep and make available to the County for inspection and copying, upon written request by the County, all records in Contractor's possession relating to the Agreement. Additionally, the Contractor shall make said records available, upon written request by the County, to any state, federal, or other regulatory authority, and any such authority may review, inspect and copy said records unless exemnted under Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.
- 9.2. Any document submitted to the County may be a public record and is open for inspection or copying by any person or entity. "Public records" are defined as all documents, papers, letters, maps, books, tapes, photographs, films, sound recordings, data processing software, or other material, regardless of the physical form, characteristics, or means of transmission, made or received pursuant to law or ordinance or in connection with the transaction of official business by any agency. Section 119.011(11), Florida Statutes. Any document is subject to inspection and copying unless exempted under Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.
- 9.3. During the term of this Agreement or license, Contractor may claim that some or all of Contractor's information, including, but not limited to, software, documentation, manuals, written methodologies and processes, pricing, discounts, or other considerations (hereafter collectively referred to as "Confidential Information"), is, or has been treated as, confidential and proprietary by Contractor in accordance with Section 812.081, Florida Statutes, or other law, and is exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act. Contractor shall clearly identify and mark Confidential Information as "Confidential Information" or "CI" and the County shall use its best efforts to maintain the confidentiality of the information properly identified by the Contractor as "Confidential Information" or "CI".
- 9.4. The County shall promptly notify the Contractor in writing of any request received by the County for disclosure of Contractor's Confidential Information and the Contractor may assert any exemption from disclosure available under applicable law or seek a protective order against disclosure from a court of competent jurisdiction. Contractor shall protect, defend, indemnify, and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any claims or judgments arising out of a request for disclosure of Confidential Information. Contractor shall investigate, handle, respond to, and defend, using counsel chosen by the County, at Contractor's sole cost and expense, any such claim is groundless, false, or fraudulent. Contractor shall pay for all costs and expenses related to such claim, including, but not limited to,

- payment of attorney fees, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses. Upon completion of this Agreement or license, the provisions of this paragraph shall continue to survive. Contractor releases County from claims or damages related to disclosure by County.
- 10. <u>Insurance</u>. The Contractor will procure and maintain insurance throughout the entire term of this Agreement of the types and in the minimum amounts detailed in Attachment "B"
- Permits. The Contractor will obtain and pay for all necessary permits, permit application fees, licenses or any fees required.
- 12. <u>Laws & Regulations</u>. The Contractor will comply with all laws, ordinances, regulations, and building code requirements applicable to the work required by this Agreement. The Contractor is presumed to be familiar with all state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations that may in any way affect the work outlined in this Agreement. If the Contractor is not familiar with state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations, the Contractor remains liable for any violation and all subsequent damages or fines.

13. Indemnification.

- 13.1. The Contractor agrees to protect, defend, indemnify, and hold the County and director and their officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any and all losses, penalties, damages, settlements, costs, charges, professional fees or other expenses or liabilities of every kind and character arising out of or directly or indirectly relating to any and all claims, liens, demands, obligations, actions, proceedings or causes of action of every kind and character in connection with or arising directly or indirectly out of this Agreement and/or the performance hereof. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any and all such claims, etc., including but not limited to personal injury, death, damage to property (including destruction) defects in materials or workmanship, actual or alleged infringement of any patent, trademark, copyright (or application for any thereof) or of any other tangible or intangible personal or property right, or any actual or alleged violation of any applicable statute, ordinance, administrative order, rule, or regulation or decree of any court, shall be included in the indemnity hereunder. The contractor further agrees to investigate, handle, respond to, provide defense (including payment of attorney fees, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses up to and including any appeal) for and defend any such claim at its sole cost and expense through counsel chosen by the County and agrees to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto, even if they (claims, etc.) are groundless, false, or fraudulent. Contractor agrees that indemnification of the County shall extend to any and all work performed by the Contractor, its subcontractors, employees agents, servants or assigns. This obligation shall in no way be limited in any nature whatsoever by any limitation on the amount or type of Contractor's insurance coverage. This indemnification provision shall survive the termination of the Contract between the County and the Contractor.
- 13.2. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by the County of sovereign immunity or the provisions of §768.28, Florida Statutes.

- 14. Assignment of Interest. The Professional and County recognize that in actual economic practice, overcharges resulting from antitrust violations are in fact usually borne by the County. Therefore, the Professional hereby assigns to the County any and all claims for such overcharges as to goods, material or services purchased in connection with the Agreement. However, for all other assignments, neither party will assign, convey, piedge, sublet, transfer or otherwise dispose any interest in this Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in same without prior written consent of the other party.
- 15. <u>Successors and Assigns</u>. The County and Contractor each bind the other and their respective successors and assigns in all respects to all of the terms, conditions, covenants, and provisions of this Agreement
- 16. Independent Contractor. In the performance of this Agreement, the Contractor is acting in the capacity of an independent contractor and not as an agent, employee, partner, joint venturer, or associate of the County. The Contractor is solely responsible for the means, method, technique, sequence, and procedure utilized by the Contractor in the full performance of the agreement.
- 17. <u>Collusion</u>. By signing this Agreement, the Contractor declares that this Agreement is made without any previous understanding, agreement, or connections with any persons, contractors or corporations and that this Agreement is fair, and made in good faith without any outside control. collusion. or fraud.
- 18. <u>Conflict of Interest</u>. The Contractor warrants that it nor any of its employees have any financial or personal interest that conflicts with the execution of this Agreement. The Contractor shall notify the County of any conflict of interest due to any other clients, contracts, or property interests.
- Third Party Beneficiaries. This agreement does not create any relationship with, or any rights in favor of, any third party.
- Severability. If any provision of this Agreement is declared void by a court of law, all
 other provisions will remain in full force and effect
- Non Waiver. The failure of any party to exercise any right in this Agreement shall not be considered a waiver of such right.
- 22. Governing Law and Venue. This agreement is governed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida. Venue shall be in Alachua County.
- 23. <u>Attachments</u>. All exhibits attached to this Agreement are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement by reference.
- 24. <u>Amendments</u>. The parties may amend this Agreement only by mutual written agreement of the parties.

- 25. <u>Captions and Section Headings</u>. Captions and section headings used herein are for convenience only and shall not be used in construing this Agreement.
- 26. <u>Construction</u>. This agreement shall not be construed more strictly against one party than against the other merely by virtue of the fact that it may have been prepared by one of the parties. It is recognized that both parties have substantially contributed to the preparation of this Agreement.
- 27. <u>Counterparts</u>. This agreement may be executed in any number of and by the different parties hereto on separate counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument
- 28. Entire Agreement. This agreement constitutes the entire agreement and supercedes all prior written or oral agreements, understandings, or representations.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA AND THE UNIVERSITY OF FLORIDA BOARD OF TRUSTEES EOR

SYSTEM MEDICAL DIRECTOR SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered by and between Alachua County, a charter county and political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "County", and The University of Florida Board of Trustees, for the benefit of the Department of Emergency Medicine, College of Medicine, University of Florida, hereinafter referred to as "University".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties executed an agreement dated July 1, 2005, for system medical director services and wish to replace that agreement, effective October 1, 2010; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY operates the county-wide emergency medical services system that provides advanced life support services; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY coordinates all ground pre-hospital emergency medical services in Alachua County. Florida: and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to coordinate the emergency medical services provided by Alachua County Department of Public Safety and any certified agency approved as set forth herein, by contracting for System Medical Director services; and

WHEREAS, UNIVERSITY desires to arrange for an appropriately qualified and experienced physician who is a Florida licensed physician Board Certified in Emergency Medicine to provide services as the System Medical Director to COUNTY and to any certified agency approved by COUNTY and COUNTY's System Medical Director to provide emergency medical services: and WHEREAS, COUNTY desires to utilize the talents and background of the physician provided by UNIVERSITY as the System Medical Director in supervising the pre-hospital emergency care provided to the citizens of Alachua County, Florida;

NOW. THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. UNIVERSITY shall assign a physician having substantial expertise and experience in the field of emergency medicine and demonstrated experience in pre-hospital care, and who is Board Certified in Emergency Medicine with strong preference for Fellowship in Emergency Medical Services and holds an ACLS certificate of completion to assume the designated role of System Medical Director ("System Medical Director") hereunder. The assigned System Medical Director shall provide System Medical Director Services as required by Chapter 401, Florida Statutes (1992) and Chapter 64E-2, Florida Administrative Code, to Alachua County Department of Public Safety ("DPS") and any certified agency approved by COUNTY and the System Medical Director to provide emercency medical services.
- 2. The COUNTY and UNIVERSITY agree to consult for the purposes of identifying a qualified physician acceptable to COUNTY to serve as System Medical Director. UNIVERSITY warrants that no physician shall be assigned as the System Medical Director without COUNTY's express written consent. As mutually agreed upon by the parties, the UNIVERSITY may assign additional physician(s) to assist the System Medical Director in the provision of services specified herein. The parties agree that the System Medical Director, and any other assigned University physician, as employees/agents of UNIVERSITY, shall provide all services required pursuant to the terms of this Agreement under UNIVERSITY's exclusive supervision and control. The specific duties of the System Medical Director shall be as follows:
 - a. Shall be responsible for providing direct medical orders via telephone and/or radio communications to emergency medical technicians (EMTs), paramedics, AED operators and first responders involved with pre-hospital patient care, to resolve problems, system conflicts, and provide services in an emergency as that term is defined by Section 252.34(2). Florida Statutes.
 - b. Serve as liaison for COUNTY to the Alachua County Medical Society for the purpose of advising and keeping them informed as to current medical care protocols

and patient transport protocols of the DPS.

- c. Coordinate with approved educational programs to make provisions for EMTs and paramedics to receive the appropriate training and experience as required, including assistance in the emergency medical services educational program by providing qualified instructors and arranging for appropriate clinical training to maintain the medical competency of the paramedics and EMTs.
- d. Consider and provide authorization and approval for a qualified physician
 to provide additional medical direction to the Gainesville Fire-Rescue Department as
 contracted by the City of Gainesville, Florida.
- e. Approve authorization for use and responsibility for a set of medically correct procedures known as medical care protocols for the DPS and any other agency approved by COUNTY and COUNTY's System Medical Director to perform advanced life support, basic life support, AED and first responder services. These medical care protocols will allow emergency medical service providers to properly manage certain medical emergencies, including dispatch protocols, on-scene patient care, and treatment and transportation of the sick or injured when voice communications with a physician are not available. The System Medical Director shall provide approved medical care protocols and require that these protocols are utilized by all agencies that are authorized by COUNTY to provide emergency medical services in Alachua County and shall, on at least an annual basis, review the medical care protocols and provide recommendations to COUNTY for improving the medical care protocols.
- f. Provide medical supervision for paramedics, EMTs, AED operators and first responders from any certified agency approved by COUNTY and COUNTY's System Medical Director to require these paramedics, EMTs, AED operators and first responders to become familiar with and maintain compliance with applicable statutes, rules, standing operating procedures, and medical care protocols, and the application of emergency medical procedures.
 - g. Determine the minimum requirements that all EMTs and paramedics must

meet prior to receiving clearance to perform as an "EMT" or "Paramedic."

- h. Report to COUNTY and to the Florida Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services any EMT or paramedic deemed, in the opinion of the System Medical Director, to be incompetent in the performance of his or her duties.
- Respond to medically related inquiries arising from on-the-job activities of EMTs, AED operators, paramedics, and first responders.
- j. Assist with development and ongoing review of a patient care quality assurance and quality improvement program by prompt review of run reports and direct observation of personnel. All agencies providing emergency medical services shall be responsible for providing the System Medical Director with a monthly quality assurance report.
- k. The System Medical Director shall be present a minimum of forty eight (48) hours per month performing the responsibilities as outlined in this Agreement. Of the total hours per month, a minimum of twenty four (24) hours shall be on-site supervision of personnel.
- I. Attend the State of Florida Emergency Medical Services Medical Directors' quarterly meetings. Membership dues and travel shall be provided by COUNTY, and travel shall be paid in accordance with Section 112.061, Florida Statutes. Travel arrangements shall be pre-approved by COUNTY.
- m. Assist with developing and implementing a System Standard of Care which includes the following:
 - (1) "Input standards" which include, but are not limited to, personnel certification requirements, in-service training requirements, equipment specifications, on-board inventory requirements, and other requirements that the system must fulfill before receipt of a request for service;

- (2) "Performance standards" which include, but are not limited to, priority dispatching protocols and pre-arrival instructions, medical protocols, response time standards, protocols governing authority for on-scene control of patient care, and other performance specifications describing how the system should behave upon receipt of a request for service; and
- (3) "Outcome standards" which include, but are not limited to, target survival rates for certain narrowly defined presenting problems or presumptive diagnoses, such as witnessed cardiac arrests involving patients whose medical histories meet defined criteria. Outcome standards are results the system intends to achieve by meeting its input and performance standards.
- n. Provide proof of current registration, either individually or through a
 hospital, with the U.S. Department of Justice, DEA, to provide controlled substances to
 the emergency medical services provider.
- Ensure and certify that security procedures for medications, fluids, and controlled substances are in compliance with Chapters 499 and 893, Florida Statutes.
 - Specify medication and equipment substitutions in writing.
- q. Notify the Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services in writing of equipment and medication substitutes and when the use of telemetry is not necessary.
- r. Assume responsibility through protocols for the "Emergency Medical Dispatch" system, which includes, but is not limited to, priority dispatching procedures, pre-arrival instructions, response codes, and response guidelines.
- s. Assume responsibility through protocol for the authorization of: 1) the use by an EMT of an automatic or semi-automatic defibrillator; 2) the performance of esophageal intubation by an EMT; and 3) on routine inter-facility transports, the monitoring and maintenance of non-medicated I.V.s by an EMT. The System Medical

Director shall ensure that the EMT is trained to perform these procedures; establish written protocols for the performance of these procedures; and shall provide written evidence to the Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services; and document compliance with these provisions.

- t. Identify the training and experience necessary for paramedics to acquire desired skills and knowledge and the specific medical skills and knowledge which paramedics must possess to achieve the desired level and standard of care.
- u. Coordinate with approved educational programs to make provisions for EMTs and paramedics to receive the appropriate training and experience as required, including assistance in the emergency medical services educational programs by providing qualified instructors and arranging for appropriate clinical training to maintain the medical competency of the paramedics and EMTs. Develop a thirty (30) hour EMT refresher course that meets or exceeds the current Department of Transportation (DOT) EMT and/or paramedic Refresher Training Program which shall include an additional two (2) hours of AIDS/HIV training (thirty-two (32) hours total).
- v. Ensure that all personnel performing as EMTs or paramedics for the emergency medical services provider are trained in the use of the trauma scorecard methodology as provided in Chapter 64E-2.017, Florida Administrative Code.
- Develop trauma transport protocols for submission to the Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services for approval.
- x. Submit to the Department of Health, Bureau of Emergency Medical Services within thirty (30) calendar days of any deviation from the department or agency approved trauma transport protocols, a copy of the run report and a written explanation regarding the deviation.
- This Agreement shall commence on October 1, 2010 (the "Effective Date"), and all previous agreements, including the agreements between the parties for System Medical Director Services, effective as of July 1, 2005 (UNIVERSITY Contract #13467), shall be

terminated at that time. This Agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless terminated by the parties as provided in Section 3. COUNTY and UNIVERSITY agree that the terms of this Agreement may be revised at any time by formal written amendment to this Agreement executed by all parties hereto. This Agreement may be terminated as follows:

- a. This Agreement is expressly conditioned on the availability of funds lawfully appropriated and available for the purpose set out herein as determined at the sole discretion of COUNTY. In the event funds to finance this Agreement become unavailable, COUNTY may terminate this Agreement upon no less than twenty-four (24) hours notice, written and delivered to UNIVERSITY. Said notice of termination shall be delivered certified mail, return receipt requested, or in person with proof of delivery. COUNTY shall be the sole and final authority as to the availability of funds.
- In the event COUNTY is no longer licensed by the State of Florida as a provider of advanced life support services, this Agreement shall terminate immediately and be of no further force and effect.
- With or without cause by either party upon thirty (30) calendar days prior written notice to the other party.
- d. Either COUNTY or UNIVERSITY shall have the right to immediately terminate this Agreement for failure of the other party to comply with the public records law of the State of Florida as set forth in Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.
- e. The failure of any party to comply with any provision of this Agreement shall place that party in default. Prior to terminating this Agreement for default, a non-defaulting party shall notify the defaulting party in writing. This notification shall make specific reference to the provision which gave rise to the default and shall provide the defaulting party with a reasonable period of time in which to cure the default. In the event said default is not cured within the reasonable time period provided, this Agreement may be terminated. The failure of any party to exercise this right shall not be considered a waiver of such right in the event of any further default or noncompliance.

- f. In the event of termination of this Agreement, COUNTY will compensate UNIVERSITY for all services satisfactorily rendered prior to the termination date.
- 4. The parties agree that the standing operating procedures and medical care protocols in existence on the Effective Date of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect unless modified, amended, or supplemented in writing and approved in writing by the System Medical Director and Director of DPS.
- 5. Commencing on the Effective Date of this Agreement, COUNTY shall pay UNIVERSITY an annual amount of Forty Nine Thousand Nine Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$49,950.00) for the UNIVERSITY services provided by the System Medical Director pursuant to this Agreement. UNIVERSITY shall invoice COUNTY in the amount of Twelve Thousand Four Hundred Eighty Seven Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$12,487.50) on or about the last working day of each quarterly period for services provided during the just-concluded quarter, and payments shall be made by COUNTY within thirty (30) calendar days of the date of the invoice submitted to COUNTY by UNIVERSITY. All invoices shall be forwarded to Alachua County Department of Public Safety, P.O. Box 548, Gainesville, Florida 32602, Attention; Ms. T. J. Joyner, Senior Administrative Assistant. COUNTY's payments to UNIVERSITY hereunder shall be made payable to UNIVERSITY's billing entity. Florida Clinical Practice Association, Inc., and forwarded to Department of Emergency Medicine, PO Box 100186, Gainesville, Florida 32610-0186. UNIVERSITY shall assure that funds received pursuant to this Agreement will be deposited in such a way as to reimburse the sources which made the original expenditures for the convision of services.
- 6. The names and addresses of the representatives of UNIVERSITY for this Agreement that must receive all notices required or permitted in connection with this Agreement are: W. Wayne Tharp, Sr. Associate Dean of Financial Services, College of Medicine, University of Florida, P.O. Box 103450, Gainesville, Florida 32610; Director, SVPHA Office of Contracts & Related Services, University of Florida, PO Box 112737, Gainesville, Florida 32610; and, Joseph A. Tyndall, M.D., Chairman, Department of Emergency Medicine, College of Medicine, University of Florida, College of Medicine, University of Florida, P.O. Box 100186, JMHHC, Gainesville, Florida, 32610-0186. The name and address of the representative of COUNTY is Edwin C.

Bailey, Director, DPS, P. O. Box 548, Gainesville, Florida, 32602. In the event that representatives change due to a change in personnel after execution of this Agreement, notice of the name and address of the new representative shall be furnished in writing to the other narries and a conv of said notification attached to the originals of this Agreement.

- 7. All parties expressly intend that with regard to the provisions of this Agreement said parties are independent contractors and no parry hereto shall receive any other benefits besides those expressly provided for herein. Further, it is the express intent of the parties hereto that no agent, servant, contractor, or employee of one party be deemed an agent, servant, contractor, or employee of the other party. All personnel of UNIVERSITY rendering services pursuant to this Agreement shall be employees/agents of The University of Florida Statutes, agrees to be fully responsible for its acts of negligence or omissions or intentional tortious acts which result in claims or suits against COUNTY, and agrees to be liable for any damages resulting from said acts or omissions. Nothing herein is intended to serve as a waiver of sovereign immunity by any state agency to which sovereign immunity by applicable. Nothing herein shall be construed as consent by a state agency or political subdivision of the State of Florida to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of any contract. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by UNIVERSITY or COUNTY of its sovereign immunity. The limits of liability or other provisions of \$788.28. Florida Statutes.
- 8. The parties shall instruct their employees to hold as confidential any patient information acquired as a result of this Agreement. Before any release or disclosure of medical records occurs, consent and authorization to release shall be obtained from the legal representative of the patient, in accordance with applicable state and federal laws pertaining to the confidentiality of medical records. Any and all use or disclosure of patient information must be made in accordance with Sections 817.5681, 394.4615, 395.3025 and 456.057, Florida Statutes, as applicable, and in accordance with any other applicable state and federal law, including the Health Insurance and Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 ("HIPAA"), and the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health Act ("HITECH") and any and all implementing regulations. The parties acknowledge that, as a result of providing professional services pursuant to this Agreement, each party will have access to, and/or obtain, confidential and protected health information (PHI) in written and/or electronic format, including but not

limited to medical records of patients. During the term of this Agreement, except as otherwise required by state and/or federal law, each party agrees (1) to maintain all PHI in a secure and confidential fashion, (2) to ensure that its directors, officers, employees and agents will maintain all PHI in a secure and confidential fashion, and (3) not to disclose such information to any third party, except as set forth herein.

- This Agreement shall be governed by, enforced, and interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida.
- 10. Failure of either party to insist upon performance of any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement shall not be construed as a waiver of future performance of any such term or condition, and the obligations of either party with respect thereto shall continue in full force and effect.
- If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the validity and enforceability of any other provision of this Agreement shall not be affected.
- 12. This Agreement is personal to each of the parties, and neither party may assign or delegate any rights or obligations under this Agreement to another entity, without first obtaining the written consent of the other party. Any purported assignment or delegation shall be a default and shall be void.
- 13. Nothing in this Agreement, express or implied, is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person, firm or corporation other than the parties hereto and their respective successors or assigns, any remedy or claim under or by reason of this Agreement or any term, covenant or condition hereof; as third party beneficiaries or otherwise, and all of the terms, covenants and conditions hereof shall be for the sole and exclusive benefit of the parties hereto and their permitted successors and assigns.
- 14. Neither party to this Agreement shall use the name, logo, or likeness of the other party to this Agreement, or any of the other party's staff, in any signage, advertising, or promotional material, without the prior written consent of the other party. Such consent may be granted or withheld in the sole discretion of the party whose consent is required; however, such

- 15. The terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement constitute all of the terms and conditions to which the parties have agreed, and no other terms or conditions in the future shall be valid or binding on either party, unless reduced to writing, executed by both parties, and attached to this Agreement as an amendment.
- The parties acknowledge that UNIVERSITY's performance and obligations under this Agreement are contingent upon an annual appropriation by the Florida Legislature.
- 17. This Agreement may be executed in several counterparts, each of which will constitute an original and all of which will be one and the same document. The Agreement shall be fully executed when each party whose signature is required has signed at least one (1) counterpart even though no one (1) counterpart contains the signatures of all of the parties to this Agreement. Signed counterparts may be exchanged by facsimile or by electronic delivery.

ACTION:

Chapter 401, Florida Statutes and Florida Administrative Code 64E-2 requires that all emergency medical service providers contract for Medical Director services in order to respond, treat, and transport patients. An agreement with the University of Florida, College of Medicine, Department of Emergency Medicine was in effect from 1994, and expired on June 30, 2005. The current agreement (UNIVERSITY Contract #13467) replaced the original agreement with a term of July 1, 2005 through June 30, 2006, with two automatic annual renewals.

The new replacement agreement will be effective on October 1, 2010. All previous agreements between the parties for System Medical Director Services shall be terminated. The replacement agreement shall remain in full force and effect unless terminated by the parties as provided in Section 3. County and University agree that the terms of this agreement may be revised at any time by formal written amendment to this agreement executed by all parties.

ACKGROUND:

chapter 401, Florida Statutes and Florida Administrative Code 64E-2 requires that all emergency medical service providers contract with a Florida licensed physician for medical director services in order to respond, treat, and transport patients.

Alachua County Department of Public Safety has contracted with the University of Florida, College of Medicine, Department of Emergency Medicine for Medical Director Services since 1994. All current agreement shall be terminated at the time the new agreement is signed, and the new agreement will be effective October 1, 2010. The agreement is specific as to the qualifications of the System Medical Director and his/her duties and responsibilities. Annual amount of agreement is \$49,950.00, to be paid in 4 quarterly payments of \$12,487.50 each.

ISSUES:

In order to comply with Florida Law, Alachua County Department of Public Safety must have an agreement with a Florida licensed physician for medical director services.

The current agreement is in the amount of \$75,000.00. The new agreement is in the amount of \$49,950.00. This is a decrease of \$25,050.00 over the current agreement. The reduction for Medical Director Services was included in the FY10/11 budget.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN ALACHUA COUNTY AND SOUTHLAND WASTE SYSTEMS FOR COMMERCIAL SOLID WASTE FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

This Commercial Solid Waste Franchise Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this Z-7 day of @errobet ____2010, by and between Alachua County, a charter County and political subdivision of the State of Florida (hereinafter "County"), and Southland Waste Systems, ("Franchisee").

WHEREAS, the County requires all persons or entities engaged in the business of providing commercial solid waste services service or construction and demolition debris collection to obtain a franchise issued by the County;

WHEREAS, the County issued non-exclusive franchise shall be by application and may be by contract, which may include agreement on the disposal site for solid waste collected by any franchise;

WHEREAS, the County owns and operates a transfer station ("Transfer Station"), which the County uses to transfer and transport municipal solid waste from Alachua County to a landfill that is owned and operated by the New River Solid Waste Association ("Landfill");

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained in this Agreement and the other good and valuable consideration provided to the parties by this Agreement, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the County and Franchisee agree to be bound by and to comply with the following terms and conditions of this Agreement:

- Recitals. The above recitals are true and correct, comprise a material part of this Agreement and are incorporated herein.
- Definitions. Whenever words and expressions are used in this Agreement, they shall be defined, interpreted and construed as provided in Article 12 of Chapter 75, Alachua County Code of Ordinances and as follows:

a. "Acceptable Waste" means solid waste that may be disposed of lawfully in
a Class I landfill, provided that the solid waste was not collected pursuant to Franchisec's
contracts; if any, for the collection of residential waste, recyclable materials and yard trash.

- b. "Applicable Law" means any County ordinance or code provision, state or federal statute, law, constitution, charter, ordinance, judgment, order, decree, permit, rule, regulation, directive, policy, standard or similar binding authority, or a judicial or administrative interpretation of any of the same, which are in effect or are enacted, adopted, promulgated, issued or enforced by a governmental body during the term of this Agreement, and relate in any manner to the performance of the County or Franchisec under this Agreement.
- c. "Effective Date" means the date when this Agreement is signed by the County.
- Application Requirements. Franchisee has submitted an application that meets all requirements set forth in Section 75.604, Florida Statutes:
- 4. <u>Franchisee Obligations.</u> During the term of this Agreement, Franchisee agrees to comply with all of the following:
- a. <u>Compliance with Law</u>. Franchisee agrees to comply with all Applicable Law, including without limitation, applicable provisions of Article 12, Chapter 75, of the Code of Ordinances of Alachua County, as exist and as may be amended during the term of this Agreement.
- b. <u>Insurance</u>. Franchisee shall maintain in full force and effect insurance as specified, and file with the County Manager, or designee, a certificate of insurance for all policies written in Franchisee's name, to remain on file with the County for the franchise term to include:
 - comprehensive general liability policy in an amount set forth in Subsection 75.604(b)(3), Alachua County Code, and
 - automobile liability policy in an amount set forth in Subsection 75.604(b)(3), Alachua County Code; and
 - (3) workers compensation as required by Florida statute.
 - Pay franchise fees as required by Section 75.602, Alachua County Code.
- 6. <u>Term and Termination</u>. The Franchise granted by this Agreement is not effective util reviewed, approved and executed by the County. Upon execution by the County, this Agreement shall remain in effect and shall bind Franchisee and the County from the Effective Date until September 30, 2011, unless this Agreement is revoked earlier or extended. This Agreement may be extended with the mutual consent of both parties. The County may deny this application for Franchise or may suspend or revoke this Agreement at any time with just cause pursuant to Section 75.605, Alachua County Code.

7. Agreement Governed by Florida Law. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida. Franchisee shall submit to service of process and the jurisdiction of the State of Florida for any controversy or claim arising out of or relating to the Agreement. Any action to interpret or enforce the Agreement shall be brought and maintained in the State of Florida. Venue shall be in Alachua County, Florida.

WITNESSETH

Whereas, the County desires to employ the Professional to provide hearing officer services, and

Whereas, the Professional is qualified to provide these services; and

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

 Term. This Agreement is effective on the date executed by both parties and continues until terminated.

The County's performance and obligation to pay under this agreement is contingent upon a specific annual appropriation by the Board of County Commissioners. The parties hereto understand that this Agreement is not a commitment of future appropriations.

- Representations. By executing this Agreement, the Professional makes the following express representations to the County:
 - 2.1. The Hearing Officer is professionally qualified to act as the Hearing Officer for the County, is licensed to practice law and is a five year member in good standing with the Florida Bar. Professional shall notify County immediately of any change in his standing with the Florida Bar.
- 3. <u>Duties of the Professional</u>. The Professional shall have and perform the following duties, obligations, and responsibilities to the County:
 - 3.1. Sit as a hearing officer for the County in:
 - 3.1.1. appeals of dangerous dog determination, under Chapter 72, County Code
 - 3.1.2. appeals from sign permit denials,
 - 3.1.3. appeals of decisions of the development review committee;
 - 3.1.4. appeals involving personnel actions, and
 - 3.1.5. other cases as required by the County.
 - 3.2. Perform all duties of a hearing officer including scheduling hearings, generating notices of

Professional as "Confidential Information" or "CI"

The County shall promptly notify the Professional in writing of any request received by the County for disclosure of Professional's Confidential Information and the Professional may assert any exemption from disclosure available under applicable law or seek a protective order against disclosure from a court of competent jurisdiction. Professional shall protect, defend, indemnify, and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any claims or judgments arising out of a request for disclosure of Confidential Information. Professional shall investigate, handle, respond to, and defend, using counsel chosen by the County, at Professional's sole cost and expense, any such claim, even if any such claim is groundless, false, or fraudulent. Professional shall pay for all costs and expenses related to such claim, including, but not limited to, payment of attorney fees, court costs, and expenses und expert witness fees and expenses. EXHIBIT B Alachua County Fairgrounds

General Rules

In the following information, the "Alachua County Fairgrounds" will be referred to as the "Fairgrounds". The Alachua County Fairgrounds operates under the management of the Alachua County Manager's Office and direction of the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners.

The County Manager shall arbitrate the following Special Conditions:

- Facility fees may be waived or reduced for "Educational" or "Not-For-Profits" (501C-3) events, as defined by the County Manager on an individual event basis.
- The Fairgrounds shall be made available for a period of four (4) consecutive weeks for use by the Alachua County Youth Fair with no rental charge to the Alachua County Youth Fair. The four-week period set out herein shall be determined by the County Manager's Office communicating with the Director of the Alachua County Agricultural Extension Service to ascertain the precise dates when the Fairgrounds are to be made available. Any expenses for the utilities associated with the Alachua County Youth Fair.
- For events that last more then one weekend or are recurring annual, monthly, or weekly
 events, agreements and facility fees can be negotiated.
- Unless an event has secured the entire facility, there may be times when multiple events are scheduled on the Fairgrounds. The County Manager's Office reserves the right to schedule multiple events without compensation to involved parties.
- ABSOLUTELY no modifications to existing grounds, buildings, or equipment will be made without prior written approval of the County Manager's Office. If prior approval has been given for such modifications, any and all modifications will be returned to its original or better condition.
- Any member of the County Manager's Office or County Facilities Management Division may move in, out, on, or about the entire facility while conducting his or her official duties.
- Users shall adhere to all signs and postings i.e. "No Parking", "All Dogs on Leash", etc.

Fairgrounds Bookings

The County Manager reserves the right to deny any bookings that may present a safety
hazard to persons or property or may damage the site. In the event any federal, state, or
local laws have been violated by the user group at the Fairgrounds, the County Manager
reserves the right to cancel or delay any scheduled event without restitution to that event
and deny future application.

- The applicant is responsible for complying with all applicable City, County, State and Federal laws and regulations that apply to the specific activity of the applicant. There is to be absolutely NO SMOKING inside the exhibit building.
- · Discharge of firearms and cutting of trees of strictly prohibited.

Payment Schedules

- User group shall pay a non-refundable deposit of fifty percent (50%) of the total fee and
 the \$90.00 Site Plan Review and Inspection fee (Fire Marshal) upon signing the license
 agreement ("license") to reserve requested date(s). Unless other arrangements have
 been made, the remainder of the basic fee and ground fees and other charges are due
 five days before the facility is turned over to the user group. License must be signed and
 delivered to the County Manager's Office before any booking is guaranteed.
- User group shall pay a clean-up, damage, key and utility deposit of \$1,000 five days before the facility is turned over to the user group. The deposit will be refunded within thirty days following the event if user has compiled with all terms of the License.

Pre-Event Setup and Post-Event Cleanup

- One half day will be allotted prior to your event for set-up and one half day after your
 event for cleanup.
- All user groups are responsible for their own pre-event setup and breakdown. It is not the responsibility of County staff to direct, conduct, manage, or set-up for your scheduled event.
- It is the responsibility of the user group to collect trash, garbage, etc. and clean all areas
 used during the scheduled event. The user group(s) WILL be billed for any cleaning
 required by County staff. Under normal circumstances, County Facilities Management
 will neath maintain the Faircrounds.
- The user group will return the Fairgrounds and facilities to the County under the same or better condition than received. By the end of the business day following the scheduled event, all clean-up of facilities must be completed:

Improvements

 Unless otherwise provided by written agreement, the cost of any improvement(s), permanent or temporary, made on or to the Fairgrounds by any user group or individuals shall not be deducted from any past or future rental fee(s) due the County. Any improvement made permanent becomes property of the County and shall be utilized or maintained at the discretion of the County Manager's Office.

Refunds

 Refunds on booking fees will be given, only if the County Manager's Office has been notified in writing 30 days prior to the scheduled event starting date. The County reserves the right to cancel or reschedule any event without compensation to the cancelled or rescheduled event organizers. If the County cancels an event and no rescheduling date is agreed upon, a full refund will be issued to the user group.

Maintenance and Cleaning Services

- Upon completion of the activity the facility and adjacent area must be clear, orderly and
 free of any obstruction or litter. Inspection of the facility will be made immediately
 following the event. If there is damage or additional clean up is needed, Alachua County
 reserves the right to use your damage and clean-up deposit to make repairs or clean up.
- Should the user group request that a County Facilities Management Division employee be present on the Fairgrounds during a scheduled event, the user group will be charged the appropriate hourly rate for the employee.
- . For any event lasting more than two (2) days, the Licensee must:
 - Insure that all of the restrooms are cleaned daily and provide the necessary bathroom items (toilet paper, hand soap, hand towels) for the duration of the event.
 - Empty trash cans daily and replace with new trash liners. If users deem it necessary to have a dumpster on the grounds for the event, make the necessary arrangements with a waste company to provide hauling and be billed directly.
 - Licensee can contact County Facilities Management for the suppliers name and telephone number to order replacements for the items listed above. It is recommended that the user hire, or appoint, a "restroom attendant" to assume this responsibility.

· Additional Charges:

- of If keys are returned after the event and the lights are left on in the building, bathrooms, or pole barn or if fans are left on there will be an additional charge of \$400.
- Additional charge of \$300 if building or grounds are not cleaned up after event.
- Additional charge of \$160 if bathrooms are not cleaned up after event.

Alcohol

 Alcohol beverages will be permitted on the Fairground's property with prior approval by the County Manager. User groups may utilize banners, signage or advertisement of companies that do sell or endorse alcoholic products.

Animals

 A written notice of all events involving animals will be provided to the Alachua County Division of Animal Services at least 2 days prior to the event. Any fees incurred shall be responsibility of the pet's owner.

- Users shall maintain a list consisting of the names, phone numbers, and addresses of all
 persons owning animals on the premises. If the possessor of the animal on the premises
 is not the owner, then the preceding information shall also be provided for the possessor.
 The quantity and type of each animal shall also be listed.
- All pets shall be on a physical restraint, i.e. leash, at all times while on the Fairgrounds.
 Only those pets directly related to an event, i.e. dog show, horse show, and approved by
 the County Manager's Office shall be exempt.
- Pet owners are to pick up all pet waste and deposit in the provided pet waste containers or trash receptacles.

Equipment Storage

- Due to a limited amount of storage space, unless otherwise approved in writing by the
 County Manager, no equipment, supplies, materials or any items belonging to a user
 group will be stored on the Fairgrounds. If such items are left on the Fairgrounds, without
 prior approval, Facilities Management shall dispose of such, with no restitution to the
 owner(s) of disposed items. All items stored and/or left on the grounds, prior approval or
 not, shall still be the responsibility of the owner and not that of Alachua County, (i.e.
 damage, theft etc.).
- If approval has been given for storage, one key to ANY and ALL locks installed by a user group for their storage shall be provided to Facilities Management and maintained appropriately. Failure to provide a key will result in removal of the lock. (This is due to any unforeseen emergency.)

Permits, Licenses and Inspections

 Any and all required Permits, Licenses, and Inspections for any event will be the sole responsibility of the event organizers. The County reserves the right to deny, cancel or delay any event that does not obtain permits, licenses, or proper inspections.

Banners, Signs and Advertising

- Any signage pertaining to the event that will be placed in the unincorporated areas of Alachua County must first be approved through Alachua County Growth Management.
- Please contact any Municipality within Alachua County (Alachua, Archer, Gainesville, Hawthorne, High Springs, Lacrosse, Micanopy, Newberry, Waldo) within which stigage pertaining to the event that will be placed for its approval and/or permit process. The Alachua County Fairgrounds is located in the City of Gainesville. Signage placed on the actual Fairgrounds must be approved and/or permitted by the City of Gainesville.
- BE ADVISED that bandit signs are not lawful anywhere within the unincorporated areas of Alachua County or any of its municipalities. The applicant is responsible for ensuring that bandit signs pertaining to the event are not placed anywhere in such areas. Should bandit signs pertaining to the event be placed anywhere within such area, the County reserves the right to deny, cancel or delay the event without refund, damages or restitution to the application.

Security, Parking, Rescue and First Aid

- A parking and security plan may be required for certain events when it is determined by the Alachua County Sheriff's Office or County Manager to be in the best interest of the public. Contact the Alachua County Sheriff's Office for arrangements and costs.

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Alachua County Fair Grounds Licensee's Ins.

Licensee shall procure and maintain for the duration of the contract insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property which may arise from or in connection with the Licensee's operation and use of the licensed premises. The cost of such insurance shall be borne by the Licensee.

COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY

Coverage must be afforded under a per occurrence form policy for limits not less than \$1,000,000 General Aggregate, \$1,000,000 Products / Completed Operations Aggregate, \$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury Liability, \$1,000,000 each Occurrence, \$100,000 Fire Damage Liability and \$5,000 Medical Expense.

AUTOMOBILE LIABILITY (While Operating Vehicles on County Owned Property)

Coverage must be afforded including coverage for all Owned vehicles, Hired and Non-Owned vehicles for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit each accident.

WORKERS COMPENSATION AND EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY (While on County owned Property)

Coverage to apply for all employees at STATUTORY Limits in compliance with applicable state and federal laws; if any operations are to be undertaken on or about navigable waters, coverage must be included for the USA Longshoremen & Harbor Workers Act.

Employer's Liability limits for not less then \$100,000 each accident; \$500,000 disease policy limit and \$100,000 disease each employee must be included.

OR:

As an independent contractor outside the construction industry with fewer than four employees choosing not to secure worker's compensation coverage under the Florida Workers' Compensation Act, the Licensee may chose to post clear written notice in a conspicuous location accessible to all employees telling employees and others of their lack of entitlement to work's compensation benefits.

LIQUOR LIABILITY (While on County owned Property)

Coverage must be afforded when a licensee, vendor, concessionaire, independent contractor, or subcontractor is engaged in the business of manufacturing, distributing, selling, serving or furnishing alcoholic beverages while on County property. Coverage must be afforded for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$1,000,000 Combined Single Limit each occurrence.

OTHER INSURANCE PROVISIONS

The policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:

Commercial General Liability Coverages

- a. The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, its officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as an Additional Insured as respects: Liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Licensee and premises owned, leased or used by the Licensee.
- b. The Licensee's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the County, its officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or selfinsurance maintained by the County, it's officials, employee's or volunteers shall be excess of Licensee's insurance and shall be non-contributory.

Il Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Coverages

The insurer shall agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from work performed by the Licensee for the County.

III All Coverages

The Licensee shall provide a Certificate of Insurance to the County with a Thirty (30) day notice of cancellation. The certificate shall indicate if cover is provided under a "claims made" or "per occurrence" form. If any cover is provided under a claims made form the certificate will show a retroactive date, which should be the same date of the contract (original if contact is renewed) or prior.

SUBCONTRACTORS, VENDORS, CONCESSIONAIRES

Licensee shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies. All coverages for subcontractors, vendors, concessionaires and independent contractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

LICENSE AGREEMENT FOR USE OF ALACHUA COUNTY FAIRGROUNDS

THIS LICENSE AGREEMENT, made and entered into this <u>24</u> day of <u>February</u>, 2011, by and between Alachua County, a charter county and political subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "County", and <u>Blue Star Productions</u> ("Licensee");

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Licensee is a Florida Corporation headquartered and doing business at 4660 Churchill St Shoreview, MN 55126 ; and

WHEREAS, Licensee desires to utilize all or a portion of the Alachua County Fairgrounds; and

WHEREAS, the County finds that this use would be beneficial to the County by allowing County residents to attend an event at the Fairgrounds; and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto desire to enter into a license agreement to establish rights and obligations with regard to the use of the Fairgrounds.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties hereto do mutually covenant and agree as follows:

- Effective Date. This license agreement shall be effective for dates and times as outlined in Exhibit A, until revoked as provided for herein.
- 2. <u>Property</u>. This license agreement is for the use of the property described in Exhibit A.
- Use of Property. Licensee agrees to use the Property exclusively for the activities outlined in Exhibit A.
- 4. <u>Payment</u>. Licensee agrees to pay the County the sum of \$2400.00 as a flat rate license fee for the privilege of using the Property. Payment will be due to the County not later than 5 business days prior to the use period.
- 5. Grant. The County grants to Licensee the right to access and utilize the Property for the purposes set forth in Exhibit A.
- 6. Restrictions. Licensee shall adhere to the Alachua County Fairgrounds General Rules. Exhibit B.
- Right of Assignment. Licensee shall not have the right to assign this license agreement without the written consent of the County.

- 9. <u>Indemnification</u>. Licensee shall indemnify, save harmless and defend the County and all list agents, officials and employees from any and all claims, demands, actions or causes of action of every description brought against the County that arise from or in connection with the execution, performance, or exercise of any rights, privileges, or uses allowed or granted in this license agreement. In the event the County is alleged to be liable on account of alleged acts or omissions, or both, of Licensee, its subcontractors or agents, then Licensee will defend such allegations through counsel chosen by the County. Furthermore, Licensee will pay all costs, fees and expenses of any defense, including but not limited to, all attorneys' fees and expenses, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses. This indemnification provision will survive the termination of this license agreement.
- Insurance. The Licensee will procure and maintain insurance throughout the entire term of this agreement of the types and in the minimum amounts detailed in Exhibit C.
- 11. $\underline{\text{Termination}}. \ \text{This License Agreement may be revoked at any time by the County Manager}.$
- 12. <u>Permits</u>. The Licensee will obtain and pay for all necessary permits, permit application fees, licenses or any fees required.
- 13. <u>Laws & Regulations</u>. Licensee will comply with all laws, ordinances, regulations, and building code requirements applicable to the work required by this agreement. Licensee is presumed to be familiar with all state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations that may in any way affect the work outlined in this agreement. If Licensee is not familiar with state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations, Licensee remains liable for any violation and all subsequent damages or fines.

- 14. <u>Third Party Beneficiaries</u> This agreement does not create any relationship with, or any rights in favor of, any third party.

EXHIBIT B Alachua County Fairgrounds

General Rules

In the following information, the "Alachua County Fairgrounds" will be referred to as the "Fairgrounds". The Alachua County Fairgrounds operates under the management of the Alachua County Manager's Office and direction of the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners.

The County Manager shall arbitrate the following Special Conditions:

- Facility fees may be waived or reduced for "Educational" or "Not-For-Profits" (501C-3) events, as defined by the County Manager on an individual event basis.
- The Fairgrounds shall be made available for a period of four (4) consecutive weeks for use by the Alachua County Youth Fair with no rental charge to the Alachua County Youth Fair. The four-week period set out herein shall be determined by the County Manager's Office communicating with the Director of the Alachua County Agricultural Extension Service to ascertain the precise dates when the Fairgrounds are to be made available. Any expenses for the utilities associated with the Alachua County Youth Fair.
- For events that last more then one weekend or are recurring annual, monthly, or weekly
 events, agreements and facility fees can be negotiated.
- Unless an event has secured the entire facility, there may be times when multiple events are scheduled on the Fairgrounds. The County Manager's Office reserves the right to schedule multiple events without compensation to involved parties.
- ABSOLUTELY no modifications to existing grounds, buildings, or equipment will be
 made without prior written approval of the County Manager's Office. If prior approval has
 been given for such modifications, any and all modifications will be returned to its original
 or better condition.
- Any member of the County Manager's Office or County Facilities Management Division may move in, out, on, or about the entire facility while conducting his or her official duties.
- Users shall adhere to all signs and postings i.e. "No Parking", "All Dogs on Leash", etc.

Fairgrounds Bookings

 The County Manager reserves the right to deny any bookings that may present a safety hazard to persons or property or may damage the site. In the event any federal, state, or local laws have been violated by the user group at the Fairgrounds, the County Manager reserves the right to cancel or delay any scheduled event without restitution to that event and deny future application.

- The applicant is responsible for complying with all applicable City, County, State and Federal laws and regulations that apply to the specific activity of the applicant. There is to be absolutely NO SMOKING inside the exhibit building.
- . Discharge of firearms and cutting of trees of strictly prohibited.

Payment Schedules

- User group shall pay a non-refundable deposit of fifty percent (50%) of the total fee and
 the \$9.0.00 Site Plan Review and Inspection fee (Fire Marshal) upon signing the license
 agreement ("license") to reserve requested date(s). Unless other arrangements have
 been made, the remainder of the basic fee and ground fees and other charges are due
 five days before the facility is turned over to the user group. License must be signed and
 delivered to the County Manager's Office before any booking is guaranteed.
- User group shall pay a clean-up, damage, key and utility deposit of \$1,000 five days before the facility is turned over to the user group. The deposit will be refunded within thirty days following the event if user has compiled with all terms of the License.

Pre-Event Setup and Post-Event Cleanup

- One half day will be allotted prior to your event for set-up and one half day after your event for cleanup.
- All user groups are responsible for their own pre-event setup and breakdown. It is not the
 responsibility of County staff to direct, conduct, manage, or set-up for your scheduled
 event.
- It is the responsibility of the user group to collect trash, garbage, etc. and clean all areas used during the scheduled event. The user group(s) WILL be billed for any cleaning required by County staff. Under normal circumstances, County Facilities Management will neatly maintain the Fairgrounds.
- The user group will return the Fairgrounds and facilities to the County under the same or better condition than received. By the end of the business day following the scheduled event. all clean-up of facilities must be completed.

Improvements

 Unless otherwise provided by written agreement, the cost of any improvement(s), permanent or temporary, made on or to the Fairgrounds by any user group or individuals shall not be deducted from any past or future rental fee(s) due the County. Any improvement made permanent becomes property of the County and shall be utilized or maintained at the discretion of the County Manager's Office.

Refunds

 Refunds on booking fees will be given, only if the County Manager's Office has been notified in writing 30 days prior to the scheduled event starting date. The County reserves the right to cancel or reschedule any event without compensation to the cancelled or rescheduled event organizers. If the County cancels an event and no rescheduling date is agreed upon, a full refund will be issued to the user group.

Maintenance and Cleaning Services

- Upon completion of the activity the facility and adjacent area must be clear, orderly and
 free of any obstruction or litter. Inspection of the facility will be made immediately
 following the event. If there is damage or additional clean up is needed, Alachua County
 reserves the right to use your damage and clean-up deposit to make repairs or clean up.
- Should the user group request that a County Facilities Management Division employee be present on the Fairgrounds during a scheduled event, the user group will be charged the appropriate hourly rate for the employee.
- . For any event lasting more than two (2) days, the Licensee must:
 - Insure that all of the restrooms are cleaned daily and provide the necessary bathroom items (toilet paper, hand soap, hand towels) for the duration of the event.
 - Empty trash cans daily and replace with new trash liners. If users deem it necessary to have a dumpster on the grounds for the event, make the necessary arrangements with a waste company to provide hauling and be billed directly.
 - Licensee can contact County Facilities Management for the suppliers name and telephone number to order replacements for the items listed above. It is recommended that the user hire, or appoint, a "restroom attendant" to assume this responsibility.

Additional Charges:

- If keys are returned after the event and the lights are left on in the building, bathrooms, or pole barn or if fans are left on there will be an additional charge of \$400.
- Additional charge of \$300 if building or grounds are not cleaned up after event.
- o Additional charge of \$160 if bathrooms are not cleaned up after event.

Alcohol

 Alcohol beverages will be permitted on the Fairground's property with prior approval by the County Manager. User groups may utilize banners, signage or advertisement of companies that do sell or endorse alcoholic products.

Animals

 A written notice of all events involving animals will be provided to the Alachua County Division of Animal Services at least 2 days prior to the event. Any fees incurred shall be responsibility of the pet's owner.

- Users shall maintain a list consisting of the names, phone numbers, and addresses of all
 persons owning animals on the premises. If the possessor of the animal on the premises
 is not the owner, then the preceding information shall also be provided for the possessor.
 The quantity and type of each animal shall also be listed.
- All pets shall be on a physical restraint, i.e. leash, at all times while on the Fairgrounds.
 Only those pets directly related to an event, i.e. dog show, horse show, and approved by the County Manager's Office shall be exempt.
- Pet owners are to pick up all pet waste and deposit in the provided pet waste containers or trash receptacles.

Equipment Storage

- Due to a limited amount of storage space, unless otherwise approved in writing by the County Manager, no equipment, supplies, materials or any items belonging to a user group will be stored on the Fairgrounds. If such items are left on the Fairgrounds, without prior approval, Facilities Management shall dispose of such, with no restitution to the owner(s) of disposed items. All items stored and/or left on the grounds, prior approval or not, shall still be the responsibility of the owner and not that of Alachua County, (i.e. damage, theft etc.).
- If approval has been given for storage, one key to ANY and ALL locks installed by a user group for their storage shall be provided to Facilities Management and maintained appropriately. Failure to provide a key will result in removal of the lock. (This is due to any unforeseen emergency.)

Permits, Licenses and Inspections

 Any and all required Permits, Licenses, and Inspections for any event will be the sole responsibility of the event organizers. The County reserves the right to deny, cancel or delay any event that does not obtain permits, licenses, or proper inspections.

Banners, Signs and Advertising

- Any signage pertaining to the event that will be placed in the unincorporated areas of Alachua County must first be approved through Alachua County Growth Management.
- Please contact any Municipality within Alachua County (Alachua, Archer, Gainesville, Hawthorne, High Springs, Lacrosse, Micanopy, Newberry, Waldo) within which signage pertaining to the event that will be placed for its approval and/or permit process. The Alachua County Fairgrounds is located in the City of Gainesville. Signage placed on the actual Fairgrounds must be approved and/or permitted by the City of Gainesville.
- BE ADVISED that bandit signs are not lawful anywhere within the unincorporated areas
 of Alachua County or any of its municipalities. The applicant is responsible for ensuring
 that bandit signs pertaining to the event are not placed anywhere in such areas. Should
 bandit signs pertaining to the event be placed anywhere within such areas. Should
 serves the right to deny, cancel or delay the event without refund, damages or
 restitution to the applicant.

Security, Parking, Rescue and First Aid

- A parking and security plan may be required for certain events when it is determined by the Alachua County Sheriff's Office or County Manager to be in the best interest of the public. Contact the Alachua County Sheriff's Office for arrangements and costs.
- A County Rescue Unit may be available with proper notice. The user group shall be responsible for all costs of the unit and personnel to operate the unit. This will be required for all Major Events. It will be the responsibility of the user group to contact Alachua County Public Safety for scheduling, rates, and availability.

COMMERCIAL GENERAL LIABILITY

Coverage must be afforded under a per occurrence form policy for limits not less than \$1,000,000 General Aggregate, \$1,000,000 Products / Completed Operations Aggregate, \$1,000,000 Personal and Advertising Injury Liability, \$1,000,000 each Occurrence, \$100,000 Fire Damage Liability and \$5,000 Medical Expense.

AUTOMOBILE LIABILITY (While Operating Vehicles on County Owned Property)

Coverage must be afforded including coverage for all Owned vehicles, Hired and Non-Owned vehicles for Bodily Injury and Property Damage of not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit each accident.

WORKERS COMPENSATION AND EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY (While on County owned Property)

Coverage to apply for all employees at STATUTORY Limits in compliance with applicable state and federal laws; if any operations are to be undertaken on or about navigable waters, coverage must be included for the USA Longshoremen & Harbor Workers Act.

Employer's Liability limits for not less then \$100,000 each accident; \$500,000 disease policy limit and \$100,000 disease each employee must be included.

OR:

As an independent contractor outside the construction industry with fewer than four employees choosing not to secure worker's compensation coverage under the Florida Workers' Compensation Act, the Licensee may chose to post clear written notice in a conspicuous location accessible to all employees telling employees and others of their lack of entitlement to work's compensation benefits.

LIQUOR LIABILITY (While on County owned Property)

Coverage must be afforded when a licensee, vendor, concessionaire, independent contractor, or subcontractor is engaged in the business of manufacturing, distributing, selling, serving or furnishing alcoholic beverages while on County property. - a. The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, its officials, employees and volunteers are to be covered as an Additional Insured as respects: Liability arising out of activities performed by or on behalf of the Licensee and premises owned, leased or used by the Licensee.
- b. The Licensee's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the County, its officials, employees and volunteers. Any insurance or selfinsurance maintained by the County, it's officials, employee's or volunteers shall be excess of Licensee's insurance and shall be non-contributory.

II Workers' Compensation and Employers' Liability Coverages

The insurer shall agree to waive all rights of subrogation against the County, its officials, employees and volunteers for losses arising from work performed by the Licensee for the County.

III All Coverages

The Licensee shall provide a Certificate of Insurance to the County with a Thirty (30) day notice of cancellation. The certificate shall indicate if cover is provided under a "claims made" or "per occurrence" form. If any cover is provided under a claims made form the certificate will show a retroactive date, which should be the same date of the contract (original if contact is renewed) or prior.

SUBCONTRACTORS, VENDORS, CONCESSIONAIRES

Licensee shall include all subcontractors as insureds under its policies. All coverages for subcontractors, vendors, concessionaires and independent contractors shall be subject to all of the requirements stated herein.

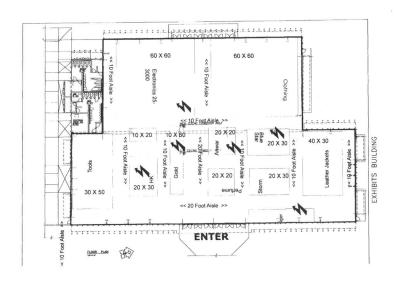

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The E9-1-1 Coordinator is the project manager for the installation of a PlantCML Patriot Internet Protocol capable 9-1-1 telephone system in the primary and backup 9-1-1 centers. The single fiber link between the primary and backup 9-1-1 centers is a secure 20Mbps Ethernet connection to bridge the two sites together. This single Ethernet link is considered a single point of failure as there is no redundant path. Creating a diverse fiber route to support 9-1-1 communications with redundant transmission nodes, switches, and power supplies will create a very resilient connection between the primary and backup 9-1-1 centers.

BACKGROUND:

Currently, the telephone system in the backup 9-1-1 center and CCC communicate via a single 20Mbps Ethernet connection without a redundant path or supporting infrastructure components such as power supplies and switches. The one-time cost to provide two transmission nodes per site on a diverse fiber path, provide a standard single power supply for each of the transmission nodes, add two new GRUCom network switches in sequence on diverse route fiber paths, add one network switch at CCC in sequence with the existing switch on a diverse fiber route and provide one service drop port per GRUCom network switch is \$14.875.00. There is no change to the current term expiration for the existing 20Mbps Ethernet link. There is no change to the current monthly service charges for the 20Mbps of dedicated transmission capacity between the two sites.

Not having a redundant network path between the primary and backup 9-1-1 centers could potentially result in the loss of 9-1-1 services at the backup site should there ever be any interruption of Ethernet services with the primary path.

- 1. Term of Agreement: Pending available facilities, GRUCom hereby agrees to provide, and the Customer hereby agrees to purchase from GRUCom, telecommunications transmission service (few "Service") for the price(s) (the "Service Cost") specified in this Agreement, subject to the terms and conditions set forth herein. 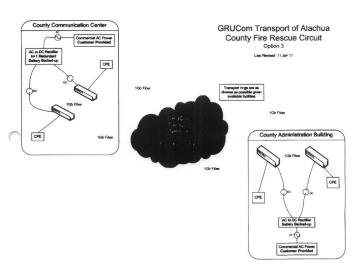

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The Department of Homeland Security is providing funds to the State of Florida to enhance the capability of the State to prepare for, respond to and recover from terrorist incidents that may involve Weapons of Mass Destruction (WMD). The State is re-allocating funds to Alachua County for the purpose of improving its capability to respond to and manage possible terrorist incidents. The FY 2009-2010 State Homeland Security Grant was originally intended to fund the development of a Catastrophic Incident Plan, delivery of the All Hazards Incident Management Team training and the development of a Resource Management Plan. However, after re-evaluating the County's needs, staff has determined that a Gap Analysis-Target Capability Assessment was a higher priority project. This assessment would give the County a baseline to work from in developing future projects, training, exercises and funding requests. Emergency Management requested and received permission from the State to change the project funded by this grant.

Sue to the on-going need to conduct training and develop various response and recovery plans, Emergency, Annagement has determined that having a Contractor of Record to hand off projects to would be the best way to complete the projects within the State agreement timelines.

BACKGROUND:

The Department of Homeland Security is providing financial assistance directly to each of the nation's states and territories through the FY 2009-2010 State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHSGP). This continued financial assistance is being provided to augment the capability of state and local agencies to prevent and respond to incidents of terrorism involving the use of chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or explosive (CBRNE) weapons. Over the last six years, Alachua County has developed and exercised COOP plans, purchased a Critical Information Management Software, conducted National Incident Management System (NIMS) training, participated in a Pandemic Flu exercise series and expanded its Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program. Most recently, the County was able to complete a Community-wide Post Disaster Re-development Plan and conducted an exercise series involving a joint City and County response to a dirty bomb.

ISSUES: There is no match requirement for this grant. However, funds received from the State Homeland Security Grant Program frust be applied to those eligible activities as outlined in the Scope of Work of the Agreement. Additionally, all work must be completed by April 30, 2012. ACTION

CONTINUING SERVICES AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into this \$\frac{3^{12}}{2}\$ day of \$\begin{array}{c} \text{No.rc.h.} \, 20 \text{11} \text{ between Alachua}\$ County, a charter county and political subdivision of Florida, by and through its Board of County Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as "County" and Emergency Response Educators and Consultants, Inc. doing business at 223 NE 58th Avenue, Suite 101, Ocala, Florida hereinafter referred to as "Professional".

WITNESSETH

Whereas, the County desires to employ the Professional to provide services for Target Capabilities Assessment and,

Whereas, the Professional is qualified to provide these services;

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

Term. This Agreement is effective on 2-30-pand will continue until 4-30-12 unless earlier terminated as provide herein. This Agreement may be amended at the option of the County for didditional yet year terms at the terms and conditions outlined herein.

The County's performance and obligation to pay under this agreement is contingent upon a specific annual appropriation by the Board of County Commissioners. The parties hereto understand that this Agreement is not a commitment of future appropriations.

- <u>Representations</u>. By executing this Agreement, the Professional makes the following express representations to the County:
 - 2.1. The Professional is professionally qualified to act as the professional for the Project and is qualified to provide the services required;
 - 2.2. The Professional shall maintain all necessary licenses, permits or other authorizations necessary to act as professional until the Professional's duties hereunder have been fully satisfied:
 - 2.3. The Professional shall prepare all deliverables required by this Agreement including, but not limited to all training documents, assessment materials and reports, in such a manner that they shall be accurate, coordinated, and adequate for the purposes intended and shall be in conformity and comply with all applicable law, codes and regulations;
 - 2.4. The Professional represents that the deliverables prepared by the Professional are adequate and sufficient to accomplish the purposes of the project and meet the requirements of

all applicable federal, state and local codes and regulations.

- 2.5. The Professional acknowledges that the County's review of the deliverables in no way diminishes the Professionals representations pertaining to the deliverables.
- 3. <u>Duties of the Professional</u>. The Professional shall have and perform the following duties, obligations, and responsibilities to the County as outlined in Attachment "A". This Agreement standing alone does not authorize the performance of any work or require the County to place any orders for work.
- 4. <u>Duties of the County.</u> The County shall have and perform the following duties, obligations, and responsibilities to the Professional:
 - 4.1. Provide access and assist in scheduling any meetings necessary to complete project.
 - 4.2.Communicate Available data and information on project objectives, constraints, budgetary limitations and time restraints.
 - 4.3. Where possible Available drawings, maps, specifications, schedules, reports, data and other information developed by Emergency Management, Alachua County and its municipalities and agencies which Emergency Management considers pertinent to the Contractor's responsibilities.
- 5. Authorization For Services, Authorization for performance of Professional services by the Professional under this Agreement shall be in the form of written Work Orders (also called a "Task Assignment) issued and executed by the County and signed by the Professional. A sample Work Order is attached hereto as Attachment "B". Each Work Order shall describe the services required, state the dates for commencement and completion of work and establish the amount and method of payment. The Work Orders will be issued under and shall incorporate the terms of this Agreement. The County makes no covenant or promise as to the number of available projects, nor that the Professional will perform any project for the County during the life of this Agreement. The County to do so the other parties for the services contemplated by this Agreement when it is determined by the County to be in the best interest of the County to do so.
 - 5.1. The Emergency Services Director is authorized to initiate and sign Work Orders and amendments and modifications to Work Orders on behalf of the County.
 - 5.2. Change Orders to existing Work orders will be authorized by a Work Order Change Order (Attachment "B-1")
- 6. Compensation. The County agrees to compensate the Professional for the Professional services called for under this Agreement on either a "Fixed Fee" basis or on a "Time Basis Method". If a Work Order is issued under a "Time Basis Method," then Professional shall be compensated in accordance with the rate schedule attached as Attachment "C". If a Work Order is issued for a

"Fixed Fee Basis," then the applicable Work Order Fixed Fee amount shall include any and all reimbursable expenses.

- 7. <u>Reimbursable Expenses</u>. If a Work Order is issued on a "Time Basis Method," then reimbursable expenses are in addition to the hourly rates. Reimbursable expenses are subject to the applicable "Not-to-Exceed" or "Limitation of Funds" amount set forth in the Work Order and to conditions, restrictions and limitations of § 112.061, Florida Statute. Reimbursable expenses may include actual expenditures made by the Professional, his employees or his Professional associates in the interest of the Project for the expenses listed in the following paragraphs:
 - 7.1. Expenses for travel when traveling in connection with the Project, based on §112.061(7) and (8), Florida Statutes, or their successor and with the prior approval of the County.;
 - 7.2. Actual cost of long distance calls and telegrams;
 - 7.3. Fees paid for securing approval of authorities having jurisdiction over the Project.
 - 7.4. Actual expense of reproductions, postage and handling of drawings and specifications.
 - 7.5. If authorized in writing in advance by the County, the cost of other expenditures made by the Professional in the interest of the Project provided such expenditures are in accordance with the Scope of Services and Work Order as approved by the County.
 - 7.6. If the Professional's duties, obligations and responsibilities are materially changed through no fault of the Professional after execution of this Agreement, additional compensation shall be paid as provided in Exhibit "1"

8. Payment.

8.1. As a condition precedent for any payment, the Professional shall submit monthly, unless otherwise agreed in writing by the County, an invoice to the County requesting payment for services properly rendered and expenses due. The Professional's invoice shall describe with reasonable particularity each service rendered, the date thereof, [the time expended, if billed by hour, and the person(s) rendering such service. The Professional's invoice shall be accompanied by such documentation or data in support of expenses for which payment is sought as the County may require. If payment is requested for services rendered by Professional, the invoice shall additionally reflect the allocations as provided and shall state the percentage of completion as to each such allocation. Each invoice shall bear the signature of the Professional, which signature shall constitute the Professional's representation to the County that the services indicated in the invoice have reached the level stated, have served a public purpose, have been properly and timely performed as required herein, that the expenses included in the invoice have been reasonably incurred in accordance with this Agreement, that all obligations of the Professional covered by prior invoices have been paid in full, and that the amount requested is currently due and owing, there being no reason known to the Professional that payment of any portion thereof should be withheld. Submission of the Professional's invoice for final payment shall further constitute the Professional's representation to the County that, upon receipt by the County of the amount invoiced, all obligations of the Professional to others, including its consultants, incurred in connection with the Project, will be paid in full. The Professional shall submit invoices to the County at the following address:

- 8.2. In the event that the County becomes credibly informed that any representations of the Professional relating to payment are wholly or partially inaccurate, the County may withhold payment of sums then or in the future otherwise due to the Professional until the inaccuracy, and the cause thereof, is corrected to the County's reasonable satisfaction.
- 8.3. The County shall make payment to the Professional, of all sums properly invoiced under the provisions of this paragraph, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 218, Part VII (Local Government Prompt Payment Act), Florida Statutes.
- 8.4. Payments shall be made to the following address:

9.1. The Professional will assign only qualified personnel to perform any service concerning this Agreement. At the time of execution of this Agreement, the parties anticipate the following parties will perform those functions indicated:

9.2. So long as the individuals named above remain actively employed or able to be retained by the Professional, they shall perform the functions indicated next to their names. The Emergency Management Director may authorize changes to this list in writing.

11. Default and Termination.

- 11.1. The failure of the Professional to comply with any provision of this Agreement will place the Professional in default. Prior to terminating the Agreement, the County will notify Professional in writing. This notification will make specific reference to the provision which gave rise to the default. The County will give the Professional seven (7) days to cure the default. The Emergency Management Director is authorized to provide written notice of default on behalf of the County, and if the default situation is not corrected within the allotted time the County Manager is authorized to provide final termination notice on behalf of the County to the Professional.
- 11.2. The County may also terminate the Agreement without cause by providing written notice to the Professional. The County Manager is authorized to provide written notice of termination

- on behalf of the County. Upon such notice, Professional will immediately discontinue all services affected (unless the notice directs otherwise); and, deliver to the County all data, drawings, specifications, reports, estimate, summaries, and such other information and materials as may have been accumulated by the Professional in performing this Agreement, whether completed or in process. In the event of such termination for convenience, Professional recovery against County shall be limited to that portion of the Agreement amount earned through the date of termination, but Professional shall not be entitled to any other or further recovery against County, including, but not limited to, damages, consequential or special damages, or any anticipated fees or profit on portions of the work not performed.
- 11.3. If funds to finance this Agreement become unavailable, the County may terminate the Agreement with no less than twenty-four hours notice in writing to the Professional. The County will be the final authority as to the availability of funds. The County will pay the Professional for all work completed prior to any notice of termination.
- Contract And Work Order In Conflict. Whenever the terms of this Agreement conflict with any Work Order issued pursuant to it, the Agreement shall prevail.

13. Project Records.

- 13.1. For a period of five (5) years, or fifteen (15) years if related to a capital improvement project, after the completion of all work to be performed, or as required by Chapter 119, Florida Statutes (Public Records Act) and schedules published by the Florida Bureau of Archives and Records Management, or federal requirements, whichever period is greater, the Professional shall keep and make available to the County for inspection and copying, upon written request by the County, all records in Professional's possession relating to this Agreement. Additionally, the Professional shall make said records available, upon written request by the County, to any state, federal, or other regulatory authority, and any such authority may review, inspect and copy said records unless exempted under Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.
- 13.2. Any document submitted to the County may be a public record and is open for inspection or copying by any person or entity. "Public records" are defined as all documents, papers, letters, maps, books, tapes, photographs, films, sound recordings, data processing software, or other material, regardless of the physical form, characteristics, or means of transmission, made or received pursuant to law or ordinance or in connection with the transaction of official business by any agency. § 119.011(11), Florida Statutes. Any document is subject to inspection and copying unless exempted under Chapter 119, Florida Statutes.
- 13.3. During the term of this Agreement or license, Professional may claim that some or all of Professional's information, including, but not limited to, software, documentation, manuals, written methodologies and processes, pricing, discounts, or other considerations (hereafter collectively referred to as "Confidential Information"), is, or has been treated as, confidential and proprietary by Professional in accordance with Section 812.081, Florida Statutes, or other law, and is exempt from disclosure under the Public Records Act. Professional shall clearly

identify and mark Confidential Information as "Confidential Information" or "CI" and the County shall use its best efforts to maintain the confidentiality of the information properly identified by the Professional as "Confidential Information" or "CI".

- 13.4. The County shall promptly notify the Professional in writing of any request received by the County for disclosure of Professional's Confidential Information and the Professional may assert any exemption from disclosure available under applicable law or seek a protective order against disclosure for a court of competent jurisdiction. Professional shall protect, defend, indemnify, and hold the County, its officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any claims or judgments arising out of a request for disclosure of Confidential Information. Professional shall investigate, handle, respond to, and defend, using counsel chosen by the County, at Professional's sole cost and expense, any such claim, even if any such claim is groundless, false, or fraudulent. Professional shall pay for all costs and expenses related to such claim, including, but not limited to, payment of attorney fees, court costs, and expert writness fees and expenses. Upon completion of this Agreement or license, the provisions of this paragraph shall continue to survive. Professional releases County from claims or damages related to disclosure by County.
- 14. Ownership of Deliverables. All project deliverables and documents are the sole property of the County and may be used by the County for any purpose.
- 15. <u>Insurance</u>. The Professional will procure and maintain insurance throughout the entire term of this Agreement of the types and in the minimum amounts detailed in Attachment"D".
- 16. <u>Permits</u>. The Professional will obtain and pay for all necessary permits, permit application fees, licenses or any fees required.
- 17. Laws & Regulations. The Professional will comply with all laws, ordinances, regulations, and building code requirements applicable to the work required by this Agreement. The Professional is presumed to be familiar with all state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations that may in any way affect the work outlined in this Agreement. If the Professional is not familiar with state and local laws, ordinances, code rules and regulations, the Professional remains liable for any violation and all subsequent damages or fines.

18. Indemnification.

18.1. The Professional agrees to protect, defend, indemnify, and hold the County and director and their officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any and all losses, penalties, damages, settlements, costs, charges, professional fees or other expenses or liabilities of every kind and character arising out of or directly or indirectly relating to any and all claims, liens, demands, obligations, actions, proceedings or causes of action of every kind and character in connection with or arising directly or indirectly out of this Agreement and/or the performance hereof. Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, any and all such claims,

etc., including but not limited to personal injury, death, damage to property (including destruction) defects in materials or workmanship, actual or alleged infringement of any patent, trademark, copyright (or application for any thereof) or of any other tangible or intangible personal or property right, or any actual or alleged violation of any applicable statute, ordinance, administrative order, rule, or regulation or decree of any court, shall be included in the indemnity hereunder. The Professional further agrees to investigate, handle, respond to, provide defense (including payment of attorney fees, court costs, and expert witness fees and expenses up to and including any appeal) for and defend any such claim at its sole cost and expenses through counsel chosen by the County and agrees to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto, even if they (claims, etc.) are groundless, false, or fraudulent. Professional agrees that indemnification of the County shall extend to any and all work performed by the Professional, its sub Professionals, employees agents, servants or assigns. This obligation shall in no way be limited in any nature whatsoever by any limitation on the amount or type of Professional's insurance coverage. This indemnification provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement between the County and the Professional.

- 18.2. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by the County of sovereign immunity or the provisions of §768.28, Florida Statutes.
- 19. Standard of Care. The services of the Professional shall be performed with the skill and care which would be exercised by a qualified professional performing similar services at the time and place such services are performed. If the failure to meet these standards results in deficiencies in the work required, the Professional shall furnish, at his own cost and expense, the work necessary to correct such deficiencies, and shall be responsible for any and all consequential damages arising from those deficiencies.
- 20. <u>Assignment of Interest</u>. The Professional and County recognize that in actual economic practice, overcharges resulting from antitrust violations are in fact usually borne by the County. Therefore, the Professional hereby assigns to the County any and all claims for such overcharges as to goods, material or services purchased in connection with the Agreement. However, for all other assignments, neither party will assign, convey, pledge, sublet, transfer or otherwise dispose any interest in this Agreement and shall not transfer any interest in same without prior written consent of the other party.
- 21. <u>Successors and Assigns.</u> The County and Professional each bind the other and their respective successors and assigns in all respects to all of the terms, conditions, covenants, and provisions of this Agreement
- 22. <u>Independent Contractor</u>. In the performance of this Agreement, the Professional is acting in the capacity of an independent contractor and not as an agent, employee, partner, joint venturer, or associate of the County. The Professional is solely responsible for the means, method, technique, sequence, and procedure utilized by the Professional in the full performance of the Agreement.

- 23. <u>Collusion</u>. By signing this Agreement, the Professional declares that this Agreement is made without any previous understanding, Agreement, or connections with any persons, professionals or corporations and that this Agreement is fair, and made in good faith without any outside control, collusion, or fraud.
- 24. <u>Conflict of Interest.</u> The Professional warrants that neither it nor any of its employees have any financial or personal interest that conflicts with the execution of this Agreement. The Professional shall notify the County of any conflict of interest due to any other clients, contracts, or property interests.
- 25. Prohibition Against Contingent Fees. As required by §287.055(56), Florida Statutes, the Professional warrants that he or she has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Professional to solicit or secure this Agreement and that he or she has not paid or agreed to pay any person, company, corporation, individual, or firm, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Professional any fee, commission, percentage, gift, or other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this Agreement.
- 26. Third Party Beneficiaries. This Agreement does not create any relationship with, or any rights in favor of, any third party.
- 27. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Agreement is declared void by a court of law, all other provisions will remain in full force and effect
- 28. Non Waiver. The failure of any party to exercise any right in this Agreement shall not be considered a waiver of such right.
- 29. Governing Law and Venue. This Agreement is governed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida. Venue shall be in Alachua County.
- 30. <u>Attachments</u>. All exhibits attached to this Agreement are incorporated into and made part of this Agreement by reference.
- 31. <u>Amendments</u>. The parties may amend this Agreement only by mutual written Agreement of the parties.
- 32. <u>Captions and Section Headings</u>. Captions and section headings used herein are for convenience only and shall not be used in construing this Agreement.
- 33. <u>Counterparts</u>. This agreement may be executed in any number of and by the different parties hereto on separate counterparts, each of which when so executed shall be deemed to be an original, and such counterparts shall together constitute but one and the same instrument

- 34. <u>Construction</u>. This Agreement shall not be construed more strictly against one party than against the other merely by virtue of the fact that it may have been prepared by one of the parties. It is recognized that both parties have substantially contributed to the preparation of this Agreement.
- 35. Entire Contract. This Agreement constitutes the entire Agreement and supersedes all prior written or oral agreements, understandings, or representations.

Executive Summary

Approve the issuance of Purchase Order 111236 to Encore Broadcast, in the amount of \$55,569.38, for the purchase of an audio/visual upgrade to the Emergency Operations Center and authorize the Chair's signature. Prices, terms and conditions are per the Hillsborough County School Board Bild #9156.

Background

On September 11, 2010, Alachua County activated the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in preparation for the Koran Burning incident at Dowe World Outreach Center. During the twelve hour activation several deficiencies with the current usdio-visual system were noted. The EOC is the County's coordination point during disasters, in essence, the voice of government. The audio-visual system is a key component of the County's disaster readiness and resiliency. It is utilized during emergencies to conduct operational briefings with our partners, to provide real time situational awareness into the EOC and to monitor local media and conditions throughout a disaster. The current system has the capability of displaying maps, hazardous materials response software, as well as the County's WebEOC system. Additionally, it is also used for audio conferencing with local partners, Regional assets and the State EOC during activations. Furthermore, the system has the capability to receive video from the Sheriff's beliefopter to provide site reconnaissance. Currently, the system can only broadcast up to three separate sources at one time. There have been new developments in the last two years that have changed the operational landscape. The City of Gainesville has recently built a Traffic Management Center and is willing to give us access to the cameras that make up the system.

Additionally, harring any new budget issues, the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) is planning on installing cameras on Intersate 75 at all of the Gainesville exits. This system would be available in the next 2-3 years. Both systems would aid in any response to traffic accidents involving Hazardous Marerials. Unformately, the EOC does not have the display capacity to be able to view one or more cameras and the EOC systems mentioned above. For example, in order to broadcast the signal from the helicopter, we have to use a cable television inputs. Os it is likely in any given scenario, that we may only have the capacity for one television channel, one map display and the helo feed. Our vendor's proposed solution involves replacing the plasma displays with projectors that will display on whiteboards. The plasmas will be relocated to the Situation Room and the display equipment from there going to equip the County's alternate EOC. In addition to the two projectors, we are asking for the vendor to give us the ability to display four sources to the main projector. In order to do this, we have to replace the current mixer that has a capacity of 16. This leads to another issue of interoperability. The Crestron unti which is the brains of the system is 10 years old and cannot handle the additional inputs. In fact, technicians are no longer trained to program or repeatior UC restron model. Therefore, it would need to be replaced as well.

The funding is available through grant and contract work with the State. Not approving the upgrades could hinder future disaster operations

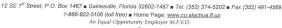

Executive Summary

This request is for the approval of a Resolution urging the State Legislature to respect the constitutional and statutory home rule authority of local governments with respect to the enactment, monitoring and enforcement of environmental protection ordinances; specifically House Bill 457 and Senate Bill 606 preempting to local regulation fertilizers

Background

On September 22nd, 2009, Alachua County adopted the Fertilizer Standards and Management Practices Code. The adopted Code is modeled after the Florida Department of Environmental Protection "Model Code". The State Legislature is currently considering legislation aimed at restricting and preempting the local regulation of fertilizers. As drafted, the proposed Bills will not immediately impact the Alachua County's Fertilizer Code; however they would severely restrict the County's ability to adopt more stringent requirements in the future. On March 21st, 2009, the BoCC received a letter from the City of Sanibel addressing this issue and requesting that the BoCC take action in support of Home Rule Authority. At their regular meeting on April 5th, 2009, the Environmental Protection Advisory Committee approved a letter in opposition of the proposed Bills and requested that the BoCC adopt a Resolution in opposition of the proposed Bills.

RESOLUTION 11-36

A RESOLUTION STRONGLY URGING THE STATE LEGISLATURE TO RESPECT THE CONSTITUTIONAL AND STATUTORY HOME RULE AUTHORITY OF LOCAL GOVERNMENTS WITH RESPECT TO THE ENACTMENT, MONITORING AND ENFORCEMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION ORDINANCES, DIRECTING THE COUNTY MANAGER TO FORWARD A COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE GOVERNOR, THE STATE SENATE PRESIDENT AND THE STATE HOUSE SPEAKER; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHERAS, Article VIII, Section 1(g), Florida Constitution, provides that charter counties have all powers of local self government not inconsistent with general law; and,

WHEREAS, Alachua County has historically recognized the need for the enactment, monitoring and enforcement of local environmental protection ordinances; and,

WHEREAS, in 2009, the County adopted an ordinance which regulates the indiscriminate use of fertilizers in urban landscapes to better protect drinking waters supplies, springs, and other waterways; and,

WHEREAS, approximately 50 local government jurisdictions have enacted ordinances to reasonably regulate the excessive use of fertilizer in urban landscapes; and,

WHEREAS, there are currently proposed State legislative bills which will completely preempt the authority of all local government jurisdictions to reasonably regulate the application of Fetilizers; and,

WHEREAS, it is critical that the State legislature respect the constitutional and statutory Home Rule authority of local government jurisdictions and understand that the regulation of these issues can only be effective if they are enacted, monitored and enforced at the local jurisdiction level:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners, that:

SECTION 1.

- (a) It is hereby requested that the Florida Legislature refrain from any preemption of local government authority and respect local governments' constitutional and statutory Home Rule powers with respect to the enactment, monitoring and enforcement of environmental protection ordinances.
- (b) In the event that any legislation is enacted by the State legislature contrary to the above request, it is strongly urged that the State legislature leave all existing local ordinances fully

intact and "grandfathered" in their entirety and, further, that all local jurisdictions be authorized to adopt more restrictive regulations than those enacted in any "State Model" or statewide regulation.

SECTION 2. The County Manager is hereby directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to Governor Scott, State Senate President Michael Haridopolos, Speaker of the State House of Representatives Dean Cannon, and the local legislative delegation.

SECTION 3. Effective date. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

Dear Chair Pinkoson and Commissioners:

In 2008, the Florida legislature adopted a statute regulating application of fertilizers on urban landscapes. The statute promoted local adoption of a "Model Ordinance for Florida-Friendly Fertilizer Use on Urban Landscapes" while recognizing that local conditions may "necessitate the implementation of additional or more stringent fertilizer management practices at the local government level." In 2009, our County Commission adopted the Model Ordinance.

Two bills (H.B. 457 and S. 606) currently moving through the Committee process in Tallahassee would gut any local flexibility to modify its fertilizer regulations in light of new scientific findings or changed environmental conditions. The purpose of the bills is ostensibly to "ensure uniform health safety standards". In fact, the impact of fertilizers on Florida waters is anything but uniform. Should they become necessary, sensible regulations beyond the provisions contained in the Model Ordinance would best be implemented locally.

In 2008, EPAC communicated its support for the Model Ordinance to the Commission, while noting that additional information might require consideration of greater environmental protection in the future. What considerations might lead a future Commission to consider other conditions on the use of urban fertilizers? One example might be a State or County program to improve the degraded water quality of our local springs. Another might be a Federal or State mandate to comply with new environmental standards for clean-up of surface waters.

EPAC members would urge you to convey your opposition to H.B. 457 and S. 606 to our State legislature. Both of these bills would impose an inflexible State-wide approach to fertilizer regulation which would nullify the Home Rule authority of current and future Commissions to protect Alachua County citizens and our local environment.

This letter is being sent to you because your local government has enacted legislation, or is considering the enactment of legislation, to reduce the excessive amounts of nitrogen and phosphorus entering your jurisdiction's waterways, its lakes and rivers or its bays and estuaries. Your jurisdiction, along with dozens of other local governments, knows that reducing and protecting against algae blooms, red tide and fish kills is not just about the environment; it is about the primary resource that is the lifeblood of our economic engine, including tourism, ecotourism, sport and commercial fishing and ultimately our quality of life in Florida.

There will be a concerted effort in this year's state legislative session to undo what you have done in terms of protecting your local waterways. A state "model ordinance" will be proposed that will preempt your local government's right to protect its citizens and their waterways by regulating the introduction of nitrogen and phosphorus which occurs during excess fertilization of lawns. The proponents of the new state law, which will override your efforts of the past years and take away your local government rights to regulate in the future, will argue their position using such catch phrase words as "ease of regulation", "uniformity" and "cost savings to the public." The fact of the matter, however, is that this issue will not be effectively addressed with a "model" state ordinance; it will only be addressed effectively at the local jurisdiction level.

If we collectively fail to act, our Home Rule authority in this area will be eviscerated and our ability to regulate locally to protect our citizens and our local waters will be preempted completely by the state legislative. Please contact your local legislative delegation and other legislators and make it clear where you stand on this issue. The state legislature has many important priorities this legislative session. Taking away local governments' right to legislate for the protection of our local citizens, our local economy and our local environment certainly should not be one of them.

A RESOLUTION STRONGLY URGING THE STATE LEGISLATURE TO RESPECT THE CONSTITUTIONAL AND STATUTORY HOME RULE AUTHORITY OF LOCAL GOVERNMENTS WITH RESPECT TO THE ENACTMENT, MONITORING AND ENFORCEMENT OF NITROGEN AND PHOSPHORUS CONTROL ORDINANCES, WHICH INCLUDE PROHIBITIONS ON EXCESSIVE FERTILIZATION OF LAWNS AND RULES REASONABLY RELATED THERETO; DIRECTING THE CITY MANAGER TO FORWARD A COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE GOVERNOR, THE STATE SENATE PRESIDENT AND THE STATE HOUSE SPEAKER; DIRECTING THE CITY MANAGER TO FORWARD A COPY OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE OVER 50 LOCAL GOVERNMENT JURISDICTIONS WHO HAVE ENACTED REASONABLE REGULATIONS ATTEMPTING TO LIMIT EXCESSIVE NITROGEN AND PHOSPHORUS ENTERING THEIR LOCAL WATERWAYS THROUGH OVER FERTILIZATION OF LAWNS AND OTHER VEGETATION, AS WELL AS THOSE JURISDICTIONS THAT ARE CONSIDERING SUCH LEGISLATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City of Sanibel has recognized the detrimental effects of the introduction of excessive amounts of nitrogen and to some extent phosphorus into the local bays and estuaries surrounding Sanibel Island; and

WHEREAS, in 2007, the City adopted an ordinance which regulates the indiscriminate use of fertilizers which invariably, primarily through run-off, enter our local waterways; and

WHEREAS, excessive nitrogen has been directly linked to harmful nuisance drift algal blooms on area beaches, fish kills and other abnormal or exacerbated events in our surrounding rivers, bays and estuaries; and

WHEREAS, a two-year scientific study was jointly commissioned by the City of Sanibel, the Lee County Board of County Commissioners, the Lee County Tourist Development Council, and the West Coast Inland Navigation District to investigate Bioavailability and Sources of Nutrients and Linkages to Nuisance Drift Algae: and

WHEREAS, the study was conducted by a team of scientists from Florida Gulf Coast University, the Sanibel-Captva Conservation Foundation, the University of Miami, Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, the University of New Hampshire, and Nova Southeastern University; and

WHEREAS, the study found that nitrogen was the primary nutrient limiting the growth of microalgae and macroalgae in the waters surrounding Sanibel Island, and that a majority of the nitrogen is coming from Lake Okeechobee and the eastern portion of the Caloosahatchee watershed; and

WHEREAS, nitrogen reduction strategies to address both inorganic and organic forms are critical to mitigate microalgal and macroalgal blooms in the Culoosahatchee River and Estuary and surrounding waters of Sanibel Island; and

WHEREAS, approximately 50 local government jurisdictions have enacted ordinances to reasonably regulate the excessive use of fertilizer and the attendant introduction of nitrogen and phosphorus into the local waterways of their jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, there are currently proposed State legislative bills which will completely preempt the authority of all local government jurisdictions to reasonably regulate fertilizer and the introduction of nitrogen and phosphorus into local waterways; and

WHEREAS, it is critical that the State legislature respect the constitutional and statutory Home Rule authority of local government jurisdictions and understand that the regulation of these issues can only be effective if they are enacted, monitored and enforced at the local jurisdiction level;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Sanibel, Florida, that:

SECTION 1.

- (a) It is hereby requested that the Florida Legislature refrain from any preemption of local government authority and respect local governments' constitutional and statutory Home Rule powers with respect to the enactment, monitoring and enforcement of nitrogen and phosphorus control ordinances, which include prohibitions on excessive fertilization of lawns and rules reasonably related thereto.
- (b) In the event that any legislation is enacted by the State legislature contrary to the above request, it is strongly urged that the State legislature leave all existing local ordinances fully intact and "grandfathered" in their entirety and, further, that all local jurisdictions be authorized to adopt more restrictive regulations than those enacted in any "State Model" or statewide regulation.

SECTION 2. The City Manager is hereby directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to Governor Scott, State Senate President Michael Haridopolos, Speaker of the State House of Representatives Dean Cannon, and the local legislative delegation.

SECTION 3. The City Manager is hereby directed to forward a copy of this Resolution to the over 50 local government jurisdictions who have enacted reasonable regulations attempting to limit the excessive nitrogen and phosphorus entering their local waterways through over fertilization of lawns and similar vegetation, as well as those jurisdictions that are considering such legislation.

SECTION 4. Effective date.

This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon adoption.

Executive Summary

Resolution authorizing the conveyance of an easement for public utilities to the City of Gainesville over the County's Sheriff's Office property for the purpose of constructing, operating and maintaining a new loop feed system to improve electrical service reliability to the various buildings located on the Sheriff's Office property.

Background

The City of Gainesville (GRU) has made a written request for the conveyance of an easement over the County's Sheriff's Office property in order to construct, operate, repair and maintain a new loop feed system to improve public utility service reliability to all of the various buildings located on the property. The County's Sheriff's Office is located on the south side of Southeast Hawthorne Road (State Road 20), east of \$E 24 Street and west of SW 27 Street.

Issues

In 1996 Alachua County granted GRU an easement by Resolution 96-109 when the sheriff's office was developed from the old Win Dixie shopping center, at it's current location. Since that time the communications center and a garage building have been constructed on the property without benefit of any other easements being granted to GRU. To improve service reliability to the entire property GRU is proposing to install a loop feed system to service all buildings located on the property. If this easement is not granted, GRU only has the right to service the actual sheriff's office building and no legal rights to the other buildings currently being provided utility services by GRU.

The Board's Financial Policies require a Capital Improvement Program (CIP) quarterly report be presented to update the Commission and community on one of the larger portions of County Budget. Each quarter the County's CIP divisions submit project highlights that occurred in the previous quarter along with new capital preservation and emergency projects that the Board needs to add to the Amended CIP (non-capital preservation/erregency projects still require Board approval prior to project start). Also included is a list of all active and past projects (past 3 fiscal year actual expenditures, current year budgets and year-to-date actual expenditures, and next fiscal year proposed budget if a policiable.

Background

Executive Summary

Amendment to Agreement for Limited Use of Easement Area between Florida Power Corporation and Alachua County related to NW 83 Street..

Background

On July 21, 1970 Florida Power Corporation and Alachua County entered into an Agreement for Limited Use of Essement Area, as recorded on July 22, 1970, in Official Record Book 651, page 191 of the public records of Alachua County, Florida for the construction of NW 83 Street. The original agreement specifically prohibited certain actions, i.e. (a) below-ground utilities such as sewers, water or gas pipes, or telephone systems located or constructed within the easement area; (b) overhead utilities, buildings, structures or trees located within the easement area; (b) use of the easement area; (b) overhead utilities, buildings, structures or trees located within the easement area; and (c) use of the easement area; or whethical parking purposes. The County now desires to install, own and operate signal cabinets on NW 83 Street and an underground two inch (2") diameter conduit for fiber optic cable within the easement area from NW 23 Avenue to NW 39 Avenue. Florida Power Corporation and the County have agreed to amend the original Agreement in order to allow the County to construct the signal cabinets and fiber optic conduit as requested as part of the Traffic Management System. NW 83 Street lies between NW 23 Avenue and NW 39 Avenue, east of 1-75

Issues

If the Amendment to Agreement for Limited Use of Easement Area between Florida Power Corporation and Alachua County related to NW 83 Street is not executed by the Board the County will not have the right to have the signal cabinets constructed, or installation of the fiber optic conduit.

AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR LIMITED USE OF EASEMENT AREA

THIS AMENDMENT TO AGREEMENT FOR LIMITED USE OF EASEMENT AREA ("Amendment"), is made and entered into effective as of the 26-th and of the 26-th and of the 26-th and of the 26-th and of the 26-th and 18-th a

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, PEF and COUNTY entered into that certain Agreement for Limited Use of Easement Area, dated July 21, 1970, a copy of which was recorded on July 22, 1970, in Official Record Book 651, Page 191 of the Public Records of Alachua County, Florida ("Agreement");

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Agreement, PEF consented to COUNTY's limited occupation and use of a certain portion of PEF's electric transmission powerline easement solely for the purposes of COUNTY's construction, utilization and maintenance of a public roadway for vehicular and pedestrian traffic, including attendant underground drainage facilities as specified in the Agreement:

WHEREAS, the Agreement restricted COUNTY's use of PEF's easement so as to prohibit, among other things specified therein: (a) below-ground utilities such as sewers, water or gas pipes, or telephone systems located or constructed within the subject easement area; (b) overhead utilities, buildings, structures or trees located within the subject easement area; and, (c) use of the subject easement area for vehicular parking purposes:

WHEREAS, the Agreement and its provisions inure to the benefit of, and is binding upon, both PEF and COUNTY and their respective successors and assigns;

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Agreement, COUNTY has constructed, and is using and maintaining, NW 83rd Street in Alachua County, Florida;

WHEREAS, COUNTY desires to install, own and operate signal cabinets on NW 83rd Street, and a two inch (2") diameter conduit containing a fiber optic cable embedded below ground surface level, within that portion of PEF's easement subject to the Agreement, between NW 33rd Avenue and NW 33th Avenue:

WHEREAS, COUNTY has contracted with the City of Gainesville to perform such installation work by way of directional bore between signal cabinets on NW 83rd Street,

from NW 23rd Avenue to South Road, then to North Road, and then to NW 39th Avenue, while maintaining a required fifteen feet (15') of separation between the fiber optic cable conduit and all PEF facilities, including Structures GH-81 to and including GH-92;

WHEREAS, COUNTY has submitted to PEF copies of COUNTY's construction plan drawings depicting the location, depth, type and manner of construction of COUNTY's signal cabinets and fiber optic strand conduit (a copy of which are attached hereto as **Exhibit** "A," and incorporated herein), and COUNTY agrees to install such cabinets and conduit in substantial conformity with such plans; and,

WHEREAS, COUNTY has requested PEF's consent to such conduit installation and PEF is willing to grant its consent upon the same conditions contained in the Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, PEF and COUNTY agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The following language shall be added to the end of Paragraph 2 of the Agreement:

"Notwithstanding the foregoing restrictions on COUNTY's use and occupation of FLORIDA's Easement Area. COUNTY further is permitted to install, own and operate a two inch (2") diameter conduit containing a fiber optic cable within FLORIDA's Easement Area, embedded below ground surface level and running from COUNTY's signal cabinets to be installed on NW 83rd Street, between NW 23rd Avenue and NW 39th Avenue, all in substantial conformity with COUNTY's construction plan drawings submitted to FLORIDA, which are incorporated herein by this reference. Such conduit installation work shall be performed for COUNTY by the City of Gainesville, as COUNTY's agent pursuant to contract, and shall be conducted by way of directional bore. COUNTY shall maintain a required fifteen feet (15') of separation between such fiber optic cable conduit and all of FLORIDA's facilities, including Structures GH-81 to and including GH-92."

 In all other respects the Agreement remains unaltered, and the Agreement as hereby amended continues to inure to the benefit of and be binding upon both PEF and COUNTY, and their respective successors and assigns. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, PEF and COUNTY have each hereunto set their respective hands and seals as of the day and year above written.

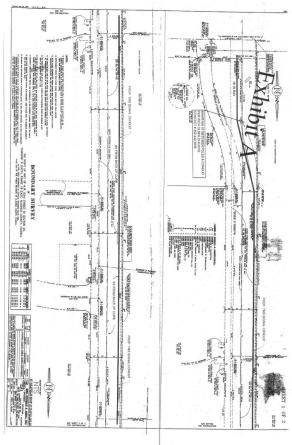

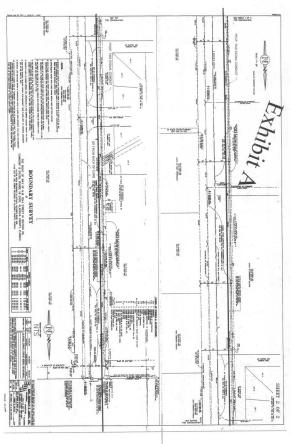

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, FLORIDA is the owner and user of an easement secured by virtue of an Order of Taking in the case of Florida Fower Corporation vs. Roy D. Cellon, et al. - Lew No. 2650, Alachua County, Florida, encumbering a 100-foot wide Easement Area through the Wig of Wig of Ey and the Ey of Ey of Wig of Section 29, Township 9 South, Range 19 East, Alachua County, Florida; and

WHEREAS, FLORIDA is operating and maintaining a high voltage electric transmission line within the said Easement Area and intends to continue said operations indefinitely; and

WHEREAS, COUNTY is now the owner of the fee simple title to the land underlying a certain portion of FLORIDA'S Easement Area and desires to obtain the consent of FLORIDA to occupy and utilize said certain portion of Easement Area for the hereinafter stated purposes only, and for which COUNTY covenants that it will not therein interfere with the saie and efficient operation and maintenance of the said electric transmission line, and FLORIDA is agreeable to such use.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises, terms, conditions and covenants contained herein, the Parties hereto covenant and agree as follows:

- 1. That COUNTY shall notify Mr. F. E. Badger, FLORIDA'S Superintendent of Transmission Construction and Maintenance (Telephone: 898-2141, St. Petersburg) at least 48 hours before commencing any activities within the Easement Area so that, if desirable, FLORIDA can have a representative present to observe the activities.
- That COUNTY'S occupancy and utilization of a portion of FLORIDA'S
 Easement Area shall be limited to that necessary only to construct, utilize and
 maintain a public roadway for vehicular and pedestrian traffic, including
 attendant underground drainage facilities, the location and specifications of

which are as shown on Exhibit "A" attached herato and made a part hereof, provided further (a) that no below-ground utilities such as sewers, water or gas pipes, or telephone systems shall be located or constructed within the Easement Area; (b) that no overhead utilities, buildings, structures or trees, shall be located within said Easement Area; and (c) that the said Easement Area shall at no time be utilized for vehicular parking purphses.

- 3. That COUNTY'S operation of any boom-type equipment within FLORIDA'S
 Easement Area shall at all times be in strict compliance with applicable provisions of the National Electrical Safety Code and the rules and regulations of the Florida Industrial Commission.
- 4. That any spoil removed during expavation in connection with said roadway shall not be deposited within the Easement Area and said Easement Area is to be left in a clean and presentable condition acceptable to FLORIDA.
- 5. That COUNTY shall hold FLORIDA nameless from any damage to COUNTY'S roadway within the Easement Area, which damage is caused by FLORIDA'S patrol, maintenance, operation and/or repair of its electric transmission line and related facilities.
- 6. That COUNTY, in and about its activities within and/or its occupancy and utilization of a portion of FLORIDA'S Easement Area, and COUNTY so covenants, shall not therein interfere with the maintenance of FLORIDA'S said electric transmission line.
- 7. That in the event ELORIDA shall be put to any additional expense in connection with subsequent activities involving the relocation and/or rehabilitation of its electric transmission facilities by reason of COUNTY'S occupancy and utilization of said Easement Area, amount of such additional expense within ten (10) days after notification in writing by ELORIDA.
- 8. That nothing contained in this Agreement or contemplated is intended to or shall increase FLORIDA'S risk or liability for personal injury or death or for any property damage beyond that which FLORIDA might have had except for this limited consent, and it is hereby expressly understood and agreed that FLORIDA does not assume any such additional risk and that liability arising out of the use and occupancy of said Easement Area by COUNTY, its employees, licensees, agents, contractors, or any representative, shall be at the sole and exclusive risk of COUNTY.

- That the consent herein granted shall cease and terminate and shall be null and void upon the breach of any covenant set forth in this indenture.
- 10. That this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the Parties hereto and their respective successors or assigns.

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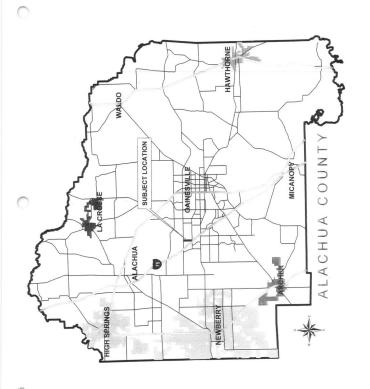

Executive Summary

The Alachua County SHIP Local Housing Assistance Plan for SFY 2012-2014 is a three year plan that delineates how SHIP funds would be spent to preserve and maintain affordable housing in Alachua County. The program requires that a new plan be submitted every three years. The current plan expires June 30, 2011. For these reasons, staff has prepared a new plan in the event that funding becomes available for the coming year (s).

Background

The SHIP Program is funded by documentary stamps and distributed by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation to eligible local governments. A three year Local Housing Assistance Plan is required to continue to obtain SHIP funds. The current SHIP Local Housing Assistance Plan, most recently revised in August, 2009, exprise June 30, 2011. The Florida Housing Finance Corporation requires that the new plan be submitted by May 3, 2011 to be considered for funding in SFY 2012, in the event that SHIP funding is included in the upcoming state budget. As there are currently no projections available as to anticipated allocations by county for SFY 2012, staff generated a budget based on the minimum SHIP allocation amount.

Issue:

Although SHIP funding could potentially be eliminated from the State of Florida's budget, a new 3 year SHIP Plan must be

submitted to the Florida Housing Finance Corporation by May 3, 2011 to be eligible for SFY 2012 funding, should any funds be included in the State of Florida's budget.

The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) recently announced the State of Florida, Department of Community Affairs will receive Neighborhood Stabilization 3 (NSP-3) funds in the amount of \$8,511,111.00. A review of the HUD data on foreclosures and related issues indicates that eight counties had the greatest need for NSP-3 funding.

One of the original eight counties that were offered NSP-3 funding has declined the full allocation. Alachua County is the next eligible county and is being offered \$1,029,844. The Department looks forward to working with you as your county begins to implement its NSP-3 program.

The Department has submitted an Action Plan to HUD that outlines the manner in which the funds will be used. You may access the NSP-3 Substantial Amendment of the Action Plan on the Department website at https://www.floridacommunitydevelopment.org/cdbg/NSP.cfm. Counties receiving funding will be required to complete an application and submit it to the Department by June 2, 2011. Counties must consider the needs of incorporated areas when deciding on an area to address for the maximum amount of impact. The Department must submit a revised NSP-3 application and Action Plan to HUD by June 30, 2011.

In order to facilitate the application process, we are asking the targeted communities to complete the enclosed 'Notice of Intent to Apply' form. The signed copy of the Intent form may be scanned and emailed to NSP@dcastate.Ins. However, please return the original signed Intent form by U.S. mail, Certified Mail Return Receipt Requested, as soon as possible indicating whether your community will or will not apply for the funds by April 28, 2011.

A copy of the NSP-3 application was provided to attendees of the April 18-19, 2011 NSP-3 Workshop. I have enclosed a copy of the application and instructions for your completion and submittal to DCA by June 2, 2011. Immediately after receipt and review of your application, the Department will contact you regarding the scheduling of project site visits.

B.

Creation of the Plan is for the purpose of meeting the housing needs of the very low, low and moderate income households, to expand production of and preserve affordable housing, to further the housing element of the local government comprehensive plan specific to affordable housing.

C. Fiscal years covered by the Plan: 2011-2012, 2012-2013, 2013-2014

D. Governance

The SHIP Program is established in accordance with Section 420.907-9079, Florida Statutes and Chapter 67-37.007 Florida Administrative Code. The SHIP Program does further the housing element of the local government Comprehensive Plan.

Cities and Counties must be in compliance with these applicable statutes and rules.

E. Local Housing Partnership

Alachua County continues to build active partnerships among community-based organizations, for-profit housing developers, lending institutions, nonprofit providers of affordable housing, local municipalities, providers of professional services relating to affordable housing and social service organizations working on behalf of persons with special housing needs.

1. Leveraging:

The Plans are intended to increase the availability of affordable residential units by combining local resources and cost saving measures into a local housing partnership and using public and private funds to reduce the cost of housing. SHIP funds may be leveraged with or used to supplement other Florida Housing Finance Corporation programs and to provide local match to obtain federal housing grants or programs.

G. Public Input:

Public input was solicited through face to face meetings with builders, lenders, realtors, and other housing professionals.

H. Advertising and Outreach

Alachua County shall advertise the notice of funding availability in a newspaper of general circulation and periodicals serving ethnic and diverse neighborhoods, at least 30 days before the beginning of the application period. If no funding is available due to a waiting list, no notice of funding availability is required.

I. Discrimination:

In accordance with the provisions of ss.760.20-760.37, it is unlawful to discriminate on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, age, sex, marital status, familial status, national origin, or handicap in the award application process for eligible housing.

J. Support Services and Counseling:

Numerous support services are available to households assisted through the SHIP Local Housing Assistance Plan. Administered jointly by Alachua County and the City of Gainesville, The First Time Home Buyer Training Program is available for potential applicants for County and City SHIP Down Payment Assistance Programs. First-time Home Buyer Training is also available through Neighborhood Housing Development Corporation (NHDC), a SHIP-sponsored non-profit agency.

K. Purchase Price Limits:

The sales price of new and existing units, which can be lower but may not 90% of the median area purchase price established by the U.S. Treasury Department or as described above

The purchase price limit for new and existing homes is shown on the Housing Delivery Goals Charts

L. Income Limits, Rent Limits and Affordability:

The Income and Rent Limits used in the SHIP Program are updated annually from the Department of Housing and Urban Development and distributed by Florida Housing Finance Corporation. Affordable means that monthly rents or mortgage payments including taxes and insurance do not exceed 30 percent of that amount which represents the percentage of the median annual gross income for the households as indicated in Sections 420.9071 F.S. However it is not the intent to limit an individual household's ability to devote more than

30% of its income for housing, and housing for which a household devotes more than 30% of its income shall be deemed Affordable if the first institutional mortgage lender is satisfied that the household can afford mortgage payments in excess of the 30% benchmark and in the case of rental housing does not exceed those rental limits adjusted for bedroom size.

M. Welfare Transition Program:

Should a eligible sponsor be used, the city/county has developed a qualification system and selection criteria for applications for Awards to eligible sponsors, which includes a description that demonstrates how eligible sponsors that employed personnel from the Welfare Transition Program will be given preference in the selection process.

N. Monitoring and First Right of Refusal:

In the case of rental housing, the staff or entity that has administrative authority for implementing the local housing assistance plan assisting rental developments shall annually monitor and determine tenant eligibility or, to the extent another governmental entity provides the same monitoring and determination: a

municipality, county or local housing financing authority may rely on such monitoring and determination of tenant eligibility. However, any loan or grant in the original amount of \$3,000 or less shall not be subject to these annual monitoring and determination of tenant eligibility requirements. Tenant eligibility will be monitored for at least annually for 15 years or the term of assistance whichever is longer unless as specified above.

Eligible sponsors that offer rental housing for sale before 15 years or that have remaining mortgages funded under this program must give a first right of refusal to eligible nonprofit organizations for purchase at the current market value for continued occupancy by eligible persons.

O. Administrative Budget:

A detailed listing including line-item budget of proposed Administrative Expenditures is attached as Exhibit A. These are presented on an annual basis for each State fiscal year submitted.

The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners finds that the moneys deposited in the local housing assistance trust fund shall be used to administer and implement the local housing assistance plan. Section 420,9075 Florida Statute and Chapter 67-37, Florida Administrative Code, provides:

A county or an eligible municipality may not exceed the 5 percent limitation on administrative costs, unless its governing body finds, by resolution, that 5 percent of the local housing distribution plus 5 percent of program income is insufficient to adequately pay the necessary costs of administering the local housing assistance plan. The cost of administering the program may not exceed 10 percent of the local housing distribution plus 5% of program income deposited into the trust fund, except that small counties, as defined in s. 120.52(17), and eligible municipalities receiving a local housing distribution of up to \$350,000 may use up to 10 percent of program income for administrative costs.

The Alachua County Board of County Commissioners has adopted the above findings in the attached resolution, Exhibit E.

P. Program Administration:

Administration of the local housing assistance plan is the responsibility of the Department of Growth Management of Alachua County. The Alachua County Community Support Services Department will administer the Rental Deposit Assistance Program.

O. Essential Service Personnel:

Essential Service personnel for this plan shall be defined as teachers and educators; school district, community college, and university employees; police; fire emergency services personnel; code enforcement personnel; health care personnel, and skilled building trades personnel.

II. LHAP HOUSING STRATEGIES

A. DOWN PAYMENT WITH CONSTRUCTION/REHABILITATION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

a. Summary of the Strategy

The Down Payment with Construction/Rehabilitation Assistance Program will provide down payment, closing cost, and rehabilitation assistance to eligible home buyers of eligible homes. Lender guidelines have been established to ensure that households are not cost burdened by housing payments after receiving SHIP assistance.

i. Assistance for the purchase of homes requiring rehabilitation

Funds will be made available for home repairs to assist eligible households with the purchase of existing homes in need of rehabilitation. A maximum SHIP award, as established by resolution, will be available for down payment, closing cost assistance, and home repairs. Eligible home repairs include but are not limited to the cost of labor and materials for:

- Repairs needed to meet or exceed the requirements of the Florida Building Code, ss. 553.70-553.898 F.S., as amended and adopted by Alachua County Ordinance 02-01.
- 2. Roof repair or replacement.
- 3. Repair, replacement, or provision of heating and/or cooling system.
- 4. Energy conservation measures such as insulation, weather-stripping, etc.
- Alterations to the unit's exterior or interior to provide greater accessibility for the disabled, as defined by the Social Security Act, or for family members over the age of 62.
- Other repairs as recommended by a certified SHIP inspector and approved by the Alachua County SHIP program.

Repairs will be completed within 90 days of closing.

ii. Assistance for the purchase of newly constructed homes

Funds will be made available to assist eligible households with the purchase of newly constructed homes. A SHIP award will be available for down payment, and closing cost assistance for homes meeting the following definitions

- If a home is being constructed involving a construction agreement between the eligible home buyer and a licensed general contractor.
- If a home has obtained a certificate of occupancy in the 12 month period preceding the contract for sale and purchase.
- 3. If a home was built as a model home and has never been occupied.
- If the final appraised value (including land value), is less than or equal to the maximum purchase price.

b. Fiscal Years Covered

The Down Payment with Construction/Rehabilitation Assistance Program will be available in FY 2011-2012, 2012-2013, and 2013-2014.

c. Income Categories to Be Served

The income categories to be served are low and very low income households up to 80% AMI per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits for Gainesville MSA, as updated and distributed annually by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

d. Maximum Award

See Exhibit C: Housing Delivery Goal Charts for the maximum awards for SFY 2011-2012 2012-2013 and SFY 2013-2014 funding.

e. Terms, Recapture, & Default

Funding for this program will be provided on a first-come first-served basis in the form of a zero-interest, 10 year deferred payment loan. Payment is due upon sale if sold within the 10 year term. If sold after the 10 year term, no repayment is required. As long as the recipient continues to own the assisted property and live in the property as their principal residence during the term of the mortgage, then the loan will not have to be repaid. Any down payment, closing cost, or rehab assistance will be included in a recorded mortgage and will be subject to the above recapture provisions. Default of the loan occurs if the mortgagor no longer resides in the home as the principal residence, or if any part of the Property or any interest in it is sold, transferred, gifted or otherwise conveyed, whether by voluntary act, involuntarily, by operation of law or otherwise, or if the Mortgagor is divested of title by judicial sale, levy or other proceeding, or if foreclosure action is instituted against the property, or if the Property is leased or rented. A subordination of this deferred payment mortgage will only be approved under the guidelines of the Subordination Policy established by the Alachua County SHIP Program. A portion of the deferred payment second mortgage may be forgiven in cases where the loan-to-value ratio exceeds 100% and the home must be sold due to a catastrophic event (i.e. borrower's death or divorce, an extended illness of the borrower or a close family member who depends primarily on the borrower for support, etc. All repayments from this program shall be considered program income.

f. Recipient Selection Criteria

Eligible applicants meeting the following threshold requirements will be served on a first come first served basis:

1. Be very low or low- income under applicable U.S. Department of Housing and

Urban Development (HUD) income guidelines, as updated and distributed annually by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

- 2. Be a first-time home buyer, defined as persons or households who have not owned a home other than a mobile home or a manufactured home during the three-year period immediately prior to purchase with SHIP funds, except that the following persons shall not be excluded from consideration as a first-time home buyer:
 - Single parent, as defined by HUD.
 - Displaced homemaker, as defined by HUD or displaced from homeownership by divorce.
 - An individual or household living in a substandard dwelling that cannot be brought into compliance with local building and housing codes for less than the cost of constructing a permanent structure.
- Have successfully completed a Home Buyer Education Workshop as evidenced by a certificate of attendance issued by a HUD Approved Counseling Agency, which must be obtained prior to attending closing and preferably prior to signing a sales contract.
- Be qualified for purchase through a lending institution, as evidenced by an Executed Mortgage Loan commitment. Private investors and seller financing is not permitted.
- Have an executed sales contract in the name of the applicant to purchase an eligible home.

Eligible homes must meet the following threshold requirements:

- Eligible homes shall be located in Alachua County outside the city limits of Gainesville.
- Maximum property values for new construction or for existing units after rehabilitation shall be as identified in the attached Exhibit C: Housing Goals Charts.
- Mortgage payments (including principal, interest, taxes, and insurance, may not exceed 36% of the household's gross monthly income.
- 4. Each unit must meet and may exceed minimum housing code.
- 5. Manufactured homes must be two years old or newer.

g. Sponsor Selection Criteria

Not applicable.

h. Additional Information

Clients will be referred to the Alachua County Housing Finance Authority's Single Family Mortgage Revenue Bond Program, the Florida Housing Finance Corporation's First Time Homebuyer Program, Rural Development, and other available funding.

B. HOME REPAIR PROGRAM

a. Summary of the Strategy

The Home Repair Program is designed for the rehabilitation of owner occupied single family housing. Eligible activities include: emergency repair/rehabilitation of substandard housing, moderate housing rehabilitation, and leveraging for state/federal grant or loan programs (ex. CDBG, HOME). To be designated as an Emergency Repair Project, the unit must be the dwelling of a household receiving less than 50% of the Area Median Income, adjusted for family size; OR be the dwelling of a disabled person as defined by the Social Security Act, AND be in a severely distressed state such as a dwelling where continued habitation would put the owner at serious physical risk, and defined as such by approved County inspectors. Sub-recipients may be not for profit or for profit housing providers. Funding for sub-recipients will be awarded on a competitive basis. Alachua County may designate funding from this strategy for its own match with CDBG, or may use to target this funding for specific neighborhood projects at its own discretion.

b. Fiscal year(s) Covered

The Home Repair Program will be available in FY 2012, 2013, and 2014.

d. Income Categories to Be Served

The income categories to be served are low and very low income households up to 80% AMI per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits for Gainesville MSA, as updated and distributed annually by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

d. Maximum Award: See housing delivery goals charts

e. Terms, Recapture, and Default

Funding for this program will be provided on a first-come first-served basis in the form of a zero-interest, deferred payment loan. Funding shall be provided in the form of a zero-interest, 10 year, forgiven, deferred payment loan. Each year the owner resides in the assisted unit, the loan principal shall be reduced by 10%. At the end of the tenth year, the agreement shall expire of its own accord. As long as the recipient continues to own the assisted property and live in the property as their principal residence during the term of the mortgage, then the loan will not have to be repaid. All rehab assistance will be included in a recorded mortgage and will be subject to the above recapture provisions,

Any eligible developer fee charged by the sub-recipient shall be considered as a grant to the homeowner and shall require no re-payment by the homeowner. All repayments

from this program shall be considered program income.

Default of the loan occurs if the mortgagor no longer resides in the home as the principal residence, or if any part of the Property or any interest in it is sold, transferred, gifted or otherwise conveyed, whether by voluntary act, involuntarily, by operation law or otherwise, or if the Mortgagor is divested of title by judicial sale, levy or other proceeding, or if foreclosure action is instituted against the property, or if the Property is leased or rented. A subordination of this deferred payment mortgage will only be approved under the guidelines of the Subordination Policy established by the Alachua County SHIP Program.

A portion of the deferred payment second mortgage may be forgiven in cases where the loan to value ratio exceeds 100% and the home must be sold due to a catastrophic event, (i.e. borrower's death or divorce, an extended illness of the borrower or a close family member who depends primarily on the borrower for support, etc.)

f. Recipient Selection Criteria

- The assisted unit must be owner occupied, the primary residence of the owner, must be located in Alachua County, and outside the City of Gainesville.
- Manufactured homes older than 2 years are ineligible for this program. All units must meet the standards of Florida Statutes in Chapter 553, Building Construction Standards.
- 3. Property taxes must be paid current on the unit to be assisted.
- 4. Client selection will be on a first-come, first-served basis, unless otherwise specified by the sub-recipient in its application or matching fund source. No client who has received home repairs under SHIP shall be eligible to re-apply for assistance for a period of five years from the date they have been completed.
- Maximum property values for existing units after rehabilitation shall not exceed maximum purchase price for new or existing single family housing as established by the Housing Delivery Goals Chart.
- Each unit, with the exception of emergency repairs, must meet and may exceed minimum housing code.

- g. Sub-recipient Selection Criteria Not applicable.
- h. Additional Information None

C. DISASTER MITIGATION/RECOVERY PROGRAM

a. Summary of Strategy

The Disaster Mitigation/Recovery Program is made available to applicants whose homes have been damaged in a disaster declared by Executive Order. SHIP funds would be used to leverage available federal, state, and insurance funds to provide assistance to eligible households for the purpose of repairing eligible housing. Use of funds would include purchase of emergency supplies to weatherproof damaged homes, interim repairs to avoid further damage, tree and debris removal required to make the housing units habitable and post-disaster assistance for non-insured repairs required in order for the unit to meet the County's minimum housing standards. Funding may also be used for homeowner relocation expenses such as security deposit for eligible recipients that have been displaced from their homes due to damage from a declared disaster.

b. Fiscal Years Covered

Fiscal year covered will be SFY 2011-2012, 2012-2013 and 2013-2014.

c. Income Categories to be served

Very low, low, and moderate income households, as defined by Section 420.9071, F.S., will be served as well as households earning up to 120% of the Area Median Income (AMI).

d. Maximum award is noted on the Housing Delivery Goals Chart

e. Terms, Recapture, and Default

Funding for this program will be provided on a first-come first-served basis in the form of zero-interest, 10 year deferred payment loan. Payment is due upon sale if sold within the 10 year term. As long as the recipient continues to own the assisted property and live in the property as their principal residence during the term of the mortgage, then the loan will not have to be repaid. If sold after the 10 year term, no repayment is required. Any assistance will be included in a recorded mortgage and will be subject to the above recapture provisions. Default of the loan occurs if the mortgagor no longer resides in the home as the

principal residence, or if any part of the Property or any interest in it is sold, transferred, gifted or otherwise, conveyed, whether by voluntary act, involuntarily, by operation of law or otherwise, or if the Mortgagor is divested of title by judicial sale, levy or other proceeding, or if foreclosure action is instituted against the property, or if the Property is leased or rented. A subordination of this deferred payment mortgage will only be approved under the guidelines of the Subordination Policy established by the Alachua County SHIP Program. All repayments from this program shall considered program income.

A portion of the deferred payment second mortgage may be forgiven in cases where the loan-to-value ratio exceeds 100% and the home must be sold due to a catastrophic event (i.e. borrower's death or divorce, an extended illness of the borrower or a close family member who depends primarily on the borrower for support, etc.)

f. Recipient Selection Criteria

Applicants must own and occupy the assisted property as a principal residence.

The residence must have been damaged in a declared natural disaster. Applicants will be assisted on a first come. first served basis.

g. Sponsor Selection Criteria Not Applicable

h. Additional Information

SHIP disaster funds may not be used to purchase or repair mobile homes.

D. SPECIAL NEEDS PROGRAM

a. Summary of the Strategy

Through an interlocal agreement, Alachua County and the City of Gainesville will jointly sponsor the Special Needs Program targeted to the construction and rehabilitation of temporary, transitional, or long-term rental housing addressing the housing needs of persons who have special housing needs as defined in Chapter 67-37.002 (13), Florida Administrative Code. Funding for this program will be provided in the form of a zero-interest, deferred payment, due-on-sale loan for eligible construction and rehabilitation costs or to a maximum dollar amount per unit for construction or rehabilitation purposes.

b. Fiscal Years Covered

The Special Needs Program will be available in FY 2011-2012, 2012-2013, and 2013-2014.

c. Income Categories to Be Served

The income categories to be served are very low households as per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits for Gainesville MSA, as updated and distributed annually by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

d. Maximum Award

See Housing Deliveries Goals Charts.

e. Terms, Recapture, & Default

Funding for this program will be provided on a first-come first-served basis in the form of a zero-interest, 15 year deferred payment loan. Payment is due upon sale if sold within the 15 year term. If sold after fifteen years, no repayment is required. As long as the sponsor agency awarded SHIP funds continues to own and operate the assisted property to benefit low and very-low income persons with special housing needs during the term of the mortgage, then the loan will not have to be repaid. All SHIP funds awarded under this program will be included in a recorded mortgage and will be subject to the above recapture provisions. Default of the loan occurs if any part of the Property or any interest in it is sold, transferred, gifted or otherwise conveyed, whether by voluntary act, involuntarily, by operation of law or otherwise, or if the Mortgagor is divested of title by judicial sale, levy or other proceeding, or if foreclosure action is instituted against the property, or if the Property is leased or rented. A subordination of this deferred payment mortgage will only be approved under the guidelines of the Subordination Policy established by the Alachua County SHIP Program. All repayments from this program shall be considered program income.

f. Recipient Selection Criteria

See Exhibit H - SHIP Special Needs Interlocal Agreement, Program Guidelines (Attachment I).

g. Sponsor Selection Criteria

Available funds will be jointly advertised by Alachua County and the City of Gainesville. Alachua County and the City of Gainesville will enter into separate contracts with the entities awarded funding. Applications will be accepted from nonprofit and quasi-governmental agencies for specific projects. Applications will be reviewed by Alachua County and the City of Gainesville staff, who will make recommendations for funding of the projects that provide the most effective use of funds for housing and other services producing the greatest benefit to low and very-low income persons on a county-wide basis. The recommendations for funding, to be awarded by Alachua County, will be forwarded to the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners for approval. Agencies must demonstrate that funding and financing used for matching SHIP Special Needs funds will be available before SHIP funds will be committed and certify that assisted individuals or households qualify as very-low or low income. Preference will be given to eligible sponsors that provide employment opportunities to clients of the state Work and Gain Economic Self Sufficiency (WELFARE TRANSITION PROGRAM) Program. See Exhibit H - SHIP Special Needs Interlocal Agreement, Program Guidelines (Attachment I).

h. Additional Information

SHIP funds may be used as leverage funds for the HUD Continuum of Care grant program or with any other applicable private funding sources or local, state, or federal programs.

E. RENTAL DEPOSIT PROGRAM

a. Summary of the Strategy

The Rental Deposit Assistance Program provides funding to pay rental security and utility deposits on behalf of eligible very low income persons and/or households within Alachua County. Eligible utility deposits include only provider-mandated deposits for water, sewer, electricity, and gas. Rental Deposit funds may also be used to pay project delivery costs associated with strategy implementation such as inspection fees. To ensure maximum effectiveness and integrity, the PRDAP will be coordinated with rental security and/or utility deposit assistance provided by other agencies.

b. Fiscal Years Covered

The program will be available in SFY 2012, 2013, and 2014.

c. Income Categories to Be Served

Extremely Low and Very low income households will be served per the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Income Limits for Gainesville MSA as updated and distributed annually by the Florida Housine Finance Cornoration.

d. Maximum Award is noted on Housing Delivery Goals Chart

e. Terms, Recapture, and Default

Assistance to eligible applicants under this strategy will be in the form of a grant and will not be subject to recapture from the tenant.

f. Recipient Selection Criteria

Eligible applicants will be approved for assistance subject to funding availability on a first-come, first-qualified, first-served basis using the following criteria:

- Applicants must meet income eligibility requirements.
- Applicants must demonstrate that they can afford the monthly rent and utilities for their selected unit.
- Applicants assisted under this strategy must lease, for at least one year, a dwelling unit which meets Section 8 Housing Quality Standards.
- Monthly rents may not exceed maximum rents as established by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation's annual Rent Schedule.

- Assistance is one-time only; applicants must not have been previously assisted by the PRDAP.
- · Applicants must show proof of residence in Alachua County.
- · Applicant must be the primary tenant of the dwelling unit to be leased.
- Applicant may not be a college student unless employed 25 hours per week or more.
 - Applicants will be assisted on a first come, first qualified, first served basis.

g. Sponsor Selection Criteria

The Alachua County Department of Community Support Services will administer this Pilot Program with oversight from the Department of Growth Management.

III. LHAP INCENTIVE STRATEGIES

AN INC. APPLY STREAM PROPERTY AND THE WORLD STREAM PROPERTY AND THE PROPER

1. Expedited Permitting Process for Affordable Housing* (Required) Permits as defined in F.S. 163.3164 (7) and (8) for affordable housing projects are expedited to a greater degree than other projects. In the case when a backlog of applications for development approval occurs, resulting in delays in processing applications within the regularly scheduled time-frame, for profit and not for profit permits for affordable housing projects are assigned priority for review and processing. Permits shall be available within six business days after the application is found sufficient. This policy was implemented through Unified Land Development Code (ULDC) Chapter 402.03.5

2. Modification of Impact Fees for Affordable Housing

Alachua County provides General Revenue Funding to offset the cost of impact fees for affordable housing units. An increase on the budget from \$25,000 to \$100,000 may be considered if appropriate monitoring methods are established to reflect expeditures that justify this action. The procedures for this program were adopted April 12, 2005 in the Alachua County Development Impact Fees Administration Manual.

3. The reservation of infrastructure capacity for housing for very-low-income persons, low-income persons, and moderate-income persons.

The new ULDC allows for long term concurrency reservation for Affordable Housing Developments without utilizing the Planned Development (P.D.) process. (Chapter 407.121 b. ULDC). Traffic capacity on many major County roads is limited. Therefore, the reservation of traffic concurrency is a critical element of the development approval process. Without a Planned Development zoning approval, concurrency reservations are normally limited to six months with Preliminary Plan approval and one year after final development plan approval. Not having a longer term reservation limits most development projects to one phase of construction. With a Planned Development approved by the Board of County Commissioners through a public hearing process, developments may be built in multiple phases over several years with the certainty of having reserved traffic capacity reserved for all of the phases. The incentive of offering long term concurrency reservations with a development plan approval for an affordable housing project allows for long term multiphase projects without the additional effort, time, and costs required to pursue a planned development zoning approval.

4. Allowance for Accessory Dwelling Units-in Residential units in residential zoning Districts

Chapter 404.24, Unified Land Development Code (ULDC)

Accessory dwelling units are allowed by right with certain limitations on homesteaded lots in all residential zoning districts. This incentive creates an opportunity for affordable rental units to be included within market rate single family developments. As part of the EAR process, the limitations of accessory units have been identified for evaluation.

5. Reduction in parking and setback requirements for affordable housing

Chapter 407, ULDC, allows flexibility in parking requirements by providing options for shared parking for mixed use projects or uses that are adjacent to one another and provides allowances for reductions in off street parking requirements.

The allowance of flexible lot configurations, including zero –lot-line configurations, for affordable housing*

The Unified Land Development Code, Chapter 403. Article 3, implemented density based zoning districts that allow for flexible lot sizes and better utilization of densities allowed within land uses. The Unified Land Development Code contains a provision to allow mixed unit types by right (Single family and attached units) in residential zoning districts, allowing for more density and a greater range of unit prices. This in turn creates opportunities to include affordable housing units in market rate developments.

7. Modification of street requirements for affordable housing

Alachua County has a range of street standards, depending on street volume, which are intended to minimize street width requirements. There are no further recommendations on this issue at this time.

8. Establishment of an ongoing Review Process (Required)

Alachua County provides for the development of an expanded process to review local policies, ordinances, regulations, and comprehensive plan provisions which significantly increase the cost of housing. This initiative is administered through public advertisement of proposed new land development regulations and invitation of public comment on housing cost impact/.

Staff analysis is required for any comprehensive plan amendments or land development regulation text amendments, prior to adoption, to evaluate the impact(s) on the cost of housing, and to incorporate the findings in the staff report. This was implemented by a memo dated March 30, 2009 by the Alachua County Department of Growth Management.

Development of an inventory list of locally-owned public lands appropriate for use as affordable housing* (Required incentive)

Alachua County, in accordance with Florida Statutes, requires that every three years a review of County-owned lands be completed to determine if any are appropriate for use as affordable housing and conducted its evaluation at a scheduled public hearing. This policy was implemented through Resolution 08-28 on March 25, 2008.

Support for development and growth near transportation hubs, major employers, and mixed-use centers.

This is a theme of many policies in the Comprehensive Plan. Key EAR issues to be evaluated include these same policies.

*Indicates Specified Areas for Review per Florida Statutes 420,9076

11. Increased Number of Attached Units

Chapter 404.20(d) ULDC, contains a provision to increase the number of attached units allowed from four to eight units for Affordable Housing Developments.

12. Development Review Application Fee

The County Manager may waive development review application fees and charges to notfor-profit corporations that submit affordable housing projects. This policy is annually approved through the Alachau County fee schedule by the Board of County Commissioners.

A RESOLUTION OF THE ALACHUA COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF ALACHUA COUNTY, FLORIDA APPROVING THE LOCAL HOUSING ASSISTANCE PLAN AS REQUIRED BY THE STATE HOUSING INITIATIVES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM ACT, SUBSECTIONS 420.907-9, FLORIDA STATUTES; AND RULE CHAPTER 67-37, FLORIDA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE; AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE CHARMAN TO EXECUTE ANY NECESSARY DOCUMENTS AND CERTIFICATIONS NEEDED BY THE STATE; AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF THE LOCAL HOUSING ASSISTANCE PLAN FOR REVIEW AND APPROVAL BY THE FLORIDA HOUSING FINANCE CORPORATION; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the State of Florida enacted the William E. Sadowski Affordable Housing Act, Chapter 92-317 of Florida Sessions Laws, allocating a portion of documentary stamp taxes on deeds to local governments for the development and maintenance of affordable housing; and

WHEREAS, the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) Act, ss. 420.907-420.9079, Florida Statutes (1992), and Rule Chapter 67-37, Florida Administrative Code, requires local governments to develop a one- to three-year Local Housing Assistance Plan outlining how funds will be used; and

WHEREAS, the SHIP Act requires local governments to establish the maximum SHIP funds allowable for each strategy; and

WHEREAS, the SHIP Act further requires local governments to establish an average area purchase price for new and existing housing benefiting from awards made pursuant to the Act; The methodology and purchase prices used are defined in the attached Local Housing Assistance Plan; and

WHEREAS, as required by Chapter 67-37.005(6)(f)3, F.A.C, it is found that 5 percent of the local housing distribution plus 5 percent of program income is insufficient to adequately pay the necessary costs of administering the local housing assistance plan. The cost of administering the program may not exceed 10 percent of the local housing distribution plus 5% of program income deposited into the trust fund, except that small counties, as defined in s. 120.52(17), and eligible municipalities receiving a local housing

distribution of up to \$350,000 may use up to 10 percent of program income for administrative costs.

WHEREAS, the Growth Management Department has prepared a three-year Local Housing Assistance Plan for submission to the Florida Housing Finance Corporation; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners finds that it is in the best interest of the public for the Alachua County Board of County Commissioners to submit the Local Housing Assistance Plan for review and approval so as to qualify for said documentary stamp tax funds; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE Alachua County Board of County Commissioners OF Alachua County, FLORIDA that:

Section 1: Board of County Commissioners of Alachua County hereby approves the Local Housing
Assistance Plan, as attached and incorporated hereto for submission to the Florida Housing
Finance Corporation as required by ss. 420.907-420-9079, Florida Statutes, for fiscal years
2012, 2013, and 2014.

Section 2: The Chairman is hereby designated and authorized to execute any documents and certifications required by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation as related to the Local Housing Assistance Plan, and to do all things necessary and proper to carry out the term and conditions of said program.

ALACHUA COUNTY/CITY OF GAINESVILLE INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR THE ADMINISTRATION OF S.H.I.P. SPECIAL HOUSING NEEDS CONTRACTS DATED AFTER APRIL 12, 2005

THIS INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT (Agreement), entered into this 12 day of Agreement, 2005, by and between Alachua County, a charter county and political subdivision of the State of Florida, acting by and through its Board of County Commissioners (County), and the City of Gainesville, a municipal corporation created and existing under the laws of the State of Florida, acting by and through its City Commission (City):

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties hereto previously entered into an Interlocal Agreement dated May 28th, 1996, for the provision of Special Needs Housing Program services, recorded in the public records in Alachua County, Florida; and

WHEREAS, the City and County desire to enter into a new Interlocal Agreement wherein the City and County administer each Special Needs Housing project individually yet jointly perform some preliminary functions; and

WHEREAS, the City and County are authorized by the Florida Interlocal Cooperation Act, Section 163.01, et seq., Florida Statutes, to enter into interlocal agreements and thereby cooperatively utilize their powers and resources in the most efficient manner possible; and

WHEREAS, the William E. Sadowski Affordable Housing Act, Chapter 92-137, Laws of Florida, created the State Housing Initiatives Partnership (SHIP) Act, Section 420.907, Florida Statutes, which authorizes distribution of monies in the Local Government Housing Trust Fund for the purpose of providing funds to counties and eligible municipalities as an incentive for the creation of local housing partnerships, to expand production of and preserve affordable housing, to further the housing element of the local government comprehensive plan specific to affordable housing, and to increase housing-related employment; and

WHEREAS, Alachua County is an approved County and the City of Gainesville is an approved eligible municipality within the County; and

WHEREAS, the County has adopted a Local Housing Assistance Plan (County LHAP) meeting the requirements of the SHIP Act and establishing affordable housing programs; and

WHEREAS, the City has adopted a Local Housing Assistance Plan (City LHAP) meeting the requirements of the SHIP Act and establishing affordable housing programs; and

WHEREAS, the City and County have determined that the welfare of persons who have special housing needs within Alachua County are the joint concern of both local governments and that a program to provide transitional housing to such persons within the City and County can be more effectively and efficiently funded and administered through an interlocal agreement; and

WHEREAS, the City and County have each therefore provided in their respective LHAPs for the establishment of a Special Needs Housing Program, to be jointly administered by the City and the County, for the purpose of providing funding for transitional housing for such persons.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS AGREED as follows:

Section #1. After April 12, 2005, all projects awarded funds as part of the Special Needs Housing Program shall be administered and monitored under the terms of this agreement. All projects awarded funds under the terms of the agreement dated May 28^{th} , 1996, shall continue to be governed by the terms of that agreement.

Section #2. The Alachua County/City of Gainesville Special Needs Housing Program (Program) is hereby established for the purpose of providing and administering funding pursuant to the requirements of the SHIP Act to provide for transitional housing needs of persons who have special housing needs, including, but not limited to, persons with developmental disabilities; persons with mental illnesses or chemical dependency; persons with Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome ("AIDS") and Human Immunodeficiency Virus ("HIV") disease; runaway and abandoned youth; public assistance recipients; migrant and seasonal farm workers; refugees and entrants; the elderly; and disabled adults.

Section #3. Unless terminated earlier pursuant to Section 6.e. of this Agreement, the term of this Agreement shall begin on the date first above-written and run for the period of implementation of all Program years for which finding is contractually awarded to eligible program sponsors. The period of implementation shall include the term of monitoring established by the SHIP Act for each Program year.

Section #4. Funding for the Program shall consist of that portion of the funds allocated to the Program by approved City LHAP and County LHAP, respectively and contractually awarded to eligible sponsors pursuant to applicable provisions of the SHIP Act, SHIP rule and adopted program guidelines.

Section #5. The Program shall be administered consistent with the Alachua County/City of Gainesville SHIP Special Needs Housing Program Guidelines, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference as Attachment I to the Agreement, as the same may be amended as applicable, by mutual agreement of the parties.

Section #6. The City and County agree:

- a. To jointly advertise available funding for the Special Needs Housing Program by which funding is allocated by the City and County LHAP's respectively.
- To jointly receive and review applications for sponsor funding through the Special Needs Housing Program.
- c. To jointly review applications for funding and make recommendations to the City and/or County Commissions, respectively for separate funding awards in accordance with the Special Needs Housing Program Guidelines.
- d. To individually monitor sponsor compliance assisted through the Program as required by the SHIP Program for each contract awarded with its respected funds.
- e. If, at any time during the term of this Agreement, the City or County which are the parties to the Agreement believe that the intent of the parties as set forth herein is not being accomplished, or that the terms of the Agreement are not fair and equitable, such party may, upon provision of ninety days written notice, renegotiate the terms and provisions of this Agreement to become effective on the first day of the next state funding cycle. If the parties are unable to renegotiate the terms and provisions of the Agreement prior to the start of the next state funding cycle, or if one party ceases to be eligible for allocation and distribution of Local Housing Assistance Trust Fund monies, then this Agreement will terminate with respect to the next funding cycle and any future funding cycle but will continue as provided herein with respect to the responsibilities of the parties associated with past and current funding cycles.

Section #7. The City agrees as follows:

- To enter into an agreement with each approved sponsor applicant for which City's funding is awarded through the Program for the purpose of implementing the Program.
- b. Each party shall be solely responsible for the negligent or wrongful acts of its officers and employees. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by either party of its sovereign immunity or the provisions of §768.28, Florida Statutes.
- c. To assist the County with any aspect of the Program which is its responsibility under the terms of this Agreement upon request.

Section #8. The County agrees as follows:

- a. To enter into an agreement with each approved sponsor applicant for which County's funding is awarded through the Program for the purpose of implementing the Program.
- Each party shall be solely responsible for the negligent or wrongful acts
 of its officers and employees. Nothing contained herein shall constitute a waiver by
 either party of its sovereign immunity or the provisions of §768.28, Florida Statutes.
- c. To assist the City with any aspect of the Program which is its responsibility under the terms of this Agreement upon request.

Section #9. This Agreement and Attachment I embody the whole understanding between the parties. There are no promises, terms, conditions, or obligations other than those contained herein; and this Agreement shall supersede all previous communications, representations or agreements, either verbal or written, between the parties hereto.

Section #10. This Agreement may only be amended by a written document approved and signed by both the parties and filed with the Clerk of the Court of Alachua County, Florida.

Section #11. This Agreement shall take effect upon filing with the Clerk of the Court of Alachua County, Florida, pursuant to Section 163.01(11), Florida Statutes.

Section #12. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted as a waiver by the City or the County of its sovereign immunity except as provided under Section 768.28, Florida Statutes.

PROGRAM GUIDELINES FOR CONTRACTS DATED AFTER APRIL 12, 2005

I. GENERAL PURPOSE

A. Project Area and Purpose

Through an inter-local agreement, the City of Gainesville (City) and Alachua County (County) will sponsor a fund pool targeted to the construction and rehabilitation of temporary, transitional or long term rental housing addressing the following housing needs: persons who have Special Housing Needs means individuals because of particular social, economic, or health related circumstances, may have greater difficulty acquiring or maintaining affordable housing. Such persons may have, for example, encountered resistance to their residing in particular communities, and may have suffered increased housing costs resulting from their unique needs and high risk of institutionalization. Such persons may include, but are not limited to, persons with developmental disabilities; persons with mental illnesses or chemical dependency; persons with Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome ("AIDS") and Human Immunodeficiency Virus ("HIV") disease; runaway and abandoned youth; the elderly; and disabled adults.[re]

B. This Program shall be operated in accordance with all applicable rules and regulations of the County, City, State of Florida and Florida Housing Finance Corporation.

II. FUNDING SOURCE

The funding source shall be the SHIP Special Needs Housing Program as allocated in the City and County Local Housing Assistance Plans (LHAP) respectively.

III. ELIGIBLE PROGRAM SPONSORS

An eligible program sponsor must meet the following key eligibility criteria in order to participate:

- ✓ Sponsor organizations must be a quasi-governmental agency or a non-profit entity with current 501 (c) (3) tax exempt status;
- Sponsor organizations must demonstrate success in providing Special Needs Housing secured services during the previous three (3) consecutive years from date of application for Special Needs Housing Program funds.

- Sponsor organizations must demonstrate that other funds and financing are available before SHIP funds will be committed and must certify that all assisted individuals must qualify as very low and low-income households as defined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and adopted by the State of Florida and distributed by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation for use in the SHIP Program. Housing projects must meet income certification guidelines as provided by City and/or County Special Needs Income Certification Plan & Monitoring Strategy.
- Sponsor organizations must have applicable federal, state and/or local license(s) as required to
 operate an entity within the City and/or the County.
- To the extent funds are available, Sponsor organizations must make the assisted housing and related services available to all eligible persons regardless of jurisdiction of residence within Alachua County prior to or at the time of request or referral for services.

. ELIGIBLE SPONSOR SELECTION CRITERIA

The following selection criteria and measures will be used to evaluate applications for funds submitted by an eligible sponsor:

Approved site plan, Letters of commitment for other funding, Evidence of site control, Three years of tax returns, Three years financial statements, Interim financial statements, Project description, Company history, Resumes of all company principals, Application form, Survey and other documentation as may be required.

V. ELIGIBLE PROGRAM RECIPIENTS

An eligible recipient must meet the following key eligibility criteria in order to occupy a SHIP funded unit or receive assistance from eligible program sponsors:

- ✓ Must be in one of the special needs groups listed in I (A); and
- Assisted individuals must qualify as very low and low-income households as defined by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and adopted by the State of Florida and distributed by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation for use in the SHIP Program.

VI. ELIGIBLE PROPERTY

An eligible property for which SHIP Special Needs Housing Program Funds can assist must meet the following key eligibility criteria:

- Eligible properties shall be located in Alachua County, including the incorporated limits of the City of Gainesville;
- Rental units constructed, rehabilitated or otherwise assisted from the local housing assistance trust fund must be monitored at least annually for 15 years or the term of assistance, whichever is longer, for compliance with tenant income and affordability requirements, as otherwise exempted from Florida Statue 420.9075_(3) (e). In determining the maximum allowable rents, "Affordable" means that monthly rents or monthly mortgage payments including taxes and insurance do not exceed 30 percent of that amount which represents the percentage of the median annual gross income for the households as indicated in Section 420.9071 (2), subsection (19) and subsection (28), Florida Statutes. The rent limit chart is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and adopted by the State of Florida and distributed by the Florida Housing Finance Corporation for use in the SHIP Program.
 - ✓ Mobile homes shall not be assisted.

VII. FORM OF OWNERSHIP

Ownership types include the following:

✓ Fee simple title in a single-family or multi-family attached or detached unit;

OR

- Long-term lease for a minimum duration of the period of construction/rehabilitation plus the income compliance period.
- Proof of ownership shall consist of a copy of a recorded deed and of an executed recorded mortgage instrument (if applicable) showing that title to the property has been conveyed to the sponsor organization and containing a legal description of the property. Proof of longterm lease shall consist of copy of the lease agreement.

III. AWARD

- The City and County will jointly review sponsor applications for funding and make recommendations to the City and/or County Commissions, respectively for funding awards in accordance with the SHIP Special Needs Housing Programs.
- The maximum assistance will be the lesser of up to 50% of the eligible construction project cost or \$6,000 per unit. Maximum dollar amounts per unit (per bed for single-room occupancy units, per bedroom for multi-bedroom units, per bed for dormitories) will be based on the number of single or multi-occupancy bedrooms.
- Funds are provided to sponsor as a due on sale loan recorded in the public records of Alachua County, Florida. The housing must remain affordable and occupied by income eligible beneficiaries for a period of 15 years. Sponsor organizations shall comply with and provide written certification of income and rent levels for the compliance period of 15 years. All SHIP assisted rental properties offered for sale prior to the 15-year term of affordability must be subject to a right of first refusal for purchases at the current market value, less the amount of the SHIP subsidy, by eligible nonprofit organizations who would provide continued occupancy by eligible persons.

Collateral:

The sponsor organization shall execute a SHIP Mortgage Agreement in the amount of the loan for Special Needs Housing Program Assistance to be recorded in the public records in Alachua County, FL.

IX. ELIGIBLE COSTS

Eligible costs include the following:

Construction or rehabilitation of a unit or building for the purpose of providing temporary, transitional or long term rental housing for eligible households who are included in one of the special needs groups as listed in IA.

X. CONTRACTING

This sets forth requirements and procedures with respect to Special Needs Housing contracts financed through the Special Needs Housing Program.

A. Contract

Repair work done through the Special Needs Housing Program shall be undertaken only through a written contract between the Contractor and the sponsor organization receiving SHIP funds.

- B. Sponsor organization shall obtain or prepare the following documents:
 - ✓ Scope of Work & Cost Estimate;

- Prepare construction contract documents for project and obtain bids and proposals from contractors; and
- ✓ Conduct bid opening, which is open to the public.

XI. DISBURSEMENT

City and/or County staff shall be responsible for the following as applicable:

- ✓ Inspect repair work;
- Make final inspection of repair work, ensure that the County and/or City Building Divisions perform applicable inspections and receive Certificate of Final Approvals; and
- Obtain warranties and releases of liens from manufacturers, suppliers and contractors prior to final payment for repair work.

Final payment shall be made to sponsor organizations upon receipt of the following:

- √ Application for payment;
- ✓ Copies of all invoices, receipts, cancelled checks and/or other related documents;
- SHIP Financial Report for the funding reimbursement request (Attachment II);
- ✓ Certificate of Occupancy; and
- Income Certification forms and/or other related documentation, for occupants of the project as required by the City and/or County.

XII. TERMS & CONDITION

The sponsor organization shall agree to abide by the following terms and conditions:

- A. Sponsor organizations awarded funds through the Special Needs Housing Program will be required to enter into an agreement with Alachua County and/or City of Gainesville prior to the expenditure of any funds pursuant to the award.
- B. Discrimination: Section 420.9075(3)(c), F.S.

In accordance with the provisions of ss.760.20-760.37, it is unlawful to discriminate on the basis of race, creed, religion, color, age, sex, marital status, familial status, national origin, or handicap in the award application process for eligible housing.

C. Wages to Work Chapter 67-37.005(6)(b)7.,F.A.C.

Should a eligible sponsor be used, the city/county has developed a qualification system and selection criteria for applications for Awards to eligible sponsors, which includes a description that demonstrates how eligible sponsors that employed personnel from the WAGES and Workforce Development Initiatives programs will be given preference in the selection process.

D. Use of Proceeds

Use loan proceeds only to pay for eligible costs to carry out the construction or rehabilitation work for which the funding is approved.

E. Compliance Inspection

The Sponsor organization and contractor must allow inspection of the property constructed and/or repaired under this Program by City of Gainesville and/or Alachua County for compliance with applicable City and/or County Building Code and other applicable federal, state and/or local codes and requirements.

F. Completion of Work

Staff will assure that work is carried out promptly and efficiently according to standard construction and rehabilitation program procedures. No payment submission will be made to the sponsor organization until a release of liens from each supplier and subcontractor and general contractor Final Approvals Certificate and warranty papers are received by County/City staff.

Executive Summary

Alachua County has received a full price offer from an eligible household for NSP Home 005. This home was acquired and has been repaired through the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. The sales agreement meets all program requirements.

Background

Alachaa County received a grant in the amount of \$2.9 million from the Florida Department of Community Affairs to acquire and rehab foreclosed homes located in neighborhood saverestly impacted by high foreclosure rates. To date, 2.0 foreclosed homes have been purchased by Alachua County through the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. Nine NSP homes were purchased for resalt to eligible homebuyers, and the same of the second of the same of the second through the Alachua County Neighborhood Stabilization Program, to eligible homebuyers, in compliance with program requirements. Notice of availability of this NSP property for sale was provided via the County website and a county-wide release, in compliance with Ordinance 10-27. County sarff also disseminated information about NSP homes and how to acquire them, through the Alachua County Homebuyer Education Workshops, held in conjunction with the City of Gainesville Housing Division. A For Sale sign was posted at this home and a Hyer for home was made available as well. The Board previously accepted all pice offer for this home on March 22, 2011. Credit issues, however, prevented the first buyer from obtaining financing for this home and all spece offer was to submitted by a different buyer. This offer is being presented to the Board for final action, in compliance with the ordinance. The net proceeds from the sale of NSP homes will be used to purchasely hSSP. A contract

addendum was prepared by the County Attorney's office to ensure that the real estate contract complies with county policies and procedures. This home will be closed using a title insurance company procured to with NSP regulations.

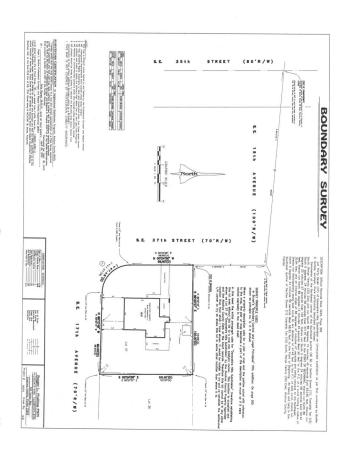

Executive Summary

The FY12 Interlocal Agreement with the City of High Springs for Fire Suppression and Initial Response Emergency Medical Services compensates the City of High Springs for their responses in the unincorporated area at a flat base amount of \$145,000 and \$362.00 per primary incident when dispatched as the primary responder into the City of Alachua. The City of Alachua reimburses the County for High Springs responses when E21 is committed on another incident within the municipal limits of Alachua. The estimated number of primary incident responses into the City of Alachua by the City of High Springs is 50 per year or \$18,100.00 for a total estimated contract expenditure of \$163,100.00. The Agreement also provides fiscal reciprocity for E21 responses into the municipal boundary of High Springs when the High Springs Engine is committed to another incident within their municipal boundary.

Background

The City of High Springs initially requested the County consider allowing a the City to merge with the County and participate in

the MSTU-Fire fund as a funding source for services for FY12. It was later requested to defer further discussions until the joint Board meeting in June, 2011 with a possible merger date of FY13. The City of High Springs has agreed to continue the Interlocal Agreement with Alachua County for the provision of Fire Suppression and Initial Response Emergency Medical Services. The agreement provides for a flat, base rate of \$145,000.00 in twelve (12) equal payments. The agreement also provides for \$362.00 are per incident when the City of High Springs is dispatched as the primary responder into the City of Alachua. The estimate based on past dispatches is \$0 or \$18,100.00. Past expenditure reductions have been shared by both the Department of Public Safety and all participants of the Fire Services Network. If the MSTU-Fire revenue is reduced, the FY12 agreement with High Springs may require amendment.

Issues

The FY11 agreement with the City of Alachua did not include the cost of the City of High Springs' primary response. The proposed FY12 agreement does include the reimbursement to the County for these costs. The City of High Springs has executed the FY12 agreement and advised the Board via attached letter dated March 30, 2011 that the document must be executed by April 30, 2011. A reduction to the MSTU-Fire revenue may impact the funding of the fire service agreements.

Fiscal Recommendation

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT FOR FIRE SUPPRESSION & FIRST RESPONSE EMS/RESCUE SERVICES BETWEEN ALACHUA COUNTY AND THE CITY OF HIGH SPRINGS

This Uniform Fire Service Interlocal Agreement for Fire Suppression & First Response EMS/Rescue Services (hereinafter "Agreement") by and between Alachua County, a charter county and political subdivision of the State of Florida (hereinafter "County") and the City of High Springs an authority organized under the laws of the State of Florida (hereinafter "City"), is made, entered into, and effective this 1st day of October 2011.

Whereas, Chapter 163, Florida Statutes, authorizes public agencies, including counties and cities, to enter agreements to provide services and to exercise jointly the power, privilege, or authority they share in common and which each might exercise separately; and,

Whereas, both City and the County deem it appropriate and in furtherance of the public health, safety, and welfare to enter an Interlocal Agreement to provide for fire suppression and first response EMS/rescue services; and

Whereas, the City is located within Alachua County and is authorized to provide fire suppression and first response rescue services; and

Whereas, the County is authorized to provide or contract for fire suppression and first response rescue services; and,

Whereas, the City is willing and able to provide fire suppression and first response rescue services to the County; and

Whereas, the County is willing and able to provide fire suppression and first response rescue services to the municipal boundaries of the City, and

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants declared herein and other good and valuable consideration each Party agrees as follows:

Section 1. Intent & Term of Agreement.

A) The City Fire Department shall be a part of the countywide cooperative system established by the Board of County Commissioners, known as the "Fire Services Network." The County and the City will reciprocate fire and first response EMS/rescue services as dispatched by the Combined Communication Center (CCC).

B) The term of this Agreement shall commence on October 1, 2011, the first day of Fiscal Year 2011-2012. This Agreement shall remain in effect until terminated by agreement of the Parties or as otherwise provided herein.

Section 2. Definitions. For purposes of this Agreement, the terms listed below shall have the following meanings:

- A) Alachua County Department of Public Safety (ACDPS): The County department charged with the responsibility for providing and/or coordinating Emergency Management, radio communications, Emergency Medical, Rescue Services, and Fire Protection services
 - B) CCC: Alachua County Combined Communications Center.
- C) First Response Rescue Services; The initial fire based non-transport response to requests for medical assistance for accident victims and health related incidents.
- D) Standard Communications Protocol; A step-by-step approach to radio communications which uses "plain language" and is based on uniform standards developed and/or adopted by the County.
- E) Incident; A call for fire suppression or first response services to a given location, regardless of the number of apparatus responding.
- F) District Chief; That person who is employed by ACDPS and who is designated to assume and assign command and control of emergency incidents.
- G) Fire Services Network; a Countywide cooperative system established by the Board of County Commissioners to ensure the safe and effective delivery of fire-rescue services through the core fundamentals of incident command, common terminology, equipment, training, dispatch protocols, radio system, and response assignments.

Section 3. Fire Suppression and First Response EMS/Rescue Services.

- A) Service Provider and Service Area. The City shall provide the initial response and support to all fire suppression and EMS/rescue incidents in the County as dispatched by the Combined Communication Center (CCC). The County shall provide initial response and support to all fire suppression and EMS/rescue incidents in the municipal boundaries of the City as dispatched by the Combined Communication Center (CCC).
- B) Incident Command. Command and control of every incident shall comply with the National Incident Management System.
- 1) Each party may retain, assign, or assume command of a fire incident occurring within its political jurisdiction.
 - C) Level of Service (LOS) Standards.
 - 1) Unit response within one (1) minute of dispatch (completion of the initial page); and
 - All personnel must meet Florida fighter certification requirements, and first
- responder (volunteer) or emergency medical technician (paid); and
 3) Responding Engine, Brush, or Squad unit(s) staffed with two (2) personnel, Tanker
 may be staffed with one (1) person.
 - 4) When responding from Station, the initial first response unit must arrive on scene

within twelve (12) minutes 80% of the time from dispatched; and 5) Apparatus assignment to incidents shall be in accordance with CCC dispatch protocols.

Section 4. Dispatch Protocols. The City may make protocol recommendations. Dispatch protocols shall be developed by ACDPS. Final authority to approve and implement dispatch protocols lies solely with the Director of Public Safety.

Section 5. Equipment and Staff.

- A) The City shall provide the necessary equipment and staff necessary to perform its duties under this Agreement.
- B) To ensure compatibility and interoperability with the Fire Services Network the City Fire Department equipment and operating procedures shall not be inconsistent with or in conflict with that used or adopted by the County.
- C) The County shall provide a complement of BLS disposable medical supplies (used by rescue units) utilized by the City's primary fire apparatus responding under this section. The County shall resupply consumable supplies as the supplies are used during emergency incidents with ACDPS.

Section 6. Other Agreements.

This Agreement shall have priority over any other agreement as related to the provision of fire suppression and first response EMS/rescue services in Alachua County except when City units have already responded to a request for mutual aid with another agency that the City has an agreement with.

Section 7. Dispatch Services. The County will provide central receipt of emergency calls, dispatching of units per the dispatch protocol, and voice radio communications.

Section 8. Communications Equipment. The County will provide the following communications equipment:

- A) Mobile and portable radios mobile and portable radios will be provided to the City for the exclusive use when responding to incidents dispatched by Alachua County. The actual number of radios provided shall be determined by the Director of Public Safety with consultation of the City's representative. The number of radios provided by the County will not exceed ten (10).
- 1) The County will provide for access for the County owned radios to the Countywide Radio System (CRS).
- 2) The County shall be responsible for maintenance, installation/removal, and replacement of County owned radios. All mobile radios are to be installed in primary emergency response apparatus by authorized technicians.
- Additional mobile and portable radios may be purchased by the City, but must meet the specifications and have full operability with the CRS.

- The City shall be responsible for any additional monthly CRS access fees for additional City owned CRS capable mobile radios.
- 5) The City shall be responsible for maintenance, installation/removal, and replacement of City owned radios. All mobile radios are to be installed in primary emergency response apparatus by authorized technicians.
- B) A list of all County-owned communications equipment provided to the City is attached as Exhibit "A" to this Agreement. This Exhibit may be modified from time to time without the necessity of amending this Agreement.

Section 10. Method of Payment.

- A) The County shall pay The City a flat rate total amount of \$145,000.00 for services provided to the County identified in this Agreement.
- Payments to the City shall be made in twelve (12) equal payments made on a
 monthly basis in accordance with the provisions for § 218, Part VII Florida Statutes ("Local
 Government Prompt Payment Act"). Payment must be received no later than the 30th of the month
 that the payment is due.
- B) The County shall reimburse the City at the rate of \$362.00 per incident when dispatched as the primary responder into the City of Alachua.
- "Primary responder" is defined as the only unit dispatched to an incident or when dispatched as the closest unit due to Engine 21's unavailability.
- 2) Payments to the City shall be made in the month immediately after the month the service was provided to the County. Payment will be in accordance with the provisions for § 218, Part VII Florida Statutes ("Local Government Prompt Payment Act"). Payment must be received no later than the 30" of the month that the payment is due.
- C) In the event this agreement is terminated pursuant to Section 12, a prorated share of funds shall be payable until the date of termination.
- D) The County shall fund the items listed below for the City's participation in the Fire Services Network :
 - Administrative oversight and management of the Fire Services Network.
 - 2) Replenishment of Disposable Medical supplies.
 - 3) Access to and use of the Countywide Radio System.
 - 4) Mobile and portable radios.
 - 5) Dispatch and radio communication services.
- E) The City shall reciprocate payment of \$362.00 per incident to the County when fire apparatus (excluding rescue and command) are dispatched as the primary responder within the municipal boundaries of the City.
- "Primary responder" is defined as the only unit dispatched to an incident or when dispatched as the closest unit due to Engine 29's unavailability.
- 2) Payments to the County shall be made in the month immediately after the month the service was provided to the City. Payment will be in accordance with the provisions for § 218, Part VII Florida Statutes ("Local Government Prompt Payment Act"). Payment must be received no later than the 30th of the month that the payment is due.

Section 11. Entire Agreement This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement and supersedes all prior written or oral agreements, understandings, or representations.

Section 12. Effective Date, Duration, Termination.

- A) This Agreement shall be effective on October 1, 2011 and remain in effect until terminated as follows:
- 1) If either party fails to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement in a timely and satisfactory manner, or if either party breaches any of the provisions, covenants, or stipulations under this Agreement, the other party shall give a written notice to the party in default stating the failure or breach and provide a reasonable time period for correction of same. In the event the correction is not made in the allotted time, the other party shall send a notice of intent to terminate, effective no earlier than 120 days. Within 30 days of the notice of intent to terminate, the Administrating Officials of each party shall meet to resolve the dispute.
- B) Termination Due to Funds Availability. The performance of any and all provisions of this Agreement by the City and County are expressly conditioned upon the availability of funds lawfully appropriated and budgeted to carry out the purpose of this Agreement. In the event an either party anticipates an unavailability of funds, then that Party may terminate this Agreement, effective at midnight on the next September 30th, by providing written notice no later than May 31st. Each Party is the sole and final authority as to the availability of funds for such Party. The each party is obligated to pay all funds due prior to the date of a termination.
- C) This Agreement will remain in effect until affirmatively terminated by either or both parties to the Agreement. Except as provided for in Section 11 (A) and (B) above, either party may terminate for convenience the Agreement by giving the other party written notice on or before May 31st of the previous contract year.

Section 13. Insurance.

- A) The County represents that it is self funded for liability insurance in accordance with Section 768.28, Florida Statutes. The County hereby assumes responsibility for, and hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the City harmless from any and all liability, claims, or damages imposed on the City up to the monetary limits provided in Section 768.26, Florida Statutes, arising out of or in connection with the negligent acts, omissions, or misconduct of the County and its agents or employees relating to the responsibilities of the County and the services to be provided by the County under this agreement.
- B) The City hereby assumes responsibility for, and hereby agrees to indemnify and hold the County harmless from any and all liability, claims, or damages imposed on the County up to the monetary limits provided in Section 768.28, Florida Statutes, arising out of or in connection with the negligent acts, omissions, or misconduct of the City and its agents or employees relating to the responsibilities of the City under this agreement. The City agrees to maintain insurance coverage, either through self-insurance or commercial policy, on their property identified utilized as part of this Agreement, to include premises liability in the amount to ensure full replacement.

C) Each party agrees to provide the other with copies of the certificates of insurance for all coverage's in effect throughout the term of this agreement and will provide the other with thirty (30) days notice of any cancellation or amendment to the insurance coverage's.

Section 14. Liability, Each party shall be solely responsible for the negligent acts or omissions of its employees, volunteers, and agents which in any way relate to or arise out this Agreement. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as consent to be sued by third parties in any matter arising out of this Agreement or constitute a waiver by either party of its sovereign immunity or provisions of 768.28, Florida Statutes. This agreement does not create any relationship with, or any rights in favor of any third party.

Section 15. Service Disputes. The County and City shall each appoint one representative whose responsibility shall be to review and resolve any and all service disputes. The Representatives must be from an operational Chief level classification. Repeat, habitual, and unresolved disputes will be forwarded to the attention of the Public Safety Director and City Manager.

Section 16. Filling of Agreement. The County, upon execution of this Agreement, shall file the same with the Clerk of the Circuit Court in the official records of Alachua County, as required by Section 163.01(11), Florida Statutes.

Section 17. Applicable Law. The laws of the State of Florida shall govern this Agreement; venue is Alachua County, Florida.

Section 18. Notices. Except as otherwise provided herein, any notice, acceptance, request, or approval from either Party to the other Party shall be in writing and, sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, and shall be deemed to have been received when either deposited in a United States Postal Service mailbox or personally delivered with signed proof of delivery.
